Harvester Grid Practice Starts Friday

Batween 80 and 100 gridders will hit the field at 9 a.m. Friday at Pampa High School as the Harvesters open their 1959 fall practice.

The Harvester grid candidates won't waste any time during the. first two days of workouts. "We'll. probably scrimmage sometime during the first two days." said head Coach Babe Curiman.

"There won't be any time to. stand around and watch." declared Curiman, mindful of last year's disastrous 1-9 season. "We'll have lots of blocking and tackling drills,_

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and lots of defensive drills." Two-a-day workouts will be Keld beginning Monday, when school starts. Morning practices Friday and Saturday are set for 9 a.m., and afternoon practices at 2:30 p.m.

No socialist will ever be specific enough so that one knows exactly

The article appeared in the Au-

gust issue of "The Freeman" magazine. It is so useful that I want to pass it on in installments. "In all the history of mankind few individuals have had a widespread influence as has Karl Marx. Recently I talked to a school boy in Africa who knew nothing of economics, but he had been taught and firmly believed that Karl Marx was one of the very greatest of all men. Half the world is under the domination of governments that profess to be founded upon principles he taught. Even in our own and multitudes of intellectuals openly or secretly support the philosophy he promulgated. A large group within the Christian Church advocates adoption of the basic principles which he expounded.

Huge laber organizations press continually for the advance of socialism, Legislators join hands with labor, business, and religious groups to put into effect his basic principles. Even among evangelical Christians many seek a furthering of his views. Some, while opposed to his system, seek a sys-. tem which at best is a compromise with it. Others who oppose communism and its principles fail to understand the basic error of it in fact, have failed to get at
