





It reads, according to most of the Bibles I have: "If any man come to me and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, ye, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple."

It is strange that the modern translations, with very few exceptions, leave that translation

George M. Lamsa has translated the New Testament, according to the Eastern text, from original Aramaic sources. He makes this paragraph read: "He who comes to me and does not put aside his father and his mother and his brethren and his sisters and his children, and even his own life, cannot be a disciple to me." That seems to me simply to mean that you must put the principles taught by Jesus in preference even to the love of your own life.

Webster's older dictionary used one of the meanings of "hate", "to love less", but the new Webster does not give this definition. It gives as the opposite of "hate," as love, cherish.

Funk & Wagnalls gives one of the definitions of "hate" as "love less". In other words, you must put Jesus and what he taught before your own will.

The above simply shows how the meaning of words has changed and how difficult it is properly to interpret various passages of the Bible.

Frederick Nymeyer has considerable to say on the different interpretations of the word "love" as used in the Hebrew-Christian Scriptures. Under the heading of "Love in Christian Ethics Should Not Be Used To Designate A Sentiment", he

"In Hebrew Christian ethics the term, love, refers to an unsentimental profound policy for conduct, rather than to an affection of any kind.

"Love, in a legislated ethical sense in the Scriptures, does not refer to affections as between husband and wife; or parents and children; or between friends. It refers instead to rules of conduct between all people-those fond of each other as well as those not fond of each other; friends and enemies; lovers, parents and children; white and

negro - everybody. "Love in the Scriptures does not mean to like and does not depend on liking, because liking is a relative term, and the minpolicy) is debased into liking, then the issue arises of liking equally, which is sure to become a preposterous demand and sanc-

"A difficulty is that the word love means so many things, even in Scripture, such as, (1) unlicensed sex and infatuation, (2) liking, (3) preferential treatment, and (4) profound policy. "As an example of love in the

first sense, namely, unlicensed sex, consider II Samuel 13:1: 'And it came to pass after this, that Absalom the son of David had a fair sister whose name was Tamar, and Amnon


