VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (UPI) Air Force sources expressed extreme pessimism today about the fate of Discoverer III satellite and Its four mice passengers.

"It is very, very doubtful that it went into orbit," said an official.

To succeed, scientists had to aim the huge seven story rocket at such a precise angle that a two degree error in any direction could have caused it to

roar through the skies like a "super intercontinen-

If that happened, Discoverer III and its black mice burned up in the heavy earth atmosphere like a blazing meteorite. It could have flown in excess of 6,000 miles before disintegrating. Two other possibilities existed.

Power Failure Possible

A "complete power failure" could have blacked

if it were in orbit. The breaking of several electrical couplings could cause such a failure.

Or it could be tumbling end over end like the first Discoverer did last April. The tumbling motion prevents transmission of vital data.

The 78 foot modified Thor missile with a Bell-Hustler second stage was blasted aloft at 4:09 p.m. e.d.t. Wednesday in what appeared to be perfect

The second stage with its mice cargo and array of scientific measuring data ignited as planned.

Signals Heard 13 Minutes But radio signals were received for only 13 min-

The last station to receive the vehicle's signals was a tracking ship 1,200 miles down the Pacific range shortly after blastoff. At that time all appeared

It was learned Discoverer III was speeding at almost the 18,000 mile an hour velocity necessary for orbiting. It was 40 miles high and seemed about to go into a planned orbit which would have whirled it around the earth across the north and south poles.

Hours of silence followed until 10 p.m. e.d.t. when the Air Force issued this statement;

"Reduction of the 13 minutes of telemetry received during the launching of Discoverer III is still underway. Based on information presently available, it is believed that the Discoverer did not achieve an orbit."

A request was put out to the world's approximately half dozen radar stations capable of tracking & satellite, but there appeared to be little hope of making contact in this manner even if Discoverer III was





Your Child and the Doctor It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parents' consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid - but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot grant consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Chil-Juanita Winborne, 1713 N dren cannot do this.



But if officious grownups insist on feeding his appetite for wonder with books about missiles, atomic submarines and flood control, he may never be able to take delight in the world's great romantic, imaginative literature.

Today we sell more of the Arabian Nights and of Andrew Lang's collections than ever before. The children want them even if the grownups don't."









Next, we cut the pattern up into its individual pieces and each piece is laid over glass and the glass cut to exact shape. It is probably much like making a dress. Pieces. of material are cut to pattern dimension. Instead of sewing our pieces we join them with lead, the pliable kind It's been that way for centuries. No innovations or modern shortcuts. After all the glass pieces are cut out and checked against the pattern, we join them all with beeswax and rosin on a sloped, giant easel. The easel also is glass so the sunshine can come through. There, the flesh tones are put on with a dye. Folds are painted into the robes, figures are outlined in black paint that will stand up for centuries and then we put the colored pieces in a kiln held by electricity at 2,000 degrees."

Only Massachusetts, in the retirement of a veterans' bonus that year, spent more than it took in. In 1958, only 16 states still operated within their incomes. Thirty-two states were in debt and spending more than they took in.


