

Pampa Escapes First Strike, **But Heavy Snow Due Tonight**

The Panhandle's worst blizzard in two years veered into West Texas today and the Weather Bureau warned four inches of snow or more would fall there by tonight.

But at Amarillo, where the snow had turned to freezing rain this morning, the storm worsened.

The rain turned to big, heavy flakes of snow as line crews from Amarillo and Pampa worked feverishly to restore electric services to 1,000 families. Amarillo is in the middle of the Panhandle.

The storm howled in from the west Monday and paralyzed much of the Panhandle and eastern New Mexico during the night. Biting winds of 20 to 40 miles an hour velocity drove residents inside



gether in the same co-operative have been immune from antitrust legislation since the Claylon Act, but Senator Aiken of Vermont has recently introduced into Congress a measure which would extend that immunity to groups of co-ops banded together to fix selling prices. Of course, the Department of Agriculture has long. approved of "marketing agreements" among fruit and vegetable growers which fix prices and eliminate competition.

From the point of view of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, all of this is sinful "restraint of trade." To make matters worse, back in-1937, the Miller-Tydings Act permitted manufacturers to set a price below which no one could sell their ; oduct. This was an open violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act. It was destructive of competition. Eventually, "Fair Trade" broke down because it was unworkable, but the idea is again cropping up in Congress under a new name: "resala-prica maintenance."

This confusing clash of oppo-

site philosophies cannot continue indefinitely. Sooner or later Unele Sam must make up his minf whether he wants compelition and a reasonably free market or government sponsored monopoly and a controlled market. Uncle Sam cannot always bless with one hand what he punishes with the other. Why not abolish this conglomeration of conflicting law and commission; and try freedom? It is time-also for the sake of 'economy' or to achieve a hoped-for 'efficiency' in the use of money.'
