HEREDITARY DISEASES ARE

CAUSE FOR MUCH CONCERN A number of diseases are known to be truly inherited. However some are transmitted through the male line, some through the fe-

male line and some by more complicated patterns. Since prospective parents are becoming increasingly aware of their responsibilities to their prospective children, more and more are seeking advice on the possi bilities of transmitting some dis ease or defect to their offspring.

Also, many who have had one child with some deformity or disease are naturally greatly concerned as to their chances of having additional children born in good The subject is complicated

partly because the patterns of transmission have not yet been completely worked out for all here. ditary disorders. But in some instances, it is possible for the physician or genetic counselor to state that a certain disease will appear with a definite average frequency in the offspring of certain parents. When this can be done, it permits the parents to know their chances of having normal children. In other words, if the parents can be told that there is one chance in three of the next children having an hereditary disease, they may feel the risks too great; if the chances are only on in 300, the odds look much better.

It is encouraging to know that there are not only books available on human inheritance but also a individuals specialize in providing

such advice, either directly or, through the family physician. The most recently opened department of this type of which. I am aware is in Washington, D.C. A recent article from this center mentioned a number of specific problems which had been submitted. In one, a man was engaged to a girl whose sister had an hereditary eye disease and whose grandmother had some unidentified disorder of the eyes.

After thorough investigation, the man was informed that if he married the girl in question, the chances that they would have an affected child with this eye disorder were one in 300. This seemed like a reasonable chance all the way around. On another case, a woman, one

of whose children had an hereditary disease was considering remarriage but was concerned that the children of the second marriage might develop a similar disorder. The evidence collected suggested that the hereditary trait probably came from the father's family and therefore the chances of it appearing in future children by a different mate were relative

counseling do not always bring a happy ending. In some instances knowledge of inheritance of disease may lead to a disturbing calculation of risk for offspring.
