One reporter asked him if he would show Eisenhower a rocket base in the Soviet Union. Khrushchev ridiculed the reporter and replied that as far as he was concerned:

"I know that America has rockets, but I am going there as a peaceful man for peaceful purposes. If I am invited to see them, I will not agree to see them."

He said Eisenhower would not be invited to see rocket bases because "that would only give a bad taste to any meeting between us," and "the President would say, 'Are you trying to frighten me?'"

"That would mean that we would be going to talk war, not peace," Khrushchev said.

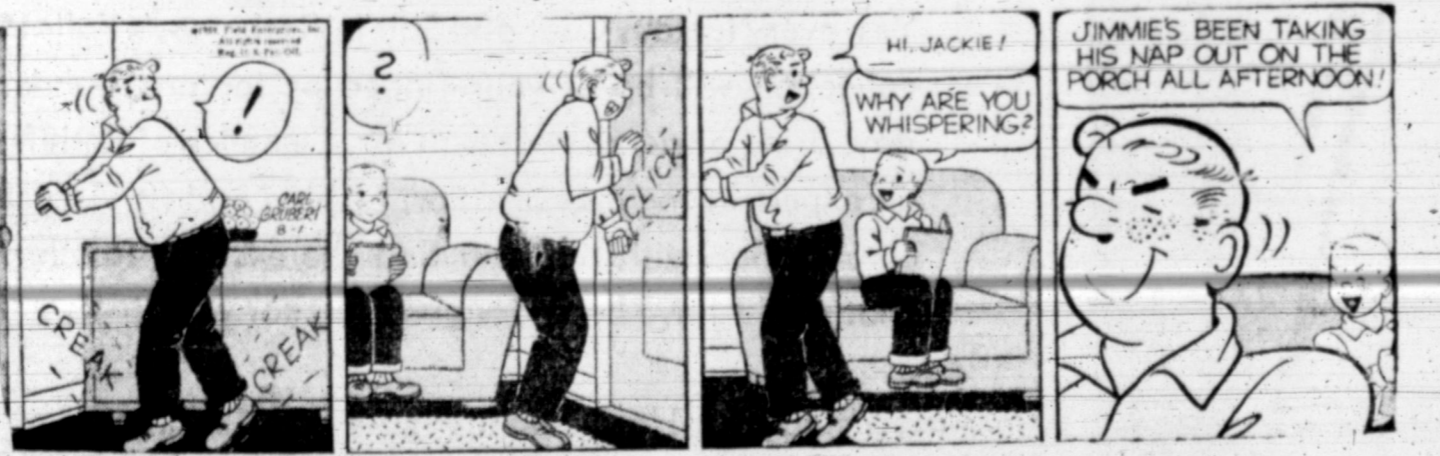

Search For Truth

There are, quite naturally, two widely held opinions respecting the nature of truth. Man has learned, thru long centuries of experience, his own fallibility. That which he concluded to be true ages ago, he now recognizes as the sheerst nonsense.

But if it is true that man does not know everything, it is also true that man does know something. And rather than surrender to our ignorance as to it, we are overpowered, we fight to better it. We employ the truths we know, rather than relegating ourselves to impotence.

Respecting truth, there is both an objective and a subjective aspect. Those who subscribe to the subjective point of view insist that truth is that which is known. They argue that truth is non-existent until it is held in consciousness.

The objective school of thought takes issue with this conclusion. Here it is claimed that truth exists independently, and does not have to be known to exist. It is argued that man discovers truth as he goes along, but that man does not create truth. And the truth exists, even if the individual is unaware of it.

Will Wage And Price Controls Be Increased?

Some people might ask, "Can wage and price controls cure inflation?" The answer to that, of course, is that we have tried to a degree to control prices and wages, and to the degree that we have tried it, it has failed. Also, it has been tried down through the ages and has always failed.

Now what is the real start that brings on this demand for more controls in credits? F. A. Harper in "The Freeman" magazine under the heading of "Can Wage and Price Controls Cure Inflation?" starts with primitive society, where the man named Smith has some corn and another man named Jones has furs. They both have more than they need, but need what the other party has.

And here we will at once observe that the objective attitude in respect to a search for truth becomes at once our most useful point of view. If we agree that the truth exists and therefore that it can be discovered and known, we are spurred onward in our search for truth. If, on the other hand, we insist that truth can only exist for us when we know it, there is provided little in the way of incentive to cause us to discover truth by diligent search.

How, then, is the problem to be resolved? Jones has been disqualified as the sole judge, and so has Smith. And so has Joe, since that excludes all who comprise this society, the problem may appear to be insoluble. But if we insist that only one person is in looking for a single judge—some one person qualified to make the decision.

Must Be Getting Near Quitting Time



The Allen-Scott Report ROBERT S. ALLEN PAUL SCOTT

AUG. 23 SET FOR CONGRESS CLOSE; LEADERS AGREE ON MUST PROGRAM WASHINGTON—Congress will wind up by August 23!

That is now the backstage aim of Speaker Sam Rayburn and key Democratic leaders of the House. For this purpose they have agreed on the following five-point "must" legislative program to be enacted by that date.

LABOR REFORM—stated to be considered in the House next week. This measure differs in a number of details from the one already passed by the Senate.

CIVIL RIGHTS—tentatively scheduled to be taken up by the House early in August. Personally, Rayburn is not enthusiastic about such legislation, but agreed to include it in the "musts" at the insistence of Floor Leader John McEuen, M. A. S., Representative Emanuel Celler, N. Y., head of the Judiciary Committee, and Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson, Tex.

GASOLINE TAX INCREASE—one-half cent a gallon. President Eisenhower strongly recommended 1 1/2 cents for a total of 4 1/2 cents to obtain an additional \$500 million to pay for the soaring costs of the 40,000-mile super-highway program launched in 1956.

DEPRESSED AREAS AID—also differs from the \$389 million bill already passed by the Senate. The House measure would set up a \$251 million federal revolving fund, for funds to be loaned to communities. President Eisenhower wants the amount limited to \$53 million.

HOUSING—to be taken up last for the express purpose of leaving this political loaded issue in the President's lap after Congress has gone home. This is to be done by passing a new housing bill, that will differ only slightly from the one recently vetoed by the President.

Also to be acted on before adjournment are the unfinished appropriation bills, including the multi-billion dollar foreign aid budget. On that the President is due for another setback.

WHO IS BACKING HIM?—Two influential senators are going to bat for former Cuban dictator Batista to gain refuge in the U.S. These backstage-Batista backers are Senators Allen J. Ellender (D. La.), chairman of the Agriculture Committee, and Homer Capehart (R. Ind.), member of the Foreign Relations Committee. Both have asked the State Department to admit Batista.

FOREIGN FLASHES—The powerful House Appropriations Committee is sending two of its ranking members to Moscow to check up on the U.S. exhibition there. These potent investigators are Representatives John Rooney (D. N. Y.) and Frank Bow (R. O.), who have criticized various aspects of the exhibit.

Two years of research went into Mr. Dunkley's paper, and his labors unearthed many interesting facts, chief among them being that the Continental breakfast did not originate in Europe at all, but at Valley Forge.

During that dreadful winter, when Washington's troops were on iron rations, the men were reduced to ersatz coffee and rolls made of equal parts of brick dust and flour.

The Society for the Abolition of the Continental Breakfast was founded by Luther Ledestone, an American from Kansas, who had been raised on breakfasts of eggs, bacon, hot cakes, milk, juice and, now and then, a steak.

The Society now numbers its members in the thousands. All of us—I have been honored by being named Corresponding Secretary—are volunteer workers in the cause. We make it a point to order American breakfasts wherever we are. That we don't get them makes no difference. Our aim is to make the Europeans aware that eggs, bacon, etc., exist, and can be eaten without harm to the digestive system.

Several delegates reported genuine progress. Emily Snyder, a hard-working member from Paris, brought cheers when she said she had introduced corn flakes to her hotel, and while she was still being served scalding hot milk with the cereal, she hoped to get lukewarm milk in a month or two.

Buster Thomson, an energetic worker in the Rome area, said he had persuaded his hotel to soak his rolls overnight, and that this had cut his monthly dental bill in half.

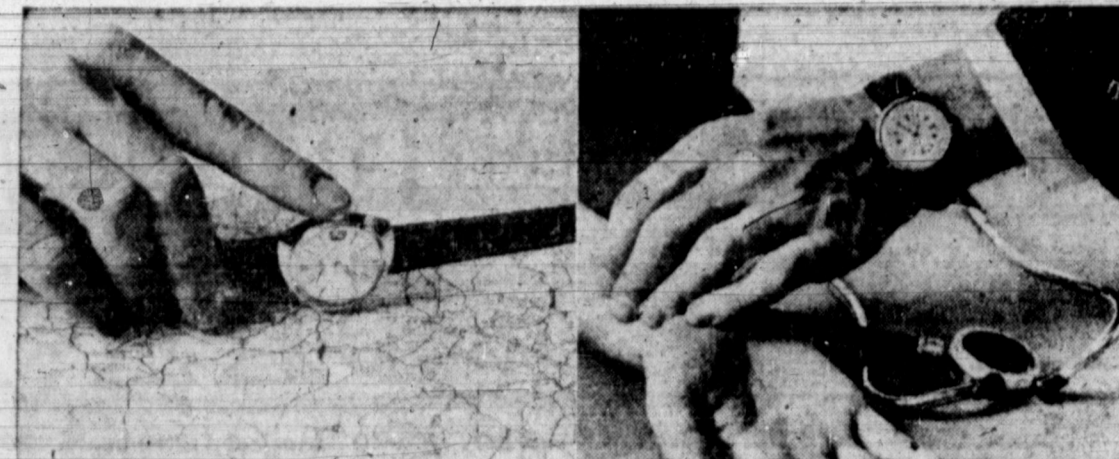

It's rolled along the route on the map and figures are recorded on the face. Timepiece, right, measures pulse beat. It has a dial calibrated for 20 pulsations. The doctor starts the timer, stops it when it reaches 20 and then can quickly determine rate and force of patient's pulse. Incidentally, both Swiss-made watches, shown in New York, also tell the time of day.

Business Views

Steel, management and labor meet again today in an effort to work out a new contract to end the three-week-old strike that has idled 500,000 steel workers and upwards of 100,000 others in allied industries. Union is asking 15 cents an hour, fringes, and retention of present working rules. Management is insisting on rules changes to give it more authority and "eliminate 'loafing,' feather-bedding and unjustified idle time."

Imports of foreign goods exceeded our exports in June—the first adverse balance of trade since 1950. Metals led the trade rise. It is held that if the steel strike carries on much longer steel imports will rise sharply. July automobile production of 555,265 cars was the best for that month since 1955 and a rise of 73 per cent over July 1958. Declines are looked for in August and September as companies change to new models.

Farm machinery sales this year are running 20 per cent ahead of the 1958 pace, producers assert. They look for 1959 volume of around \$1.7 billion, against \$1.5 billion in 1958.

HOOVER HAILS SUGGESTION

NEW YORK (UPI)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover Monday hailed a proposal by Richard Cardinal Cushing, archbishop of Boston, that students be taught about communism in high schools and colleges. "If the principle, aims and tactics of this atheistic evil were properly and intelligently taught in our schools," Hoover said, "we would be doing much to combat this evil." But he emphasized that great care should be exercised in selecting the instructors.

ORCHESTRA BEGINS TOUR

NEW YORK (UPI)—The New York Philharmonic Orchestra flew to Athens today for the opening concert of a foreign tour that will include the raising of the Iron Curtain. The orchestra will play in Communist nations for the first time when it performs in the Soviet Union, Poland and Yugoslavia later in its 13-week tour.
