The explosion, which occurred only seconds after the blunt nosed Thor biasted off, spoiled what the Air Force had hoped would be a rare double bullseye by two of its most touted missiles. Minutes after the Atlan launch-

ing, the Air Force announced that "preliminary instrumentational" indicated that the 100-ton missile "achieved its test objectives." Air Force officials and other persons connected with the trouble-jinxed Atlas project were jubriant. However, the test did not mean the Atias is yet ready for operational use. At least three more experimental Atlases probably will be fired by mid August.
Designed to hurl a hydrogen warhead 6 300 miles, the Atlas

originally was to have been ready.

NEW YORK - A few days hence, if spared by Providence to see the day, this reporter of a grab-bag of themes of, about, in and around New York will come within shooting distance of whatmy old friend George Solotaire calls "60th Street." Since 1949, when I undertook this job, I have made it perfectly clear that I've been totting off the 50's and if anybody saved these disclosures from the beginning, which is most unlikely, he'd know that I was 49. in 1949 and will be 59 in 1959 and there is nothing I or anyone else can do about it. Not being a movie actor, although I was once, I see no reason to lop off whole sections of truth and evade the fact. I got home about 4 o'clock the other morning and not being felled by exhaustion or sleeping pills (a nefarious habit I have avoided so far), I decided to pull up a deep, soft chair out on the terrace and watch the dawn pearl itself into being along Long Island Sound, Watch and think back. By the time I had the chair arranged and some comfortable clothes on, the first hints of light were just beginning and it was a good time to remember.

Dr. William Beaumont, a United States Army Surgeon, observed the processes of digestion in St. Martin's stemach over a period of years. The patient was extraordinarily elusive, disappearing at frequent intervals. At one time he was lost entirely for over ten

Alexis St. Martin, in spite of this hole in his stomach, lived until the ripe old age of 83.

Another patient whose should be remembered was the first child to receive vaccine for smallpox given by the English physician, Edward Jenner. This was a boy of eight, James

Phipps, who was inoculated on May 14, 1796, with cowpox from the hand of a milkmaid named Sarah Nealmes. To test the value of this vaccination, Jenner eight weeks later inoculated the boy with smallpox, but James did not contract the disease.

The fatal illness of the Emperor Frederick, during which his physician was severely criticized, drew attention to cancer of the larvnx and greatly advanced medical knowledge of that subject. Also, when the operation for ap-

pendicitis was performed on King Edward VII, attention was focused on this disease and its treatment, thus benefiting many less prominent patients. The patient who suggests methods of treatment to his dotcor is

not always popular and is apt to be a nuisance. A good example is Isambard Brunel, a distinguished engineer. In 1843 Brunel was entertaining some children by pretending to
