## Marine Facing Sentence Of Death For Rape

BEAUFORT, S.C. (UPI) — A young white Marine with "overpowering sex urges" faces a sentence of death in the electric chair for the rape of a 17-year-old Negro woman.

An all-white jury took only an hour last night to convict Fred Davis, 22, of Atlanta, without recommendation of mercy. The verdict made the death sentence mandatory under South Carolina law, and Circuit Judge J. Harry Johnson planned to pronounce the sentence today.

Davis' attorney, Ben Carter, said he would appeal. Davis was believed to be the first white man in southern history to be sentenced to death for raping a Negro woman. Just a week ago, four white youths at Tallahassee, Fla., were sentenced to life imprisonment for raping a Negro college coed.

There was no apparent racial feeling on either side in this case, the town of 5,000 population near the big Parris Island Marine base where Davis was stationed. Five Negroes called to sit on the jury were excused when challenged by the defense.

The trial before the all-white female jury took only one day. The woman's name was withheld under South Carolina law which prohibits publication of the name of a rape victim.

Davis was accused of accosting a woman at a Beaufort street drug store, grabbing her by the neck, and raping her. (ADV)

## Compromise Committee Can't Click

AUSTIN (UPI) — A "compromise" committee failure to agree on a compatible tax program today forced the state's financial battle to the House floor where lawmakers were expected to wage a "last chance" battle to piece together a tax bill in a jigsaw puzzle fashion.

Speaker Waggoner Carr's informal committee of 17 met again today in a last ditch effort to break their deadlock, but quit again in disagreement.

Liberals and conservatives were reported as still unable to compromise on how to tax corporations and natural gas.

Carr promised Monday night to give the entire House a "last chance" to write a tax bill before it becomes too late to solve the state's financial dilemma without a third special session.

Carr speaks out. Lawmakers were expected to attempt to construct a tax bill "piece-by-piece." Before the lower chamber is a bill by Rep. Frates Sealigon of San Antonio.

Carr said "I've done everything I can on a compromise," then added he would lay out the Sealigon bill, and "they (the House) can start amending it any way they want to."

This is the bill that is bolstered mainly by a two per cent luxury sales and use tax on items of 50 dollars and over. In a rare Saturday night session, the representatives struck the luxury tax from a substitute to the bill reported out on the floor by the Revenue and Taxation Committee, and a substitute amendment by Rep. George Hinson of Mineola embodying Gov. Price Daniel's tax program, which is currently stalled in committee.

Carr would give the membership of the House Sealigon's bill as it was originally drafted before revision by the revenue committee.

Last Chance Today. Carr said when the House resumes debate on the bill today, "that's the last chance on the bill."

Tomorrow is the mid-way point of the 30-day special session. It ends automatically at midnight July 16.

The members of the compromise committee, each and every one, have worked hard," Carr said. "At least in that respect they cannot be criticized by anyone. I personally appreciate the sincere effort that was made by these men to find areas of agreement."

# Jet Slams Housing Area; Claim 16 Dead, 100 Hurt

NAHA, Okinawa (UPI) — A flaming U.S. Air Force jet, fighter abandoned by its pilot struck an Okinawa schoolhouse today and exploded in the midst of a crowded housing area, killing and wounding scores of persons.

The Air Force said 10 Okinawans were killed and 76 injured when the plane exploded on impact and spewed burning wreckage onto a row of houses, destroying 30 of them. Okinawa police said six children also were killed, raising the toll to 16 dead. They said 100 were injured.

Four children, two with skull fractures and two with serious burns, were reported among the injured.

Officials on this former Japanese island set up tents and other shelters near the resort city of

Ishikawa, about 25 miles from the capital of Naha, to shelter 150 homeless persons.

There was some confusion over the number of persons in the jet, an F100 Super Sabre. First reports said there were only the pilot, Capt. John G. Schmitt, of Chalmers, Ind., who parachuted to safety. The Air Force first said a trainee was with him but later said only Schmitt was aboard.

The Air Force said Schmitt's aircraft developed engine trouble shortly after takeoff on a routine training mission. He first attempted to return to its base, Kadema air field near Naha, for an emergency landing.

But Schmitt found the plane difficult to control and then realized it was on fire. He directed the plane toward an unpopulated area west of Ishikawa when an explosion occurred, filling his cockpit with smoke and flames. He then ejected himself.

The crash was expected to have major political repercussions, and Lt. Gen. Robert W. Burns, commander of the U.S. 5th Air Force, flew here from Tokyo to make a personal investigation.

Socialists and their left-wing groups have campaigned to force withdrawal of the U.S. Air Force on grounds frequent accidents endangered the lives of Japanese and Okinawans.

The first repercussion came from the opposition Socialist Party in Tokyo which demanded the U.S. government pay "due compensation" to the victims. It issued a statement saying the United States has not given "proper consideration" to the welfare of Okinawa residents.

## Sheriff Jordan Given Plaque For His Service

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce Monday chose Sheriff R. H. (Rufe) Jordan as the most representative of Gray County law enforcement officers and presented him a plaque for outstanding service. He was especially honored as president of the Texas Sheriff's Association.

Fifty-four other lawmen were honored at a star-studded Law Enforcement Day luncheon in City Hall. For a speaker the Chamber group had Col. Homer Garrison Jr., who heads the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Garrison said that Texas lawmen have pulled themselves up by their own bootstraps through training and research. "The men in law enforcement themselves realized that they had to be better equipped," said Garrison.

One of the biggest problems of his department is traffic. Garrison touched on Washington conference called by the President "to keep us from killing ourselves with traffic." Officers were warned at the last conference that if they did not get results with a safety program, the government would assume the responsibility.

"Don't complain when the federal government steps in and takes over," Col. Garrison declared. "It will be the opening wedge in a federal police system." He said this meant the end of liberty. The death toll has been reduced in Texas but 2,342 persons were killed on the highways last year. "Statistics mean nothing to the families of people who have been killed," he commented.

Col. Garrison was introduced by District Attorney Bill Waters. E. L. Henderson, immediate past president of the Chamber of Commerce, presided. President Warren Hesse is on vacation in Wisconsin and Vice President H. V. Wilks is in New York.

Special guests were introduced by County Attorney Don Cain. Mayor Ed Myatt gave an official welcome and later presented Jordan's plaque. He also presented a "True Top O' Texan" certificate. (See SHERIFF, Page 4)

## Mrs. Long Is Back, Claims Life Threat

COVINGTON, La. (UPI) — Mrs. Earl K. Long was back in Louisiana today and filed an answer to a separation suit by her husband, the governor, who is suffering from a nervous breakdown and heart trouble.

She charged that Long, 61, threatened her life, so that she had to take steps to protect herself. Furthermore, she said, she is afraid to be alone with him.

"She needs treatment and I recommend she hire my doctors (psychiatrists) or similar ones," Long snorted today when he heard about it. He is in a motel here which he is using as a temporary hospital.

Mrs. Long, who has been missing a week, turned up in Baton Rouge Monday night and had her attorney, Clint Pierson, file an answer to long's suit for separation.

"Respondent is without temporary means of support during the pending of this action and temporary alimony should be awarded in the sum of \$2,500 per month," her suit said.

Alimony Error at First. Pierson, who had at first denied that alimony was mentioned, later said it had been included in the suit by mistake and that he will amend the suit "to get the part about alimony out."

Long who was awakened at 3:45 a.m. by the quail calling in the pines outside his motel told Dr. Paul Pratt, the psychiatrist who stays with him constantly: "I'm glad she answered the suit. I want to make it a decent affair and I don't want to say anything against her. I just want reasonable court proceedings."

"I want to keep it clean. . . I don't make \$2,500 a month and that would be ridiculous for her to ask. She has as much money as I do and is 12 years younger and can work."

Fruit said Long, whose psychiatrists had spelled out for him the dangers of his condition, was not upset or worried.

Mrs. Long's lawyer got Family Court Judge Joseph W. Sanders to issue a 10-day order restraining Long from disposing of any community property. Long's lawyer said that was acceptable.

Long's psychiatrists told him Monday night that he is a victim of a nervous breakdown, but even so, he is in better shape mentally than physically.

# Street Paving Set

The Don Baker Construction Co. of Borger this morning was awarded a \$44,238.49 contract for street paving by the Pampa City Commission.

Five separate paving units were included under the contract including one to pave Duncan St. between Pampa High School and Fairview Cemetery, and another to pave one-half mile of Aspen St. from 28th St. to the north city limits.

Another successful bidder was the Given Tersch Co. of Amarillo which submitted the low price (\$16,864) on asphalt and seal-coating specifications.

Other paving and seal-coat bids were presented by Ray Boswell

and the J. H. (Bud) Chastain and Son Co. of Snyder.

Three bids were also presented to the commission for a sewer coil road machine which will be used for the cleaning of city sewer lines. The low bid was submitted by the Flexrod Tool Co. which offered a machine at \$3,792.50.

In other matters the commission advised citizens that (1) there exists an ordinance against fireworks inside city limits; (2) that the litterbug situation is gradually growing worse; (3) that it is against the law to fire arguments inside the city; and (4) that weeds should be removed from around traffic signs.

Mayor Ed Myatt said the litterbug situation has grown worse of late, with high winds carrying paper containers, sacks and cups away from the city's drive-ins. He urged that citizens carry their refuse to the proper trash containers.

The commission also passed on three readings an ordinance that will remove the fire zone from in front of the old LaNora Theatre and install three parking meters.

Parking meters will also be placed around the newly constructed Southwestern Investment Co. at Kingsmill and Root. Three parking meters will be removed from the corner of Ballard and E. Foster.

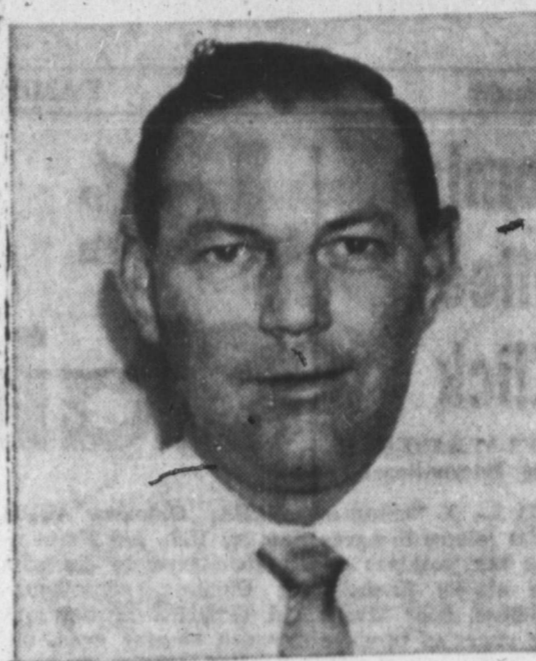

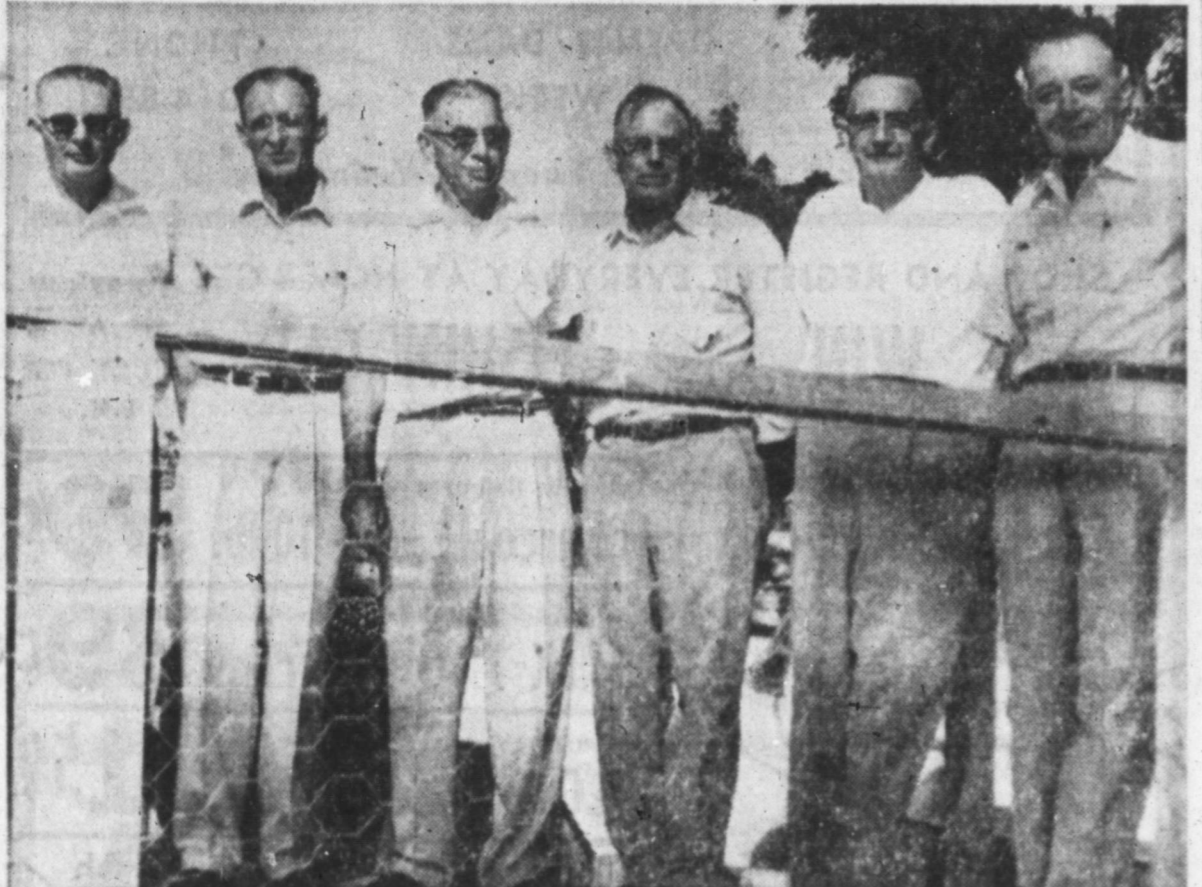

## Soviet Fair Opens To Public In New York Coliseum Today

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Soviet Union lets the paying general public into its bright show of Russian life and know-how today.

President Eisenhower previewed the fair Monday and pronounced it remarkable. He lifted a glass with Soviet First Deputy Premier Frol R. Kozlov and said: "To your success." Kozlov in a speech said there must be peace through negotiation.

Kozlov ribbon-snipped the 40-day show into an official opening Monday night. Wednesday he is expected to turf to craver matters—such as the Berlin crisis and a summit meeting—during a White House visit.

Today, while the customers start clicking the turnstiles at the New York Coliseum at \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children, Kozlov scheduled a visit to the Ideal Toy Corp. here, producers of dolls and plastic toys, and a later drive to the shipyards at Camden, N.J.

Nixon Shares Podium

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who shared the speaking podium before 1,500 invited guests with Kozlov Monday night, toured the six acres of Russian exhibition and called it "very important."

Nixon will open the American National Exhibition in Moscow next month. In his address he said it was not expected that the exchange of exhibitions and the Nixon-Kozlov visit exchange would "resolve the basic differences which exist between our governments." But the Russian and American peoples instinctively like each other, he said, and the exchange should help reduce misunderstandings.

The vice president said that he was convinced that after Kozlov tours and studies the United States he will return to Russia "convinced that not only is this nation strong materially but that it is united behind the leadership of our President in working for... peace, justice, and freedom."

Kozlov Greets Ike

Kozlov, a jovial, graying man of 50 years, grasped President Eisenhower's hand late Monday when the President entered the Coliseum after a flight here from Washington. He helped escort the President through the exhibition from Sputniks to atomic reactors to autos to oil paintings.

Pausing before the model of the big new Soviet atomic-powered icebreaker Lenin—while Ike adjusted his glasses and peered into a cutaway section of its power plant—Kozlov remarked: "That's what we use atomic energy for."

"I've been preaching that for six years," Eisenhower told him.

In a visit of more than an hour, the President drank orange juice, heard some Russian hi-fi music (it sounded like jazz, in French).

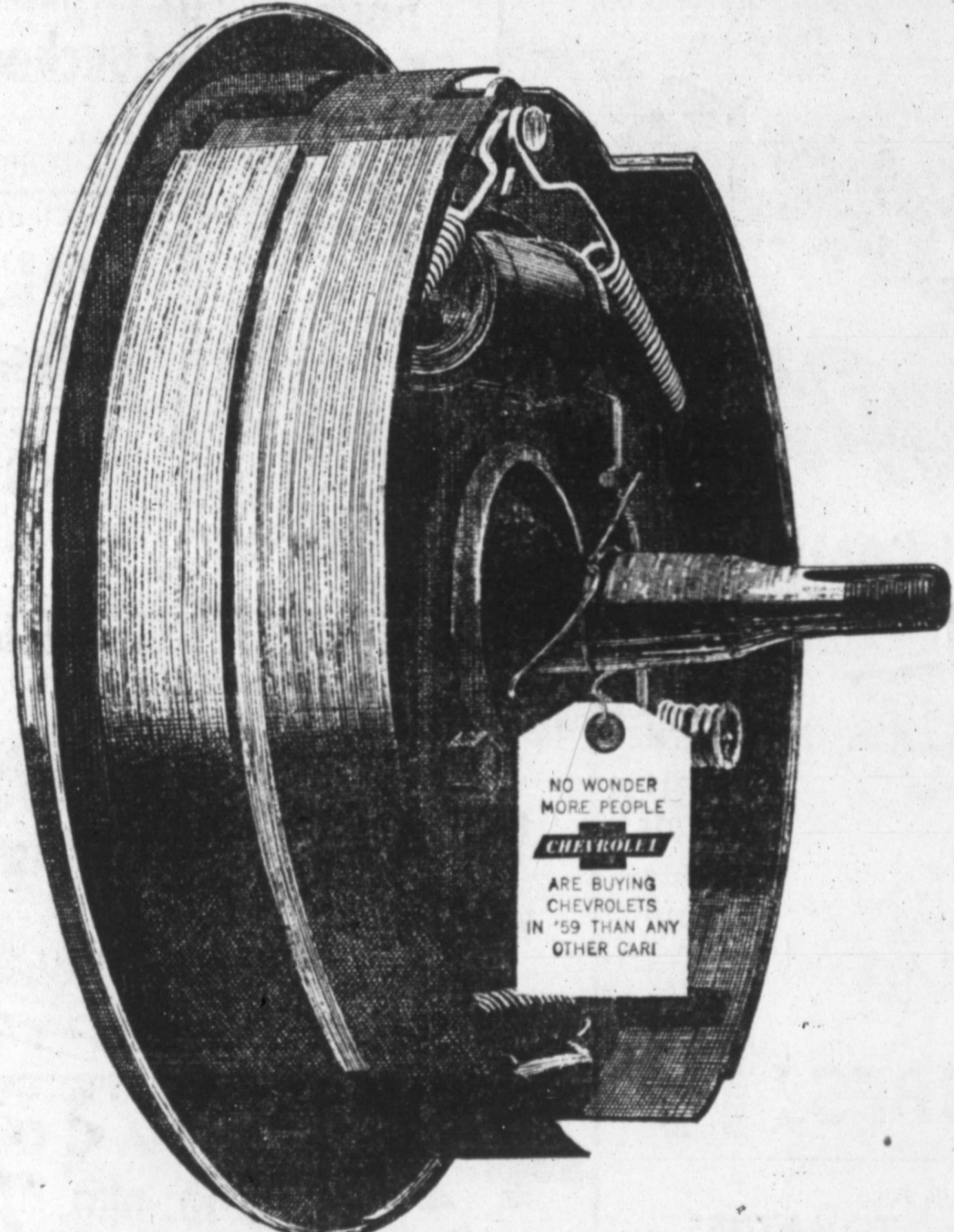

# COMO, RED HOT IN HOLLYWOOD

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Sleepy-eyed Perry Como is a celebrity in a town jaded by famous names and faces—Hollywood.

The easy-going crooner stopped by Zanyville for a two-day visit causing a small uproar among stars, gents and newspapermen. Everybody wanted to talk to Como.

Perry, who reduces problems to a minimum, was host to a cocktail party at the swank Beverly Hills Hotel to simplify the situation: Agency men, network bigwigs and performers climbed into their most sincere flannels to pay court to the singer who hadn't visited Movie Town in three years.

Como had the drop on 'em right off the bat. He was logged in sports shirt and sports coat.

The big question asked the gray-haired crooner: "When are you going to bring your show to the West Coast?"

And Perry's answer surprised his questioners.

"I may very well be out here in September to be a guest on Bing Crosby's spectacular," he said. "Bing was with my new sponsor (Kraft) for so many years it was easy to arrange.

"If I do sing a few tunes with Bing I may stick around and telecast some of my own shows from Hollywood. The change would be good for all of us, and give us time to work in our guests a little better.

**Little Rehearsal Time**

"Back in New York we catch stars on the fly with only a day or two—sometimes less—to rehearse.

"That isn't fair to anyone. It's a little too casual. When the guest reports for work all you can tell 'em is to stand in a doorway or something and sing a couple of songs."

Then TV's "Mr. Nice Guy," who rarely is ruffled, frowned and blasted the use of video-tape for recording "live" shows in advance.

"I don't like any part of it," he said.

"If a performer is going to tape seven or eight shows in a row it gets to be a grind. I might as well buy a barber shop somewhere and start in all over again.

"Once in a while it's okay to tape a program to get away someplace with the family for a week. But that's all."

While celebrity-struck visitors milled around with highballs in hand Perry calmly sipped a ginger ale. He couldn't have been less impressed with the shindig.

Como also is unperturbed about his switch in time slot. Next season the NBC star will be seen at 9 p.m. e.d.t. Wednesday nights, after four years of Saturday nights at 8 p.m.

**Will Do Everything**

Does he plan a change in format as well?

"Oh, we'll do everything," Como concluded. "I'm mighty happy to have a single sponsor, and we'll try to keep a relaxed air on the show."

Bit parts: Arthur Godfrey will restrict his TV activities next season to four one-hour spectacles.



# FRONDIZI WEATHERS GOVERNMENT CRISIS

Man-of-the-week: President Arturo Frondizi of Argentina.

The place: Buenos Aires.

The quote: "I just wanted to say hello to you and tell you I am fulfilling my constitutional duties."

It was a typical low-keyed statement from the thin, studious man who, by the age of 22, had earned a reputation as a sort of South American Don Quixote who tilted against the windmills of dictatorship and went to prison for his pains.

Now, at the age of 50, he was telling assembled Argentine and foreign newsmen that he had just weathered the worst crisis of his 13-month-old government.

Whether he would be in office next week, or the week after that, remained a question.

But for the moment, Frondizi represented a triumph of constitutional government in a nation not long emerged from ruinous dictatorship. For the moment also he was free to continue the austerity campaign by which he hoped to rescue Argentina from the heritage of bankruptcy left by the dictatorship of Juan D. Peron.

Paradoxically, while the public outcry had been against Frondizi's austerity campaign, the move for his removal seemed to center on demands that he be even more severe.

The demands included: additional changes among government ministers to eliminate Peronist and leftist sympathizers; stricter application of economic policies designed to enforce Frondizi's austerity program and the firing of some 12,000 Peronistas and Communists from public payrolls.

Politically, Frondizi's troubles spring from the election support he received from the Peronistas and Communists, which aroused armed services suspicions, and from his own intransigent radical party, which has protested abandonment of the more nationalistic policies in favor of gigantic financial help from abroad.

Whatever Frondizi's troubles, his policies have been paying off. From an annual deficit of 200 million dollars a year, Argentina's trade balance for the first four months of 1959 showed a credit of 102 million dollars.

LA PAZ, Bolivia (UPI) — Loyal troops backed up by airborne reinforcements have smashed a one-day rebellion in the rich oil city of Santa Cruz, the government said Monday.

A government radio broadcast from the southeastern oil center said rebel leaders had fled and order prevailed. There were no reports of further fighting.

The government had indicated Friday night that the rebels, allegedly led by Jose Gil Reyes of the Santa Cruz Youth Movement, had seized control of much of downtown Santa Cruz and were cruising the streets. But government forces held the vital airport.

The rebels struck with an "armed attack" on the federal police barracks in the city Friday. One policeman was killed and two Movement rose to power in 1952

# First French A-Bomb May Be Exploded

NUCLEAR CLUB

It's beginning to look more and more as though France will explode its first atomic bomb before the end of the year. If it does, it will make France a member of the exclusive "nuclear club" now made up of the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union. This achievement will give President Charles de Gaulle realization of one of his fondest desires — a bigger voice and more influence in shaping world affairs. About a week ago, Pierre Guillaumat, De Gaulle's minister of the armed forces, said France was so "close" to completing work on its first atomic bomb that it didn't need foreign assistance. This hint of atomic attainment was underscored later when Assistant Premier Jacques Soustelle told the Senate in Paris that France would not agree to any suspension of nuclear tests at a time when its own bomb was nearing completion. It's not expected that France's big bang will go off until after the summer months, however.

DEUTSCHLAND UNDER ALLIES

The Saarland's half million residents may become full-fledged Germans again soon. The coal-rich territory which has been the subject of international tugs of war since Charlemagne's grandsons divided up his empire, was part of France from 1919 until Jan. 1, 1957 when it was returned to West Germany. However, it was agreed the Saar would remain a part of the French monetary zone for three years to provide an orderly changeover. The West Germans now are ready to bring the Saar into the German monetary zone six months ahead of schedule. One sticky problem is that of children allowances. In France, the government allowance begins with the first child. In West Germany, it begins with the third. The West German Parliament has agreed to continue to pay for the first child in the Saar, although it fears this may lead eventually to similar arrangements for all of West Germany. It would boost government costs 250 million dollars a year.

DEEP FREEZE

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has a standing invitation to visit London, but British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan is sad to hope he won't pick it up. Macmillan has been soured by some of Adenauer's recent acidly anti-British pronouncements, resulting from their divergent views on the best ways to deal with Soviet Russia. Macmillan, alone among Western leaders, is strong for a summit meeting with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and is not going to be talked out of it. Therefore, he also opposes any meeting among Western leaders now. There will be the usual consultations through "diplomatic channels" but nothing to patch up frayed Western unity, except possibly a get-together of Western foreign ministers in Geneva just before the four-power conference reopens on July 13.

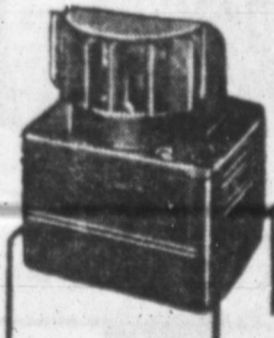

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## Summer Turns On Heat To Speed Growth Of Crops

COLLEGE STATION (UPI)—Summer "turned on the heat" this week to speed growth and maturity of crops across Texas. At the same time, the heat increased the need for rain in many sections to insure bumper yields, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said today.

"Many stations did receive moisture, some heavy and damaging," said director John E. Hutchison of the extension service. "However, many crops are approaching or are at the critical period of growth when rain is needed to carry them through." District agents report crop conditions generally good up to this time. Cotton varies from the first early bale ginned in the lower Rio Grande Valley to completing planting in the Rolling Plains and Panhandle. Insect damage varies from full control in the valley to few and light in West Texas.

Most replanted cotton and grain sorghum in the south plains after hail damage earlier, is up and growing. Wheat harvest reached

full swing in the Panhandle this week, and about 75 per cent of the grain sorghum acreage has been planted. The USDA reports about 95 per cent of the spring crop acreage is planted.

Baling of a bumper crop of hay is in full swing throughout the state. Ranges and pastures are reported dry or drying fast in Far West Texas, the Edwards Plateau and most parts of South Central Texas to exceptionally good in all East Texas and the coastal area.

Livestock is said to be in good shape throughout the state.

Corn and Grain sorghum growth varies also from maturing in South Texas to completion of planting in the Panhandle. Small grain harvest is about complete as far north as the Rolling Plains. There farmers are already breaking their stubble land.

# Passage Of House Bill Hailed By Enemies Of Centralization

The House of Representatives last week passed H. R. 3. This is a bill commonly referred to as the "States' Rights Bill." It is primarily designed to prevent federal laws from striking down state laws in the same field where there is no irreconcilable conflict. It contains two sentences. The first states in effect that acts of Congress shall not be construed by the courts as preempting a field and thereby nullifying state laws on the same subject, unless the act of Congress so specifically states or unless there is such a direct and positive conflict between the federal act and the state law that the two cannot be reconciled or consistently stand together. The second sentence states in effect that it was not the intention of Congress in passing the Smith Act in 1940 to prevent states from prosecuting sedition against the United States. It will be remembered that the Supreme Court in 1956 ruled that an alleged Communist in Pennsylvania could not be prosecuted for sedition under the Pennsylvania laws because the federal government had adopted an act in that field and thereby nullified the state law on the subject.

The passage of H. R. 3 after a vigorous and bitter debate, was a clear-cut victory for those who are opposed to the centralization of government and the concentration of power in Washington. Those who opposed the passage of the act are considered generally to fall into the category of those desiring further expansion of federal regulation and activity. Needless to say, it is to be expected there will be much litigation on this subject if H. R. 3 finally becomes the law. Whether or not it will clear the Senate is an unanswered question at this time. This same bill passed the House last year by the vote of 241 to 155.

The margin this year was much narrower, the vote being 225 for the bill and 192 against it. The bill that passed the House last year failed in the Senate by a narrow margin of one vote. Presuming, however, that the bill does pass the Senate, there is still the threat of a veto by Eisenhower. It is difficult for me to see how Eisenhower or anyone else can oppose this legislation if they desire to see the people of this country governed in the manner intended by the framers of our Constitution. However, the opponents are entitled to their beliefs on the subject which I respect but I sincerely hope they do not prevail.

**Dixie**  
A Yankee friend of mine from Fredericktown, Ohio, Congressman Robert W. Levering, introduced a resolution extending congratulations to the people of Mt. Vernon, Ohio, as they commemorated the 100th anniversary of the famous song "Dixie." It seems that the composer of the song was one Dan Emmett of Mt. Vernon, Ohio.

The story of the composition of Dixie is one with which I was not always familiar. It seems that Dan Emmett who is known as the father of minstrelsy in the United States for his first popular song "Old Dan Tucker," was desperate for a new song for a minstrel show in New York which was going badly. Dan had a deadline to produce a song that would pep up the show. The story is that during that period there was a common expression among people in the theatrical world who were not getting along so well.

The expression was "I wish I were in Dixie," which simply meant "I wish I were somewhere else besides where I am now." At that time it had no relationship with the South. While brooding over the fact that he could get no inspiration for a new song, Dan Emmett kept repeating the expression to himself, and it was because of this that the song was born. The name of the piece was "I Wish I Was In Dixie's Land."

It pepped up the show and was a great success, but it was received with widest acclaim in the South. In fact at the outbreak of the Civil War it became the South's war song, its national song, its anthem and has been so associated ever since.

When Jefferson Davis was inaugurated President of the Confederacy, the band played Dixie. When President Lincoln came out of the White House to address a crowd joyous that the great civil strife was ended, the conductor of the United States Military band asked him his favorite selection. Lincoln replied "Play Dixie."

Thus, Dan Emmett gave the nation its first national song of native origin. The Star Spangled Banner, America, and even Yankee Doodle were all tunes with overseas tones.

**Uncle Sam**  
Last week the House Interior Committee adopted the resolution making a national shrine of the grave of Samuel Wilson, progenitor of the symbol "Uncle Sam." Few people realize that the symbol "Uncle Sam" did have its foundation in a real person, to wit, Sam Wilson, who was a prominent figure of the Revolution and colonization of this country. He was born in 1766, ran away from home and joined the Army at 14, serving until the end of the Revolutionary War. He settled in Troy, N.Y., and established a meat-packing business. He was inspector of provisions for the American Army in New York during the War of 1812. A visitor to his meat-packing plant inquired as to what the initials "EAUS" on a barrel of meat signified.

The workman replied the initials EA stood for Elbert Anderson, the contractor, and the US stood for Uncle Sam or the United States. The name of Uncle Sam was later associated with the figure of the tall gentlemen in striped pants, the star-bedecked coat and top hat. This figure then appeared in a cartoon and was known as Brother Jonathan. However, the association of the name Uncle Sam with the figure caused a merger of the two and it has remained since as the symbol of the United States, sometimes stern, sometimes jovial, sometimes surprised, but always typical of the qualities of our country and that for which it stands.

The United Nations reported that recovery from the 1957-58 recession continues, but warned that there are a few dark spots in the world economic outlook. An economic survey forecast steady improvement through 1959. The rate of expansion will be limited only by demand, it said.

The steel industry says it does not intend to retreat from its demand for a wage freeze in the two-week strike truce arranged by President Eisenhower. It has become apparent, say observers, that the White House move has failed to break the deadlock that has prevailed through eight weeks of negotiations.

The administration's cabinet committee on price stability for economic growth called for action to fight inflation and "insure growth." The report, prepared by

**Vice President Richard M. Nixon** who is chairman of the committee, made no departure from established administration policy.

The 500 largest corporations suffered a combined drop in profits after taxes last year of 17.8 per cent and cut their total employment rolls by 600,000 to 8,900,000. Fortune Magazine reported. Profits declined from \$11,700,000 in 1957 to \$9,600,000 in 1958, according to Fortune's annual survey.

## Brando's Ex-Wife Will Concentrate On Acting

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Almond-eyed Anna Kashfi, Marlon Brando's ex-wife, said today she is starting life anew to concentrate on an acting career.

For the first time in almost a year, Anna is back at work — and in a television show.

Fittingly, the smoky-kinned beauty — who is purportedly half Indian, half Welsh — portrays a half-caste French and Chinese girl in her video debut.

Anna refused scores of opportunities in movies and TV during and since her turbulent marriage to mumbbling Marlon. The fast buck artists wanted to capitalize on her head-lined marriage, baby and divorce. But the 24-year-old Anna turned thumbs down.

Why, then, the sudden decision to perform again?

"This is the first script I've liked," she said. "It's a waste of time to appear in anything that is not good."

Anna can afford to be choosy. Her settlement with Brando brought in more than half a million dollars.

She's bought a new home in Beverly Hills where she and young Christian, 13 months, live alone with a nurse. A semi-retuse, the ex-Mrs. Brando rarely attends parties or premieres.

Currently at work in a segment of the new TV series, "Adventures In Paradise," she next will appear in "The Singing Mountain" in London. Despite her antipathy to Hollywood, she will return.

"I will be able to work here and spend a maximum amount of time with little Devi," she explained. "Whenever possible I take him to the park to play. We will make our permanent home in Beverly Hills."

Fred Haney said that he may put Musial on the all-star team anyway, but nevertheless it looks as if the hand writing is on the wall for the old pro, who's appeared in 15 straight all star games. Orlando Cepeda got 181 votes for first base, and Frank Robinson of the Reds collected 26.

Not too long ago, these two wouldn't even be mentioned in the same breath with Musial. Last year, in fact, Musial led in the voting of the players with an overwhelming 201 votes.

With Williams, the fall hurt just about as badly. Minnie Minoso drew 143 votes and Jim Lemon of Washington 36, so they both outdistanced the 41-year-old Splinter pretty badly. Which goes to show that nobody can go on forever — except maybe Archie Moore.

## Yanks Rated Mighty Low!

Williams and Musial, however, weren't the only ones to be rudely jolted by the results of the all-star vote. The New York Yankees in general, and Mickey Mantle in particular, got their come-uppance from the players.

The Yankees placed only one man, first baseman Bill Skowron, on the team. Mantle was no better than second in the voting for the centerfield spot.

Skowron won the first base job pretty handily, with 153 votes to 72 for runnerup Vic Power of Cleveland, but Mantle lost the centerfield post to Detroit's Al Kaline by 118 to 100.

It was Yogi Berra, though, who really took a beating on the Yankees. He fared almost as badly as Musial and Williams, with only 20 votes for the backstop job. Gus Triandos of Baltimore was the leader with 171 votes, and Sherm Lollar of the White Sox was second with 29.

## Aaron Picked Unanimously

While the Yankees, Musial, Williams and co. were having their troubles, Hank Aaron was having his moment of glory. He became the first player in the history of the game to get a unanimous vote of the players — all 308 of them in the National League.

Not even the mighty Babe Ruth was pointed out by baseball

commissioner Ford Frick, was ever elected unanimously. Which goes to show you what the National League players must think of this Aaron guy, both as a player and as a person. Many men would probably get a few votes cast against them because of personal feelings, regardless of their ability.

Overall, it would be hard to argue with the players' vote on any count. They picked two solid teams, and it's doubtful if the fans would pick two squads that good if the all-star game lasted another hundred years.

The game really should belong to the fans, but it was becoming a farce, with the fans picking the team. If became a game of seeing how many of the "home" team could be jammed onto the starting lineup.

This practice reached a ridiculous climax a couple of years ago when seven Cincinnati Reds were named to the starting team, and the commissioner had to step in to give Stan Musial (when he WAS Stan Musial) the first base job over Joe Blow, or somebody, from Cincinnati.

Until some way can be found to stop such abuses, the picking of the all-star squads should be left to the players. At least, Joe Blow from Cincinnati won't be playing first base.

## Chisum Third In Lefty Meet

Melvin Chisum of Pampa finished third in the recently completed National left-handers golf tournament, held at Galesburg, Ill., from June 23-26. More than 130 golfers were competing against him.

Chisum had competitive scores of 75-71-73-74 for a total of 293. He was only four strokes back of the winner, Ed Sweetman of Greensboro, N.C., who had a 292.

Chisum has entered the left-handers tournament several times, but his best previous finish was seventh. His score this year was especially good, since the par 71 layout included water-holes, timber and deep ravines, traps, hazards, and bunkers.

Chisum teamed with another Pampa, Les Howard, several weeks ago to win the National Junior College Jinks championship for Odessa Junior College, so he isn't exactly a novice as far as national honors are concerned.

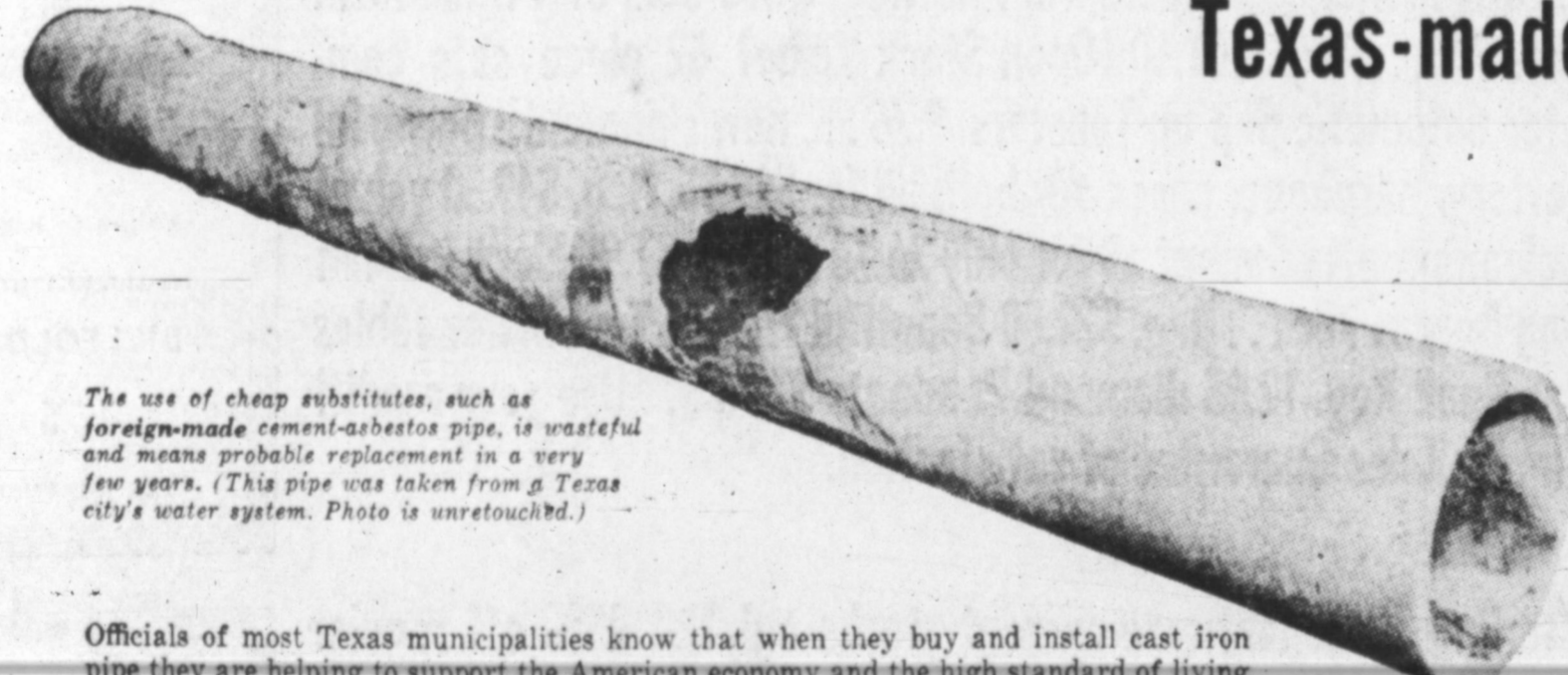

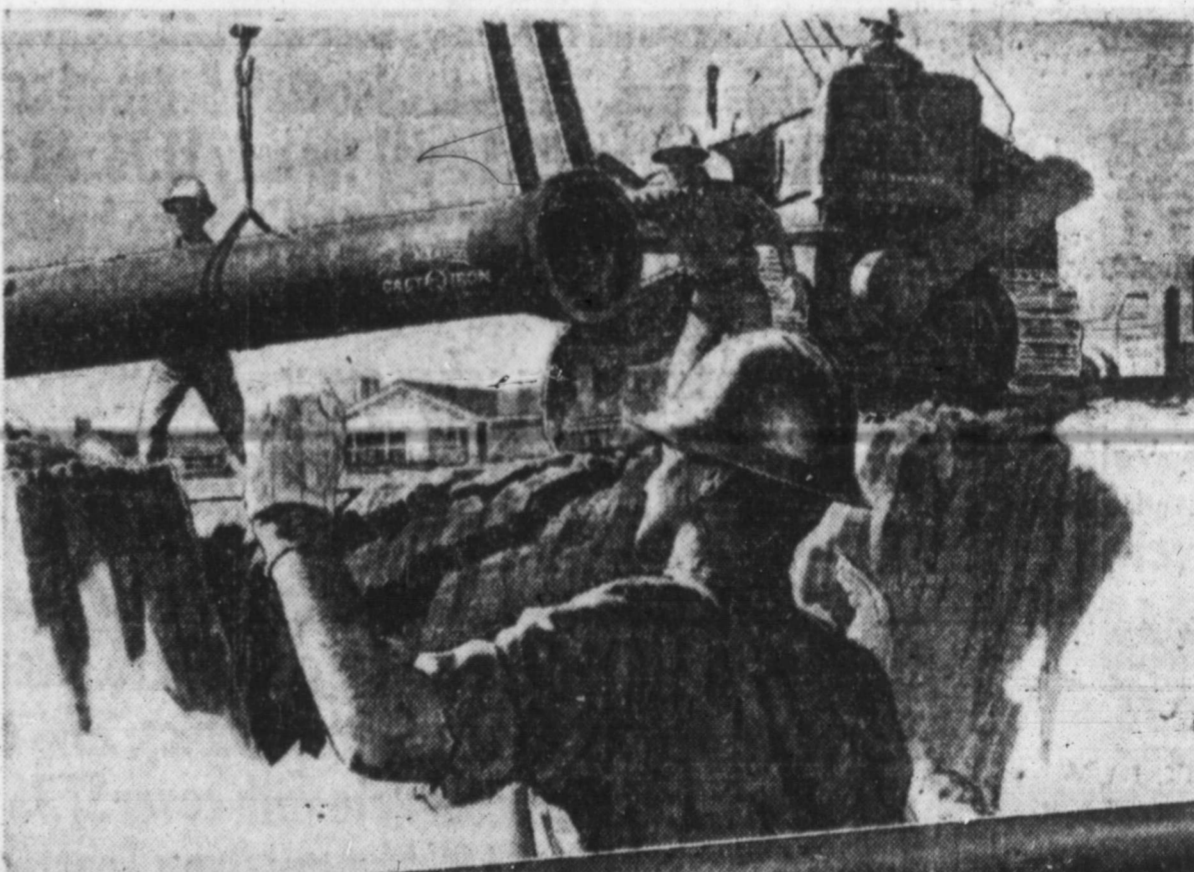

# Hamilton Heads West Loop

## Four Schools From Pacific Coast Conference Entered

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The new Athletic Assn. of Western Universities goes into business officially Wednesday—with none other than Rear Adm. (Ret.) Tom Hamilton in command of the ship. Hamilton, former Naval Academy football coach and athletic director at University of Pittsburgh for the past decade, accepted the new post Monday on a five-year contract.

He will come West today to meet officials in San Francisco and Los Angeles, then return to Pittsburgh until Aug. 1. He takes over his new duties on Sept. 1, with headquarters in San Francisco.

As "executive officer" of the AAWU, Hamilton will direct the athletic activities of Southern California, Washington, California and UCLA in the new conference, which succeeds the old Pacific Coast Conference.

"I took the post because of the fine opportunity," said Hamilton. "I have been working for a great university. Now I can work for four great universities."

It is probable that before Hamilton is settled in his new office very long there will be more than four schools in the conference. Stanford has been asked to join and President Dr. Wallace Sterling is looking into the feasibility of becoming the fifth member. It is possible that Oregon, Oregon State and Washington State also may be asked to join.

Most of these schools already are on each other's football schedules at least the next five or six years. They also compete against each other in basketball, track and field, golf, swimming, wrestling, boxing, baseball, etc.

Hamilton had been contacted to take the job more than a month ago. He was one of several who were considered for the post.

"We are extremely pleased we were able to attract Hamilton," said Dr. Frank Kidner, faculty athletic representative at University of California and chairman of the organizing committee for the new association. "He is a national figure who commands respect among his colleagues in intercollegiate athletics."

In her cool, overcontrolled voice, his mother said, "Stuart, you heard what I said. Give the olives back to Melinda."

He shoved them into his mouth. I thought, "Oh, young mother, why don't you open that carefully lipsticked mouth of yours and cry to your husband: 'Bill, help me! Sit on Stuart! Subdue him! I'm so fashionably thin that my sitting on him makes no impression. Indeed, Bill, I only seem to be sophisticated, self-sufficient, certain of all the answers—and am really unable to father our children for you. Squash Stuart, dear Bill, and I'll

never quote Doctors Spock or Gell to you again, so help me!"

She didn't say this, or course. So what happened was family surrender. The bright young executive father, as a nod of decision from his wife, untied the napkin from Stuart's neck. Slipping a bill to the bewildered waiter, he meekly followed wife and children to their parked car and home where Stuart, I can only presume, was served more olives.

I don't know how we women got stuck with this awful obligation to appear so independent, so self-assured, so superior to any need for husbandly strength and co-operation in the discipline of children.

How we got stuck with it doesn't matter if we could just register our resentment of it. We seem unable to. We just brood, smoke and

devote proper attention to her other children. The homemaker takes care of these youngsters for her.

Another type of case occurs when a woman returns home from the hospital after having a baby.

The homemaker looks after the older children while the mother recovers and gets used to caring for the infant.

Homemakers also advise mothers on how to raise children and do housework efficiently. Welfare agency officials explain that such tips have proved especially useful to widows who have several young children. In many cases, mothers who felt incapable of raising their youngsters would have turned them over to foster homes if it hadn't been for the homemaker's help.

Homemakers have proved highly beneficial in aiding elderly folks. By relying on a welfare

**For-Hire Homemakers Ease Lot Of Many Families In Distress**

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Welfare agencies are hiring substitute mothers to save hundreds of needy children each year from growing up in orphanages and foster homes.

This boon to family preservation is called homemaker service. It provides experienced welfare workers to help raise children in homes where one of the parents has died or been hospitalized for a long-term illness.

Here's a typical example of how it works: One day a worried father walked into the local welfare agency and asked for help. His wife had just been committed to a mental institution for an indefinite period of time.

He had been left with four small children. Since the father couldn't take care of them and hold down a job at the same time he wanted to place them in foster homes until his wife recovered.

A social worker explained that for a small sum the agency could send a woman to look after the children and manage the household each day until he got home from work. The father agreed.

The result was that he and the children were spared the heart-break of separation while the mother was away from home.

In addition to pinch-hitting for missing parents, homemakers are called on to help in other types of cases. For instance, they help parents who have children with serious ailments such as mental retardation. Since the afflicted child requires a lot of care, the mother often doesn't have time to

drink too much, get headaches and divorces imagining we're mad at everything but the one thing that really grieves us—the obligation to play father to our husbands' children.

So, fooled by our front of self-sufficiency, our men have got to feeling uncertain, insufficient. Joining us in parental surrender, leap to our nod or decision—and follow us obediently out of the restaurant instead of staying there, helping to quell Stuart and enjoying a fine roast beef dinner.

worker to do the shopping and difficult household chores, feeble oldsters are often able to live happily at home instead of having to move to an old folks' institution. Often homemakers provide nursing care for elderly people who are ill.

There are about 150 welfare agencies in 32 states and the District of Columbia that offer these services. Each one pays the salaries of its homemakers, which range from amounts of less than a dollar to \$1.50 an hour. The family is charged for all or part of the costs according to its ability to pay.

Some agencies are financed by private donations. Many receive funds from organizations like the Community Chest, United Givers Fund and cancer, heart, tuberculosis and polio societies. Others are supported by state and federal welfare appropriations.

Above all, start off your summer hair beauty with the right permanent wave.

If you take these simple precautions, you can enjoy the sun and summer fun, and your hair will still be lovely for the more formal fashions of autumn.

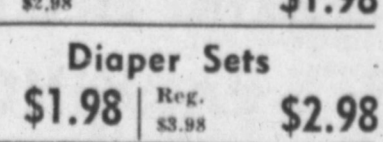

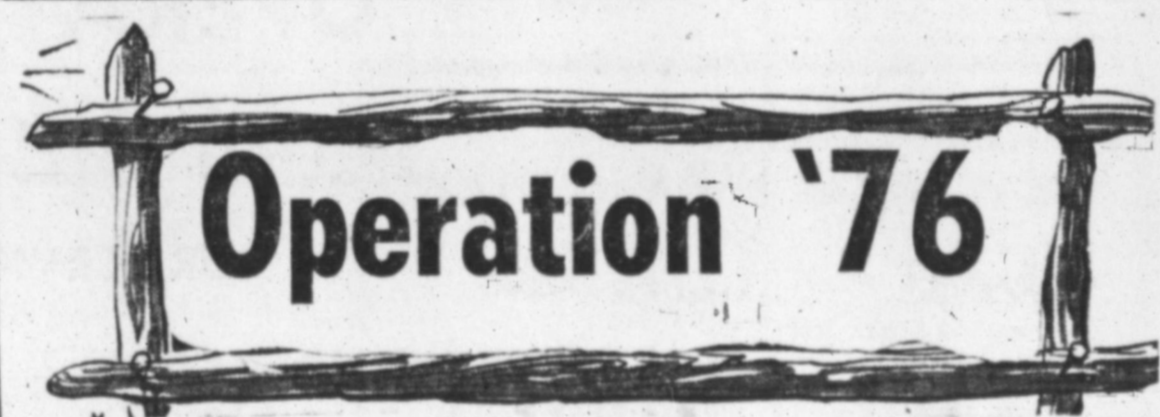

Too Many Meetings

Roy Pearson, dean of Andover Newton Theological School, gets a round of hearty applause from us. He has an article in the June issue of "Think" magazine entitled "No Meetings in Heaven," which we think is pretty fine. He begins this way: "Like most explosions, mine had a very small trigger. In fact, it all started while I was opening my morning mail, and the significant item was nothing but a notice of a weekend conference. But what set this particular notice apart from the other was the fact that this was a conference on how to hold conferences, and the infinita possibilities which such a concept offered were all I needed for my detonation. If you could have a conference on how to hold conferences, why not a conference on how to hold conferences on how to hold conferences; and if you got away with that, there was no limit to the avenues that beckoned your gregarious inventiveness. No more worries about a day without together; you would always be together! No more anxiety about spending only half of your life in meetings; now you could spend all of it in them!" From this excellent beginning Dean Pearson goes on to further excellence. He admits that he has no actual hostility for meetings which may be essential. "How else can you keep all of the constituents' constituent? How else can you pool diverse resources, fan enthusiasm, or provide the encouragement which prevents individual initiative from starving in its unsupported isolation?" But he insists that meetings must not become an end in themselves. "And when I hear it said that Philip Wylie summarized his own observations on the matter with a trenchant 'To hell with togetherness!' I gladly pledge him my allegiance." The dean suggests that this business of jamming executives into one meeting after another, (after the manner of democratic politics) is a process which is "killing the minds" of our best executives. "For one thing, it seems obvious to me that we have made a fetish of togetherness, elevated group dynamics to the status of a holy cult, and by insisting that every forward step be taken by a team

The Flow Of Power

To obtain an understanding of the nature of government takes a certain amount of concentration. Many of our schools teach certain facts about the practical usages of government. Few undertake to delve into the theories of government per se, in an effort to establish a moral base. As a result of this lack of depth in the modern approach to government knowledge, there is one enormous fallacy which persists in the minds of the American people which dwarfs all other fallacies. This fallacy can be stated: "We, the people, ARE the government." When this is believed, and it is widely believed, the conviction grows that a government debt is meaningless. We hear it said constantly: "It doesn't matter how much money we owe the government. After all, we are the government, and therefore, we merely owe the money to ourselves." We hope in some measure to alleviate this misconception. People are NOT their government, even in a democracy. A government is an agency of force and power. It must and always will be wielded by a few and not by the many. People are always the governed. A government is a group of men who are NOT governed, but who do the governing. That is possible for a government to exist for brief periods within the framework of a constitution which limits its powers or which prescribes certain directions for the flow of its powers, the fact remains that ALL power in government flows from the government DOWN upon the people. There is an insensate gravitation pull that directs the flow of power in the relationship between a government and its people. The reason we are confused so largely on this subject is that we imagine that because of general and frequent elections, the final say on any matter remains in the hands of the people. BETTER JOBS

"Supreme Importance Of Worship" My wife tells me that I do too much quoting. My answer is that it is best, of course, to have an original idea and an explanation, but the next best thing is to pass on an idea with an explanation that will help promote a society that will not get our children into trouble. Especially is this true when the person quoted can do it better than I can.

With this idea in mind, I am continuing to quote from Howard E. Kershner's commencement address before the Grove City College on the subject of "The Moral Basis of a Free Society." "The Fourth Commandment: 'Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy.' What has that to do with self-government and freedom?" you say. "If one wishes to work or play on Sunday, that is his business. It affects no one else." But we think hard to believe we shall see that this Commandment is of tremendous importance; in fact, it is basic to all the others. Only by the worship of God can we keep plain the vision in our hearts of the moral law so that it becomes a motivating force in our lives. If we do not reserve at least a substantial portion of the Sabbath day to nurture our souls, we need not expect to grow in grace and spiritual power. The moral law, "will reign in the hearts of men only so long as they faithfully worship its author, God."

"Worship is the most constructive act of man. Abraham worshipped God for many years before he was led out of Ur of the Chaldees to become the founder of a great nation and a great religion. In all his travels, so the record tells us, the first thing he did upon arriving at a new location was to build an altar unto the Lord. Worship was the central motivating and controlling force in his life."

"Moses worshipped God for forty years in the wilderness before he saw Him revealed in the burning bush; God was there all the time but long years of worship were needed to develop sufficient sensitivity to see Him. Likewise, our perception of God can be developed only through devout, long continued worship of Him."

"After half a century of worship and a long time on the top of Sinai, Moses acquired sufficient spiritual vision to become the instrument for transmitting to men the laws of God, which we know as the Ten Commandments. Even so, when he came down from the mountain and saw the children of Israel dancing in revelry and wantonness around the golden calf, the beauty and majesty of God which he had seen in deep worship faded from his mind and the Ten Commandments were smashed to bits. Moses had to retrace his steps back up the mountain and worship God another long period of time in order to restore the vision and get a new copy of the moral law."

"Even Jesus Christ, strong as he was spiritually, found it necessary to go apart frequently and to remain for long periods of time, sometimes all night and sometimes many days, in concentrated worship of God."

Discipline, Internal Or External "If men do not voluntarily discipline themselves by loyalty to the laws of God, then they must be disciplined by the secret police and the iron heel of authoritarian government. Discipline there must be if organized society is to be carried on."

"Failure to observe this Commandment and neglecting to reserve time for devout worship of God will destroy our civilization. Every one of the Ten Commandments is essential; should even one be removed or ignored, the arch will fall. They are of Divine origin, not human, and we neglect them, or any one of them, at grave peril to our well-being and even to our lives."

"The Ten Commandments are not folkways to be amended or repealed with the changing mores of men. God's laws are unalterable. One may neglect or ignore them but that does not change them or solve those who violate them from suffering the consequences. Professor Kinsey proved that a lot of people were committing adultery but that in no wise changed or altered the Adultery Commandment, nor mitigated the penalty accruing to those who violate it."

"Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful."

"But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in His law doth he meditate day and night."

"And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper."

"The ungodly are not so; but we are like the chaff which the wind driveth away."

"Therefore the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous."

So, that's why I am in the market for an old bird. A young bird would be out of place in the cage. It calls for a patriarch of a bird, a bird born long enough ago to appreciate fine craftsmanship.

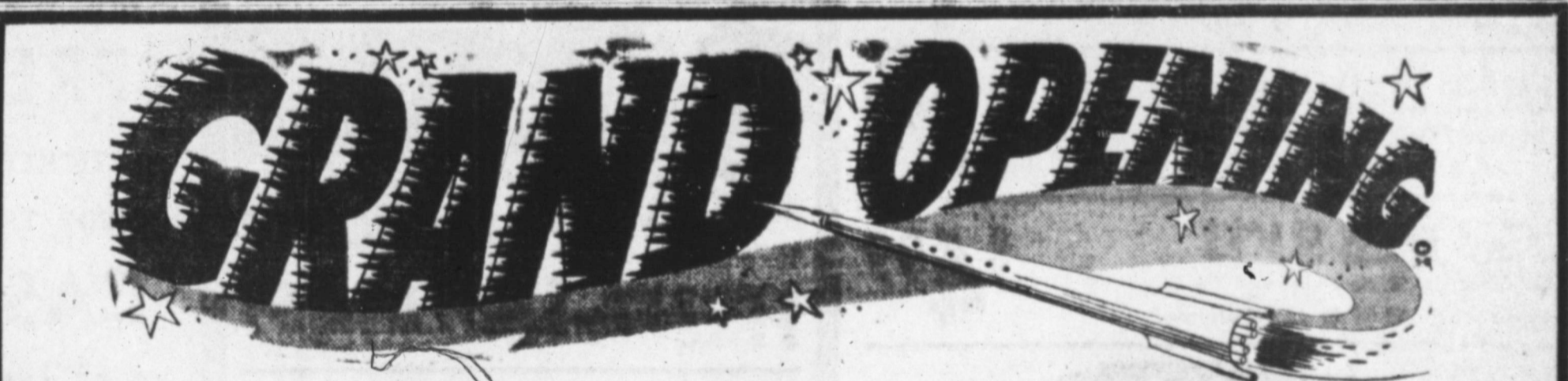
