They have made many people forget that a community's or nation's financial intake must equal the outgo. There is widespread acceptance of the socialist idea that the federal government owes every citizen a living, plus free health benefits, federal scholarships and a wide variety of welfare state services. It is well understood that this necessitates socialist - style taxation that takes from the productive elements in society to give to those who expect a handout as

their right. People who once would have scorned a handout and who believe they should support the government instead of the govern ment supporting them; now are willing to ride through life at government expense. The dole is accepted as a permanent feature of American life. Any loss of individual or states rights in the process of gaining welfare state 'benefits' seems to be regarded as a satisfactory price to pay-at least by a large element in this

country. Of course many people hold fast to the independent, free enterprise traditions of this country. They want to stand on their own feet and they want their communities to do the same thing. But tilere's no mistaking that such selfreliant Americans face an uphill fight in the struggle against socialism in America. 

Business Views

United Press International Chief federal mediator Joseph Finnegan said he is "encouraged" by a turn for the better in steet contract negotiations. But he added that the two sides in the 24day-old strike still have not gotten down to discussing dollars and cents for a new contract.

The Senate Finance Committee approved legislation that would prevent states from taxing a company that sells goods in a state but has no offices or warehouses there. The bill is designed to limit the scope of two Supreme Court decisions giving the states broad powers to tax the income of interstate companies.

Retail auto sales in July totaled 452,000 cars, down 22 per cent from June but 30 per cent ahead of the July 1958 pace. With sales considerable below last month's production of 550,000 cars dealer stocks climbed to a record 965,000
