Delivers 'Peace' Message

ROME (UPI) - President isenhower arrived in Rome today in a driving rainstorm at the start of an 11 nation tour and said in earnest tones, "I bring a simple message from America . . . We want to live in peace.'

Warm applause followed the President's remarks, made as he stood with bared head under the partial shelter of an airport balcony. His voice was firm as he said he hoped his peace message "will be heard in every country which I visit."

He had stood bareheaded earlier in a cold rainstorm while bands played the American and Italian anthems.

Eisenhower left Washington Thursday night on an unprecedented 19-day journey that will take him into three continents. Before he left he said he wanted o impress upon all nations his ideal of "peace and friendship, in







Ayn Rand was born in Russia, and she understands clearly the results of government interference with competition in serving. I have read her books "The Fountainhead" and "Atlas Shrugged", which are novels explaining the benefits that come from the capitalistic system.

I am also especially interested because we have had Ayn Rand in our home and I have attended a luncheon given for her in Los Angeles. There were about 20 people there, including businessmen, lawyers and professors, and it seemed to me she was defending the free enterprise system

better than the rest of them. The article is part of a lecture in a series on the philosophy of Ayn Rand written by Barbara Branden, who is an Associate Lecturer.

This is the way "The Freeman" magazine summarizes this lec-

"Capitalism and socialism have, traditionally, been considered exclusively as opposing economicpolitical systems. It is therefore in terms of economic and political tenets that the battle between them has been fought. Certainly each system does embody a mutually exclusive theory of the proper function of government and the legitimate operation of an economy - but if one examines. their tenets, one will discover at the root of their specific and practical doctrines, a more basic and divisive clash between them.

"It is in their opposing concepts of the nature of man and of his proper relationship to other men - in that which each side holds to be the good, the right, the moral — that the heart of the conflict between capitalism and socialism exists.

What is capitalism? Economically, it is a system in which the instruments of production are owned by private individuals who operate them for their personal profit. Goods and services are exchanged by free trade on a free market, a market which is regulated, not by bureaucratic edict. not by what those who claim to represent the majority decide is good for the people, but by the law of supply and demand-which means: by each man's voluntary decision as to what products he is willing to produce, to buy, and to sell, and at what price, within the context of the market with

which he deals. "The motive power of capitalism, the propelling force which makes it work, is men's desire. and effort to use their productive capacity for the purpose of creating wealth. The end which capitalism serves is the achievement. of profit - a private, personal, selfish profit - by every man from a captain of industry to a shopkeeper to a coalminer, each to the limit of his ability, his effort, his attainment. Capitalism is not aimed at what its opponents call 'the service of the public good.' It is concerned exclusively with the private good of individual citizens, and holds that the good is to be achieved by those citizens as individuals. It expects each




