# Hundreds Killed As Dam Bursts

# French Riviera Resort In Path Of Cascading Water

FREJUS, France (UPI) - The 200-foot high Malpasset dam burst Wednesday night with a noise like the crack of doom and sent a 35-foot wall of water onto this sleeping Riviera town, killing at least 260 persons.

The official death toll was announced by rescue headquarters of the regional prefect in Marseilles. Additional scores of villagers were feared swept to their death when 45 million tons of water cas-

WY WHITNEY BOLTON NEW YORK - As a traveling aficionado of motels soin days when an unswept log cabin in a sparse grove of dusty pines was pretty fancy stuff, and continuing up to today when selective heat and cold, swimming pools, glittering bars and piped music to lull you to sleep are standard or you don't stay in business. I have to say that it never once entered my mind that one day I'd find a modern, gleaming motel on 10th Avenue in the middle of the island of Manhattan. And if I had had such a thought I would not have had the \$2,000,000 it would take to implement it. For some months, from my

passing car window, I have watched in turn a line of wretched rookeries come tumbling down, a foundation being dug and stunning contemporary architecture go up on the solid block between 49th and 50th Streets and each time I passed this burgeoning structure it occurred to me that somewhere along the line a firm statute of the City of New York had been changed: a motel was being allowed whereas before such a structure was against the law. Which proves that one should never believe in legends. There never was such a law, it was only that 8,000,000 people thought there was — otherwise why had no one ever put a modern motel within five walking minutes of theaters, within a cross-town bus ride of the UN, on the direct avenue line to the forthcoming Lincoln Square and a twist of the steering wheel from the West Side Highway and the Lincoln Tunnels into Manhat-They polished the last window

and brushed the final rug the other afternoon and I walked in to ask for someone to sit down and talk with concerning New York's first and only motel and the first hotel structure of any kind in New York in almost 30 years. One reason pushing me along was that Freddie Fox, a Broadway theater scenic designer, had done the interior from lobby to rooms to halls to restaurant and as an old friend I wanted to see what Freddie had done. He done good, as the fellow said. Real good. It turned out that Harold Steinberg scoin of an old and sagacious real estate family of several generations standing in Westchester, not only had dreamed up the idea of a motel on 10th

Avenue, with 130 rooms and 150 surrounded himself with some knowledgeable people in staff There was Kenneth Kendall straight from his post at the Ritz Hotel in London, there was Dick Barnes running the restaurant, bar and coffee shop, and he straight from Broadway's beloved Al and Dicks's, which he helped to found, and other hotel executives from three of the best places in town, like the Sheraton East, the St. Regis and the Waldorf. Wasn't this pretty heady hiring? The answer to that was, no, it wasn't. The price for rooms was commensurate with the best motel operations across the nation and had this advantage: parking was free, which meant a \$12 room for two really went for \$9 since \$3 is standard for overnight parking in Manhattan and this meant it was \$4.50 per person per night, and there was no tipping allowed even though bellboys would be on hand if elderly persons needed help to move luggage from cars to rooms.

"In a standard, high level New York hotel, as any traveler knows," he went on, "the tipping along the way is ghastly.
