Last Official Action Taken By Western Allies At Paris Meet

PARIS (UPI) - The Western Big Three leaders today formally invited Premier Nikita Khrushchev to come here April 27, for the first of a series of Big Four summit meetings. He was expected to accept the invitation quickly.

A series of communiques and announcements issued at end of a three-day meeting of President Eisenhower with the government heads of Britain, France and West Ger-

many made public the text of the official invitation to Khrushchev four hours after it was extended to him in Moscow. French ambassadors in Moscow called on Soviet Foreign Minister Khrushchev to "meet together from time to time" with the Western leaders.

Cuba Initiates 'Big Brother' **Drive On Foes**

HAVANA (UPI) Premier Fidel lastro has launched a "big prother" drive against "counterevolutionary" foes of his regime. sking Cubans to report to the uthorities any critical talk they verheard.

In a three-hour telecast Sunday, Castro announced stringent measures against enemies of his egime, including a law that would permit confiscation of the property of convicted conspiritors.

Labor Minister Augusto Martinz Sanchez whose official car vas shot up early Sunday, appeared on the television show vith Castro. He made no menion of the attack on his car, in which three persons were wounded.

Martinez himself was not in the ar when it was raked with bulets by unidentified gunmen in uburban Vedado. The gunmen led before police arrived.

Need Better Understanding Of Money

This column has devoted considerable space to quoting Frederick Nymeyer's interpretation of money and credit. Now, the Committee on Monetary Policy, headed by Walter E. Spahr, quotes at length from George Winder's new "A Short History of

Money". Winder pretty well agrees with Nymeyer and Spahr, that a lot of our trouble comes from the government attempting to guarantee the value of irredeemable paper money. Spahr quotes from Winder's "A Short History of

Money" as follows: "'During the nineteenth century, all the other leading commercial nations of the world adopted gold as the basis of their currency. Although it is not always realised now, the effect of

this was to give the world an international money. The metal. coins of the world might bear different names and have different weights, but, as long as they were gold and could be exchanged freely, what did that matter? An ounce of gold is an ounce of gold whether it is made up of sovereigns, Louis d'ors, ducats, or the chief coins of any nation, and it

can measure values anywhere on earth. 'The result was that international payments during the nineteenth century ceased to be a problem. .

. . .

"'...We are sometimes adjured today to invest money in the Empire. Never has more money been invested in an Empire, and never have so many countries developed more quickly than during the nineteenth century, and no Government ever though of asking its people to invest money. People invested because there was security in the world, and the existing monetary system facilitated the free transfer of money from one country

to another.' "From his page 101: 'The age of the world's international gold standard came to an end with the outbreak of war in 1914, and, with it, ended that growing economic unity which was an outstanding feature of the world of the nineteenth century. . .'

Spahr continues to quote from Winder's book under the heading of " 'Reliability, honour, integrity ... are attributes of individuals, not of Governments.' Winder puts be banned. it this way:


