By a vote of 115-25, the House adopted a notion by Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches to end the Legislature's long and bitter, 21 day struggle over taxes and spend ing at 3 p.in. to lay.

A few minutes earlier, the lower chamber approved the spend ing measure by a vote of 108-30 House members rejected a pr posal by Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth, who sought to post pone action on the final adjournment plan until this afternoon. The vote was 71-52.

If the House gives it final approval today, the Legislatur could adjourn today or Friday. It's been more than 200 work

ing days since the lawmaker. first went into regular session Jan. 13 faced with the problem o. raising a record amount of nev revenue to finance an all-time high spending program for the next two years.

The tough tax problem took the regular session, two special ses sions and well into the third before a 185 million dollar tax bill based largely on selective sale taxes was approved by both houses last week.

Wednesday marked the breakthrough on the second majordeadlock when the conference committee ironed out differences on the spending program and reported out the appropriations bill. It calls for an expenditure of \$322,800,000 from the general revenue fund, and is a 300 million dollar increase in state

Interest Rates Increasing On New Home Loans

By EDWARD COWAN United Press International

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Interest rates on new home loans have moved up to 5 and 6 per cent in most paris of the country, according to two industry reports.

James E. Bent, president of the 550-member National League of Insured Savings Associations, said that in most sections conventional loans now cost borrowers 5% or 6

"And by fall, a 6 per cent rate will be dominant." Bent told United Press Internationa

As for a long run forecast, Bent said and other experts say the outlook is clouded by uncertainty about whether Congress will grant a Treasury request for permission to pay higher interest rates on government bonds.

Interest On Upswing In another report, the National Association of Real Estate Boards said interest rates generally have risen a quarter of a point in the past three months.

But some of the increase reflects loans for longer terms and of a higher ratio to downpayments, the association said in a report on its summary survey of credit conditions in 225 areas.

"The general money market is unstable and will probably continue to be until Congress decides the question of interest rates on ong-term government issues," the association said. "This decision could prompt the mortgage market, to move either up or down." Recently the Minnesota Department of Health reported that the number of cases of animal rabies had reached an all - time high in 1958. There were 461 cases reported from 77 of the state's 87 counties. Skunks accounted for more than 50 per cent of the total.
