## Ike, USW Offers Plans To Industry

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Settlement of the steel dispute seemed as remote as ever today despite new proposals by President Eisenhower and the United Steelworkers union.

Both proposals were rejected in effect, within hours after they were unveiled Thursday night by the Chief Executive and USW President David J. McDonald.

Federal Mediation Chief Joseph F. Finnegan, who resumes separate talks with union and management officials today, promptly announced he would schedule sessions when he thinks they will do some good.

McDonald suggested that Eisenhower's steel fact-finding board recommend settlement terms for all unresolved issues in the dispute. He pledged that the union would negotiate a new contract "within the framework" of the recent negotiations.

But R. Conrad Cooper, top management spokesman, spurned this proposal as another union attempt to get a settlement "decreed by government action." He pledged swift and continuous effort by management to bargain on the issues and reach a voluntary agreement.

Eisenhower chided both sides for failure to settle the marathon steel dispute in a radio-TV address to the nation before departing on his three-continent trip.

The President has said the dispute will act to end the dispute if the strike resumes on Jan. 26 when a Taft-Hartley stay-at-work injunction expires.

Eisenhower called on both sides to look beyond self-interest and reach an agreement that will protect the public as well as stockholders and workers.

There were indications that he watered down his speech at the last minute to take out tougher criticism of union and management negotiators.

## Lady Chatterly's (P)lover For Birds

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (UPI) — Librarian Ellsworth Mason recommended to students at Colorado College today a book that might interest bird lovers: "Lady Chatterley's Plover (sic)."

Mason supported his selection by quoting a Field and Stream magazine review of D. H. Lawrence's frankly-worded love classic:

"... This fictional account of the day-by-day life of an English gamekeeper is still of considerable interest to the outdoor-minded readers, as it contains many passages on pheasant raising, the apprehending of poachers, ways to control vermin and other chores and duties of the professional gamekeeper."

"Unfortunately one is obliged to wade through many pages of extraneous material in order to discover and savor these sidelights of management on a Midlands shooting estate, and this book cannot take the place of J. R. Miller's Practical Gamekeeping."

## Louisiana Campaign In Last Day

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — A large field of candidates for the governorship of Louisiana stamped the state today in a final day of campaigning for Democratic primary voters.

A record million-plus voters registered for Saturday's balloting.

The major question was whether the voters would continue in power the fabled Long dynasty, represented this time by a ticket comprising ex-Gov. Jimmie Noe and Gov. East-Long Long, who cannot succeed himself, is running for lieutenant governor.

Opposition to the Noe-Long bid was led by ex-Gov. Jimmie Davis, a cowboy singer and one of the favorites; New Orleans Mayor DeLespess Morrison, making his second try for the governorship, and State Sen. Willie Rainach, a leading segregationist.

Other candidates include State Comptroller William Dodd, insurance man Gail Berry of Lake Charles, and boxing enthusiast Allen G. LaCombe of New Orleans.

Noe said Thursday night the election is "a Long or anti-Long fight" and told the voters, "If you believe in what the Longs have done, go down the line with us and vote for us."

## New Officers For Kiwanis

Six Pampa Kiwanis Club officers were installed Thursday night at the club's 30th annual installation banquet in the high school cafeteria.

Arthur Aftergut took office as president succeeding Sam Begert; Bob Alford became first vice president; Dr. Weldon Adair was installed second vice president; Fr. William West was re-installed secretary, and Jack Imel became treasurer.

A crowd of over 200 Kiwanians, their wives and guests attended the annual banquet. Warren Hasse served as master of ceremonies, while the installation was led by Kiwanis Lt. Governor-elect Hugh Anderson, sheriff of Hutchinson County.

Local insurance man Melvin Munn, in the evening's main address, said the club must move aggressively into new fields. "I cited active support of churches, schools, the city and county and everything in it."

His talk, largely in a humorous vein, touched on the Kiwanis organization, Pampa's future, and the Kiwanian's role in the community.

Four "special awards" were presented by Malcolm Hinkle to club pianist Helen Waggoner, Cletus Mitchell, Father West and Sam Begert. Hinkle said the awards were "IOU's," since the club's treasury was depleted.

## Skellytown House Destroyed

# 6 Fires Hit Pampa Area

Pampa firemen fought six fires Thursday, one of which destroyed the home and belongings of the W. D. Teague family, three miles north of Skellytown.

Fire Chief Ernest Winborne reported that flames broke out in the Teague home at about 2 p.m. Skellytown and Pampa fire trucks arrived at the scene too late to save the house. Winborne said the only belongings saved were a divan and a few chairs.

Made homeless by the blaze were Mr. and Mrs. Teague and their five children, Jeanie, June, Willard, Lynn and Robert, all between the ages of 7 and 21.

Three members of the family last night moved into the Merle Cramer home in Skellytown, while Mr. and Mrs. Teague spent the night in the home of Rev. and Mrs. Robin-Byars.

Mrs. Byars told the Daily News this morning that efforts are now underway to find a home for the Teague family.

It is presumed that flames broke out in the home's bathroom where a homemade hot water heater had been installed. No members of the Teague family were at home when flames broke out.

Five other fires in Pampa and the surrounding area did minor damages to property during the afternoon hours.

Fires were reported at 2:04 p.m. when a washer caught fire in a home at 1161 Neel Rd.; at 2:10 p.m. when flames broke out in a car of 308 Tignor; at 4:41 p.m. when about two acres of grass burned at Perry-Lefors airfield; and at 4:45 p.m. when a small building one-half mile south of Pampa burned down on the Haggard lease along the Amathillo highway.

## New Evidence Links Cancer With Smoking

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI)—A team of medical researchers reported today they have found new evidence linking cigarette smoking to the prevalence of lung cancer.

Cigarettes are not only a major cause of the cancer itself, but they lead to lung conditions which are favorable for the development of cancer, the report said.

The researchers, headed by Dr. Oscar Auerbach, chief of laboratory service at the Veterans Administration hospital in East Orange, N. J., and associate professor of pathology of the New York Medical College, based their report on tissue samples taken from 402 men who died at the VA hospital.

Of that number, 63 died of lung cancer and the remainder of other causes.

Auerbach's report was said to be the first medical evidence in which tissue samples were studied to show a link between lung cancer and cigarette smoking.

The report was delivered at today's session of the American Medical Assn.'s 13th annual clinical meeting.

A five-year study showed that the prevalence of lung cancer, (See CANCER, Page 2)

## Investigation Set In Dam Disaster

FREJUS, France (KPI)—Government investigators sought today to find out why "the world's thinnest dam" collapsed the first time it was filled to capacity and buried this Riviera town under a sea of water and mud.

Latest government figures set the toll of the Wednesday night disaster at 270 dead, 50 missing, and 70 injured. Many more victims were feared swallowed up in the oozing mud that choked the six-mile-long Regnan Valley. Many were swept out into the Mediterranean on a mountain of water.

Unconfirmed reports said 500 were killed.

A mass funeral planned for this afternoon could accommodate only 90 bodies, for the supply of coffins ran out.

A priest, his black robes plastered with thick red mud, blessed the dead in unpainted coffins.

"I helped piece the people in coffins, including many sweet children," he said. "While I was seeing it, I somehow didn't realize the horror of the whole thing. But when I stood back to pray with the families of the victims, I broke down and could not help cry."

All of France shared that priest's horror. President Charles de Gaulle called the Frejus disaster a "catastrophe" and ordered government experts to find out what caused the fall, thin Malpasat Dam to tumble and send 50 million tons of water on a rampage down the Cegnan Valley and over the town of Frejus.

Engineers slashed through the red mud to the collapsed dam to check its faulty foundations. Ironically, Malpasat, roughly translated, means "I went badly."

There were reports the dam completed in 1954, was so named because of a series of troubles that beset its construction.

## Rooney Doesn't Show For Show

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Jack Paar appeared on his nightly television show as usual Thursday night, but actor Micky Rooney wasn't around to trade barbs with him.

The two performers had planned a peace meeting before a nationwide audience on Paar's show to let everybody know there were no hurt feelings from their encounter Tuesday night.

But the pint-sized actor backed out late Thursday, declaring: "I am convinced nothing further could be gained by anyone were I to appear with Jack Paar. I told him personally that I was sorry for what had occurred Tuesday night. As far as I'm concerned the whole matter is forgotten."

## Brazil Revolt Appears Over

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI) — A "rebel army" of 28 officers held a tiny outpost in the jungles of central Brazil today, but their efforts to promote a general uprising appeared to have failed.

U.S.-made jet fighters of the government air force "buzzed" the reported rebel stronghold of Aragaras Thursday night in a warning gesture, apparently without opening fire. It was believed the government might drop paratroops on the town unless the rebels quickly surrendered.

The insurgent "air force"—five stolen planes, none of them known to be armed—was said to be parked off the turf runway of the airstrip in Aragaras, a mining town 700 miles northwest of Rio.

There were unconfirmed reports, however, that the rebels had abandoned Aragaras and fled 600-odd miles further to the northwest, into the Cachimbo Mountains of southern Pampa province.

## Benson To Have Surgery Today

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agriculture Secretary Ezra-Taft Benson undergoes surgery today at Walter Reed Army Medical Center for removal of his gall bladder.

The 60-year-old cabinet officer entered the hospital Tuesday night. A hospital spokesman said the operation was ordered because Benson has been suffering "intermittent acute attacks of gall bladder colic."

Daily medical bulletins will be issued while Benson is in the hospital. He is expected to remain there for 10 days to two weeks.

# President In Rome

## Urges Strike Peace In Absence

### Addresses Country On Departure

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower told the nation Thursday night that he was carrying America's message of "peace and friendship in freedom" on his mission to three continents.

The President spoke on all radio and television networks less than an hour before he took off on his 22,370-mile tour of 11 countries in Europe, Asia and Africa.

He coupled his foreign policy remarks with a strong appeal for steel management and union leaders to settle the steel dispute during his absence, warning that a resumption of the strike would hurt the free world's economy.

The Chief Executive said that he was embarking on the unprecedented mission of personal diplomacy "to convey to everyone our earnestness in striving to reduce the tensions dividing mankind."

Eisenhower delivered his parting word to the nation from his White House office. He said he hoped his mission would "make widely known America's deepest desire—a world in which all nations may prosper in freedom, justice and peace, unimpeded and unafraid."

He said America is "still on trial" before the world. He asked the American people to join him "in a renewed dedication to our moral and spiritual convictions, and in that light reexamine our (See DEPARTURE, Page 2)

## Delivers 'Peace' Message

ROME (UPI) — President Eisenhower arrived in Rome today in a driving rainstorm at the start of an 11 nation tour and said in earnest tones, "I bring a simple message from America... We want to live in peace."

Warm applause followed the President's remarks, made as he stood with bared head under the partial shelter of an airport balcony. His voice was firm as he said he hoped his peace message "will be heard in every country which I visit."

He had stood bareheaded earlier in a cold rainstorm while hands played the American and Italian anthems.

Eisenhower left Washington Thursday night on an unprecedented 19-day journey that will take him into three continents. Before he left he said he wanted to impress upon all nations his ideal of "peace and friendship in freedom."

Rain threw the carefully worked arrival ceremony out of gear and delayed for 16 minutes the landing of the plane which circled Ciampino Airport and the seven hills of Rome while the pilot studied the low visibility.

Eisenhower, wearing a dark overcoat and hat, stepped first out of the plane and was greeted by a fanfare of trumpets. The rain-making "sirocco" wind blowing from Africa was so strong the soaked red carpet had to be spiked to the tarmac.

Eisenhower bared his head when the anthems sounded and then his welcome covered him with an umbrella for the walk to the balcony where he delivered the first speech of a peace campaign that will take him halfway around the world.

## Monkey Rocketed Into Space Today

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A seven-pound monkey named Sam was rocketed into space from Wallops Island, Va. today to test satellite escape equipment which may save the lives of future human astronauts.

The launching was carried out at 11:15 a.m. at the Wallops Island station of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Space engineers reported to NASA headquarters here that "the launch looked good."

It will be some time, however, before it is known whether all aspects of the test were successful.

The shot was designed primarily to test the operation of the pilot escape system which will be used in the Mercury manned-satellite program.

Other purposes were to test the monkey's reactions to high accelerations and weightlessness in space.

The monkey was in a capsule similar to the one in which human astronauts will be put into orbit at the climax of the Mercury program a year or so hence.

The escape rocket is mounted on a 14-foot tower above the capsule. Its function is to pull the capsule away from the booster rocket if anything should go wrong before, during or immediately after launching.

## Men's Wear Shop Planned On Cuyler St.

Burger clothing Ollie Hare has purchased the former Ideal store building at the corner of N. Cuyler and Francis from the Lovett Estate and today announced plans to divide the structure into two retail shops. One will house a men's clothing store, owned by Hare, and the other will be rented.

Work began on remodeling yesterday.

Hare has been in the clothing business in Burger for almost 30 years and emphasized that the Cuyler St. store will be a "quality" shop with a full line of clothing, shoes and accessories.

A manager has been named for the shop, which will be ready for business the latter part of February. He is Pat Watson of Phoenix, Ariz. The store will employ about three persons.

The store fronts will be predominantly plate glass with light metal trim, according to the owner.

Hare said he expected to hire local salespeople and buy construction material in Pampa where surplus is available.

## Candy Barr To Prison

SAN ANTONIO (UPI)—Candy Barr, the buxom doll-faced stripper convicted of hiding marijuana in her brassiere, was taken to the women's prison at Huntsville today to begin a 15-year term.

Deddy Sheriff Allan Sweett and his wife escorted her. They left San Antonio about 1 a.m.

Candy carried a Bible, and little else.

She flew to San Antonio from Los Angeles Thursday, spent several hours talking to Fred Semann, her attorney, and then surrendered to Sheriff Owen Kihlstrom.

## Cashier At Bank Steals \$340,000

TENAHA, Tex. (UPI) — "I was hoping for a miracle. Now I'm glad it's in the open."

With these words Clifford Gary, 34, explained why the First State Bank of Tenaha closed its doors and posted a notice that it is insolvent.

Until Thursday, Gary was assistant cashier at the bank. Friends looked on him as one of the most upstanding citizens of this small town of 1,150 persons. He was enterprising, trying to get ahead.

Although he worked full-time at the bank, he formed the Gary Construction Co., went into the game-bird business and even worked part time at farming.

What the town didn't know was that Gary financed his extra curricular operations with nearly one-third of the deposits at the bank. He admitted embezzling an estimated \$340,000.

"This is a tragic thing for our community," Jack Motley, bank president, said. "He had worked for me for 10 years and as far as I knew he was a trusted and loyal employee."

### 49 Building Permits Issued During November

Examination of records at the city engineer's office discloses that Pampa is growing steadily.

Forty-nine building permits were issued during November: 24 for new residences and 5 for new businesses. The remainder of the permits were issued for residential and business remodeling and miscellaneous small jobs.

For the same period last year, 32 permits were issued, with 23 for new residences and no new businesses.

A total of 633 permits has been issued this year, against 583 for the same period of 1958, with more than \$6 million spent for construction. That figure is \$1 million above last year's total through November.

### Accident Total Here Higher Than In 1958

Forty-two accidents on city streets during November raised Pampa's accident total to 503 this year, Police Chief Jim Conner reported.

The total through Thursday was 17 higher than at the same time a year ago, but Conner believes this year's record will probably be better than a year ago. Last year's total was boosted to 550 when 30 accidents occurred on city streets last December.

Property damages in November accidents totaled \$11,053, Conner said, and their were five injuries. Pampa is now in its 44th consecutive day without a fatal accident. Conner said he is optimistic that the city will pass through

of the conditions favorable for its development, were linked "almost completely" to the number of cigarettes smoked by the victims, according to the report.

Kinds and quantities of damage to the tissues lining the bronchi — tree-like tubes in which lung cancers grow — are in mathematical proportion to the number of cigarettes smoked, Auerbach said.

"These anatomical observations seem to us to indicate that cigarette smoking is today a major factor in the causation of lung cancer in men," he said. "This is in complete agreement with evidence previously obtained from extensive epidemiological studies. Epidemiology is the study of epidemic diseases."

How much longer can NATO be held together?

It's a real question, and one that President Eisenhower must ponder in the coming days as he moves along the route of his 11-nation good will tour toward a Western summit meeting in Paris on Dec. 19.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organization, put together in the Spring of 1949 as the backbone of Western defenses against Communist expansion, is getting tattered.

Last week, a powerful newspaper voice in Britain, Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express, said editorially "Britain would be well advised to move out of NATO altogether."

On a different note, but pointing up current NATO difficulties in fulfilling its assigned task, was a statement by French Air Force Gen. Jean Valluy, NATO commander in central Europe.

In event of Soviet attack, he said, NATO would find its Belgian and Dutch troops "unusable" and its French forces all in Algeria.

He said NATO's first line of defense is manned entirely by the Germans and there "would have to be some delay before the arrival of British and American troop reinforcements."

Valluy went on to condemn "the moral disengagement" of certain NATO nations "apart, perhaps from the United States and Canada."

NATO's founding cornerstone was fear of Communist aggression. And the unity of NATO members has ebbed and flowed with the ebb and flow of the cold war. Now that fear once more has receded, NATO's weaknesses become the more apparent.

The London Daily Express was expressing common British resentment at "all the blocking tactics of diplomacy" used by France and West Germany to delay a summit meeting with Russia.

Valluy condemned the practices which have forced a steady retreat from the 50-division goal first set up for NATO, the skeletonizing of divisions which are left and the internal quibbling whereby nations refuse to contribute either the money or manpower which NATO commanders believe are a minimum for European defense.

West Germany will fall 150,000 men short of original target figures.

French President Charles de Gaulle has served notice that his land, sea and air forces are not answerable to NATO in case of emergency.

Coupled with the "moral disengagement" of NATO nations has been mounting disagreement in warfare, and the rising hope that in any such war it would be the United States and Russia, blasting away at each other with others escaping if they are cautious and lucky.

NATO commanders say it won't be that way.

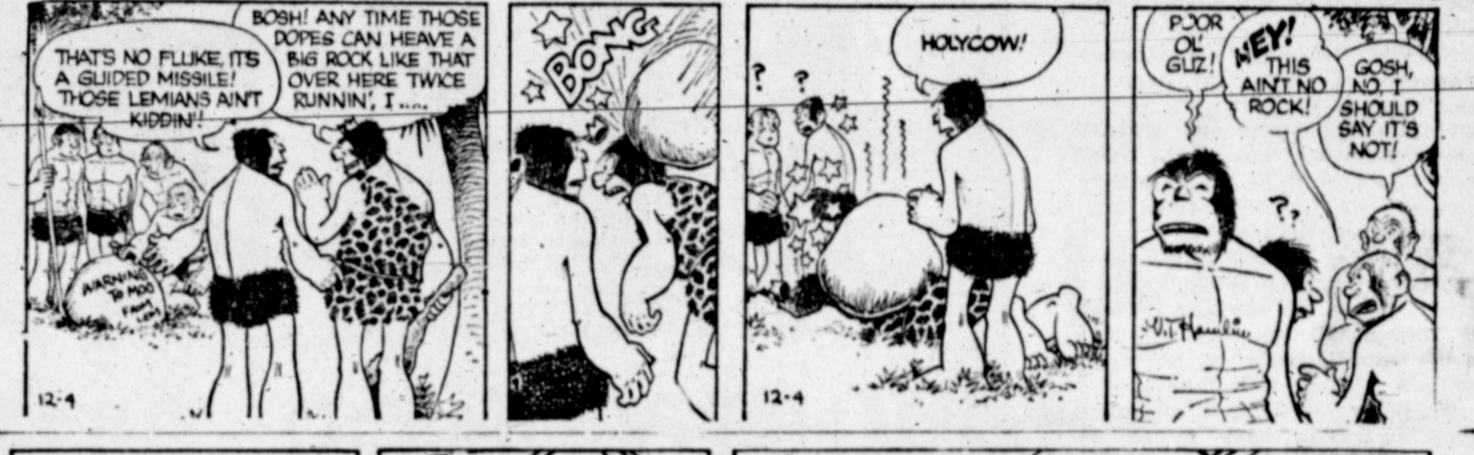

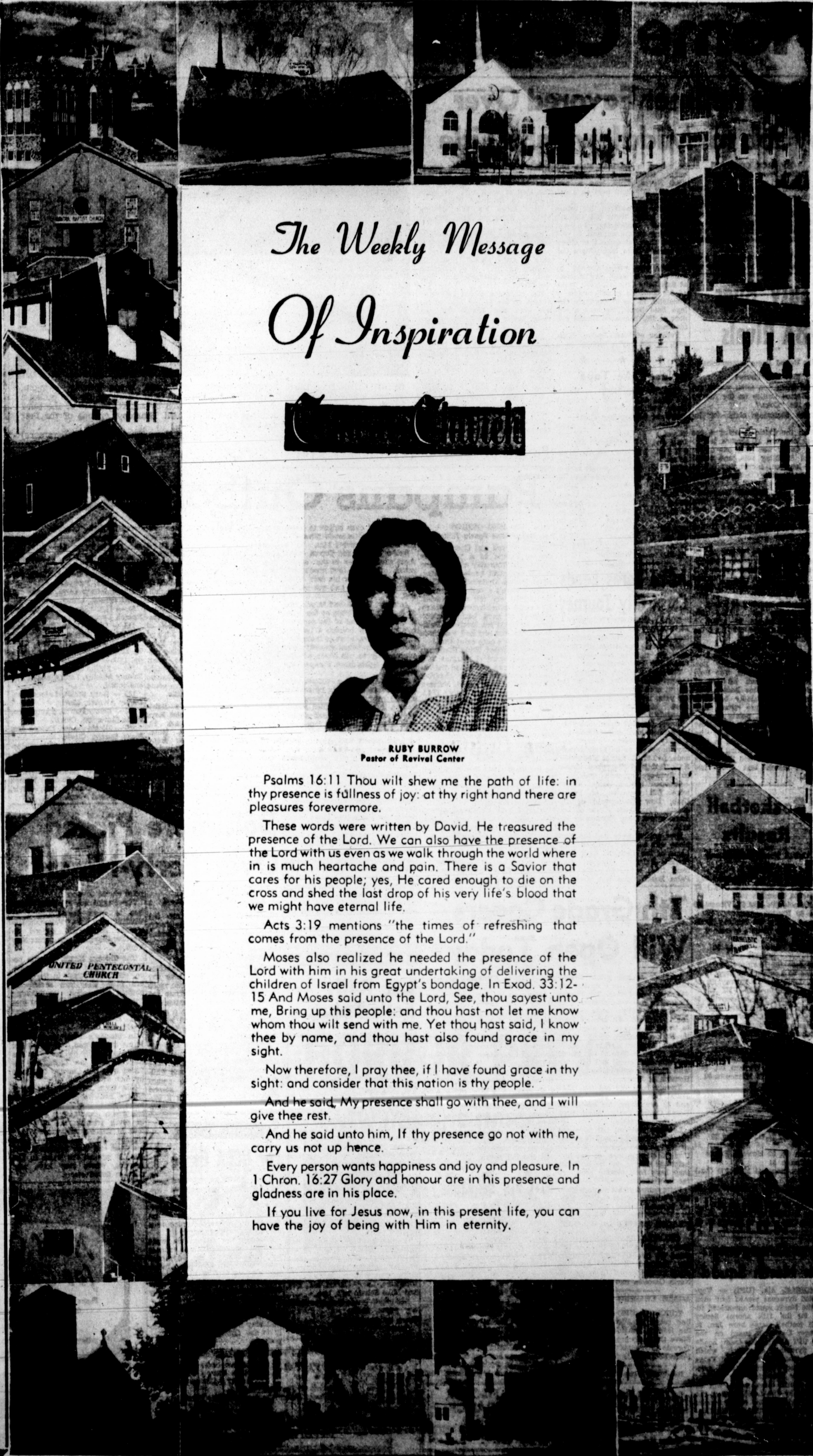
Now therefore, I pray thee, if I have found grace in thy sight: and consider that this nation is thy people.

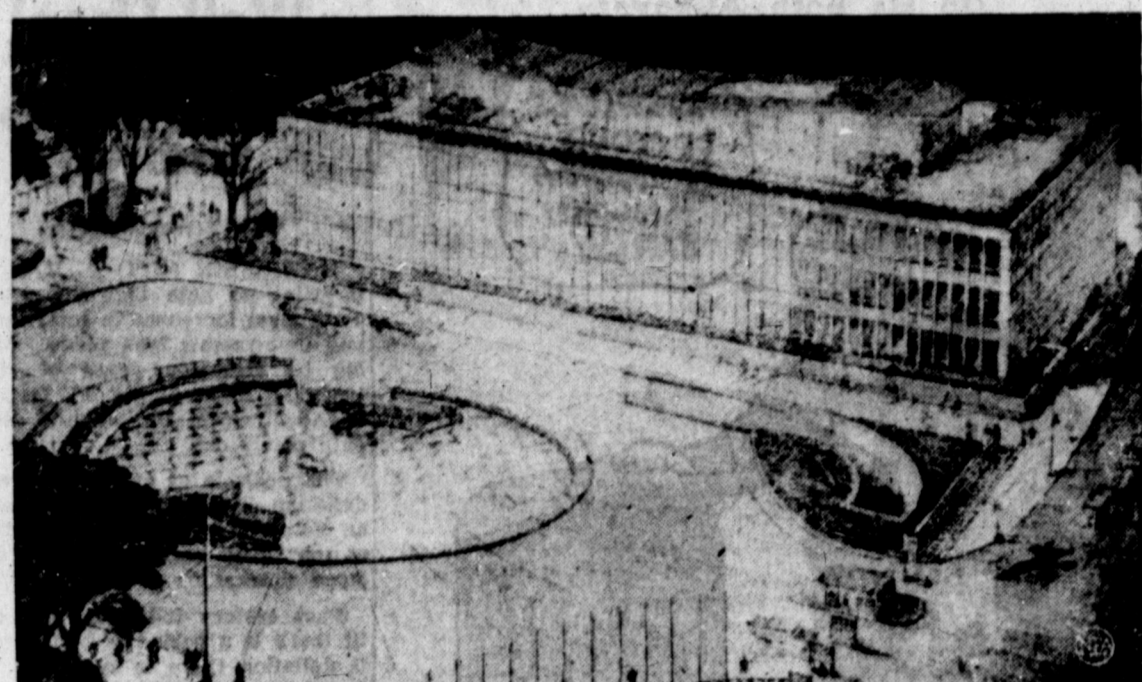

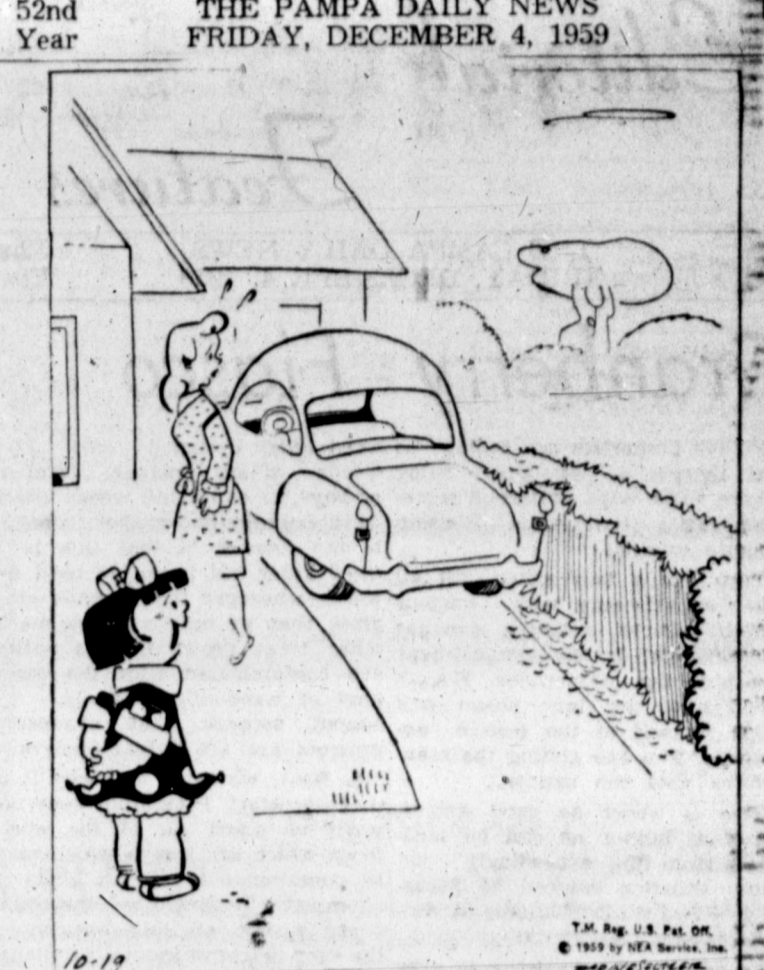

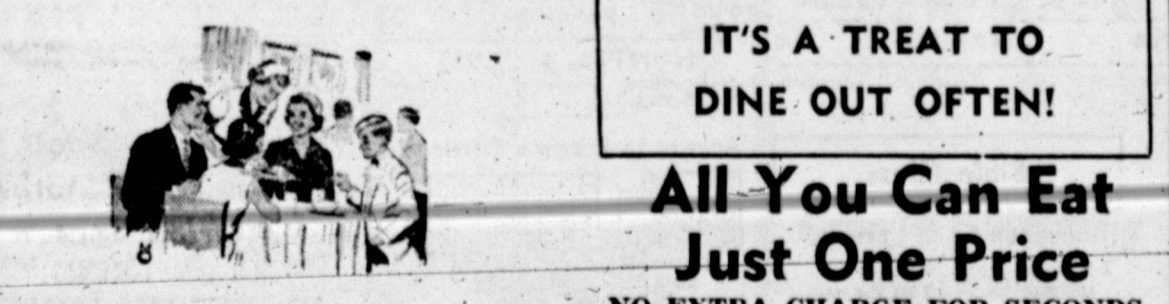

While South has a 15 point minimum, any lead but a spade will make three no-trump and with the actual spade opening he does so by holding up twice.

He has to win the third spade lead but the double hold up has eliminated all danger as long as East does not have the long spades. South takes the diamond finesse. It loses but East hasn't a spade left and South winds up with nine tricks and his contract.

## Medicine Jug Radioactive Since 1912

MIAMI (UPI)—A highly radioactive jug which apparently had been used to dispense quack medicine was found here Wednesday, still "hot" after nearly 50 years.

It was so radioactive, police said, that a Geiger counter had to be reset in big ranges to measure the degree of radiation.

On the jug was a label explaining that "six cups of water a day" from it would restore vigor and health.

Doctors said anyone who drank out of it regularly probably would get cancer of the intestine.

The jug was found in a boat-house on the Miami River by Tom Sykes, a drug firm executive. Sykes said he once saw a display of pseudo-medical quack items and "it came to me that the thing might be hot — radioactive."

## Wilson Laments Errant Juveniles

AUSTIN (UPI)—Atty. Gen. Will Wilson spoke at dedication ceremonies for the new Court of Criminal Appeals chamber in the State Courts Building Wednesday and called crime and juvenile delinquency "one of the top and overriding problems" facing all branches of state government.

"I would like to call your attention to the fact that in the state of Texas... the major crime rate is outstripping the population increase," Wilson said.

"The Texas major crime rate for the first six months of this year was up 6.2 per cent. In our state, the most heinous crimes, murder and rape, were up more than 10 per cent.

"The most heart-rending aspect of this is that the children of our state and nation are increasingly becoming involved in major crimes," he said.

# President's 'Peace Crusade' To Correct Image Of U.S.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower has set himself a two fold task during his "peace crusade" to Asia, Africa and Europe.

Officials said today that the President will try to:

—Convince neutralists and Allies alike that the United States is sincerely searching for a world peace formula and has no ulterior motives or aggressive designs.

—Reassure staunch anti-Communist friends such as Turkey that the United States will not lower its guard during negotiations with Russia on disarmament and other critical issues.

The President spelled out his hopes for improving America's "image" abroad at his news conference Wednesday, on the eve of his departure on the unprecedented 22,370-mile visit to 11 nations.

He said he felt a "compulsion" during the "relatively few months left" to him in office to try to make them see that "our basic aspiration is to search out methods by which peace in the world can be assured with justice for everybody."

But he also feels, according to top aides, that an equally important part of his "mission" is to make it clear to those who have stood firm in the anti-Communist fight that the United States is not going to compromise any basic principles just to get agreement with the Russians.

The President realizes, these sources said, that some Allies in the area he is visiting fear the Western powers may make unwelcome concessions to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev in their eagerness to reach a tension-lowering agreement.

Such fears have been voiced by officials in Turkey, Pakistan and Iran — three stops in Eisenhower's swing along the southern Russian front. All three belong to anti-Communist pacts.

Eisenhower is prepared to tell these friends that their fears are groundless so far as the United States is concerned.

The President and Secretary of State Christian A. Herter both feel there is a danger that some countries, particularly neutrals, might fall for the Soviet line that the Eisenhower-Khrushchev meeting produced some sort of magic "spirit of Camp David" which is going to settle the world's problems.
