LIGHT PLANE MARK BROKEN

EL PASO, Tex. (UPI) — Pilot Max Conrad broke the record for non-stop, single-engine light plane flight today and radioed as he passed over El Paso that he is going to try to fly to San Diego, Calif.

Conrad took off from Casablanca, Morocco, Tuesday in a Piper Comanche 250 and has been going ever since. "I am feeling good," he radioed, Southwest Air Rangers as he passed over El Paso International Airport at 10:52 a.m. c.s.t.

Circle, Over Gulf He had been in the air 33 hours when he passed over El Paso and said he would trade a gallon of the gasoline he had left for a gallon of water.

Conrad also reported that he had circled over the Gulf of Mexico about six hours earlier before reporting to the Corpus Christi, Tex., airport.

A veteran pilot at El Paso airport said he has enough gasoline to fly 75 miles farther west, if he is careful.

The Southwest Air Rangers radio station lost contact with him shortly after he passed over the airport. His battery was reported weak.

El Paso. Officials arranged for Customs service agents to be at Tucson in case he decided to land there.

Conrad, known as the "flying grandfather," dipped to within 100 feet of the ground as he passed over the El Paso airport. He was escorted by a squadron of El Paso planes.

Conrad told the control tower at El Paso airport that where he stops depends on how his gasoline supply looks. He reported over Van Horn, Tex., 80 miles out of El Paso, that he had 70 gallons left.

Old Mark Shattered The weather was clear as Conrad passed over El Paso.

It is 6,958 miles from Casablanca to El Paso. Conrad had broken the record when he radioed in from Van Horn.

The old record was set by M. L. Boling on a flight from Manila, in the Philippines, to Pendleton, Ore., last year. Boling flew 6,856 miles.

Conrad, a Trans-Atlantic ferry pilot, lives in San Francisco.

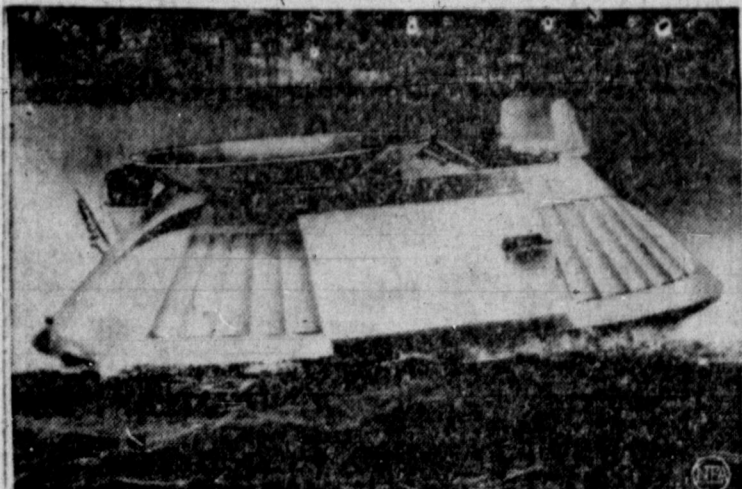

It was big news in England last month when Ginger Rogers admitted she was 47. Ginger was just being honest while most of her contemporaries guard their ages more carefully than their diamonds and furs.

Some Grow Younger

Hollywood's record books, going back to the early days of the talkies, provide the ages for almost every star in movies and TV. Frequently, an actress grows younger as new editions come out of the presses. In other cases the birth date is missing altogether.

DeGaulle Has Done Much For France Since Taking Office

Just a year ago France teetered on a precipice, threatened with total chaos if pushed too hard either by the Communists on the left or Fascist elements on the right.

Between these forces and a France frightened by her own inability to solve her problems stepped Gen. Charles de Gaulle.

In the 12 months which have followed, much for the better of France has occurred. The franc, unit of French currency, is at its soundest in years. As proud evidence of French resurgence, French Finance Minister Antoine Pinay arrived in the United States last month carrying a check for more than 100 million dollars—a debt before due payment on France's U.S. debt.

Frenchmen once more feel themselves in the collective role of world power.

Of all the problems which pressed in upon De Gaulle on his assumption of power, there was one which combined a bit of the elements of each.

This was Algeria.

Unrest and the threat of civil war stemming from the Algerian rebellion had been the spearhead which opened the way for De Gaulle's return. The same elements could lead to his downfall.

Human elements were the powerful French settlers in Algeria who had gained the support of the 400,000 man French army there and who together finally toppled the Fourth Republic.

But as De Gaulle has been able to guide individual Frenchmen home from their single paths to one broad highway of French effort, his popularity in Algeria has declined as suspicion mounted.

The suspicion was based on De Gaulle's obvious reluctance to declare Algeria's "integration" with

France—a condition which would align 1,200,000 French settlers in Algeria with 45 million Frenchmen at home against 9 million Moslem Algerians.

Thus, the Moslem natives always would be effectively outvoted and the minority settlers always assured of a dominant vote in Algerian affairs.

Signs Of Progress

Their suspicions were heightened by De Gaulle's forgiveness of certain rebel leaders and his expressed willingness to negotiate.

De Gaulle has undertaken his monumental tasks one by one and until the last three weeks has appeared to give little more than lip service to settlement of the Algerian revolt.

But in the last few weeks there have been these signs of measurable progress:

First, plans by extremist settlers to demonstrate against him on May 13 in Algiers fell through

when it was learned he had swung the army solidly behind him. On May 13 Algiers was quiet.

Second, the Sunday, May 31, senatorial elections in Algiers also were quiet, in sharp contrast to the bomb attacks which accompanied the municipal elections in April. Moderates were the winners.

Third, there has been an increasing number of Moslem rebel surrenders, complete with arms.

And, finally, there have been the renewed negotiations which by the end of the summer might see King Mohammed V of Morocco acting as mediator between the De Gaulle government and the Moslem rebels with a view toward ending the war which now costs France more than a billion dollars a year.

The French army and middle of the road Algerians now seem to be on De Gaulle's side. What he

CON MEN SLACKING UP

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Inspector George Dyer, a 34-year veteran on the San Francisco police force, said that even criminals were better in the good old days. "Today's criminal simply doesn't take pride in his work," Dyer said. One Wife, One Mortgage Is Enough!

WASHINGTON (UPI) — "One wife and one mortgage loan is all any man should be asked to bear."

So says Norman P. Mason, federal housing administrator, home owner and husband.

Mason's maxim is directed mainly at prospective home buyers who plan to finance their purchase with not one but two mortgages.

A foe of second mortgages for many years, Mason is afraid that home buyers who go in for secondary financing don't know enough about it.

Having seen friends and associates load up with second mortgages in the booming 1920's, then find themselves facing foreclosures in the depression 30's, Mason makes no bones about his professional dislike of secondary financing.

A second mortgage is often taken out by persons buying a house on credit who can't get up enough cash for the downpayment. The second mortgage is generally for a much shorter term than the principal loan.

Second Trust Is Riskier

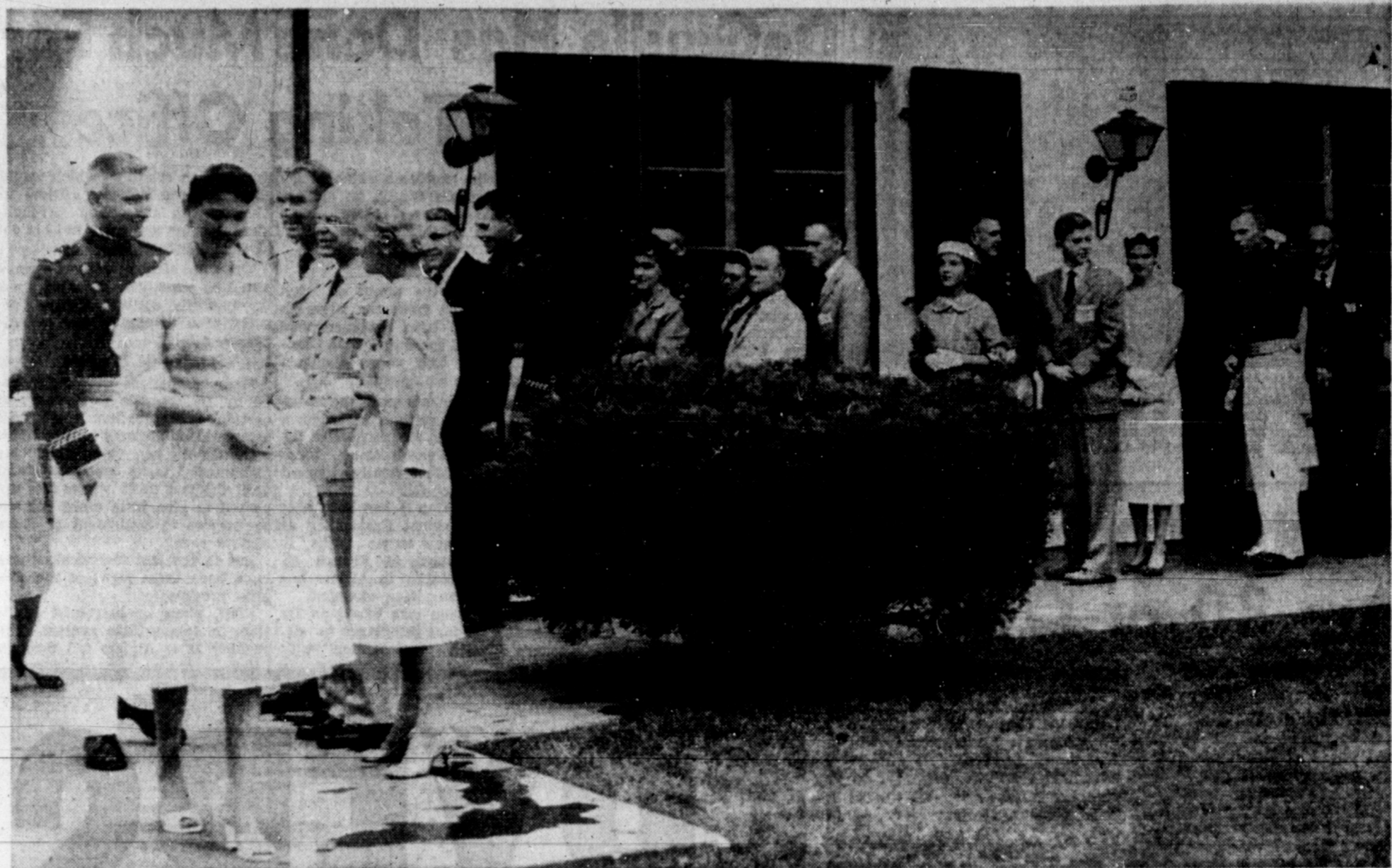
Because it represents a secondary claim on the property in case of default, the second trust is riskier for the lender. Therefore, he charges a higher interest rate, discount and other fees. Mason said that paying off two home loans at once can put a terrific strain on the monthly budget of a middle or low-income family. That's one of the hazards of secondary financing he believes is not fully understood.

"There's a tendency to be lulled into the belief that all installment-buying works out all right," Mason said in an interview. "When times are good and incomes are steady or rising, perhaps it does. But if something goes wrong, and people can't meet their payments, they are in danger of losing the house and everything they've paid into it."

Might Burden Themselves

The second mortgage sometimes allows modest income home buyers to burden themselves with an imprudent amount of debt, Mason stated.

"The purpose of our FHA and VA mortgage programs is through government underwriting to give a big enough first mort-

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House Considers 'Uribiculture' Dept.

The Lighter Side

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A House Government Operations subcommittee was considering setting up a new department of agriculture, and what Rep. Clarence Brown (R-Ohio) wanted to know was whether this meant plans were afoot to plow under some city dwellers.

According to Rep. Martha W. Griffiths (D-Mich.), author of one of a number of proposals to create this new agency, that wasn't the idea at all. Neither was it her plan, as Brown apparently

had suspected, to pay window box farmers for not raising onions, tomatoes and parsley.

Mrs. Griffiths' argument seemed to be that we set up the Agriculture Department years ago to help out the country fellow, and now we've pretty near helped him clean out, with the result that 70 per cent of our people are living in town.

City Folks Harassed

These city folks now are harassed by too many cars and no place to park, too much sewage and too little water, too many people and not enough houses, too few schools and too many slums, and by so many other crises she said it's time we set up a government department to try to help figure the answers.

Rep. Albert Rains (D-Ala.), who has a similar bill, said, "in the next generation, this is the biggest problem we'll have to face."

Brown said from the way farmers are singing the blues he couldn't see that the Agriculture Department had exactly solved the farm problem, despite spending billions of dollars. Brown was right, Mrs. Griffiths allowed, and that's why we better pass her bill in a hurry.

"Under the present farm program," she said, ever so sweetly, "all the farmers are soon going to be in the cities."

Brown let that one go by and said he bet Congress originally never suspected the Agriculture Department would wind up paying farmers for what they don't grow. He said if we create a new secretary of agriculture, mightn't he wind up solving the water shortage by paying city folks not to take baths?

Subsidies For Babies

"Everybody else is paying subsidies," Brown said, "so maybe he'll pay people not to have babies, or not to drink water."

Rep. Dante Fascell (D-Fla.), who wants to create a study commission on city problems instead

Holiday U.S.A. Show Like Lettuce - Not Very Nourishing

TELEVISION IN REVIEW

NEW YORK (UPI) — Holiday U.S.A., Wednesday night's CBS TV special, was a lettuce and tomato sandwich kind of show. Hot weathery, slapped together, not particularly nourishing, acceptable only if you're heat beat and willing to let your standards slide.

It was one of those programs in which a group of performers — Gisele MacKenzie, Burl Ives, Eddie Hodges — obviously were signed up in advance without much idea of what would be done with them. As a result, nothing much was done. The combatants were flung into a series of musical numbers, none wholly diverting, and all of it wound up looking like a soggy one hour version of Your Hit Parade.

The show had a scattering of fair moments: Jacques D'Amboise and Diana Adams danced briefly, but well. The U.S. Naval Academy glee club ground out a few pleasant pieces with the unhelpful assistance of Burl Ives. And the Red Nichols group turned out some acceptable music, marred only by Ives' insistence on sing-

ing with the band. As a jazz singer, Ives has about as much feeling as Carmen Lombardo.

As for Eddie Hodges, the young star who was on board, I suggest it is about time he retired. He is a clean-cut looking boy, but beyond his hygienic attributes, his talents are slim. His singing has that particularly irritating kind of quality that is best put to use in calling stray dogs.

Wednesday night, ABC-TV unclocked a new weekly hour whose title, Music for a Summer Night, describes it pretty well. It's a little like the Voice of Firestone Show and Wednesday night one of the graduates of the Firestone chorus. Frances Wyatt, was even present to help define its character. It provides pleasant, if not fine entertainment — the kind of show

which tries to manufacture the type of music that fades into the woodwork and which books in performers to match.

There were a few stickout moments Wednesday night. Melissa Hayden and Andre Eglevsky tackled the Swan Lake bit with a nice sense of ethereal elegance. Geula Gill, an Israeli folk singer, pitched out some semi-exciting sounds in a segment far too brief. And John Hoppe's moblux constructions — strange schmoos like creatures that are created with special light reflectors — provided some delightful punctuation for the proceedings.

Aside from that, however, it was a standard TV musical offering — a kind of long playing record to open beer bottles by.

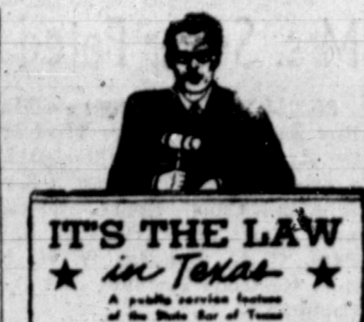

Your Child and the Doctor It's a good idea to give written consent for necessary medical care if your child leaves home for a visit or a camping trip, or if you plan to be away for any length of time.

For example, a summer camp nurse may bring a boy into a hospital with an acute case of appendicitis. But the doctor may well hesitate to go ahead and operate without the parents' consent.

Is the doctor arbitrary, and is such permission just a legal technicality? No, he is well within his rights, though he may give first aid—but only for emergency treatment where a child's health or life may be at stake. He is likely to put off follow-up care until he can reach the child's parents. A relative or baby sitter generally cannot grant consent for a child's treatment.

Even an adult must request treatment and grant consent to medical care on his own before a doctor can give it to him. Children cannot do this.

By going to your doctor you show your willingness and consent to accept his treatment. Your consent is assumed also when you ask for a house call by the doctor or if as a result of an accident you come to a hospital for emergency treatment. If you are unconscious, the doctor may well give you emergency care, yet later he should get your consent to further treatment.

Minors cannot consent to medical treatment, and except in dire emergencies their parents or guardians must give it for them. The consent should not be broadly or loosely phrased, but should be as specific as circumstances permit.

The principal reason for having the consent in writing is to avoid later misunderstandings. It is a protection both to the patient and physician.

United Press International

Aluminum Co. of America announced it is stepping up its output to 83 per cent of capacity by reactivating idle facilities at its Alcoa, Tenn., works. The company recently has reactivated other idle potlines at its Point Comfort, Tex., and Vancouver, Wash., smelters.

An executive of Humble Oil & Refining Co. said crude oil prices may go up as the result of increased drilling costs, should steel prices be boosted later this year. Meanwhile, petroleum refiners were reported to be contemplating sharp cutbacks in their operations in an effort to reverse the downturn in prices of gasoline and other refined products.

A proposal to merge New York Trust Co. and Chemical Bank Exchange Bank has been approved.

ICED TEA RECIPES

(Makes 10 to 12 servings) Bring 1 quart of water to a full rolling boil in an open saucepan. Remove from heat and immediately add 1 1/2 cups loose tea (or 15 tea bags). Brew 4 minutes. Stir and strain into a container holding an additional quart of cold water. When ready to serve, pour into ice-filled glasses. Serve with lemon and sugar to taste.

PINEAPPLE SWIZZLETEA Add a pineapple swizzle stick (a slice of fresh pineapple with some sprigs left on top), a clove-studded slice of lemon, a little lime and lemon juice to an ordinary pitcher of iced tea and you have what is known as Pineapple Swizzletea. Delicious, refreshing - just the thing with a few small sandwiches for lunch on a sweltering hot day.

TOMORROW'S DINNER: Pineapple juice, pan-broiled chopped round steak, parsley boiled new potatoes, garden peas with mushrooms, enriched bread, butter or margarine, sliced tomatoes with chopped dill, old-fashioned strawberry shortcake, cream, coffee-iced tea, milk.

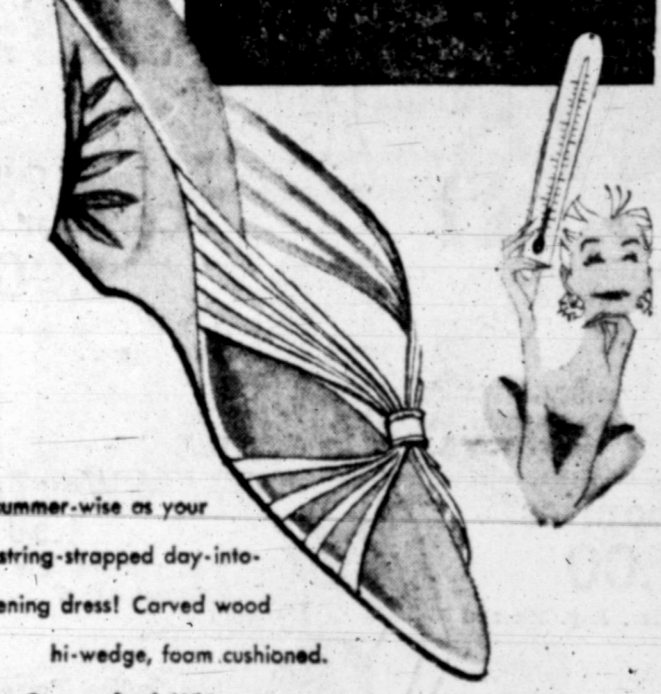

Reducing Facts For Fancy Figures High Positions Told For Club

Can you "figure" on a sleek shape this summer? Or will a swimsuit leave you bulging at some vital points?

If your figure doesn't quite measure up, you can reshape it with play-as-you-go exercises done right at the beach. Even without a reducing diet, exercises will add new discipline and grace to your figure, and tone up winter-soft muscles, too.

Here's a group of invisible exercises from the June issue of Seventeen Magazine, designed to be done at the beach under camouflage of playing ball or brushing your hair or toweling off after a swim. Do them slowly, in lazy summer-time swing, but be sure to do them every single day.

Nautical Signals — For prettier shoulders, bosom and upper arms; sit cross-legged on sand with a book pressed between palms at chest level. Stretch arms out, press hard, raise book over head. Repeat.

Beach Towel Dry — For hips, thighs, waist; sit, legs straight, bend at waist; dry left foot, leg with right hand. Reverse.

Rope Trick — For buttocks, stomach muscles; sit straight up with knees against your body and feet flat on ground, with a rope wound under feet and held at knees with each hand. Rock back on buttocks, pushing legs out in front of you, without letting legs touch the ground. The rope will help you balance. Puff up again to first position and repeat six times.

Have a Ball — To make a game out of tummy-trimming, lie on your back on the sand with legs straight up in the air. See who can balance a volley ball on her feet the longest.

Beautiful Brush-Off — As you brush your hair, raise both elbows to give lift to upper arms, shoulders, bosom. First brush hair up and back, then lean forward and brush hair over face. Brush vigorously, till arms tire.

Jewelry Sparkle Aided With Soap

Nothing lights up a suit or a dress like a sparkling piece of jewelry, whether real or fake. But the key to this lies in the word sparkling.

When costume jewelry loses its shine, it's time to give it a bath. This is easy to do but you must work fast and you must not soak the pieces. The reason for this is that many stones in costume jewelry are pasted rather than set. Soaking will loosen them so that they may fall out.

Fill the washbasin with warm, soapy water and place a dry terry towel on the edge. Use a very soft

brush to loosen the dirt and bring up the luster again. Put each piece on the towel to drain after rinsing in clear water.

Then buff the pieces dry, very gently, with a soft flannel cloth. Be careful not to rub too hard. Sterling silver pieces get silver polish, of course.

Scouring the bottoms of skillets, pots and pans often leaves washcloths and towels in a greasy mess. The utensils will be cleaner and so will your washcloths if you use a paper towel and chlorine bleach cleanser on the pan and skillet bottoms.

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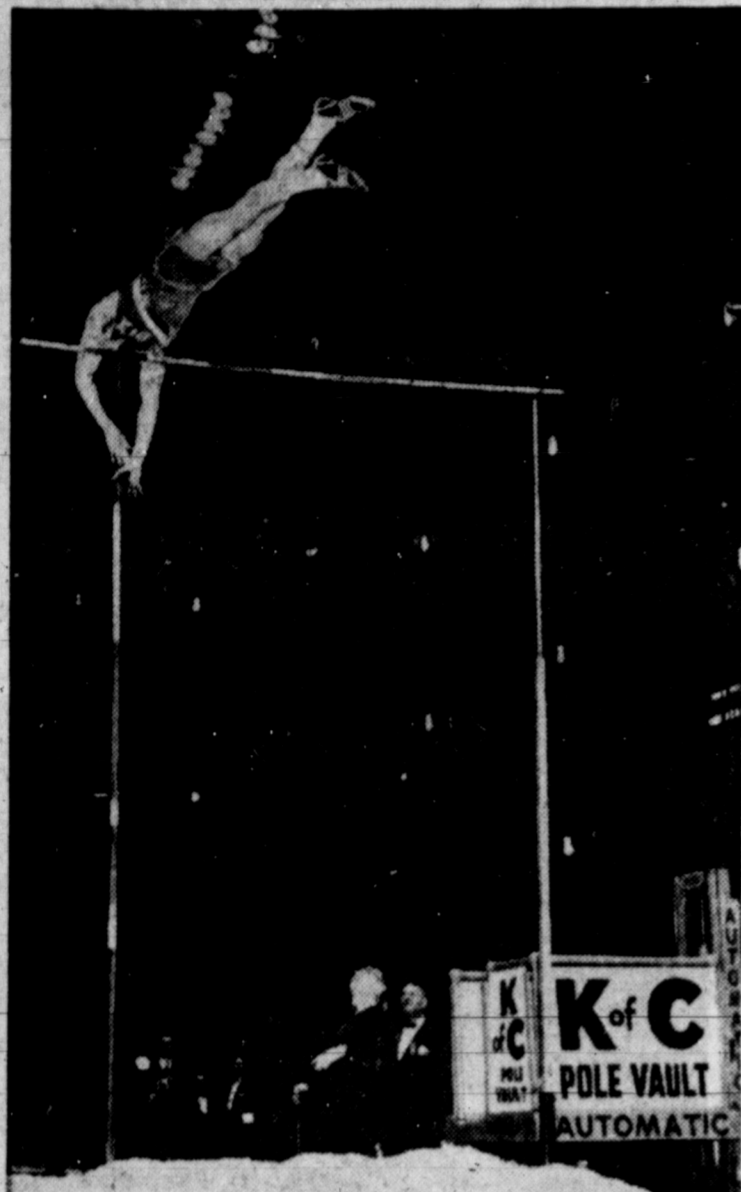

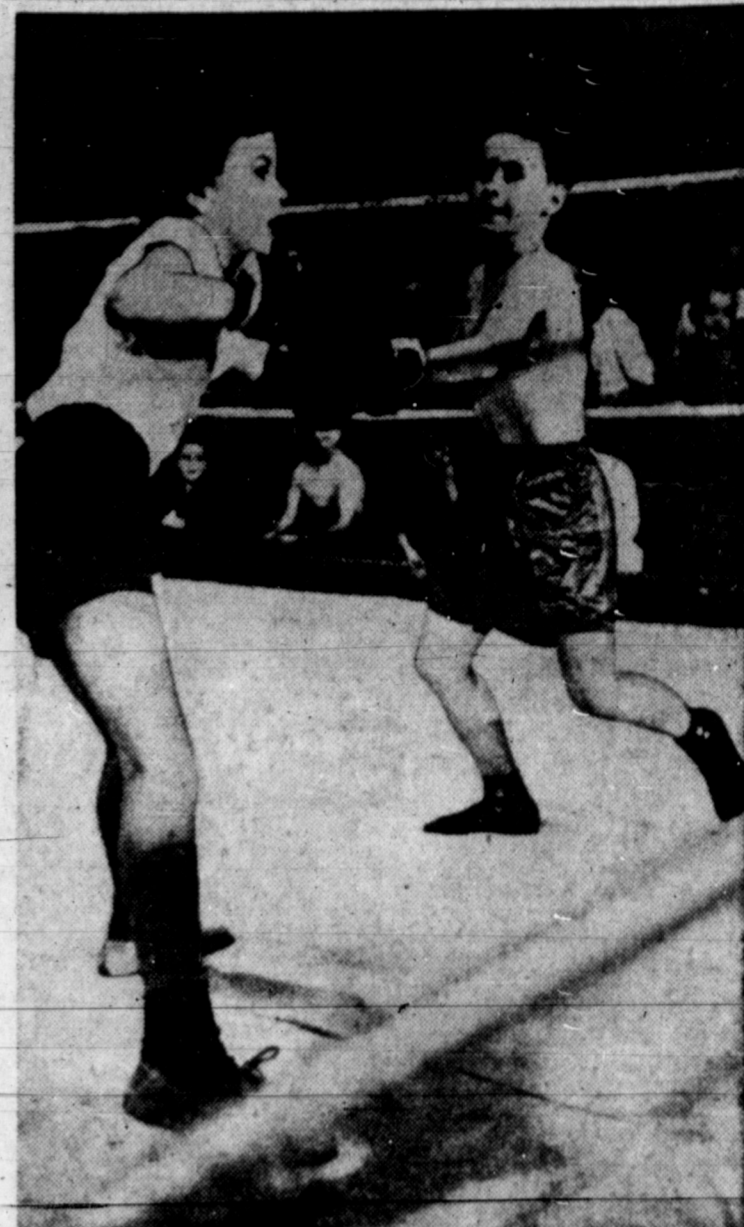

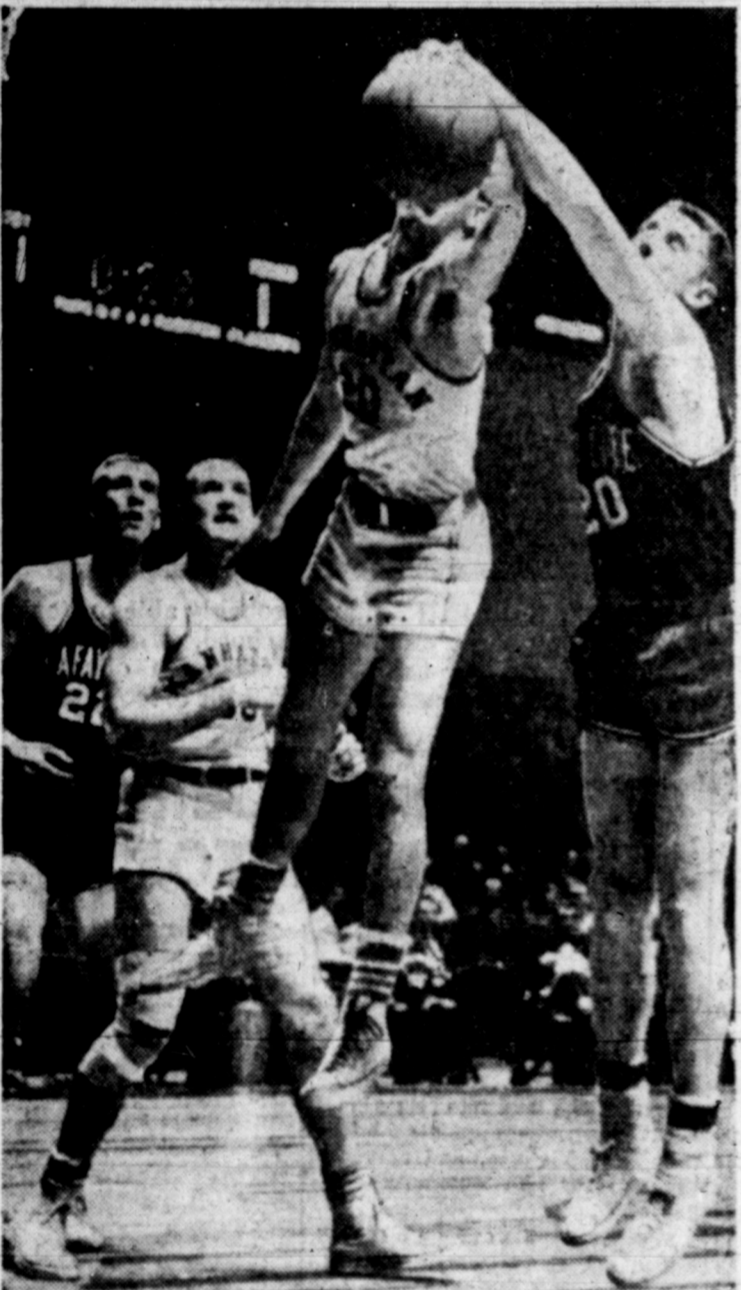

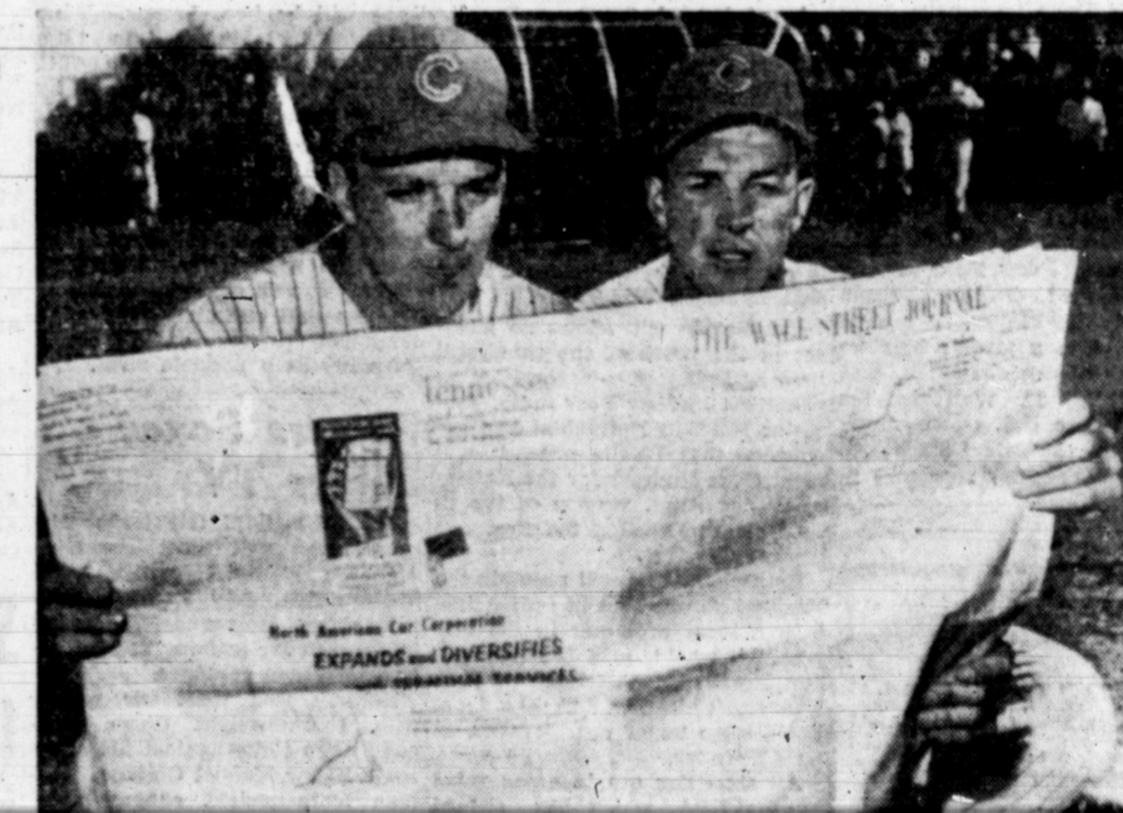

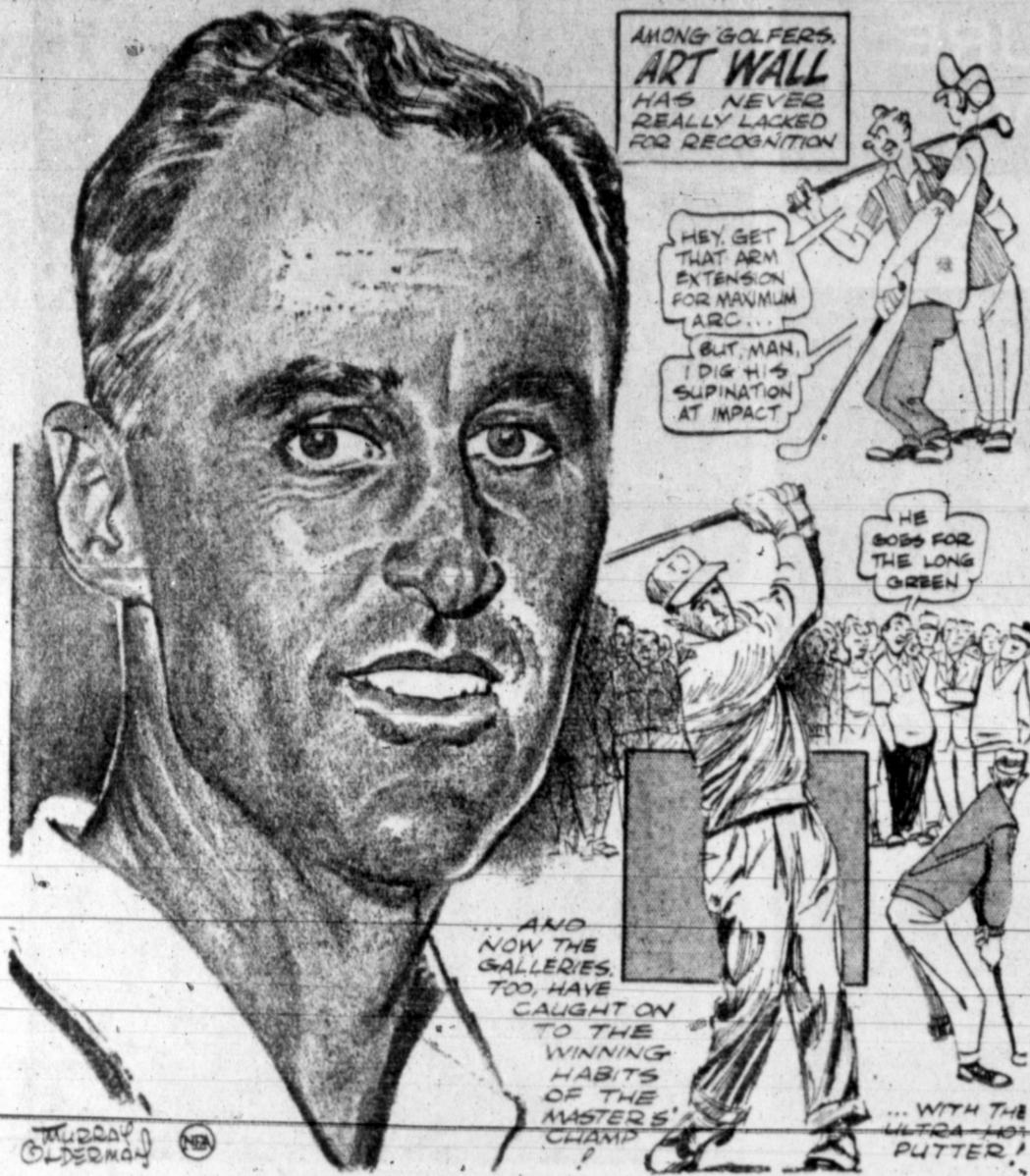

Wall Defends His Title In Eastern Open

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI)—Masters champion Art Wall of Pocomo Manor, Pa., was in the role of defending champion today when a star studded field of 133 opened play in the Eastern Open golf tournament over relatively untested Pine Ridge course.

Opening play marked the 10th annual renewal of the 72 hole \$20,000 tournament but the first time it was held at 6,820 yard Pine Ridge. Palmer, also a former Masters and Eastern Open champion, was rated just behind Wall in the warmup to the U.S. Open. Each faced a jinx, however. Since 1950 there have been no repeaters in the Eastern Open.

Ex Yankees Doing Well

The oddest twist in a season of oddities may be that the buys the Yankees traded away reach first place before the champs themselves. And, in the bargain, Arnold Johnson may demonstrate he hasn't made such bad ones after all in his dealings with George Weiss.

These Yankee discards, hereafter referred to as the Kansas City Athletics, gathered another dividend from their numerous trades with New York Wednesday night when they beat the Boston Red Sox, 5-3. The victory was the Athletics' fifth straight and moved them to within 1 1/2 games of the fading first place Cleveland Indians.

A total of six games now separates first and last place in a league which so often has been plagued by runaway races. The spread in the National League is 11 1/2 games and the front-running Milwaukee Braves have opened up a 3 1/2 game margin on second place San Francisco.

The American League tightened up from top to bottom as the Washington Senators dealt the Indians their fifth straight loss, 4-0, the Chicago White Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles, 6-1, and the Yankees shaked the Detroit Tigers, 6-5, on Mickey Mantle's ninth inning homer.

In the National League, the Braves bombed the Giants, 7-4, the Pittsburgh Pirates rallied to down the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-3, the Los Angeles Dodgers whipped the Cincinnati Reds, 5-1, and the Philadelphia Phillies edged out the Chicago Cubs, 4-3.

LA Dodgers Sign Pact With City

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The last hurdle cleared, the Los Angeles Dodgers today raced pell-mell toward a new permanent home in Chavez Ravine.

"I hope to see our opening game played in the new stadium next season," said Dodgers owner Walter O'Malley Wednesday. The occasion was the formal signing of the Chavez Ravine contract between the Dodgers and the city of Los Angeles.

The signing of the contract came exactly one year after it was approved by the voters.

And it opened the way for the city to start with two million dollars worth of site preparation at the ravine — subject to months of legal battles.

The city now can go ahead with plans to rezone the ravine and the site preparation called for in the contract. The 300 acres in the ravine then will be turned over to the Dodgers.

O'Malley said the new stadium originally would have 52,000 seats, but would be built so additional wings could be added to up the capacity to 90,000.

"Now," said O'Malley, "I don't want anybody to get the idea that we are going to move up to 90,000 seats rapidly.

"We have carefully gauged the cost of the improvements including parking lots, 82,000 seats and the recreational area to be between 12 million and 13 million dollars," he added.

The Dodger head man pointed out this will be the first major league park since 1923 built with private funds. The last was Yankee Stadium.

Brown Stops Rosi In Title Defense

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Champion Joe Brown, very dissatisfied with Wednesday night's gory victory over challenger Paolo Rosi, said today he would remain in the lightweight division and try to equal, at least, the late Benny Leonard's record of eight title defenses.

"I won't try to step up to the welterweight division," said the slender, 23-year-old champion who weighed only 132 pounds — while scoring a ninth-round technical knockout victory over bloody Rosi of Italy and New York.

That was Brown's seventh defense in his 100th professional bout, "and it certainly wasn't one of my best performances."

Requires 10 Stitches

Rosi, who had 10 stitches taken in his right brow at Sibley Hospital this morning and patches put on three other minor cuts about his eyes, claimed he was the victim of Brown's alleged butts and not his fists.

"I had the title in my hands," declared the baldish, 31-year-old challenger, "until I got his head in my face in the eighth round."

At the end of the eighth session, Rosi — who weighed 134 pounds — was ahead on the score sheets of nine sportswriters at the ringside in Uline Arena. Four writers had Brown ahead and two figured the bout even.

But on the official score sheets,

the opinion was evenly divided. Referee Charlie Reynolds favored Rosi on a five points must basis, 76-71. Judge Norvel Lee gave each 75 points, and Judge Harvey Volkman, favored Brown, 77-75. The United Press International had Paolo in front, 78-74.

Fought Retreating Battle

Brown insisted today he had fought a retreating fight in nearly every round, because, "I had to keep out of the way of Rosi's bald, billygoat head. Otherwise my face would have been a bloody mess from his head—as his face was from my fists."

Rosi forced the action in every session, marching after the elusive champion with wild hooks that jigger almost fell to the canvas landed. In the third round, the sharp featured, muscular challenger almost fell to the canvas when he missed with a terrific left hook.

The estimated 4,500 fans in the arena were greatly disappointed when Dr. Clark Halstead and Jack Kneipp told the referee to notify Rosi that he could not continue because of the profusely bleeding wound — an inch-and-a-half long and a quarter inch wide — at the outside corner of his right brow.

The bout was ended while both men were in their corners after the end of the eighth round. Under National Boxing Assn. rules, which prevail in the District of Columbia, it was a ninth-round technical knockout.

\$24.7 Billion Won't Be Reported In '59

WASHINGTON — The immense total of \$24.7 billion in personal income is not going to be reported for federal taxation this year.

Lefors School Library To Remain Open

LEFORS (Sp) — The School library will be open this summer starting June 8 and ending August 14 on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon, and everyone in the community is invited to use the library as books are available for all age groups.

Miss Linda Robinson, summer librarian, will read and discuss stories each Monday morning between the hours of 9 and 10 a.m. for children who will start to school next year or soon thereafter.

Each Wednesday from 9 to 10 a.m. a reading group for students that will be in the 2nd and 3rd grades will be held. Other reading groups will be organized if the need arises.

Students who read fifteen or more books on the reading level or above will be entitled to a reading certificate. The reading level is determined by their school teacher and Miss Robinson will be in charge of keeping the records on the number of books read.

A set of rules have been made which are as follows:

1. There will be fines of 5 cents a day for all overdue books.
2. Books may be checked out for two week period.
3. Only two books may be checked out at a time.
4. Lost, misplaced, or damaged books will have to be paid for.
5. Books may be rechecked only once.
6. No one is admitted to the library if the librarian is not on duty.
7. No one will be allowed to take library books on vacation.
8. The library may be used as a reading room during the hours it is open.

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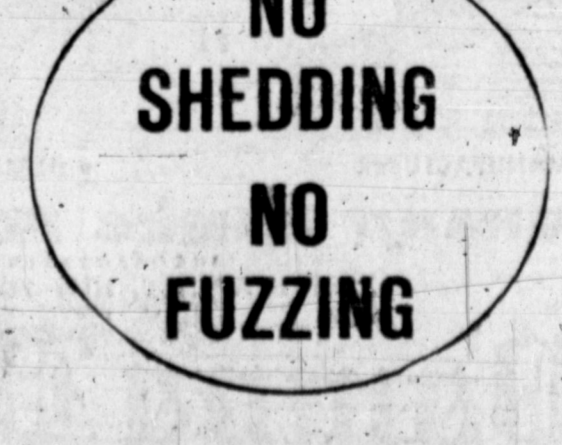
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
