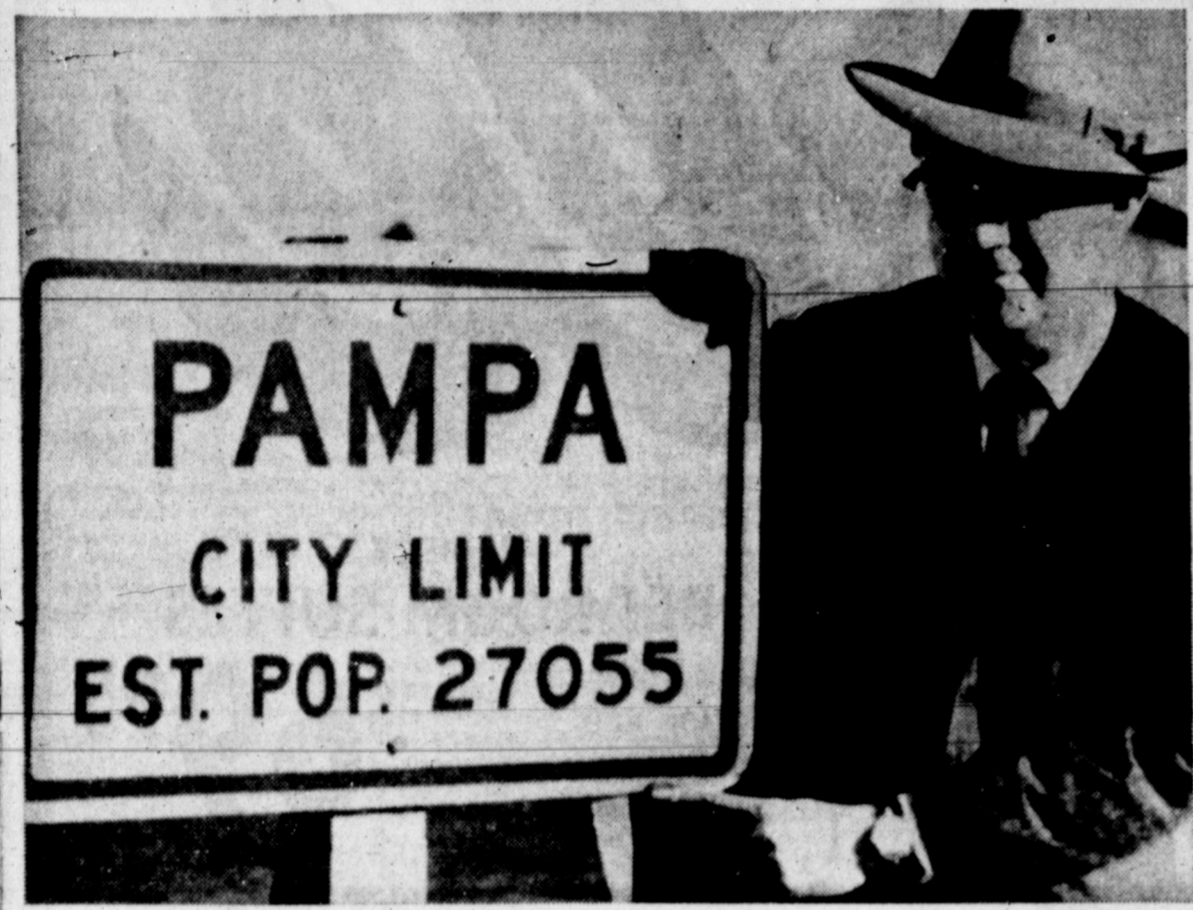

Eyes On McDonald For Steel Bargaining Clues

CHICAGO (UPI) — United Steelworkers President David J. McDonald was expected to indicate today the strategy his union will employ when negotiations to end the steel strike resume next week.

McDonald also was expected to comment at a news conference on his week-long talks with executives of major aluminum firms and possibly to announce an industry-wide agreement on new contract terms.

Federal Mediation Chief Joseph F. Finnegan announced in Washington Thursday he would call union and steel management negotiators back to the bargaining table next week, possibly Monday.

Talks to end the nation's longest steel strike were suspended last Thursday because of lack of progress.

McDonald met Thursday with Midwest union officers in Chicago in sessions reportedly devoted to mapping new plans for settling the strike.

Speaking before more than 5,000 cheering steelworkers at Gary, Ind., Thursday night, McDonald said the union will "overwhelmingly reject" the steel industry's latest offer, but hinted at chances of reaching agreement along another line.

He promised rank-and-file USW members they had seen the last of the steel strikes if industry would accept a tri-partite agreement such as that worked out with Kaiser steel.

Mastermind Of Poisoning Try Named

MUNICH, Germany (UPI) — A Red Czech vice-consul stationed in nearby Austria masterminded last month's unsuccessful attempt to poison employes of Radio Free Europe, the U.S. Army announced today.

"The counter intelligence corps investigation shows that Jaroslav Nemecek, a vice-consul of the Czech Consulate in Salzburg, Austria, on Nov. 16 gave a Communist agent salt shakers containing atropine for placement in the RFE canteen in Munich," the Army announcement said.

A spokesman for the radio station, which broadcasts to Czechoslovakia and other satellite nations, had reported earlier that the poison-laden salt shakers were discovered just in time.

Danger Of Flooding On 3 Rivers Siege Of Winter Rain Over

For the first time in nearly a week, the Weather Bureau reported "no precipitation of consequence" in the state today.

A siege of unusual winter rains had all but stopped.

But at least three rivers—the Sabine, Sulphur and Trinity—reached flood stage Thursday from almost constant rains and there was still danger today from flooding.

In the Panhandle, normal December rainfall averages about 67 inch. But in the four days Monday through Thursday most of the Panhandle got 3-5 inches of moisture, some of it in the form of snow that blew in Monday from New Mexico.

Soaking rains caved in a Fort Worth and Denver Railroad tunnel Thursday near Quitaque, between Childress and Lubbock and blocked the tracks. Trains were rerouted through Amarillo while the tracks were cleared.

Dallas' rainfall for the year has already gone nearly 3 inches over normal. The yearly average is 34.42 inches and so far this year the city has had 37.08 inches, with 4.15 inches of that falling in December. Other cities had similar above-average totals.

Cleveland, in South Texas near Houston, got 5.91 inches of rain in a 24-hour period Tuesday and Wednesday. It was the heaviest single amount recorded in the state this week.

The Weather Bureau predicted a flood crest of 29-30 feet on the Trinity River at Trinidad Saturday, but the Trinity was falling upstream from there. Flood stage at Trinidad is 28 feet.

Flooding is expected in the Sulphur and Sabine watersheds early next week.

Cloudy skies held sway from the upper Pecos Valley eastward over the Edwards Plateau and in North Central and Northeast Texas today, but elsewhere skies were clear.

Occasional light drizzle fell in Central Texas.

The Weather Bureau said cloudiness would decrease late today as a high pressure system moves into the state, bringing slight temperature drops with it. Clear weather was in the forecast for tonight and Saturday.

Rainfall amounts in the 24 hours ended at 8 a. m. included:

Abiene 25, Dallas 22, Brownwood 21, Waco 17, Fort Worth 16 and Texarkana 13.

Low temperature reports this morning ranged from 26 at Dalhart to 84 at Corpus Christi, with most readings in the 40s.

Other overnight lows were Amarillo 29, Lubbock 32, El Paso 34, Abilene and Wichita Falls 40, Midland 41, Freddick and Brownwood 43, Houston and San Angelo 45, Fort Worth, Waco, Victoria and San Antonio 46, Dallas and Laredo 47, Austin, Galveston, Beaumont and Port Arthur 48 and Brownsville 49.

Sold On NATO, Like Tells French

Allies Said Stronger Than Ever

TOULON, France (UPI)—President Eisenhower declared on arrival in France today that the Allies are stronger than ever before and prepared to negotiate peace "from a position of strength."

Eisenhower landed at France's main naval base on the Mediterranean and left by train for the Western summit conference in Paris. Without mentioning current strained French-American relations, he said in an arrival address that "the underlying respect of the two nations for each other has never lessened, and because of that we are stronger today."

"This nation, under the leadership of General De Gaulle — and our nation — are stronger for the pursuit of peace than was possible ever in our history," he said.

"We are part of a great coalition, determined, from a position of strength, to pursue peace with every bit of our strength, every bit of our wisdom and with all the motion we can."

"In our opinion, if all of us can struggle together in the same way the United States and France have for many decades, we shall one day win through to success."

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Summit Delegates Arriving

PARIS (UPI) — Leaders of the United States, Britain and West Germany converged today on Paris for a summit conference with France that was already in trouble because of a Franco-American dispute over NATO and Algeria.

The belief in the Allied camp was that only a face-to-face meeting Saturday between President Eisenhower and President Charles de Gaulle could blunt the sharp differences and permit the Western Big Four to try to chart a dynamic approach to the end of the cold war.

Eisenhower was arriving at Paris' Gare de Lyon tonight from Toulon and de Gaulle was formally greeting him. British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan was flying in from London and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer from Bonn.

The Western Big Four planned at their three-day meeting starting Saturday to place the problem of ending the nuclear arms race at the top of the list in preparing for their meeting next spring with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev. (See SUMMIT, Page 3)

Cuba Will Try American Reporter For 'Complicity'

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro announced early today that Miami Herald reporter James Buchanan will be tried by a "revolutionary tribunal" which could sentence him to death.

In a four-hour television speech, Castro rejected appeals from the Inter-American Press Association for the release of Buchanan, who was arrested in the hotel room of prison fugitive Austin Young.

Authorities in Pinar del Rio province had asked the Supreme Court to decide whether Buchanan should be tried by a court martial or a civil court which could not impose the death sentence.

Castro said Buchanan will be tried on charges of complicity in Young's escape from Pinar del Rio prison a week ago Tuesday night, 36 hours before he was recaptured in the hotel room where Buchanan was arrested about two hours later.

The premier rejected an appeal from William Cowley, editor of the Spokane Spokesman — Review and president of the IAPA, who had argued that Buchanan should be freed because he had committed no crime.

Mafia Suspected In Touhy Killing

CHICAGO (UPI) — The execution of Prohibition era beer baron Roger Touhy focused attention today on unsolved gangland slayings, many believed the work of the Mafia.

The year 1959 saw the total of gang killings in the Chicago area alone rise to more than 900 since the days of the late Al Capone. Only 7 of these murders resulted in convictions.

In recent years several top echelon members of the Black Hand (Mafia) organization were believed rubbed out by gangsters seeking advancement in the racket.

There was Albert Anastasia who was shot to death while sitting in a hotel barber shop in New York. Anastasia at one time was reported to be the lord high executioner of Murder, Inc., an organization that specialized in gangland killings.

Another was Anthony (Little Augie) Pisano who was shot to death on a city street in New York while riding in his limousine. Killed with him was Janice Drake, wife of comedian Alan Drake.

The slayings are believed by New York police to be the work of the Mafia. None has been solved.

Both men had long police records. (See MAFIA, Page 3)

In-Air Crash Survivors Are Rescued

TRENTON, Ont. (UPI) — Two survivors of an aerial collision between two U. S. Air Force jet planes in northern Ontario were rescued today. There was hope other survivors might be located.

A Royal Canadian Air Force and a U. S. Air Force helicopter each rescued one U. S. airman from the scene, 32 miles northeast of a radar station at Pagna, Ont. Their condition was reported good.

An RCAF copter picked up 1st Lt. Theodore C. Adams, 24, of Greenville, S. C. and flew him to Pagna for medical treatment. The USAF helicopter, based at Kincheloe, Mich., rescued Capt. Roy N. Minor, 34, of Manchester, Tenn.

Adams told officials he heard three shots during the night. Minor said he fired only two. Based on these reports, other survivors were believed in the area. Two planes and two helicopters continued an intensive search.

The in-flight collision occurred Thursday between a U.S. B47 Stratojet bomber and an F102 fighter. Wreckage of the two planes was located four miles apart. Minor piloted the bomber and Adams was his co-pilot.

Still missing were the pilot of the F102, Lt. Gaylord B. Ryan, 27, Garner, Iowa; and 1st Lt. Lloyd A. Horn, 27, Boise, Idaho, and 1st Lt. Calton W. Hunt, 26, Oklahoma City, Okla.

Tax Law Relief Possibility Quashed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman Wilbur D. Mills of the House Ways & Means Committee today ruled out the possibility of a major overhaul of tax laws next year.

The Arkansas Democrat commented as his committee wound up five weeks of hearings during which it heard tax reform proposals from 175 tax experts, economists and others.

He said it would take "at least until 1961" before the staffs could lay a tax revision plan before his committee, which originates all tax legislation in Congress.

Rodeo Board Elects 2 Directors

Ted Eads, John Spearman and Buddy Cokrell were elected to the board of directors of the Top of Texas Rodeo Association at a meeting of that group last night in the chamber of commerce offices.

Eads was elected to a two-year term, while Spearman and Cokrell were elected to one-year terms.

The election was necessary because of resignations.

In other action, the group passed two new amendments to the by-laws of the organization and discussed plans for the 1960 show.

The new amendments provide that each retiring president of the association will remain on the executive board for one year after retirement, and any director who has served as many as two consecutive terms on the board will be made an honorary member with the right to attend board meetings, but without the right to vote. The second amendment was made retroactive to the beginning of the association in 1945.

LONDON (UPI)—Chinese Communist Premier Chou En-lai said today he is prepared to agree to an Indian proposal to withdraw all armed forces from disputed areas as a "partial solution" to the border crisis between the two countries.

He offered to meet Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru in China or Rangoon, Burma, on Dec. 26 to discuss the dispute.

Chou's offer was made in a note to Nehru, broadcast by Peiping and monitored here.

Nehru had rejected an earlier Chou proposal for talks because he said he would not negotiate while Chinese troops remained on Indian soil.

Chou today renewed China's claim to several areas of the disputed frontier territory. But he offered to pull back Chinese troops from Longju if India did the same, and to extend the pullback to other areas.

The Miami reporter came to Havana the day after Young escaped to check a telephoned tip on his whereabouts. He interviewed Young in the hotel room, and filed the story before he was arrested.

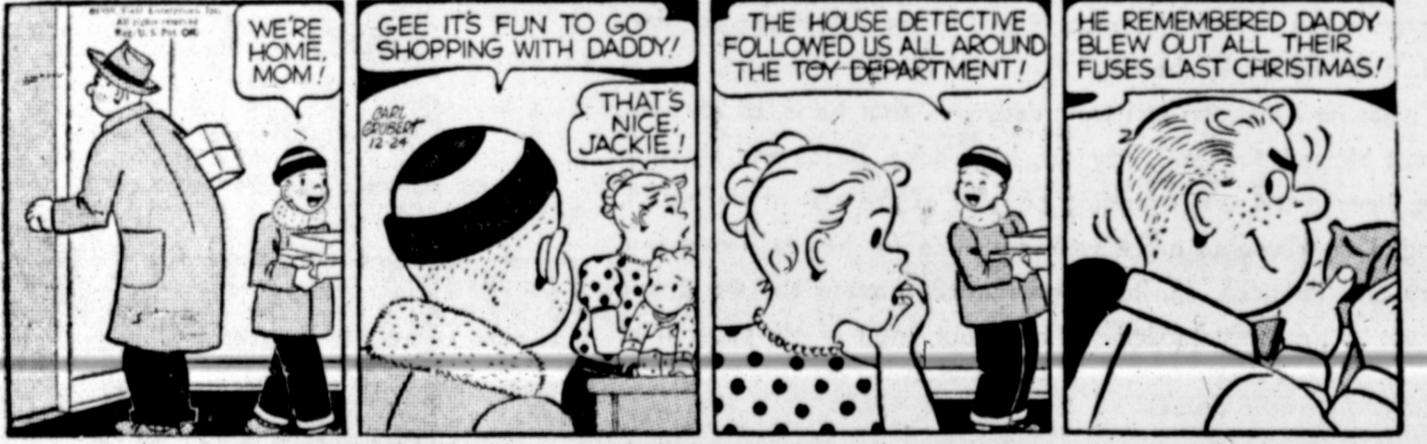

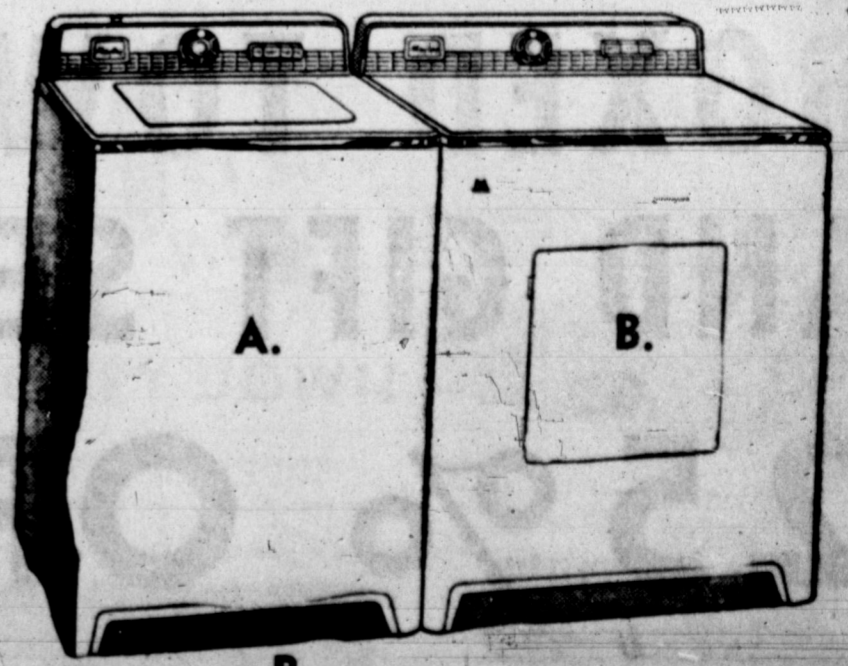

Johnson Hits Space Delays

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson has served notice that Congress must inject "get up and go" into the nation's space program if President Eisenhower won't.

"It is not our technology that has failed. Our leadership has failed," the Texas told the Aero Club Thursday night. "We cannot concede outer space to the Russians and hold leadership on earth."

"In short, we must get up and go," Johnson said. "We can no longer afford procrastination and endless delay. We cannot indulge in the luxury of budget clerks gambling with our destiny."

Johnson, a possibility for the Democratic presidential nomination, mostly criticized the "executive department" rather than mentioning Eisenhower by name.

But he left little doubt of his target when he said "the highest national level" must decide that the United States is going to compete with the Russians and win.

Johnson, chairman of the Senate space committee, suggested strongly that the U.S. space lag would be a 1960 election issue.

"The whole field of space needs one head—one man to be accountable, one man with the powers to accomplish," he said. "We thought we had done this in the space act when we put the President in charge of it."

"If the executive department cannot or will not meet this responsibility, then Congress must act. America cannot sit out 1960 and wait to star up again, somewhere down the road."

Johnson said the space program must have all necessary funds and priorities and must not be hampered by "arbitrary fund limitations" or restrictions on overtime work.

This should be reinforced, he said, by "truly effective coordination of the military and civilian elements of the space program."

Santa Didn't Look Quite Right

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Santa Claus will no longer travel through the District of Columbia flat on his back.

Officials today ordered changes in a float that showed Santa stretched out cold beneath a sign reading "drinking is a grave offense, drive safely."

The float, sponsored by the District Traffic Safety Committee, drew protests from youngsters and parents who saw the float in the downtown and outlying shopping areas of Washington.

City officials decided to silence the jingling phones by ordering Santa to ride upright.

Before a Hickman anti-drunk move, this city treated arrested drunks to delicious sandwiches while they were in the local lockup.

"Silly," reasoned Hickman. "And costly, too." For the first two weeks of November the city spent \$157.50 feeding 20 drunks.

The drunks still got their three squares. But it was bread and water.

Meals like that apparently weren't worth the effort of getting drunk.

For the first two weeks of December, the city spent \$4.50 to feed six drunks.

Thompson To Seek Board Reelection

AUSTIN (UPI) — Ernest O. Thompson has announced he will be a candidate for reelection to the post of chairman of the State Railroad Commission in 1960.

Thompson, a veteran on the commission since he was appointed to fill the expired term of Pat Neff in 1932, said he would seek the post again because "I enjoy the work and feel that I understand the duties of that office."

Commissioners are elected every two years for six-year terms.

Thompson, Lieutenant General of the Texas National Guard from 1948 until he retired at the age of 65 in 1957, is from Amarillo and was educated at Virginia Military Institute and the University of Texas Law School.

Social Security Paid To 1,600 In Gray County

There are more than 1,600 persons in Gray County receiving monthly social security benefits amounting to approximately \$1,000,000 a year, according to Hal Geldon, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

Geldon noted that while the benefits are intended for the beneficiary's economic security, the payments help business in the area. Most of the money is spent immediately on food, clothing, and other necessities.

Payments in the Panhandle are going to more than 16,000 persons at the rate of approximately \$10,500,000 a year, Geldon said. This represents an increase of about 20 per cent over last year.

There are several reasons for the increase. The long term growth of the aged population and the proportion of the aged population eligible for benefits are important factors. Also, the 1958 Amendments to the Social Security Act made it possible for more persons to receive payments.

Actor, Wife Still At Odds Over Custody

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Sterling Hayden's former wife accused the sea-faring actor Thursday of planning to take their four children to live in northern California. She asked the court to halt such a trip.

In a strongly worded petition filed in Superior Court by the attorney for Mrs. Betty De Noon Hayden, 36, the 41-year-old actor was called a "fat head."

"Every chance to have the Hayden children start to live normal lives, as the children of divorced parents, is to be blocked on the altar of hate," said the document filed by Attorney Chester L. Smith.

"For trying to stop this 'fat head,' Betty Hayden ends up cut to shreds on all sides," continued the document. "She is declared until I think Hayden belongs in the 10-year-old class in juvenile hall, certainly his writing does."

Hayden wrote a series of newspaper articles following his return last month from a court-defying 10-month voyage in his schooner with the couple's children, Christian, 11, Thor, 10, Gretchen, 9, and Matthew, 7.

He faces a contempt hearing Jan. 5 for defying the court order and later in January must appear in court to answer Mrs. Hayden's latest attempt to regain custody of the children.

Beauty Damaged By Sketchy Meals

Sketchy eating is a major fault of many Americans. Both housewives and career girls are among those who eat in a hit-or-miss fashion.

It goes something like this: nothing for breakfast (or coffee and orange juice). A sandwich for lunch. A TV dinner at night.

This is not only hasty eating, it's lazy eating and definitely injurious to the health. There's nothing wrong with coffee, orange juice, sandwiches or frozen foods when they are used with other foods, as they should be.

This day should line up like this: orange juice, an egg, toast and coffee. A sandwich plus a green salad and some fruit. A frozen turkey pie, if you like, plus two vegetables, fresh fruit or cheese and crackers.

This second way of going at the day's meals involved very little more effort than the first. It isn't really cooking but it is far more nutritious, far more healthy and much more of an aid to beauty.

Nervous mannerisms detract from any woman's beauty. The woman who fusses with her hair, grimaces, gestures constantly, moves about restlessly or clutches other people in order to gain attention as she talks is always a minor and sometimes a major irritant.

The sad part of it is that she seldom is aware that she has a nervous mannerism. It's so much part of her that she would be shocked if someone pointed it out to her. And, with rare exception, no one will. People will avoid her, of course, but they won't say anything.

So, the only way each one of us can be sure that we haven't let a nervous mannerism get the best of us is to check up. Watch yourself in a full-length mirror. Be conscious of the gestures you make. And stop when you find yourself twisting a lock of hair, waving your hands or distorting your face as you talk.

To prevent lipstick from caking during the cold winter months, apply a pomade base before you put on the lipstick. (There are many lip pomades on the market. Most come in the shape of a lipstick. Some are rosy pink and some are colorless.)

Smooth the pomade with a cleansing tissue and then apply lipstick. Let it set for twenty minutes and then blot away everything but the color with a cleansing tissue.

Using this method, your lipstick will stay smooth for four hours or more.

Insurance Fraud Ring Uncovered

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI) — Police here smashed an insurance fraud ring that collected on phony automobile accidents set up in at least five western states.

Charles F. Holmans, special agent in charge of the Dallas field office of the Association of Casualty & Surety Companies, said Wednesday nine men have been arrested in Texas, Arizona, and New Mexico, and more may be arrested.

Donald Lee Garrett, 27, indicted in Houston, is described as the ring-leader. Holmans said he admitted his part in the series of fake accidents, but refused to implicate others.

The operation, which collected at least \$25,000, was at times brazen. One of the phony accidents was staged in front of the Wichita Falls, Tex., police station.

Other fake accidents were set up at San Bernardino, Calif., Fort Worth, Tex., Facoima, Calif., Albuquerque, N. M., Lubbock, Tex., Chandler, Ariz., Houston, and Denver, Colo.

Holmans said the gang would set up an accident by paying a truck driver \$200 to smash into the rear of a car. Police would be called, and the trucker would admit he was following too closely.

The "accident victims" would then file claims for car damages and bodily injury. In the Wichita Falls accident, five alleged members of the ring were hospitalized for two days and collected \$6,900 in claims.

Strip Stops In Miami

MIAMI (UPI) — City Hall lowered the shades on Miami strip-teasers and police began work today on a way to keep them covered.

The City Commission decided by unanimous vote to ban strip-tease dancing in this South Florida playground.

A new ordinance would make it illegal for any male or female in a public place to disrobe or expose the body in a lewd or lascivious manner. Offenders would be subject to a maximum penalty of 60 days in jail and \$500 fine.

The law does not affect the plush niteries of Miami Beach, which has a separate government.

The new law was to take effect immediately, but police probably won't be able to enforce it until a method for making it stick can be worked out.

Attorneys for several Miami nightspots featuring strippers charged the new law was un-

derstandable as the result of a legitimate rear-end collision he was in and collected \$2,300.

Holmans said police, hospital attendants and claim adjusters were fooled until a Houston adjuster checked on Garrett in Dallas and found he had been involved in at least nine similar accidents in the past two years.

Children Would Trade Santa Visit For That Of Lost Daddy

EAST BRUNSWICK, N.J. (UPI) — Kenneth Brown left the house or work Dec. 4 with a kiss for his wife and a wave to the youngest of his five children. It was like many other such partings.

His 28-year-old wife, Dorothy, went about her Friday chores and tended the children. She waited for her husband's return from his 30,000-a-year foreman job on the night shift. The waiting turned to anxiety, then to fear.

Brown failed to show up for work at the Chicopee Manufacturing Co. in Milltown. Neither friends nor family has seen or heard from him since.

Mrs. Brown, left without any income, turned to his and her parents for help. She kept his disappearance quiet, hoping he would return.

"I don't understand. If I could only understand," she said. "He was a very, very good husband and a wonderful father."

The children missed him, too.

She said if he had gone any place she thought he would go to Florida. He liked Daytona Beach and Miami. Her main concern was the children.

"I can't get them to see Santa Claus. They just want to see their daddy," she said.

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"Susan is so thin and pale and she just breaks up at the sound of his name and the word 'daddy,'" Mrs. Brown said.

She decided she could keep his disappearance quiet no longer. She told her story to newsmen. "I hope he'll read something and just call us and talk to the children," she said. "Maybe we can talk to him and make him come home."

Aaron Leads NL Sluggers

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI) — Hammering Hank Aaron of Milwaukee was certified today as the National League's leading slugger for 1959.

Aaron compiled a slugging percentage of .826, according to official averages released here, and his 400 total bases not only were tops in the circuit, but represented the highest figure since Stan Musial registered 420 total bases in 1954.

Slugging percentages are compiled on the basis of a player's total number of bases compared with his total number of official times at bat.

Ernie Banks of the Cubs finished second to Aaron with a slugging percentage of .806. Rounding out the top five were Ed Matthews of the Braves, .803 and Frank Robinson of the Reds and Willie Mays of the Giants, each with a .803 slugging mark.

Jim Gilliam of the Dodgers drew the most walks, 86, and Banks the most intentional walks, 20.

It was the first road game for A&M, and the last the Aggies play until the Southwest Conference pre-season tournament Dec. 28-30 at Rice gymnasium in Houston.

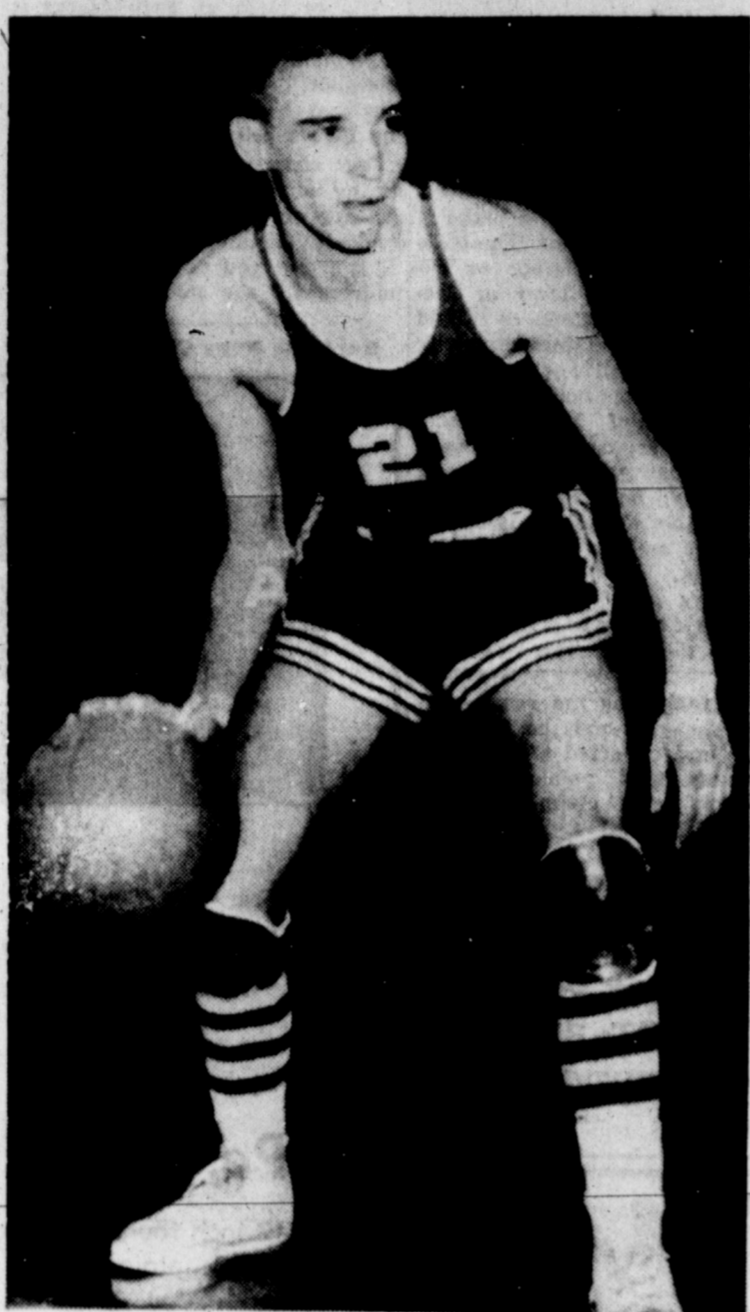

Ray, Sundown, Breckenridge, Stamford Picked For Titles

Defending champions Breckenridge and Stamford are in the favorite's spots, and Wichita Falls is the underdog as the three 1958 titlists prepare to seek their second straight schoolboy football championships this week end.

Stamford gets the first crack at proving the odds-makers right tonight when the Bulldogs take on Brady at San Angelo in the Class AA championship game.

Cocher Larry Wartes' champs, winners of their last 25 games, rule a 12-point choice to whip Brady for the second time this year and rack up a fourth championship in five years for the Bulldogs.

Breckenridge has been made an 18-point favorite over Cleburne for tomorrow afternoon's Class AAA showdown at Breckenridge, but Wichita Falls was a six-point underdog to Corpus Christi Ray in the AAAA game set for Austin tomorrow afternoon.

The game set for Brownwood tomorrow afternoon, finds Sundown's perennial contenders favored by 13½ points to whip Katy and succeed dethroned White Deer.

Ray, undefeated and untied, has been so impressive in the playoffs, the odds-makers figure Coach Bill Stages' talent-deep crew will be able to end the Wichita Falls string, although the latter club wound up the season with No. 1 rank in the United Press International coaches board ratings to No. 2 for Ray.

Brady has been this far twice before, but lost both times—once to Stamford. The challengers bowed to Stamford 8-0 earlier in the season, and it was Brady that Stamford whipped in the fifth game last season to start its present 25-game victory string.

Sundown has been in the playoffs often—six out of the past seven years, but the semifinals the South Plains team ever made it to the finals. Katy has never been in the playoffs before, but the coastal team is one of only three perfect record teams surviving Ray and Stamford are the others.

Wichita Falls has a tie with Breckenridge to mar its record; Breckenridge lost to Abilene as well as tied the Coyotes; Cleburne lost to Stamford; Brady to Stamford and San Saba, and Sundown to Denver City.

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI) — Texas Christian University and the Clemson Tigers, with 16 previous bowl games between them, square off here Saturday in the first annual Bluebonnet Bowl game.

The Horned Frogs rule an eight-point pick to make Clemson their fifth post-season victim. The Frogs have won four and tied one game in 10 previous bowl assignments.

Penn State, 'Bama In Liberty Bowl

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Penn State, an Eastern powerhouse which stumbled twice, and Alabama, which rose from an opening defeat to prance unbeaten through its last nine games, smoothed out the final wrinkles today for their clash in the Liberty Bowl game Saturday.

The meeting between the Nittany Lions, powered by All-America Richie Lucas, and the defense-minded 'Bama in the East's first major NCAA approved post-season game will be nationally televised on NBC starting at 12:45 p.m. e.s.t.

It will mark Alabama's 13th bowl appearance dating back to the Rose Bowl in 1926, and Penn State's third bowl game.

The promoters were hopeful for a crowd of 40,000 in the vast Philadelphia Stadium which seats 68,814, but which only the Army-Navy game fills. Arkansas to Bring Nation's Lightest Team Into 'Gator'

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (UPI) — Up-to-date Arkansas brings the smallest major college football team in the nation to meet hefty Georgia Tech in the Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 2.

Coach Frank Broyles' first team averages only 191 pounds, only a pound heavier than the Tech backfield and much less than the 214-pound Yellowjacket line.

Arkansas relied on a squadron of nine small, but quick backs to compile an 8-2 record, one of the best in Razorback history.

The quickest back is 175-pound Jim Mooty, one of the greatest runners in Arkansas history. He was an All-Southwest Conference choice and garnered more votes than any other Razorback in the All-America poll. He gained 1,053 yards in his three-year career.

Mooty's running mate is Lance Alworth, a sophomore "import" from Mississippi and a potential triple-threat All-American.

The field general is James Monroe, experienced, brilliant and the team leader. He is an average passer, a fair runner and he's the best blocker on the team. Joe Paul Alberty, at 178, is the starting fullback. He works well in the fast-hitting offense and is a good blocker.

Broyles' alternate backfield of George McKinney at quarterback, Curtis Cox at full and Darrell Williams and Billy Kyser at the halves is only a shade under the starters. The ninth back, Jarrell Williams, is a fine broken field runner, but he will be sidelined for the bowl with an injured knee.

Arkansas, expected to be one of the also-rans in the SWC this year, finished in a three-way tie for the title and ninth in the nation, as high as it has ever finished in history. The 1954 team, which lost to Tech, 14-6, in the Cotton Bowl, also was ninth.

The Porkers started fast this year, winning their first four games, then lost to powerful Texas and Mississippi and it looked as if they might flounder out the season. But they came back strong in November, winning four straight and the bowl bid.

At Jacksonville, the team and Coach Broyles will have added incentive. The team can become the first in Razorback annals to win nine games and Broyles faces his old boss for the first time. Broyles played quarterback and was backfield coach at Tech under head coach Bobby Dodd. Both have enviable bowl records.

Dodd is unbeaten in eight games as a head coach and Broyles has won 10 of 11 as a player and assistant coach. Broyles was an assistant at Tech when it beat Arkansas' great 1954 team.

Broyles and Dodd both agree Tech is better now than in 1954. Broyles won't commit himself on whether Arkansas is better this year. He hopes it will be evident Jan. 2.

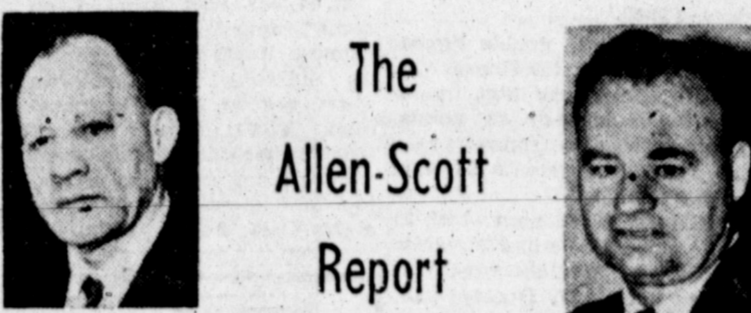

NEW U.S.-JAPAN SECURITY PACT TO STRESS 'JOINT CONSULTATIONS'

WASHINGTON — Japan is getting a big say-so concerning U.S. military operations in the Far East in a new mutual security treaty that has been negotiated by the two countries.

Under the provisions of this still unannounced agreement, Japan becomes, in effect, an equal partner with the U.S. in Far Eastern affairs, and will be given U.S. financial and technical assistance to build up a strong army, navy and air force, including a nuclear submarine.

Purpose of these considerably strengthened forces is to meet the menace of the steadily growing military might of Russia and a Red China in the Pacific.

Its principal features are as follows: For the ten-year duration of this treaty, the U.S. can continue to occupy various military bases in Japan.

The U.S. will consult Japan before taking any important military action anywhere in the Far East. This includes Korea, Formosa, Vietnam, Red - threatened Laos, and the SEATO countries.

During the five-year period, Japan's armed forces are to be built up to the level of the U.S. military forces in the Far East.

by EDWIN F. JORDAN, M.D. In the shooting season, in our country, I can see from my study, the hunters and their dogs traipsing through the brush in search of game.

In the practice of preventive medicine, the technique of flushing is called "case finding." As in hunting, nothing can be done with therapeutic equipment or ammunition until the case finder can flush the patient who is threatened by, or afflicted with, the preventable disease.

Here are the important facts that bear on this sneaky disease whose victims number more than one million in the United States alone.

Most often, the first phase of the rheumatic attack is a sore throat. Least often, it is an attack of scarlet fever, erysipelas or St. Vitus dance (chorea).

Whether mild or severe, approximately 10 to 20 per cent of these attacks of sore throat are caused by a particular brand of streptococci.

Of attacks of streptococcal sore throat, perhaps 3 to 5 per cent lead to rheumatic involvement of the heart. This means that for every 300 attacks of sore throat, there will be one, two or three children whose hearts will suffer permanent damage.

In another column, I'll tell you how you may be able to save your child from being included in the ranks of rheumatic cardiac invalids.
