7,000 March Together Worshipers Jam Pampa

More than 7,000 persons participated in the Pampa Pilgrimage yesterday at 6 p.m. to prove the efforts of 44 Pampa Key Club members a success.

The Pilgrimage, originated, planned and executed by the club and its support of church members, brought together what is thought to be the largest assemblage of this type in the history of Pampa.

Mert Cooper, chairman of the committee, said about 5,500 pilgrims marched to gathering places in the six sections of Pampa, while another 1,500 to 2,000 drove cars.

Cooper said the event, which is expected to become an annual project of the Key Club, began at 6 p.m. with families leaving their homes for the trek to gathering points at Pampa High School, Woodrow Wilson, Horace Mann, Baker, Lamar and Carver Elementary schools. FDIC Pays Claims For Defunct Bank

TENAHA, Texas (UPI) — The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. (FDIC) has settled \$510,000 in claims against the defunct First State Bank of Tenaha, which was forced to close when a \$340,000 shortage was discovered in the accounts of its assistant cashier.

Clifford Gary, 35, admitted he embezzled the money to shore up the finances of his construction company, according to the FBI. E. N. Johnson, chief claims agent for the FDIC, said the \$510,000 paid out so far represents claims of 900 depositors.

Big Three Invites Nikita To Parley

Last Official Action Taken By Western Allies At Paris Meet

PARIS (UPI) — The Western Big Three leaders today formally invited Premier Nikita Khrushchev to come here April 27, for the first of a series of Big Four summit meetings. He was expected to accept the invitation quickly.

A series of communiques and announcements issued at end of a three-day meeting of President Eisenhower with the government heads of Britain, France and West Germany made public the text of the official invitation to Khrushchev four hours after it was extended to him in Moscow.

The American, British and French ambassadors in Moscow called on Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko this morning and delivered oral invitations for Khrushchev to "meet together from time to time" with the Western leaders.

The Western ambassadors told Gromyko their chiefs of government will expect to discuss with Khrushchev disarmament, the German question including Berlin, and East-West relations.

In delivering the invitation and proposed agenda to Gromyko, the American ambassador was instructed to make it clear that the suggested list of items was not restricted, but that each participant would be free to raise and discuss any topic.

West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer attended the Western Big Four summit meeting in Paris this week but did not take part in inviting Khrushchev to a summit meeting. However, he was kept advised of all allied developments.

President Eisenhower met with Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer in a last half-hour meeting in the Elysee Palace shortly after the formal invitations were delivered in Moscow.

Today's meeting was so short there was some speculation the Western leaders may already have received an affirmative reply from Moscow.

The decision on the time and date of the first of a series of summit conferences was the major outcome of a Western summit conference this week end.

Shortly after the Western summit ended President Eisenhower headed for Spain, Morocco and Washington, completing on Tuesday.

Ike In Spain On Last Leg Of Global Visit

MADRID, Spain (UPI) — President Eisenhower arrived at nearby Torrejon Air Base from Paris by plane at 4:22 p.m. (10:22 a.m. est) today.

In Paris he attended a three-day meeting of the Big Four western heads of government and discussed serious Franco-American differences with President Charles de Gaulle. He goes to Morocco tomorrow and returns to Washington tomorrow night for the Christmas holidays.

Eisenhower failed to extract from de Gaulle a promise that France would integrate its Air Force with NATO's but he did win a pledge that de Gaulle would study means of closer cooperation with the Atlantic Alliance.

They meet again in Washington April 18 when the differences may be fully ironed out.

Eisenhower plunged right into the Algerian question and de Gaulle's reluctance to integrate the French air fleet with NATO. Eisenhower gave a detailed explanation of why the United States abstained in the United Nations.

Cuba Initiates 'Big Brother' Drive On Foes

HAVANA (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro has launched a "big brother" drive against "counter-revolutionary" foes of his regime, asking Cubans to report to the authorities any critical talk they overheard.

In a three-hour telecast Sunday, Castro announced stringent measures against enemies of his regime, including a law that would permit confiscation of the property of convicted conspirators.

Labor Minister Augusto Martin Sanchez, whose official car was shot up early Sunday, appeared on the television show with Castro. He made no mention of the attack on his car, in which three persons were wounded.

Martinez himself was not in the car when it was raked with bullets by unidentified gunmen in a suburban Vedado. The gunmen led before police arrived.

Castro denounced all foes of his regime, particularly the "idle rich" and charged that before he took over some Americans thought Cuba was part of the United States.

Efforts Redoubled To Halt Strike Resumption

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Steel negotiators meet with federal mediators today to discuss the union's demand that the companies bargain individually rather than on an industry-wide basis.

Federal Mediation Director Joseph F. Finnegan summoned both sides in the prolonged dispute in a new effort to head off a resumption of the steel strike next month.

Senate Democratic Whip Mike Mansfield (Mont.) said today that Congress would have to tackle new labor legislation next month if the steel workers walk out again. The court order keeping them on the job expires Jan. 28.

The 11 major steel companies suggested Sunday night that the Steelworkers' demand for company-by-company negotiations be discussed at today's meeting with Finnegan.

The issue of separate bargaining talks appeared certain to raise new conflict between management and labor. The companies said they had "serious misgivings" about the plan. The union previously had threatened to go to court to get its way.

In a letter to Steelworkers' President David J. McDonald, the companies said the union's latest contract demands — higher than those already rejected by management — had contributed to the deadlock.

McDonald presented a 10-point revised proposal to the companies last Thursday. The new plan generally followed terms negotiated with the Kaiser Steel Corp. in October, but included some new demands.

The companies said McDonald's higher terms, coming just prior to President Eisenhower's return from his good will tour and "in defiance of his earnest urging for a (steel) settlement which is fair to all," has further endangered free collective bargaining.

First Such Strike In 6 Years Armed Bandits Hit In Pampa

Three young robbers, two brandishing pistols, held up the Vaughn and Roth Truck Terminal, 821 W. Brown, early Sunday morning and escaped with more than \$200. It was the first armed robbery here in six years and the second since 1947.

Two bystanders and the station attendant, Cleo Ruff, turned over \$175.48 to the men after a cash register had been emptied of \$175.48.

It is believed that the three men also robbed an Amarillo liquor store about 7:30 Saturday night. A Panhandle-wide manhunt is in progress to find the three, some who drove away from Vaughn and Roth in an old, gray-colored pickup truck.

Police Lt. D. L. Day said the three young men entered the station at 3:05 a.m. Two were carrying snub-nosed pistols while the third held a paper sack.

They approached a bystander in the station, William Ledbetter of Kingsmill, and mistaking him for the attendant, told him to open the cash register, "or else."

Ledbetter said he didn't know how Day reported, and called out to the attendant, Cleo Ruff, working in a back room. Ruff emptied the register's contents into the sack at the same time a passing motorist entered the station's office.

The motorist, Alvin Tucker of Amarillo, was told to line up with Ledbetter and Ruff against a wall, then relieved of their billfolds containing a total of \$117 in cash and checks. Ruff handed over \$9 in cash and a \$67 payroll check.

Ruff told Day that they were next herded into a rear room and sack at the same time "get their heads blown off with a rifle."

They stayed in the room a few minutes, came out, and then called.

Keep Out Of Trouble, U.S. Warns Visitors

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department has this bit of advice for anyone traveling abroad: Don't get into trouble.

Once you're in, the department says, there's not much that can be done to get you out. Other countries have standards of justice that are not always the same as those in the United States.

State Department officials emphasized that an American visiting a foreign country must acquaint himself with the laws of that nation and understand that he cannot expect exactly the same treatment he might get at home.

An example, they said, are traffic codes in Mexico. These laws are stiff, more so than in this country, and violators are usually jailed until trial, which may be delayed for days.

The department follows a routine procedure once an American is arrested. In every case where the U.S. citizen applies to a consular official for help, the official patters the facts in the case, reports them to the State Department, follows the trial closely and appraises it from the legal standards of the foreign country.

38 Lose Lives In Weekend Carnage

At least 38 persons were killed in multiple fatality accidents across the nation during the weekend in one of the worst non-holiday highway tolls of the year.

A rash of one-death accidents took several lives, including six in Illinois in separate accidents and eight in Missouri in six smashups.

Nine persons were killed and 30 injured Sunday in the worst of the crashes, a collision between a Greyhound bus and a trailer truck about 11 miles east of Tucson, Ariz.

In another Greyhound bus crash, one person was killed and about 37 injured when the bus skidded on ice and rolled over Sunday night near Springfield, Ohio.

At Chadwick, Ill., three persons were killed Sunday night when a speeding passenger train collided with the car in which they were riding. The accident happened at a main street crossing.

Five persons, including three soldiers, were killed Sunday in a two-car crash near Deming, N.M., and four other persons lost their lives in a two-car collision near Conasauga, Tenn.

Three accidents in Illinois Sunday and Saturday took six lives, and 10 persons were killed Saturday in two-car head-on collisions, six at Washington, Ohio, and four at Rockford, Mich.

National Day Of Mourning For Williams

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI) — Crowds of American citizens today filed past the bier of the last veteran of the Civil War.

Walter Washington Williams, 117, died Saturday. His body, dressed in a grey Confederate general's uniform with a star on both sides of the collar, lay in a blue and grey casket draped with the Confederate flag.

Across the world, American flags were flying at half staff.

President Eisenhower Sunday proclaimed a period of national mourning until Williams is buried Wednesday near his old farm at Franklin, Tex.

Williams had fought off four attacks of pneumonia this year. At times, he had to be fed with an eyedropper. His death was directly caused by a blood clot in the large vessel leading to the brain, according to his physician Dr. Russell Wolfe. Contributing factors were the after effects of pneumonia, under-nourishment and old age.

"He just quit breathing," Wolfe said.

"Old Reb" Williams served in the Civil War as a forage master in Gen. John B. Hood's Texas brigade. He was a private, then. The general's uniform was given to him long after Appomattox by the Sons of the Confederacy.

Light Snow In El Paso

Light snow flurries fell around El Paso today and weathermen said a low pressure system moving eastward from the Pacific Coast will bring another siege of heavy rains later this week.

Shah Of Iran Takes Third Wife In Oriental Splendor

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi married dark-eyed Farah Diba today in a simple Moslem ceremony that transformed the beautiful ex-bobby soxer into her imperial majesty, the Queen of Iran.

The setting was one of great Oriental splendor, splashed by the glitter of Farah's diamonds, but the ceremony which touched off vast celebrations throughout the land took only a moment.

Three times a Moslem priest asked Farah if she would take the Shah as her husband. The one-time Paris college student answered "yes" finally and the Shah slipped a plain gold band on her hand. That was it.

It was the Shah's third marriage. His first two marriages were dissolved when his wives failed to bear him a male heir to his peacock throne.

The handsome Shah and the beautiful dark-eyed, chestnut-haired Farah were married in the Hall of Mirrors in the Shah's imposing marble palace.

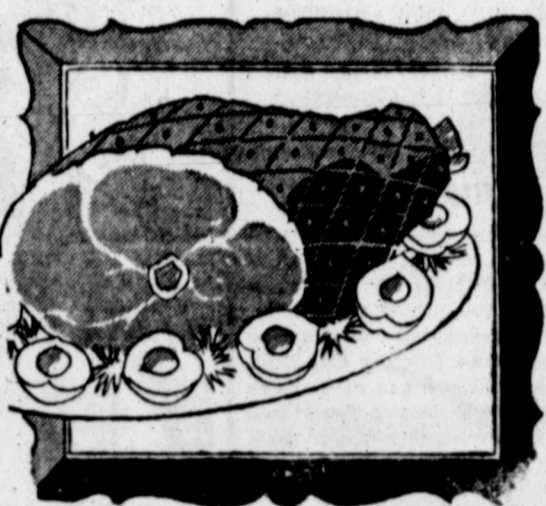

On integration Eisenhower was reported to have made the firm statement that he had accepted the supreme command of NATO originally because he believed strongly in the principles of cooperative defense and that he had not changed his mind.

Tuesday morning Eisenhower flies to Nouasseur Air Force Base at Casablanca for a welcome by King Mohammed V, lunch at the royal palace, brief talks and a departure for Washington. He arrives in the capital at 10:50 p.m. e.s.t. Tuesday.

—Agreement on the subjects to be discussed: World disarmament linked with East-West political agreement; the related West Berlin and German reunification problems; East-West relations in general; Big Four aid to underdeveloped countries.

—Adoption of a surprisingly tough and unyielding position on Berlin.

—A decision by De Gaulle to pay an official four-day visit to Washington beginning April 19. The visit will follow a Khrushchev visit to France and a three-day De Gaulle visit to Britain.

—A decision to try to prevent a West European trade split between two rival trade blocs.

—A decision by De Gaulle to submit to NATO a new plan for French cooperation with NATO's integrated air command.

Highway Toll Has Taken Joy Out Of Christmas For Many

NEW YORK (UPI) — Christmas is a magic word to children. But in countless homes there are heavy hearts. In others, fate contrives to turn young tears into smiles.

Across an often heedless nation bent on festive holiday and the gentle blessing of holy things, the glad ones smile once more.

It was just 35 days before Christmas when two automobiles met head-on at midnight in Mount Kisco, N.Y., in a slickening rain.

Taylor said the boy picked one out, was told it would be 50 cents, and plunked down two cents. He said he'd make equal payments for the rest.

Another customer contributed a quarter, and Taylor shook hands on a done deal with the youngster, who warned: "Don't you send me no bill. We get enough of them."

In Kansas City, Kan., life itself was a Christmas present for Patty McLinden, 12, Born a blub baby, worsening until six months ago, she could hardly walk. She was given little chance to survive much longer. This month a surgeon team used a heart-lung machine and body cooling and repaired Patty's heart.

She went home last week to the family farm near Cedar Point, Kan. With her went the doctor's promise of a normal, active life.

In a Fort Worth, Tex., hospital, Lynn Campbell, 17, worked hard to learn to breathe three minutes without mechanical aid so she could go home in an ambulance with her father for Christmas. Lynn, a polo victim, lies in bed and in daytime breathes through a new device that feeds her air through a hole in her throat.

Her father, Ervin, was in a Dallas veterans' hospital with a spinal ailment and had tentative permission to go home to Boswell, Okla., for Christmas. Lynn's doctors said she could join him in the ambulance if she learned to breathe three minutes without help, so they could put her in an iron lung if the other device failed.

"I've got to do it," Lynn said. "I haven't seen my daddy for so long. I don't want anything else for Christmas, just to go home."

Editorials Would 'Wise Up' The Public

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Editorial writers in two widely separated communities (Omaha World Herald and Houston Chronicle) have endorsed the suggestion that income tax pay day and election day should be combined on the same date in November.

This suggestion had a purpose. It was to focus the attention of voters on the tax-take at the very time when they were being wheedled by spenderama candidate for public office. The voter-taxpayers of the United States are not wholly witless, despite certain depressing evidence that most of them are not very smart, either.

It is reasonable to expect that a voter-taxpayer with taxes much on his mind would be in an angry mood. It could be a mood to challenge the pie-in-the-sky campaign performances of candidates whose greatest claim to public office appeared to be a free-wheeling enthusiasm for spending other people's money.

"Who," the moody voter-taxpayer might ask, "is going to pay for all of this?"

That is a question the candidate would find difficult to answer. Difficult, that is, if he chose to answer honestly, which is not likely. The free-wheeling spender of other people's money would answer up to that tough question like this:

"Who will pay for all of this? Why, bless you my friend, the other fellow will pay for it."

That, friends, is a remarkably fine sample of malarkey or, as the late Alfred E. Smith used to call it, baloney. It is not the truth. The truth is that it is the little fellows among the voter-taxpayers who pay most of the government's bills. It is a fact, of course, that the progressive rates of income taxation go up to 91 per cent in the top brackets — \$200,000 and over.

Spenderbund politicians have encouraged the idea that the fellows in the big brackets will pay for whatever spending program the politician may whomp up to catch the common man's vote. That the common man or little fellow falls for this with happy cries is part of the depressing evidence that he is not very smart.

The fact is that the greatest source of income tax revenue is the common man's bracket, the first bracket. There he pays 20 per cent on the first \$2,000 of taxable income.

Filbert Caramel Roll Is A Sweet Christmas Greeting

A simple answer to the problem "what to give that friend who has everything" is a gift from our own cheerful Christmas kitchen. And you couldn't make a better choice than these two delicious goodies, nicely contrasted in shape, color and flavor. Sweet, baking chocolate, spiked with rum rum flavoring, adds a touch of sophistication to the little round ruffles. There's a rich caramel glaze on the Filbert Roll (the making greatly simplified by using caramel chips) over a creamy brown sugar center. With the candies charmingly boxed and Christmas wrapped, you can be absolutely sure you're presenting a gift in "the best of taste."

FILBERT CARAMEL ROLL. Makes about 2 pounds of candy: Seven tablespoons butter, 1/4 teaspoon rum extract, 3 cups sifted confectioners' sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons hot milk, 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar, 1/2 cup milk, 1 tablespoon light corn syrup, 1/4 cup toasted chopped filbert, 1 cup (16 ounces) caramel chips, 1 cup toasted sliced filberts. Cream 1/4 cup of the butter with the rum extract. Gradually add the part of the confectioners' sugar and cream until light and fluffy. Add the remaining sugar and salt alternately with the hot milk. Beat until creamy and smooth. Combine brown sugar, 2 tablespoons of the butter, 1/4 cup of the milk, and the corn syrup in a medium saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Then continue boiling, stirring occasionally, until mixture will form a firm ball when a small amount is dropped in cold water (or to a temperature of 248 to 250 degrees F.). Remove from heat. Gradually add the confectioners' sugar mixture, beating until smooth and thick. Quickly pour out onto a buttered platter or baking sheet. Let set until firm—takes about 10 minutes. Knead chopped filberts into mixture and form into two rolls. Chill. Combine caramel chips, 1/4 cup milk, and 1 tablespoon butter in a saucepan. Place over low heat. Cook, stirring constantly, just until chips are melted and mixture is smooth (do not boil). Cool slightly. Spread over all sides of each roll. Cover with sliced filberts. Chill and slice.

CHOCOLATE TRUFFLES. (Makes about 24 balls.) Two tablespoons softened butter, 1 egg yolk, 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar, 1 package sweet cooking chocolate, grated; 1 tablespoon rum or nonalcoholic rum flavoring, 1/4 cup (about) chocolate sprinkles. Cream butter and blend in egg yolk. Gradually add sugar. Blend well. Add chocolate and flavoring. Mix well. Form into 1/2-inch balls and roll in chocolate sprinkles. Place on waxed paper and chill for several hours.

TOMORROW'S DINNER: Blend red tomato and grapefruit juice, cold sliced turkey, cranberry jelly, scalloped potatoes, mixed leafy over vegetables, enriched bread, butter or margarine, fresh fruit bowl, cookies, coffee, tea, milk.

- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 6 slices white bread
- 1/2 cup chili sauce

Combine ground beef, onion, horseradish, salt, pepper and mayonnaise. Mix well. Butter bread slices. Spread with meat mixture, extending well to the edge of bread. Mix together chili sauce and cheese. Top each sandwich with approximately 3 tablespoons chili sauce-cheese mixture. Arrange sandwiches on cookie sheet and place in a very hot oven (450 degrees F.) for 10 minutes, or until bread is toasted and cheese is melted. Yield: 6 sandwiches.

 - 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon soda
 - 1/4 cup sugar
 - 2-3 cup liquid (juice from one orange and water)
 - 2 tablespoons grated orange rind
 - 3 tablespoons melted lard
 - 1 egg
 - 1/4 cup chopped walnuts
 - 1/4 cup chopped cranberries
- Grease the bottom of a 5 x 9-inch loaf pan. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, soda and sugar. Place orange juice, water, orange rind, melted lard and egg in mixing bowl. Gradually add sifted dry ingredients, mixing well. Add walnuts and cranberries. Do not over mix. Pour batter into greased pan and bake in a slow oven (325 degrees F.) for 1 hour and 15 minutes. Let bread partially cool, 20 to 30 minutes, before removing from pan. Cool thoroughly before wrapping for storage. Yield: 1 loaf.

Yoga Offers Novel Housework Approach

WASHINGTON (NEA)—If you want to keep from catching cold, learn to enjoy housework, and lose weight at the same time, take up yoga.

That's the advice of 60-year-old Madame Indra Devi, Hollywood yoga instructor and author of two books on the ancient Indian exercises aimed at energizing the physique and tranquilizing the psyche. She believes they hold the solution for practically all of a housewife's problem.

"Yoga," she explains, "helps to perfect the body in every respect. It makes it younger, stronger, more resistant, keeps it in good shape and prolongs its life. It also helps you achieve a better mental attitude, makes you more aware of your responsibilities and better able to cope with them."

Other benefits include moral straight and a better complexion.

"What more can you ask?" Madame Devi asks.

She believes you can obtain all of these benefits by practicing yoga between 10 and 15 minutes a day. Key to the system is a series of physical and deep-breathing exercises. It is practiced along with a few mental gymnastics to promote concentration and meditation.

The exercises have such names as "Headstand," "Cobra Pose," "Lotus Pose" and the "Twist." Although some look as if they would be difficult for a professional contortionist, Madame Devi insists that anyone can learn them. "My mother is 78," she says, "and she does all the exercises. I had one woman pupil who started at the age of 80."

But the best time to start teaching yoga to a child is between the ages of six and eight, she explains.

Madame Devi believes one of yoga's most important benefits to housewives is its ability to relieve tension, she explains.

"Each day, women often have to do the marketing, look out for the children, clean the house, cook, and then go out with their husbands at night. I don't know how they do it."

"One woman told me she did it by drinking coffee and smoking cigarettes during the day and taking sleeping pills at night. She ended up in a mental institution."

Madame Devi doesn't believe this would be likely to happen to a yoga practitioner.

Another of yoga's mental benefits is its improvement of a person's attitudes. Madame Devi tells the story of a friend who hated washing dishes until she took up yoga. She combined deep breathing with thinking pleasant thoughts while standing over the sink. Soon, Madame Devi explains, she learned to love the chore.

Yoga also is said to uncover a person's hidden talents. Madame Devi says that she knows women who started writing, sculpting and painting after practicing yoga. "They didn't even know that they could do these things," she says.

Although Madame Devi doesn't claim yoga to be a disease cure-all, she does believe it helps the body combat illness. Some of the afflictions she says the exercises help prevent are colds, fever, sore throat, constipation, headache and fatigue.

She also views the exercises combined with dieting as an excellent weight reducer. Her diet recommendations include eating fresh fruit, drinking plenty of water and "generally eating less of everything."

Madame Devi learned yoga in India in 1927 and later taught it there. She is the first Westerner to ever teach the ancient exercises in that country, she maintains. She also taught it in China before opening her Hollywood studio, she says.

Fruitcakes Baked In Coffee Cans — They're Fun To Give, Fun To Open



IN England, when it's time to make Christmas fruitcakes, everyone in the household takes his turn at stirring the dough for good luck! With this done, the cakes are baked in slow ovens and then carefully tucked away for the holiday festivities.

Here in the United States, rich homemade fruitcakes are also held in high esteem and, every year, they become more and more popular as Christmas gifts for friends. Those which are the most fun to make and to receive are the small, plump cakes baked in gilt-grayed coffee cans, then wrapped, and all in, in gay holiday paper. Here's a marvelous gift, a delicious morsel to serve with cups of rich, steaming coffee during the holidays. Indeed, it's in the true spirit of Christmas.

- HOLIDAY FRUITCAKE**
- 1 cup salad oil
 - 1 1/2 cups firmly packed brown sugar
 - 4 eggs
 - 2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour, divided
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 2 teaspoons cinnamon
 - 2 teaspoons allspice
 - 1 teaspoon cloves
 - 1 cup pineapple juice
 - 2 cups mixed dried candied fruits
 - 1/4 cup whole candied cherries

1 cup chopped dates
1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts

Combine salad oil, sugar and eggs and beat vigorously with spoon or electric mixer for 2 minutes. Sift 2 cups of the flour with baking powder, salt and spices. Stir into the oil mixture alternately with the pineapple juice. Mix remaining cup of flour with fruits and nuts. Pour batter over this mixture, blending well. Turn into 3 or 4 well-oiled 1 lb. coffee cans. Place on upper rack in oven. Set a pan of water on lower oven rack. Bake in very slow oven (275°), 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Let stand 15 minutes before removing from pans, then cool on racks. Coffee cans, after washing, may be sprayed on outside or wrapped in red, blue or gold aluminum foil. This quantity of batter will fill 3 or 4 one-pound coffee cans. For larger cakes, cans may be filled almost to top, as the cake does not rise much, or filled 1/2 full to make 4 smaller cakes.

Note: To remove cakes from cans more easily, hold carefully upside down and remove bottom of can with can opener. After washing and decorating can, set cake back on bottom rim, slip can back in place and wrap in transparent plastic film.

The Aggies ran their streak to five last week in a thriller—a 64-62 road game decision over Houston while Texas had its record

Kuenn Named Baffling Champ

CHICAGO (UPI) — Harvey Kuenn, possibly the finest natural hitter in the American League, finally owns that elusive batting crown he has eyed for six years.

It was made official today when league averages released here showed the Detroit outfielder was far and away the leading hitter with a .353 average last season.

Until this year, the 29-year-old Kuenn had placed among the top six hitters in the circuit for five of six previous seasons, but he never was able to win the title.

This year, though, he won going away, slamming out 198 hits in 561 official times at bat to beat teammate Al Kaline, who was runnerup with 327.

Pete Runnels of the Red Sox wound up third behind Kaline with a .314 average and the top five was rounded out by Nellie Fox of the White Sox, who batted .306 and Minnie Miñoso, recently traded by the Indians to the White Sox, who hit .302.

The other three players who managed to hit 300 or better were Bobby Richardson of the Yankees, 301, and Bill Tuttle of the Athletics and Gene Woodling of the Orioles, each .300.

All Four Schoolboy Champs To Lose Heavily By Graduation

Graduation will dig heavily into the ranks of the four state schoolboy football champions crowned over the week end, but their coaches aren't pessimistic about what next season will bring.

Of course, it's hard to be gloomy just after winning one of the prize morsels of Texas athletics.

Cold figures tend to refute the optimism of coaches Bill Stages of Class AAAA's Corpus Christi Ray, Emory Bellard and Doyle Weldon of Class AAA's co-champion Breckenridge and Cleburne gains, Larry Ware of Class AA Stamford and Gordon Brown of Class A Katy.

Ray, a six-point favorite, wrested the AAAA title away from Wichita Falls 20-6 at Austin; Cleburne, an 18-point underdog, played Breckenridge to a 20-20 tie in the Bucks' own back yard to spoil Breckenridge's record of always winning in the finals; Stamford, a 10-point choice, had a mile more trouble than that of downing Brady 19-14 at San Angelo, and two-touchdown underdog Katy rapped Sundown's Roughnecks 16-6 at Brownwood.

Ray loses 20 of its first 21 players—all except right tackle Chuck Little, but Stages said he had a good B team as well as some excellent squadmen from which to build in 1960.

Bellard said Breckenridge "loses a lot," but that he'd have a good team again next fall from a program that starts, he said, "in the spring of the boys' third grade of schooling."

Halfbacks Joe Dan Knox and Troy Kennedy and tackle Leonard Tolbert will be the only returning regulars for the Bucks, but Bellard said "we had a real sophomore team that played a lot and they'll be ready."

Weldon, now an assistant coach who will step up to head coach at Cleburne as Brooks Conover is missing a dozen or so of his top 35 players.

But, among those returning is quarterback Timmy Doerr, the passing-running star who scored two touchdowns, threw for one and ran for the tying two-point conversion with 82 seconds to play against Breckenridge. And, rangy end Stephen Lee, tackle Dick Ottiger and middle guard Bob Finkles will also return.

Ware at Stamford loses 22 of his top 27 players, including all starters except guard Larry Hodgkinson. But, he has two fine halfbacks who saw a lot of action in Ronnie Gerlot and Wayne Bates. And, like Breckenridge, Stamford's football program runs deep and its B team usually is packed with potential regulars.

Katy, which can't defend its championship, anyhow, because the school moves into Class AA next season, loses nine of its top 27 hands.

But, Brown said, "we'll have a pretty good ball club since our reserves got to play a lot after we ran up the score." Katy had only one real close game all season—an 8-6 decision over Waller.

Brown loses his four starting backs, but gets back end Stan McDonald, guard Albert Voight, tackle Roy Weisner, end Lenny Steffens and Jerry Goynes, a starting end until he broke a leg in the next to last game of the regular season. Goynes, however, probably will be switched to the backfield.

"We'll probably be a bit faster club next year," Brown said. "We didn't have any speed this season, but we fairly quick."

Highly-favored Sundown, which piled up a 337-196 yard statistical advantage, can testify to the "quickness."



Conerly Vs. Colts In Pro Title Game

NEW YORK (UPI) — It'll be the old miser against the thieves when Charley Conerly leads the New York Giants against the Baltimore Colts in the National Football League championship game.

Conerly, New York's 35-year-old quarterback, will take the field Dec. 27 at Baltimore with the lowest interception percentage for a passer ever recorded in an NFL campaign. He'll throw against a Baltimore defensive unit that led the league in interceptions this year with 40.

Conerly replaced Sam Baugh as the all-time miser of the NFL, only ways for one season when only four of his 194 passes were stolen in 1958. His percentage of interceptions was 2.02, under the former season low of 2.2 set by Baugh for the Washington Redskins in 1945. Four of Baugh's 182 losses were intercepted that season.

John Unitas, Baltimore's 26-year-old quarterback, stands third only to Conerly and Baugh for the lowest interception percentage for a season. He compiled that mark, 2.7, in 1958 when only seven of his 263 passes were intercepted this season.

Unitas has a combined interception percentage of 3.3 for 1958 and 1959 while Conerly shows a percentage of 3.4 for the two years.

Conerly produced the lowest interception percentage in his 12th NFL season. Charley, currently the oldest active player in the league, also won the passing title this year for the first time by averaging 8.79 yards for each of his 194 throws.

Bill Davis, Don Shinnick and Andy Nelson head the pack of "thieves" Conerly will face at Baltimore. Davis and Shinnick tied Dean Derby of the Pittsburgh Steelers for the interception title this year with seven each. Nelson and Dick Alban of Pittsburgh were right behind with six each.

Seventeen of Baltimore's 40 interceptions were recorded by the linebackers—Shinnick, Bill Pelington, Dick Szymanski and Marv Matuzak.

By watching films of Baltimore games, offensive coach Al Sherman is trying to discover why Baltimore's linebackers nabbed so many enemy passes this year. Naturally, he won't tell if he does discover the reason.

Hank Stram Named Coach Of Dallas AFL Entry

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI) — Henry (Hank) Stram, 35, who is regarded as one of the best backfield coaches in football, has been named head coach of the Dallas Texans of the new American Football League.

Lamar Hunt, owner of the Texans, also announced that Jack Spikes, TCU's 205-pound All-Southwest Conference fullback, will play for the Texans when the new league opens in 1960.

Spikes, of Snyder, Tex., was drafted by Denver, of the AFL, and was the No. 1 draft choice of the Pittsburgh Steelers of the National Football League. Hunt said he acquired Spikes in a trade with Denver.

Hunt said he signed Spikes to a contract in Houston Saturday after Spikes closed his college career in TCU's 23-7 loss to Clemson in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Hunt refused to disclose the terms of either Stram's or Spikes' contract.

Stram was backfield coach of the University of Miami during the 1959 season and he helped to develop Fran Curci, Miami's outstanding left quarterback.

LAS CRUCES, N. M. (UPI) — You had told anyone at New Mexico State University this past week that their Aggies would be in the Sun Bowl this year, you probably would have laughed out of the campus.

For here was the proverbial "ball doornat," winner of the Border Conference game in 1958 and averaging about 10 victories per season for the last 10 years.

Upper Bowl Game Yorkouts Start

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI) — The biggest question in camp today as the National and Southwest All-Stars began two-day practice sessions for next Saturday's Copper Bowl football game was "how's Richie Lucas?"

The Penn State All-America was the first to answer. "I think I'm going to be all right."

Lucas was speaking about the injured hip that knocked him out of the inaugural Liberty Bowl game in the second period last Saturday. His understudy, Galen All, took over in that one and threw an 18-yard pass that beat Alabama 7-0.

"My hip hurts a little when I twist my leg, but it won't keep me out of the Copper Bowl game," said Richie. "I brought along a list of recommended treatments from the Penn State team doctor."

Lucas walked across the hotel lobby in normal fashion without sign of pain or limp after his arrival Sunday.

Although the Longhorns, nationally fourth-ranked with a 9-1 regular season record, possess a puny 36.9-yard average per game through passing, they have thrown nine touchdown aerials. And tossing the ball may prove

more reliable than carrying it into Syracuse's "Sizeable Seven," who outweigh the Texas starting nine pounds average per man.

If Royal's "make-the-breaks" opportunists throw the ball, it will come from the pitching arm of senior quarterback Bobby Lackey, left-handed halfback Rene Ramirez, or sophomore flash Jack Collins.

Those three plus fullback Clair Branch form the starting backfield and contributed heavily to Texas' leadership of the Southwest Conference in total offense with an average per game of 273 yards—although that pales in the face of Syracuse's 451.5-yard average.

Collins, who led the Longhorns in almost every department, is one of his team's most dangerous threats, particularly on end sweeps behind the blocking of second unit soph quarterback Mike Cotten.

The Collins-Cotten combination proved itself in Texas' uphill 20-17 victory over its grudge rival, Texas A.M., on Thanksgiving Day when Collins helped set up the Longhorns' winning marker on a crucial fourth-down end sweep behind Cotten.

For the Longhorns, the come-from-behind situation is becoming a habit, as Royal's lads were forced to overcome opposition leads four times this year to win—and the same number in 1958.

The scrappy performance enabled Texas to tie for the Southwest Conference championship with Texas-Christian and Arkansas—both of whom also won post-season bowl berths.

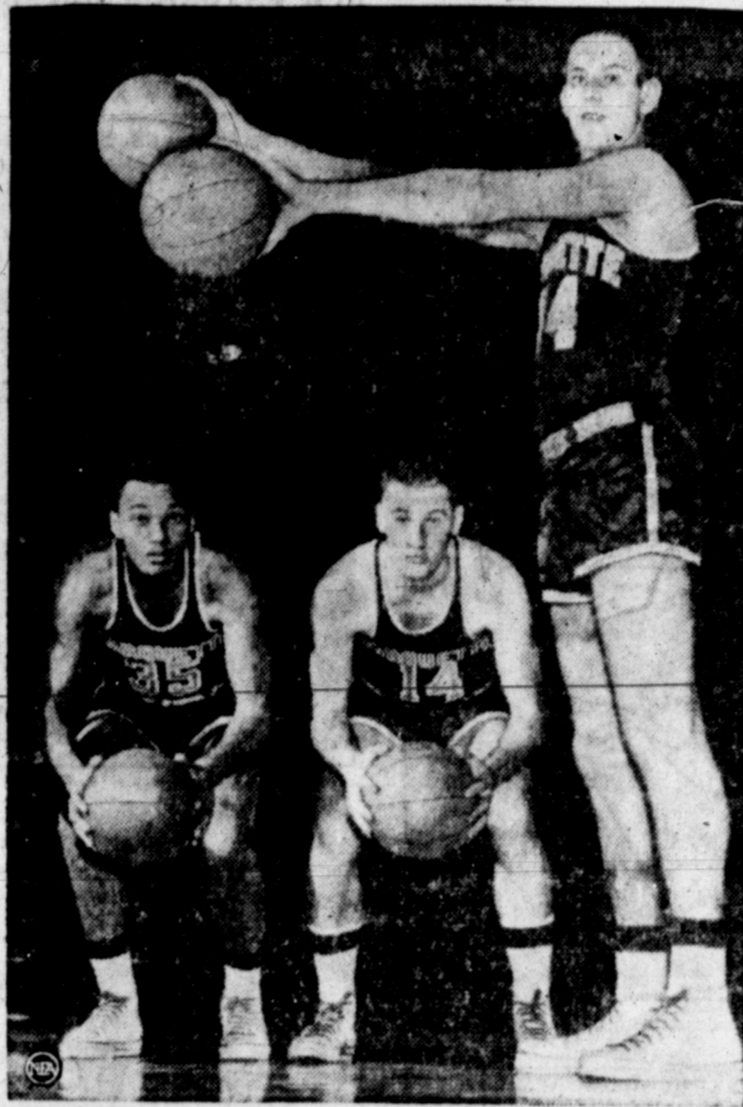
Although Texas' forward wall is outweighed by the big Syracuse front men, its alertness and aggressiveness "helped set up almost two-thirds of the Longhorns' 30 touchdowns this season."

Longhorn touchdowns came after Texas recovered 10 opposition fumbles, intercepted three passes, blocked two punts, and after four short kicks by opponents.

The hard-charging starting line is composed of ends Larry Cooper and Monte Lee, tackles Larry Stephens and Dick Jones, guards Maurice Duke and Babe Dreymla and center Jerry Muenink.

Texas will be defending an impressive bowl record in meeting Syracuse. The Longhorns' bowl history, dating back to 1943, includes five victories, two losses and one tie.

Cohn added, "and we hope to get the other third within 24 hours."

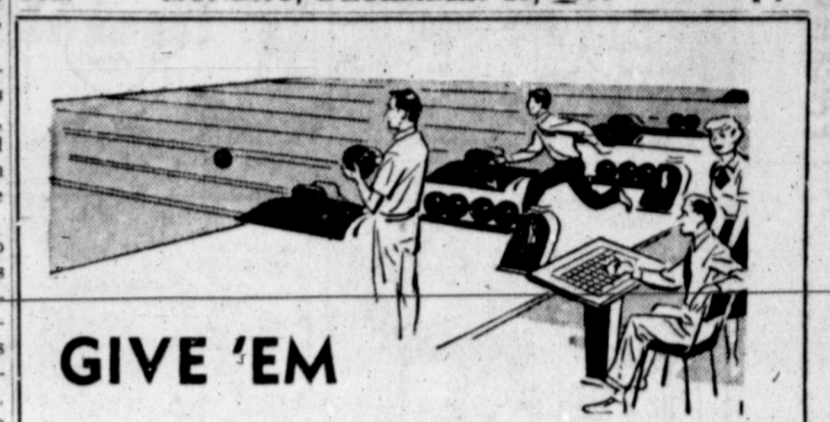

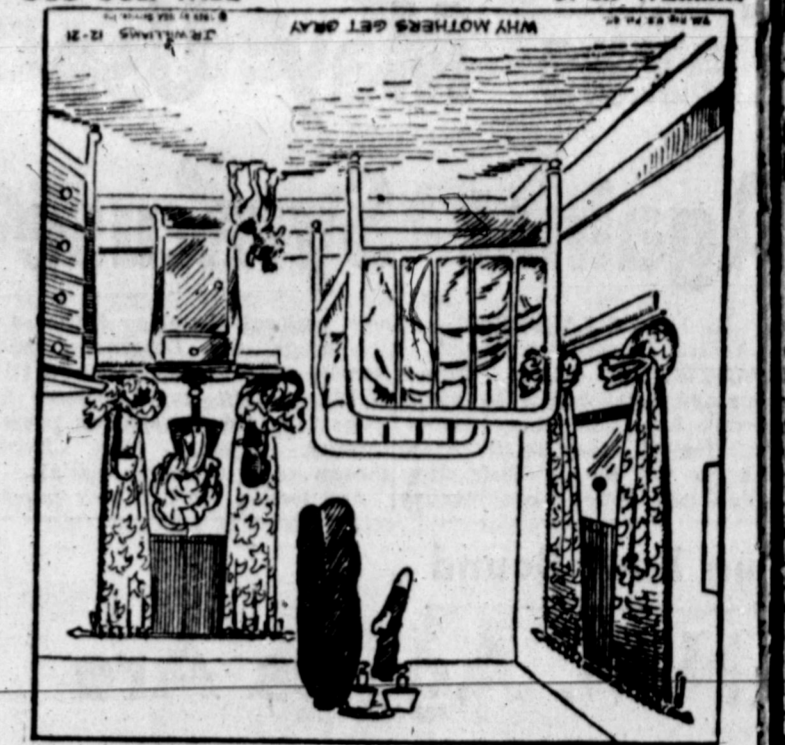
