

> **OLD MOBEETIE JAIL** — Within a radius of 50 miles of Pampa there remain a history-rich collection of 19th century buildings, battle fields and crumbling ruins, most of which had their beginnings in the 1870's. One such building is the Old Mobeetie Jail, built in 1886 of rocks hewn out of the surrounding area. Not far from Mobeetie is the site of Ft. Elliott, established June 5, 1875 "for the purpose of clearing the region of Indians. Around it (Ft. Elliott) Mobeetie - rendezvous of buffalo hunters and traders, grew." The post was abandoned in 1889, the year Walter McLaren began

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

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

Aphasia Is Little Understood **Condition Affecting Children**

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
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

THE NEW ROLE - Undersecretary Robert Murphy spelled out the importance that the State Department attaches to winning the goodwill of Russian women in a speech to a group of New York Republican women. He told them:

The net result is to lessen the interest of investors in the railroad industry, and if carried far enough can only lead to socialization - government ownership and operation of the railroads.


