WASHINGTON (UPI) — Backstairs at the White House:

Only rarely does President Eisenhower sign autographs in public. Usually, when he's at a banquet and people approach him with their menus to be signed, he smiles as graciously as possible and asks that they mail the cards to him.

Eisenhower is pretty good about signing such things as menus and programs, even if it does on occasion take many weeks before they get back to the individual who made the request.

The President's firm stand which, incidentally is quite encouraged by the Secret Service, dissolved the other night here when he had dinner with several thousand Republicans honoring the GOP members of Congress.

Movie actor John Wayne was the toastmaster and naturally he attracted a lot of autograph seekers.

ers. Armed with Wayne's signature, many of the diners then approached Mrs. Eisenhower. And the next step logically was to brace the President.

As he said later, he made his fatal mistake when he signed the first one. The next thing he knew, he was literally besieged. The front of the table where he was sitting was mobbed. Even waitresses who were supposed to be serving the meal put aside their trays for the moment and joined the mob.

Secret Service agents in front of the President stood their ground gamely, but they had their limitations. After all, this was a Republican dinner where the new holders planked down \$100 a plate.

One waitress ran along the edge of the head table waving an autographed menu and crying, "My son will be proud of me—even if I get fired for this."

The banquet manager of the Sheraton Park Hotel stood in the wings and glanced balefully at the hubbub in front of Eisenhower.

At this point the question was how to cut off the autograph seekers without committing political sin.

There were whispered conferences between the Secret Service and the White House political expert A. P. Pollack, Secretary Thomas E. Stephens. A quiet message was passed along to actor Wayne and he got to his feet to announce somewhat sadly that the crowd was getting too great and would the autograph seekers please desist immediately.

Then the President, far behind the other diners, got to eat a few mouthfuls of his dinner.

One of Washington's most distinguished and best-liked reporters is Edward T. Follard of the Washington Post and Times Herald.

Eddie recently enjoyed a long vacation and returned to work in time to cover the White House swearing-in of Thomas S. Gates Jr., as Deputy Secretary of Defense in the White House conference room.

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Per custom, the President after the ceremony moved down a line of Gates' relatives shaking hands. Because of the crowd in the room, Follard was pushed close to the end of the reception line. The next thing he knew, the President had grabbed his hand and was shaking it vigorously.

Then Eisenhower looked up and went into a movie-type double-take.

"Why, Eddie," the President burst out with a laugh. "What in the world..."

Follard retreated immediately from his new-found status as a member of the Gates family.

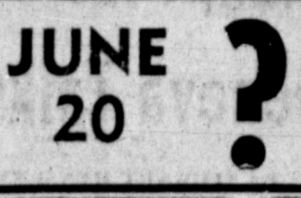
NORSTAD VISITS BAVARIA

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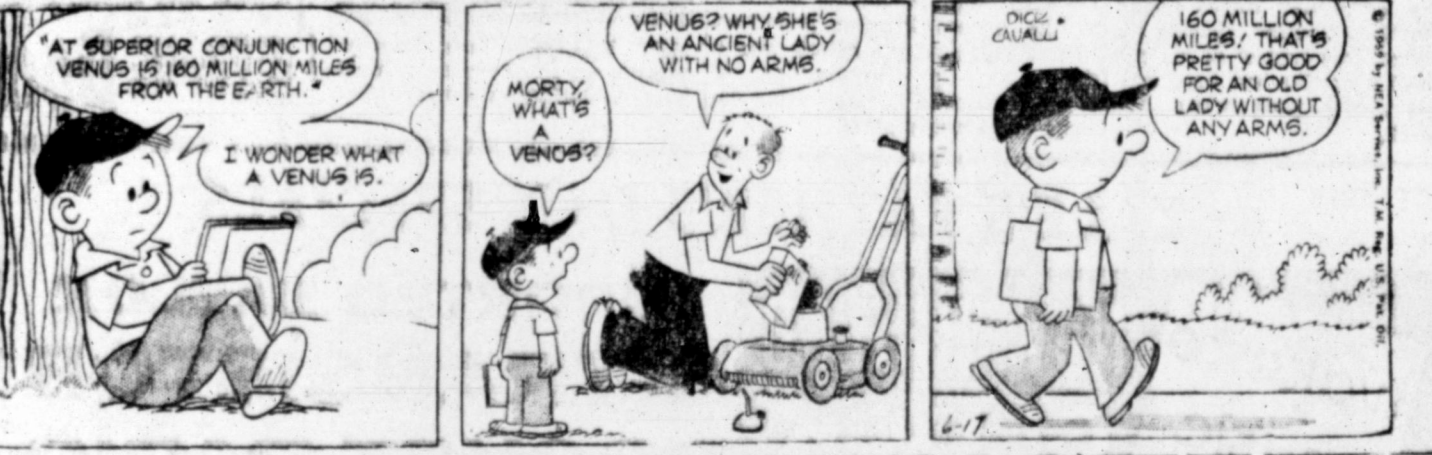

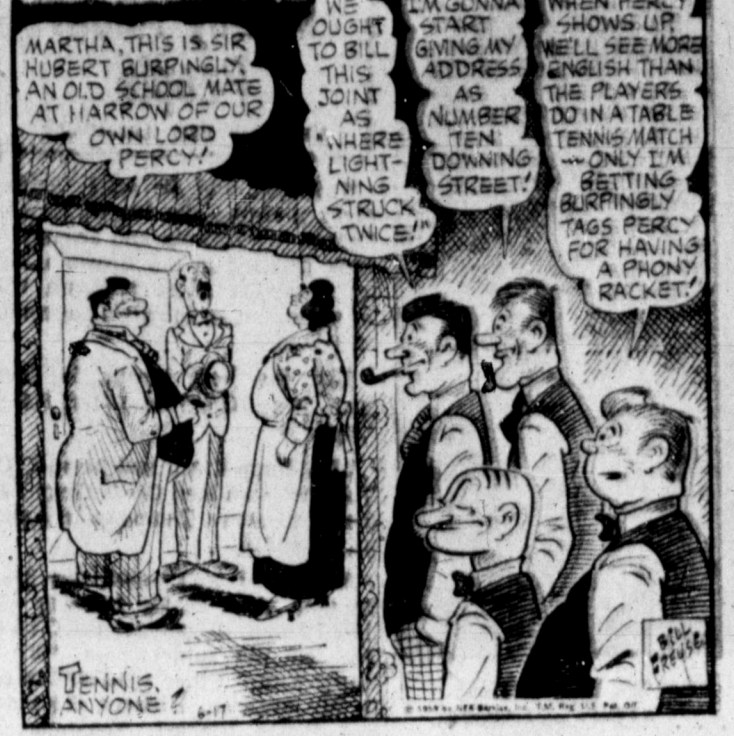
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Rockefeller May Have Better News For Taxpayers In 1960

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Along about January 1960 will be soon enough to determine whether New York's Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller has a solid chance to win the Republican presidential nomination.

Practical politicians will wait until January to make their own estimate of Rockefeller's political potential. They will be waiting for the governor's second annual message to the New York Legislature. It will be recalled that in his first message, last January, Rockefeller rocked New York and shook up the Republican Party with a demand for a big tax boost, and got about what he wanted.

would compel the Republicans to take a long and lively look at Rockefeller. Vice President Richard M. Nixon's prospects would be clouded and Rockefeller's would be correspondingly brightened by such a combination.

Party Irregular

Some of the governor's political disabilities would begin to fade under such circumstances. Many organization Republicans would consider it a disability that Rockefeller does not always wear the party label proudly. For example, the fact that he was the Republican candidate for governor last year was de-emphasized in his campaign.

Campaigner Rockefeller seemed unwilling to associate himself with the Eisenhower administration; all but bolted the city in an effort to avoid a meeting with Nixon during the campaign. Some Republicans question how deeply his political roots go into Republican soil. Some of these cite the opinion of Averell Harriman, the Democratic governor whom Rockefeller defeated last November.

In a newspaper interview, Harriman said: "Mr. Rockefeller, in my judgment, ran as a liberal Democrat."

Further to Left

In a less publicized remark, Harriman on Dec. 23, 1958, expressed the opinion that the Republicans would not nominate Rockefeller in 1960 because he is

too far to the left—even more so than L. Further left than Harriman is quite a distance.

Political observers noted during the New York campaign between Harriman and Rockefeller that: "Basically, there are no meaningful issues in the campaign so far as New York voters are concerned."

There is no question about Nixon's party regularity. There seems to be some question about Rockefeller's. That, of course, need not be a disability in the Republican Party. Republican national conventions from time to time have rejected the claims of party regularity and responsibility for a bright, new face.

There was Wendell L. Willkie back there in 1940. And, in 1962, Republicans chose Dwight D. Eisenhower over Robert A. Taft.

In New York's Rocky, the Republicans may have got themselves another Ike or, even, a personality cult dreamboat in the image of F.D.R.

Rockefeller's January 1960 message might have better news for the taxpayers. The governor will be in business as a likely Republican presidential nominee if that 1960 message reports a surplus in the state treasury and requests a tax reduction.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower is worried about the oyster lobby. He says there is a possibility it may be influencing somebody.

What popped out of each letter from the Long Island Shellfish Farmers Assn. was a couple of starfish.

When order was restored, and the starfish were retrieved from far corners, behind bookcases, etc., everybody was relieved to find they were dead. There was further relief when it was ascertained they hadn't been dead but so long, or possibly that they had been pickled.

Starfish Relish Oysters

Some congressional secretaries, and maybe some members of Congress, later got around to reading the letter that came with the starfish. It said starfish, like people, think oysters taste great.

It said they hold to this view so firmly in fact that they ate 50 million dollars worth of 'em last year on the bottom of Long Island Sound.

What the oyster men want, of course, is for Uncle Sam to spend such sums as may be necessary to wipe out the starfish. It remains to be seen what comes of that.

Earlier this year each of our lawmakers got a Douglas fir tree in the mail. This do-it-yourself reforestation kit came from an Oregon lumber firm, through Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.), and each member was left to judge for himself what axe this outfit was trying to grind.

What Watered, Will Grow!

What Porter said was that the tree, if watered and tended for the next 100 years, was guaranteed to grow into a giant.

Most members accepted the gift at face value, though one demanded assurance the fir wasn't now, and would never become, a mink. Many of the trees were planted and apparently Porter was right; some are already two inches high.

In another influence attempt overlooked so far by the President, every congressman awhile back received in the mail three nice tuna fish cans, courtesy of Rep. Bob Wilson (R-Calif.). The only thing was, they were empty.

Wilson got some phone calls about that, might quick, and would have got a lot more except that some of the recipients read the letter that came with the cans. Wilson said in the letter that if foreign competition didn't let up his district's tuna packers would have to quit packing.

To mollify everybody, lest they start eating created chicken instead, Wilson later sent each member another package just like the first one. Most of the recipients detected the difference in weight and refrained from throwing the shipment back at the mailman. These cans were full.

Maybe they got there too late, though. Anyway, Wilson's bill to curb tuna imports never got out of committee.

Atomic Experts Place Price Tag

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Government atomic experts have placed price tags ranging up to three billion dollars on the cost of installing a fool-proof nuclear test ban detection system.

Their rock-bottom estimate to get the system started was one billion dollars.

The estimates came from government sources most interested in winning agreement with the Soviet Union on a nuclear test ban. They said the price tags are admittedly "guesstimates" because such key cost questions as the current Geneva test ban negotiations are still inconclusive and the number of controlled stations to be set up.

Some studies were made last summer on the basis of a 150-station control system. But officials said Saturday the studies have been made somewhat obsolete by new developments in underground and high altitude testing.

Report Complicates

An official intimately connected with the test ban negotiations said it would take from two to three billion dollars to get the system moving. Another official said he was "personally convinced the costs would be utterly fantastic."

Complicating attempts to fix a firm figure was a report made public Friday by President Eisenhower's special scientific panel recommending new research in seismic studies, including resumption of underground tests to substantiate theories developed in the laboratories.

The panel, chosen by Eisenhower's scientific adviser, Dr. James Killian, also proposed development and installation of more sensitive seismometers in the control system.

Scientists from East and West are expected to meet later this month to discuss means of detecting high altitude tests such as those conducted by the United States last August and September. It has been agreed generally that space satellites would be the most effective means of detecting such tests.

Share All Costs

Officials said the cost of administering a control system probably would be relatively high even after it is in operation. Thousands of persons would have to be trained to operate the stations. In addition, maintenance of the remote stations required for an effective worldwide system would run into millions of dollars.

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DEATH HOUR ADVANCED

OSNING, N.Y. (UPI)—The execution-hour at Sing Sing—11 p.m. the last 43 years has been moved up to 10 p.m. It was announced Tuesday. Authorities said the new hour would preclude disturbing the governor late at night in an emergency, would be more convenient for witnesses and would enable fuller news coverage of executions.

Gen. Charles de Gaulle has gone beyond his original demands that France, the United States and Britain have final say in all NATO military decisions. Should he be successful in his latest demand, he alone would have the final say. De Gaulle already has announced the French Mediterranean fleet would not be answerable to NATO command in winter. Now he refuses to permit stockpiling of U.S. atomic warheads in France unless he receives a share in atomic secrets. Advance military planning is based on the absolute certainty of cooperation of all NATO members. Therefore, what De Gaulle is saying is that unless he is captain of the team he won't play. It is one of the thorniest problems NATO has had to face.

Mamie's secret is quantity of pictures, not quality.

"I've been learning and accomplishing a great deal. I'm confident I'll be able to handle dramatic roles in big pictures now. I'm ready for them."
Clad only in a sheer negligee and frilly undergarments, Mamie didn't evoke memories of Helen Hayes. But she's determined to make the grade.

Government Wants To Lower Interest

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Now it comes out that what the government wants is lower interest rates. That's why it is proposing to raise 'em.
And anybody who can't understand this just hasn't stayed away from the hearings at which it is all being explained.
According to the testimony so far, a lot of us have the wrong idea about interest rates anyway. In the first place, they aren't really high at all. And in the second place, if they were, this would only prove how well off we are.

You see, it's only when we have plenty of money that we all rush out to the bank for a loan. And, of course, it's not the lenders, but all of us borrowers competing with ourselves who keep interest rates up.
Martin Clarifies
William McChesney Martin Jr., chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, spent all morning clarifying these matters of high fiscal policy for members of the House Ways & Means Committee.
They thanked him, and Rep. Thomas B. Curtis (R-Mo.) said gratefully these were just the things they needed to know, so they can explain them all to the House a little bit later.
This will come, presumably, when the committee approves, at least in part, President Eisenhower's request for a law to let us taxpayers pay ourselves higher interest rates on the billions of dollars we always are borrowing from ourselves to keep solvent.
If Congress doesn't OK the request, Martin said, the savers amongst us are liable to start lending their money to somebody who can pay more than the 4 per cent interest which is all the law now lets us pay ourselves.
