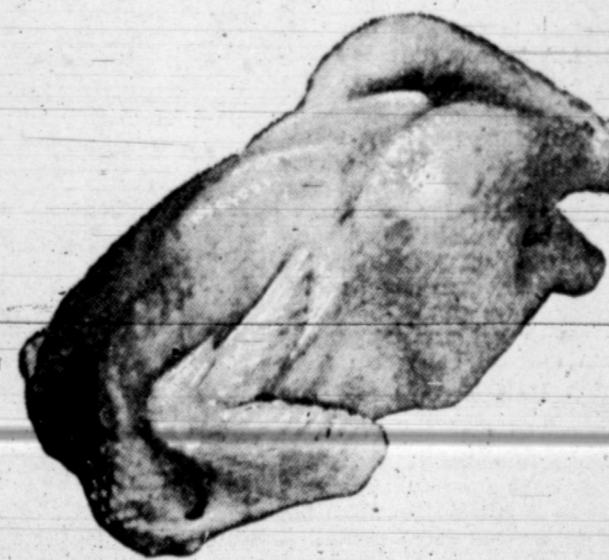

Reds Trying To Panic The West!

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Atomic sources said today Russia may be trying to panic the West into a test ban agreement by raising the specter of Communist China armed with nuclear weapons.

But Chairman Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) of the Senate disarmament subcommittee said he had information from a high scientific source that Red China could explode an atom bomb this year.

These were the conflicting reactions to reports circulating in Geneva that the Red Chinese have accumulated enough fissionable material to touch off a nuclear blast, possibly this fall.

Spurs Quest For Ban The reports said this possibility spurred the efforts by United States, Britain and Russia to reach accord on a test ban. Some officials believe Russia fears a nuclear-armed China as much as the West. Although the Chinese would not be a party to the test ban agreement, it was suggested that they would be morally bound by it.

Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.), chairman of the congressional atomic energy military applications subcommittee, said he did not believe Red China could scrape together enough atomic explosives to make a bomb.

He viewed the Geneva rumors as a "propaganda pressure deal" to persuade the West to accept a test ban that was "not properly conceived."

No Known Bomb Capability Other U.S. sources agreed. One official said "we have never received any information" from the Central Intelligence Agency or elsewhere that Communist China "has the capability of making atomic weapons."

Another official said Russia would look with horror on its Communist neighbor owning nuclear weapons. But he said the Soviets could suggest that possibility to frighten the United States.

Killer Of Parents Is Not Sorrowful

HOBART, Okla. (UPI)—Clark D. Brillhart, captured Monday and put in a strait-jacket, showed no remorse at bludgeoning his parents to death with a heavy wrecking tool.

"I guess I'll get the electric chair," he told police. "But it doesn't make any difference. They never gave me any freedom. I was planning to kill them and run away."

Brillhart, a 23-year-old mental patient on leave from Ft. Supply mental institution to spend Memorial Day weekend with his parents, was captured by a highway patrolman at Union City, a small town southwest of Oklahoma City.

The manhunt was touched off Sunday night when his parents, Elmer and Florence Brillhart, were found beaten to death at their farm near Hobart. Both were leaders in Oklahoma's mental health program.

Brillhart surrendered calmly, but officers put him in a strait-jacket for the car trip back to Hobart. He said he was a senior at Oklahoma State University last year when his parents put him in the hospital after a nervous breakdown.

"They made me do everything," he said. "I never had any freedom. They had me under their thumb."

The killing occurred Sunday evening. It went undetected for two hours, although Brillhart went to an uncle's house and said he had killed his parents and wanted to surrender to the sheriff.

Melvin Brillhart didn't believe him, and Clark left. Later, the uncle decided to check and found his brother and sister-in-law brutally beaten.

Hard For A Gal To Age Gracefully!

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Miss Marlene Dietrich, the first of the red-hot grandmas, says it's difficult for a gal to age gracefully in this country because everybody is youth-crazy.

The 54-year-old star, a vision of glamor in her nightclub appearance here, lamented in her backstage dressing room at the Sahara Hotel:

"This country is wonderful but it has a youth complex, darling, and a complex is not healthy. The women are not responsible for it alone—the whole country is. 'Everybody worships youth. Everything has to be new—from cars to houses to anything. Here, something 15 years old is pointed out as very old, and anything old you tear down.'"

The blonde performer added in her soft, accent:

Don't Reverse Things Old It's awfully difficult for the average woman to buck the national trend, darling. Young people are not taught to have reverence for things old—so how can their parents be different? They don't have respect for things that have survived for many years—architecture, for instance."

Miss Dietrich, a splendid piece of architecture, is a notable exception to this trend. She has survived three decades of stardom, and two of her greatest successes are now being revived.

The movie "The Blue Angel" is being re-made in Hollywood with Miss Dietrich. "The New Dietrich," another of her films, "Destiny Rides Again," has been converted into a Broadway musical.

In addition, Miss Dietrich has gained a new audience for herself with an advice-to-the-lovelorn radio program in New York.

"You'd be surprised who writes me most," she said. "Teen-agers, wives and men."

Say She's Not A "Square" "The teen-agers say I'm not a 'square,' and they think I'm interested in them. As for the wives, I can thank Ernest Hemingway for a lot of their letters. You know, he said I know more about love than anyone else, and most of their letters quote that."

The men really surprised me, though, with all their letters. They also read or heard what Hemingway said, and they feel I'm fair

about the subject—that I'm not necessarily taking the side of women."

Miss Dietrich said she feels people trust her judgment in these delicate matters because she is not a professional glamor queen.

"I don't pay much attention to myself," she said. "I work hard. The type of woman who wastes a lot of time on makeup and such things is the type of woman who has nothing else to do. Worrying about your looks only makes you get older faster."

"I don't diet, don't have massages and don't worry about how long I can go on. Why should I? After all, darling, I'm a lot younger than some people."

Herter Plans To Sit Tight

GENEVA (UPI)—Secretary of State Christian A. Herter plans to sit tight indefinitely until the Russians either guarantee Western rights in Berlin or break up the foreign-ministers' conference, high U.S. officials said today.

The decision was reached in the face of a statement made in private Saturday by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko that Western troops "sooner or later" must leave Berlin.

U.S. officials said Herter believed Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev still wants a summit conference and will order Gromyko to get down to business once he is convinced the solid Western front cannot be cracked.

Insists on Good Faith President Eisenhower has insisted the Russians show some good faith at the foreign ministers conference before he attends a summit conference.

Two sessions were scheduled today, a plenary session this afternoon asked for by Gromyko to let the East Germans talk again, and a private session restricted to the Big Four after dinner tonight.

The U.S. delegation toughened its attitude, both publicly and in private, as the foreign ministers conference ground deep into the fourth week with little accomplishment apparent.

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Graham Sums up Impressions Of Australia Residents

EDITOR'S NOTE: Evangelist Billy Graham, completing an extended crusade in Australia, sums up his impressions of that country and its people in this dispatch written for United Press International.

SYDNEY, Australia (UPI)—I have just spent four months in Australia. During this time I have learned a great deal about this land "Down Under."

There is an exhilaration, a happiness, and cordiality and a hospitality here that is beyond anything in my experience thus far. The average Australian appears to have little respect of wealth and little envy of riches. There is contentment here that in any country I have been to thus far. The average Australian is skeptical, even cynical about some things, and is not easily impressed. He has few inhibitions but a wonderful sense of humor. He is friendly, generous, hospitable, tolerant and is rarely sentimental except over children.

I doubt if there is a country in the world more friendly to the United States than Australia. Almost everything American is sought after and liked. Americans are greeted with open arms everywhere. Australians are criticized for their drinking, gambling, "white Australian policy," and al-

lowing a well-organized Communist Party to thrive. While there is a great deal of drinking, yet I have seen practically no drunkenness, and am convinced that the Communists have very little hold on the majority of the people and that Australia is irrevocably tied to the west.

Response Stuns Clergy
During the past three months I have preached to over two million people and seen more than 125,000 respond to the invitation to receive Christ as Lord and Savior. This has surprised me and stunned the clergy. There is a "spiritual hunger" and interest here that few of the clergy suspect. Before coming we had been told that the press, radio and television would not be friendly. The press, radio and television have given us the most generous and sympathetic coverage we have ever had anywhere in the world. The entire country has been touched.

The Right Rev. R. C. Kerle, bishop of Sydney, told me, "this is the biggest thing that has happened to our churches in the history of the nation." In checking some of the attendances in his diocese he found that since the crusade began many of the congregations had doubled and trebled in attendance.

St. Stephens Presbyterian Church, which is the largest in

the country, counted 600 people who had requested spiritual help as a result of the crusade; and the minister said, "the amazing thing about it is that 80 per cent of them are new people to us."

Bible Sales Rocket
There is a boom in Bible sales. Canon Arrowsmith of the Bible Society said that in a single evening his Bible store had sold more than \$2,000 worth of Bibles and Testaments.

The Sydney Daily Mirror had a story on the social impact of the crusade on Sydney. It said, "the crusade has cut crime in parts of Sydney by an estimated 50 per cent." It went on to give a number of case histories of criminals giving themselves up to the authorities, gunmen handing over revolvers, and burglars surrendering their kits of tools.

For the first time in my ministry I believe a spiritual impact of major proportions has been made. For the first time we have been able to reach an entire nation. Australia had never had a national spiritual awakening in its history, such as America and Britain have had. There were many factors that contributed to all of this. We had the greatest unity among the churches here of any place we have ever been. Sixty per cent of the church people of Australia are Anglican. We have had almost full participation of the Anglicans in Melbourne and Sydney. Sydney is one of the largest Anglican dioceses in the world and almost every church participated. All three bishops were in the services night after night.

PRINCE RETURNS HOME

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (UPI)—Prince Norodom Sihanouk of Cambodia returned home Sunday from France where he had undergone a stomach operation. In a statement at the airport the prince charged that "certain nations," which he did not identify, would like to destroy Cambodia's neutrality in the East-West struggle.

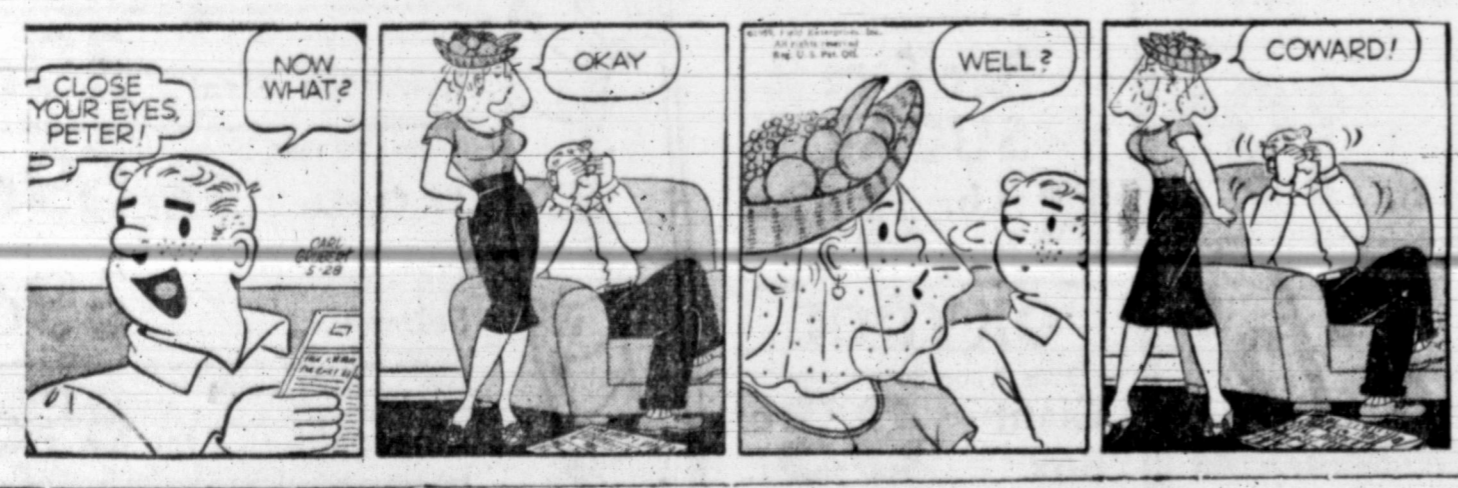

Word 'Expenditious' Appears In Stormy Reorganization Act

Watch for the word "Expenditious" in the procedure outlined under the Constitution. Legislation under the act is to be prepared by the Congress and submitted to the President. The President has the right to veto the legislation. So, you can see that the procedure under the Reorganization Act simply reversed the operations of the government. Many Members of Congress opposed this procedure, as did I. I think that history will prove that our forefathers knew a lot better how to handle this sort of situation than those who are so anxious to pass legislation that they can't wait for the Congress to draft the bill and take affirmative action on it.

One member, who was opposed to the bill in the first instance, entered into the debate on the amendment and advised the House that one of the main reasons for wanting to grant Eisenhower the powers under the Reorganization Act was because the same powers had been held by Roosevelt and Truman. This member observed that he had understood that Roosevelt and Truman had both had the measles, but no one had suggested giving them to Eisenhower.

But, to get back to the new word — the report that was filed explaining the legislation undertaken to quote the original Act, which was Public Law 100 of the 81st Congress. It reads in part as follows:

Sec. 2. (a) The President shall examine and from time to time reexamine the organization of all agencies of the government, and shall determine what changes therein are necessary to accomplish the following purposes:

(1) To promote the better execution of the laws, the more effective management of the Executive Branch of the government and of its agencies and functions, and the expeditious administration of the public business;

The word, "expeditious", impressed me when I read it because I had never heard of it before, although I did know of several places in which it would fit. In view of the great furor in recent months concerning spending, it occurred to me that there might be such a word so I hastened to the dictionary to find out. I did not find that word, but the nearest thing I could find to it was "expediture". This means, "a laying out of money; disbursement".

There is no question but that the proponents of the Reorganization Act sold this bill of goods on the ground that it would reduce expenditures and promote economy. In view of this basis for the Act, I made some comparisons on the costs of some of the departments of government. I found that the cost of one of them rose between 1931 and 1958 by more than one billion dollars; another by 100 million dollars; another by 300 million dollars, and numerous others by varying amounts. In this connection, I remember quite well that several years ago a question was posed to the American public which was, in effect: "Are you for or against reorganizing the Department of Agriculture and saving 80 million dollars?"

This posed quite a problem, because most everyone was for saving 80 million dollars, but they had no assurance that a reorganization

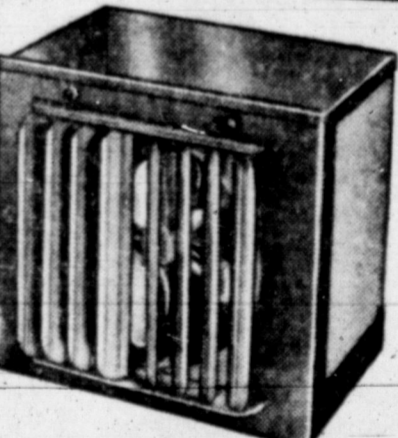

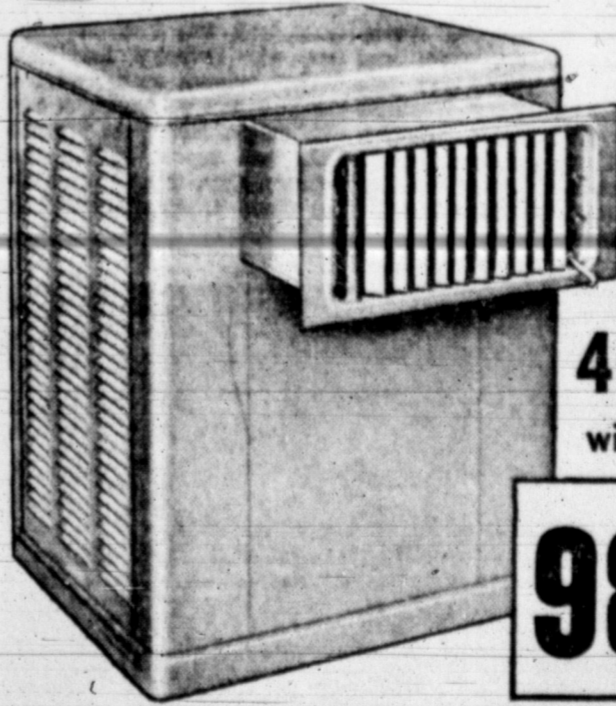

'Good Old Days' Were Even Worse!

NEW YORK (UPI) — You get the idea from endless investigations, scandals and court actions that sports today are in a mess but there's no use pining for "the good old days."

They were even worse. The antics and intrigues of Sugar Ray Robinson, fight manager Gus D'Amato and various colleges currently in hot water with the NCAA for rules violations are small potatoes compared to the skull-duggery old-timers many remember.

What was worse than the "Black Sox" world series scandal of 1919? Or the old Federal League baseball war in which stars jumped their contracts without a second thought? Or more recently, the coup of 1937 in which the late Mike Jacobs actually "stole" the heavyweight championship from James J. Braddock — from Madison Square Garden?

There was a time when college football was so rough there was agitation to "stop the bloody massacre" by abolishing the game. It was allowed to continue only on order from Teddy Roosevelt to clean up or else.

Iowa was bounced by the Big Ten in 1909 for "enterprising" football recruiting. A later widespread investigation of "over-emphasis" in college football reduced many major powers, including Pittsburgh, which only recently began to recover, and Carnegie Tech, which never did come back.

The late Bill Tilden was declared a "pro" for his tennis writings and was restored to simon purity only at the insistence of the French who wanted to see him in Davis Cup play at Paris.

Owner Bill Cox of the Phillies was tossed out of baseball for betting on his own club.

Dizzy Dean staged a sit-down strike on the pitcher's mound when a talk was called on him and when Ford Frick, then National League president, called him on the carpet to apologize. Diz uttered the immortal words, "I won't sign nothing."

And he didn't.

There was the pro football "fix" attempt in '46 involving the New York Giants and the '50 "fixes" in college basketball that did come off.

Advance Fee Racket Shifts Into Field Of Business Loans

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The advance fee racket, which has gyped home owners, farmers and businessmen of millions of dollars, is on the wane.

But, government officials caution, it has cropped up in a new form. Instead of touting real estate listings, the advance fee operators have shifted into business loans.

Some 15 or 20 complaints about this new version of the confidence game came to the Federal Trade Commission every week, officials reported.

The older property listings racket has been hurt by a vigorous government attack. First, the FTC began investigating under the Federal Trade Act's prohibition against "false and deceptive practices."

It issued cease and desist orders and put operators out of business. One Los Angeles "listing service" quit soliciting properties for sale as soon as the commission issued its order. The "service" had been grossing more than a million dollars a year.

Has Sharp Bite

More recently the Post Office and Justice departments moved in on the advance fee promoters with a bite sharper than the Trade Commission's. Conviction for mail fraud carries a maximum \$1,000 fine and five years in jail.

That penalty can be applied to each separate piece of fraudulent mail—20 letters, 100 years.

Since last October, a Post Office spokesman reported, grand juries have indicted 20 persons in three advance fee cases. Ten of them, in two cases, have been convicted.

The third case is now in court in Sioux City, Iowa.

The spokesman also disclosed that nine other cases involving about 50 persons are now before U. S. attorneys for study and possible presentation to grand juries.

Officials also credit congressional hearings, and the possibility of legislation dealing specifically with advance fee rackets, with

"persuading" some operators to abandon their efforts—at least for the time being.

Widespread publicity in newspapers and magazines also made the public wiser, which may explain the shift from the property listing version to the business loan species.

Promises Refund

A typical come-on letter forwarded to the trade commission starts out: "There's only one real cure for insufficient working capital—money. There are many reasons why businessmen need additional financing today." Enclosed is a postcard. If it is returned, the "account executive" calls—in person or on the telephone. He says he can get the businessman a loan and he promises to refund the advance fee if the loan falls through.

The businessman signs a contract—which says nothing about a refund, in all probability.

If he doesn't get the loan—or can't get it at the interest rate promised by the "account executive"—he's probably out his advance fee of \$50 or \$100 or more. The loan swindle is a variation on the real estate listing routine—a gambit practiced with great success on elderly people and farmers seeking to sell their property.

Voters Veto

Geoffrey Dobbs, Ph.D., A.R.C.S., and senior lecturer in Forestry at University College of North Wales, Bangor, Wales, England, has given us some food for thought.

In an article entitled "Triumph for the Voters' Veto," Dr. Dobbs takes up a recent move in the British Isles to fluoridate the water supply in several towns.

It seems that certain municipal authorities in the towns of Norwich, Darlington and Andover became inspired with the idea of preventing decay in the teeth of small children by the application of sodium fluoride (a well known poison) to the drinking water of the citizens of these respective communities.

Dr. Dobbs reveals that the inspiration came largely from the World Health Organization's Dental Committee, the United States Public Health Service, and from the British Dental Association.

When the city fathers of Darlington agreed that this was a marvelous idea and suggested it publicly, they were met with such a storm of protest that they instantly dropped the matter.

But in the town of Andover, reaction was slow to form, and the city fathers went blithely ahead to doctor the drinking water, a practice that has raised a similar storm in city after city in these United States.

Finally, the voters in Andover found a rallying point. They could not and they did not attempt to oppose the dosage on medical grounds. They were not health experts.

As Dr. Dobbs tells us: "At first eight most people, like the Andover councilors, would say: 'The experts know best, but on further thought it can be seen that in advising fluoridation the experts have stepped far out of their field of preventive dentistry and have entered the field of politics - and very controversial and objectionable politics at that!'"

"In advising that, if the fluoride supplementation of many children is supplemented it will reduce dental decay, they are on their proper ground; but when they recommend that this supplement be given via the water supply to people who do not need it, do not want it, and are known to object strongly to it, on their own showing they

Will Toward Virtue

In the course of years the government has raised so many obstacles to the success of struggling individuals that failure and semi-failure have become common.

"Principles Of American Government"

The more one reads what the youth of the land is studying in non-free enterprise schools, the easier it is to see why so many people are worried about unemployment, the high cost of living, stupendous debts, serving mamon rather than The Eternal, and almost continuous wars.

This so-called book, "Principles of American Government," is being taught in Santa Ana Junior College and is recommended by the teacher, Prof. Ernest Crain.

Progressive Legislation On page 237 the authors write: "...The Federal Reserve Act, the Clayton Anti-trust Act, and other progressive legislation of his administration (Franklin D. Roosevelt's) stemmed largely from the White House."

Notice the authors seem to think that the Federal Reserve Act that gave the government the right to increase the circulating media as a politician saw fit was a progressive measure.

There is no progress in inflation. It has been tried again and again throughout the centuries and always resulted in regression instead of progress.

And the Clayton Anti-trust Act that made two classes of citizens is anything but progress. It is a law that permits labor unions to combine to fix prices and not violate the Sherman Anti-trust Law.

No wonder we are gradually growing toward an unlimited government when these kinds of laws are regarded as progress.

Isolation On page 269 the authors imply that all those people who do not believe in meddling in foreign affairs and who do not believe we ought to have been in the First World War or the Second World War are isolationists.

When people are united in demanding what is not theirs, or something which they do not understand, they have no right to be given it; but when something affecting their private lives is concerned, they have an absolute right of veto, or rejection, of contracting out. If this disappears, democracy in any real sense, will have entered the new slavery of the managerial state.

There is so much wisdom in these final sentences that we have said the whole story in order to provide the proper setting for the words. What Dr. Dobbs is saying in essence is that each individual human being must retain the right of saying NO to his government in any and all matters which affect him in a personal manner. And to this conclusion we echo a hearty concurrence.

All Members One Vote On page 272, after listing the 81 different members of the United Nations in 1957, they point out that all members of this United Nations have one vote; that the majority can take collective action, including the use of armed forces. This is the case no matter how much difference in population and support the different nations have.

For instance, Iceland, a member, has only 166,000 population. They undoubtedly contribute practically nothing to the support of the United Nations. Yet they have the same vote as the United States, with 170,000,000 population and which contributes about 30 percent of the support of the United Nations. I am not sure whether Iceland is the smallest of the 81 members of the United Nations, but it shows how inability to support have equal votes.

It is just about as rational as deciding how a business should be run where one man put in one dollar and another man put in one thousand dollars and they both would have equal votes to determine how the business should be operated.

Federal Aid To Education On page 304 they write: "...The fact that education is a matter of national interest and that federal funds are badly needed to improve and equalize educational opportunities is widely recognized..."

Of course, that is just pure opinion. There is no fact about it. It is completely denying that the parents are responsible for the education of their children, just as they are responsible for the food, clothing and shelter of their children.

It would be difficult, indeed, to tell the difference between this concept of the duty of government and that of Russia, other than in degree. And when the federal government takes over the education of its citizenry, taking over the minds of future generations, and yet this book is recommended by the professor of the political science of the individual, if he will let it. But, as with any temptation, the individual does not have to yield. The fact that he is tempted does not destroy his moral fiber. The fact that he yields to it, does.

Those persons who may have discovered that the process of taking government hand-outs has become or is becoming a soul-destroying experience for them, have a ready remedy. They are not compelled to be public charges. They can refuse all further hand-outs. They can straighten up their backs and determine to be self-respecting, self-supporting citizens once more.

And even the handicapped have made remarkable progress in this direction when the will toward virtue remains a living force within them.

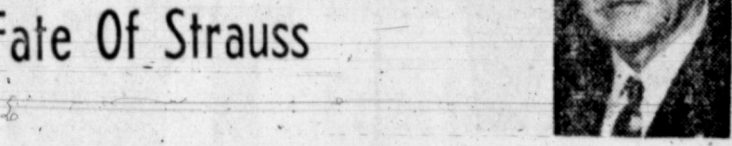
The persons who have found that virtue is like a dead weight within them are those who cannot or dare not bestir themselves to individual effort, regardless of temptation.

Robert Allen Reports:

8 Senators Hold Fate Of Strauss



WASHINGTON - Outcome of the long and acrimonious fight over the confirmation of Commerce Secretary Lewis Strauss now rests on the vote of 8 senators - 7 Democrats and 1 Republican.

The controversial cabinet member needs a minimum of 3 of them to win.

The latest backstage poll by Senate Republican leaders shows Strauss is still leading, but by the narrow margin of 46 votes definitely for him, 44 against, and 8 undecided. For confirmation he must obtain at least 3 of this group.

That would mean a tie which Vice President Nixon would break in Strauss' favor.

The senators in this crucial group are: DEMOCRATS - John Kennedy, Mass.; Stuart Symington, Mo.; J. William Fulbright, Ark.; Richard Russell, Ala.; Herman Talmadge, Ga.; Sam Ervin, Jr., N.C.; Russell Long, La.

REPUBLICAN - Mrs. Margaret Chase Smith, Me.

The GOP poll disclosed that Strauss has lost some ground since his hairline 9 to 8 approval several weeks ago by the Senate Commerce Committee. At that time, both Democratic and Republican polls gave him a 6-vote lead in the full Senate.

Strategy of the opposition is to wage a protracted fight against Strauss on the Senate floor, dragging it out for several or more weeks if possible. This plan is based on the belief that time and his explosive temper will work to their advantage, as happened in the Commerce Committee.

During the course of its stormy hearings on Strauss, he lost 2 and possibly 3 votes - Senators Warren Magnuson (D., Wash.), chairman; Clair Engle (D., Calif.); and Bob Bartlett (D., Alaska).

As the start they were either learning toward him or open-minded. By the end they were strongly critical.

Senate Republican leaders are bluntly telling Strauss to say nothing during the Senate debate on his appointment - no matter how painful it may become. They are particularly cautioning him against making any "private" comments about his critics, as such remarks usually get quickly bruited about in Washington.

STILL GROUNDED - The Air Force is still getting nowhere in its two-year effort to bestow a brigadier general's star on movie actor James Stewart.

Senator Margaret Chase Smith (R., Me.) has again blocked that with a long list of critical questions about the qualifications of Stewart and other prominent reserve officers for promotion to general.

This is the second time Mrs. Smith has done that this year. In February, when the Air Force again proposed giving stars to Stewart and the others, Mrs. Smith submitted some 100 questions regarding the grounds for that. This was the second time since 1957 that the Air Force sought to promote this group to generals.

NEW YORK - CUFF NOTES: Late in April NBC-TV put on a long Hallmark teleiving of Eugene O'Neill's gentle and nostalgic play, "Ah, Wilderness!" and, naturally, not many people remember much about it except that Helen Hayes was in it and it had a wonderful set which included a lake, a Victorian house, some rowboats, some pilings, a lawn, an old nickelodeon music box and a 1906 white Buick. . . . People from here to California wondered where the old house and grounds had been found and how long it took to move the cameras out there. . . . They wondered wrong, which is why I am mentioning so dated a thing as a late April TV show. . . . The physical recreation of 1906 is a young, bright, alert and rarely dismissed woman named Jan Scott. . . . And she did it all on a Brooklyn sound stage and not in the open. . . . Assuming greater wisdom than God, managers of the welfare state map out the good life for other men, choose for them and direct them. God's plan is much less ambitious. He lets men make mistakes, profit from experience, learn to think, to acquire wisdom and eventually to act wisely.

Fools rush in where even God fears to tread.

God and man are the only two creatures with the power of contemplation and the power to choose between good and evil. The power of choice is what gives man the status of sonship to God.

The advocates of the social gospel or the welfare state say that men are wasteful and will not save for old age. Therefore, government will compel them to do so through the instrumentality of social security. Men are careless and will not strive to learn, therefore, government will force them to attend school. Farmers do not know what or how much to grow, therefore, government will compel them to accept its decisions.

The welfare state, alias socialism, communism, nazism or government-managed economy, alleges that men do not know what is good for them. The state must choose for them and force them to do right. Granted, that in many cases men do not know what is good for them, is there any reason to believe that the welfare state bosses are gifted with greater wisdom in that respect?

Moreover, men learn only as they exercise their faculties and develop their self-reliance. To develop wisdom, strength and character men must study, think, solve problems and above all they must learn to make decisions - and, to take the consequences thereof.

The degree of pain, irritation and local discomfort caused by enlargement of the prostate varies from man to man. There is also some danger of the development of kidney trouble because of the back pressure from the urine held in the bladder.

Often without apparent warning, a man with an enlarged prostate may suddenly find that he is not able to urinate at all. Under such circumstances, the bladder must be drained through a tube, called a catheter, which is passed into the bladder (or by some other method). But this is only a temporary measure of bringing relief.

Treatment of prostate enlargement is usually by operation. Several surgical methods are available and the choice of which procedure to use depends on the individual circumstances and the judgment of the surgeon.

It may be hoped that a method can be discovered to prevent prostate enlargement or to treat it with hormones or drugs. Some studies along these lines have been made, but as yet there is no successful method of preventing, or nonsurgical means of treating, simple prostatic enlargement.

I am confident that something will be found - but probably not soon.
