Population, first of all, will be zooming. By 1970 the big crops of babies that arrived in post-war vears will whe old enough to be married and to begin having babies of their own. By 1970 it-18 estimated that U.S. population will come close to 210 million, a 33 million increase from 1959

This increase in population is predicted to include about 14 million more workers and about 43. million more school children. The older group from age 65 and upward is expected to increase from its present 15 million number to about 19 million.

This means that there will have to be some pretty sizeable investments made if this huge increase in population is going to be housed, clothed and fed. Here, prediction becomes precarious. We will either see a relaxing of governmental controls with industry being freed to do the job, or we will see a tightening of governmental controls with the government becoming an ever larger factor in all walks of life.

If the former is the case, the nation will be moving forward in its stride. It will be competing favorably with all other nations. including Russia. Frankly," it is not too much to suggest that in this case, America will be putting distance between itself and Russia with the latter handicapped in such a way that it never can catch up.

On the other hand, if the government increases taxes and regulations according to its own plans, then, we could see the gap between the two nations narrowing. Instead of the improvement that could come, we will find standards whether of the same or any other of living going down and a general apathy and loss of freedom. One way or another, the foilowing seem to be on the horizon. There will be about 90 million cars and trucks jammed on super highways. Neither the highways



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
