Violation Of The Law Of Neighborly Love

I am continuing to quote from Frederick Nymeyer's essay on the Hebrew - Christian Law of Love. Under the above heading he

"If the law, thou shalt love they neighbor as theyself, means that you are not required to love your neighbor more than yourself, the implication is equally true that your neighbor less than yourself. In fact, this is the only deviation from the law which has any reality. Loving your neighbor- more than yourself is usually self-delusion or hypocrisy; but loving your terrible reality and one of the most prevalent evils in the world. All the real attention to the commandment on brotherly love is directed we do not love our neighbors as curselves. If we all will get rid of the sanctimoniousness about loving our neighbors more than ourselves, and will make some real progress on loving our neighother programs which can be clasbors as much as ourselves, then the world will soon be a much better place in which to live. \*\*\*

> "Sin in the relations between men, is not the pursuit of legitimate self - regarding interests. Sin, on the contrary, is the pursuit of legitimate self - regarding interests at the expense of the neighbor, by spending our time and talents figuring out ways of exploiting him. Instead of pursuing his self - regarding interests by the right means. man operates as an exploiter using violence, wife stealing, theft, fraud and unrestrained covetousness.

"The 'frame of reference' in which in this analysis we set sin is not that self - regarding interests are wrong but that the means we adopt to satisfy our self - regarding interests are wrong. The difference between Scripture and socialism - communism is summarized in that antithesis. Scripture assumes and approves selfregarding interests as the standard for relations of men to men; socialism - communism declares that self-regarding interests are

wrong. \*\*\* The Five Great Seemingly Restrictive Commandments

"Freedom to pursue our legitimate self-regarding interests - in other words, loving ourselves - is a wonderful freedom and presents a great vista for life and activity and pleasure before us. But two requirements close in or seem to close in on that fair view: (1) what does God demand of us, and (2) maybe life is not worth living if we may not exploit our neighbor. (There are also sins which constitute self-damage. These are not being analyzed in this study.) The 'world' often says that religion is a kill-joy, and a great unpleasantness.

"The definition we have thus far given of neighborly love is a great liberation from narrow - minded ethics. We have, indeed, opened up all of life to the pursuit of the self-regarding interests, (1) except that we may not exploit the neighbor, and (2) except as we have an obligation to God. The second exception we are not discussing here: we are now addressing ourselves to how much life is worth living if we may not, and do

not exploit our neighbor Ethics can be taught so that it looks as it you may not do this; and you may not do that. In many respects Christian ethics is taught that way. Probably most children from Christian homes get the impression that the Christian religion narrows the range of pleasure in this life. It surely does if we must all knuckle under to our neighbors. But it surely does not really narrow life and its plea-

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

By NORMAN R. HAGEN ELECTRONIC WEATHER DE-TECTIVES' TO IMPROVE FORE CASTING

WASHINGTON - An electronic reather detective soon will be added to the staff of 31 Weather Bureau offices to help find the hidden clues to better weather forecasts. Each of these 31 robot storm detectors will be able to locate and track all rain, hail and snow storm occurring anywhere within 250 miles of its sky scanning antenna. The installation of this powerful next decade. means that for the first time frany local forecasters will be able to observe the minute - by - minute changes in size, intensity, direction and speed of a threatening storm as it moves anywhere over 200,000 square mile area.

Called "Weather Search Radar" by the Weather Bureau, and identified as "WSR-57." these automatic and continuous recording storm detectives are already being tabbed by enthusiastic meteorologists as the "magic weather warning tool of the future."

Since June 1959, when the first of the 31 especially designed weather search radar sets was installed Miami, there is growing eviience that the outstanding performance of the new model weather radar equipment will bring revolutionary changes in weather reporting and forecasting services. Miami radar experts, already have observed and tracked the fascinating generation-to disspation thousands of rain-shower clouds as they are carried along by the winds over southeastern Florida. The Senate foreign relations committee hired a statistical service to estimate the economic growth of the United States, western Europe, and the Soviet Union, in the

The United States will no longer. be first in gross product tho' it will continue to be first by a wide margin in per capita income; Western Europe (including the

United Kingdom, the Sandinavian countries, Greece, and Turkey) will have the largest aggregate product and will be second in per Soviet Russia's rate of growth.

will be fastest but it will continue to trail far behind the others in both gross product and individual income. (Soviet Russia, for the purpose of this study, included all the satellite countries.) If these estimates are confirm-

ed by time, Premier Khrushchev's boast that his country will pass the United States in economic power by 1970 will be exposed as nothing but a boast. Meanwhile the estimates can be defended as having been made with care, by competent analysts under the supervision of an able committee of economists and business men. There has no need to skimp the job because the committee had \$300,000 to spend on its

The findings gain added credmaterial in the report that will prove thoroughly displeasing to some members of the Senate comwritten to gratify the members of the committee but rather from a isinterested desire to deal hon-

estly with the questions presented. For example, the report says that the potential rate of growth of the American economy is far greater than that of either of the other two. porate taxes, and quotas." Each of these hindrances exists only because it has been sanctioned by Congress, and each has its strong supporters on the committee. What the Senators were told was that their darling farm subsidies are hampering America's progress; that the citizens' welfare would be greatly enhanced if the extortionate taxes on business profits were lowered materially from the present level of 52 per cent, if tariffs were further reduced, and import quotas done

away with. As for the committee chairman, Sen. Fulbright, it will be interesting to see if he has grasped an obvious conclusion to be drawn from his experts' figures. If it is indeed true, as the report forecasts, that western Europe will soon be more productive than America, then Mr. Fulbright ought to start thinking about 'reducing America's commitments, both economic and military to Europe.




