

Reds Back Home Aren't Told Of Nikita's Cool U.S. Reception

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Buried deep in the structure of Nikita S. Khrushchev's visit to the United States is a disturbing fact as dangerous as a ticking bomb.

It is this: The Soviet people apparently have been led to expect great, immediate and concrete results from the Eisenhower-Khrushchev exchange of visits. Worse: they are being fed an exaggerated story of the warmth and enthusiasm with which Khrushchev has

been received by street crowds. Ovation for Khrushchev from the curbside crowds are what Russians have been reading about in their official newspapers. Any American eyeball, eardrum witness of the distinguished visitor's Washington reception knows there was neither ovation nor warmth for Khrushchev, only curiosity and courtesy.

Grim and Polite
Chill and courteous are the words for the greeting Khrushchev received from the thousands who watched his Washington arrival. Courteous and grim are the words to describe President Eisenhower as the welcoming host. If that is not the way the Russian people are hearing it, then there must be reasons.

The reasons well may be these: That the Russian government is making a propaganda play in support of its line—that the people of the United States are sympathetic to and support the objectives of the Soviet Union.

A propaganda play to show that the American—opponents of the Soviet Union are a lot of war-mongering millionaires and militarists who will be responsible if not much comes from the Ike-K exchange.

Dangerous Tactic
This is very dangerous propaganda, indeed, especially if it works. If it does work, the Russian people will vastly underestimate the determination of the American people to protect their way of life and to fight for it, if need be.

If the Russian people do so underestimate the American point

Auto dealers retailed 114,100 new domestically-built cars in the first third of September, cutting stocks to 625,000. The drop from the 965,000 level at the start of last month had been expected as dealers sold from inventories while awaiting 1960 models.

Gasoline stocks rose 1,982,000 barrels in the week ended September 11, according to the American Petroleum Institute. This pushed supplies of motor fuel in storage to 183 million barrels, against 172 million a year ago. Gasoline prices also displayed soft spots.

The Agriculture Department published new figures showing

this year's downturn in farm profits may be steeper than previously expected. The agency reported net income realized by farmers in the first three quarters is running at an annual rate of \$11,500,000,000, down \$1,600,000,000 from last year.

Gulf Coast refineries generally are raising prices on kerosene No. 2 fuel oil and diesel oil by one-quarter cent a gallon. The CAB in a policy statement said it favors a lowering of jet economy fares over the North Atlantic. The New Haven Railroad has been authorized a government loan guarantee for \$1,500,000 and an additional \$8,159,400 provided the terms are right.

city police were assigned to the sidewalks outside the United Nations' East River campus and the plaza in front of the U.N. headquarters was to be closed to traffic during the visit.

Khrushchev really lost his temper for the first time Thursday night at the Waldorf-Astoria after a long speech in which he had boasted the Communist system would surpass the American and taunted top businessmen as being afraid to trade with Russia.

The Russian leader was asked why the Soviet Union jammed American broadcasts, banned circulation of American periodicals and censored the dispatches of American correspondents when Russian newsmen here were free to write whatever they pleased.

Reaction Ruffles Khrushchev There was loud and prolonged applause at the question and answers when Khrushchev began a reply circumventing it. Khrushchev's face became flushed and his voice was gruff.

"I've come here at the invitation of your President," he said. "We have invited him to visit us. We agreed that our discussions would not touch on... the internal affairs of others."

"You are like an old sparrow but you cannot rattle me by your cries. You must not interrupt. If you have no desire to listen, I can go."

The incident apparently got under Khrushchev's skin as nothing had so far during his visit to Washington and New York. He got another cool if polite reception from about 120,000 lunchtime spectators on his arrival in New York Thursday, but it did not disturb his cockiness.

The Russian's speech Thursday night was before an overflow audience of the top businessmen and industrialists of the United States and he put on an astounding performance of hulling with a joke in one sentence and jabbing with a threat or a boast in the next.

Combine lamb, salt, pepper, celery seed and catchup. Shape into 4 patties about 3/4-inch thick. Place on broiler rack. Insert broiler pan so that the top surface of meat is 2 to 3 inches from the heat. Broil until brown on first side, about 8 minutes. Turn, broil second side 3 to 4 minutes. Sprinkle grated cheese on patties and continue broiling 1 to 2 minutes, or until cheese is melted. Yield: 4 servings.

What takes place when man finds God? We spend much time in search of assurance that God exists and we continually try to prove his being—but what takes place when we find God and come to the realization that He is a real being.

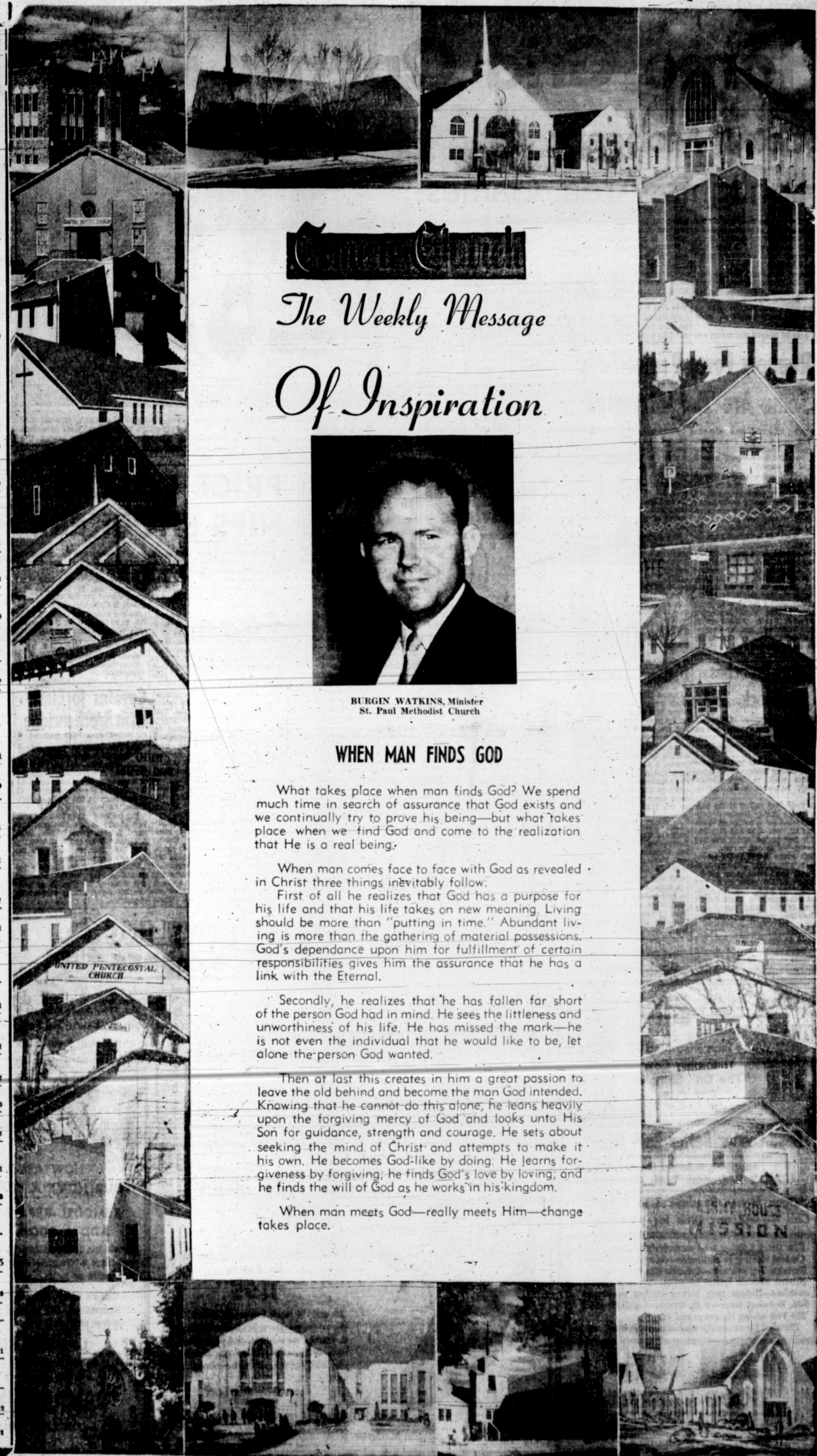
When man comes face to face with God as revealed in Christ three things inevitably follow:

Secondly, he realizes that he has fallen far short of the person God had in mind. He sees the littleness and unworthiness of his life. He has missed the mark—he is not even the individual that he would like to be, let alone the person God wanted.

Then at last this creates in him a great passion to leave the old behind and become the man God intended. Knowing that he cannot do this alone, he leans heavily upon the forgiving mercy of God and looks unto His Son for guidance, strength and courage. He sets about seeking the mind of Christ and attempts to make it his own. He becomes God-like by doing. He learns forgiveness by forgiving; he finds God's love by loving; and he finds the will of God as he works in his kingdom.

When man meets God—really meets Him—change takes place.



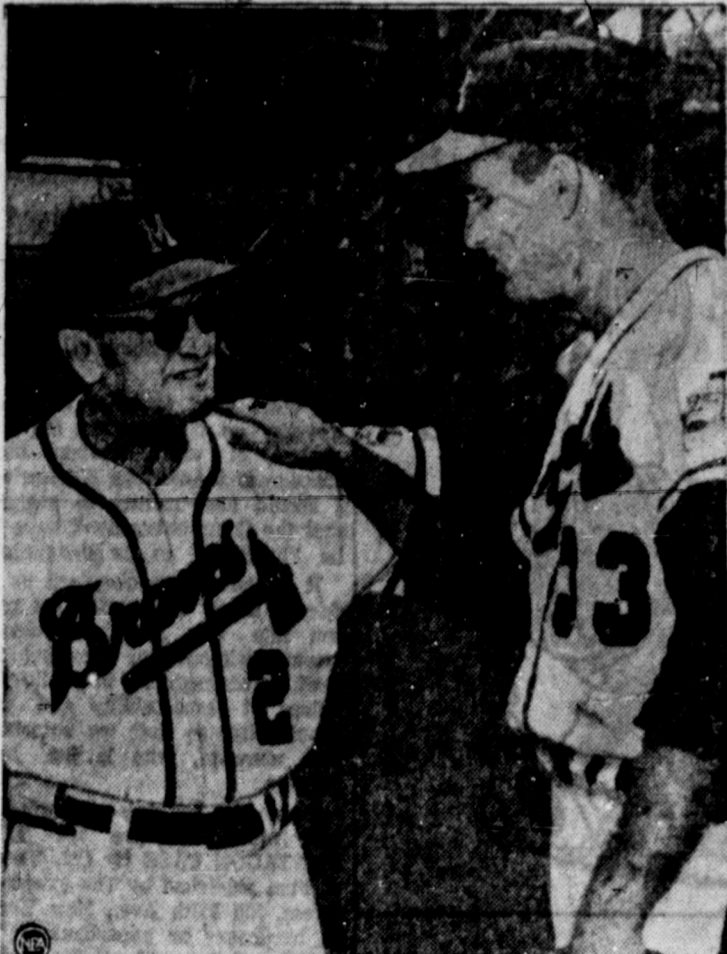

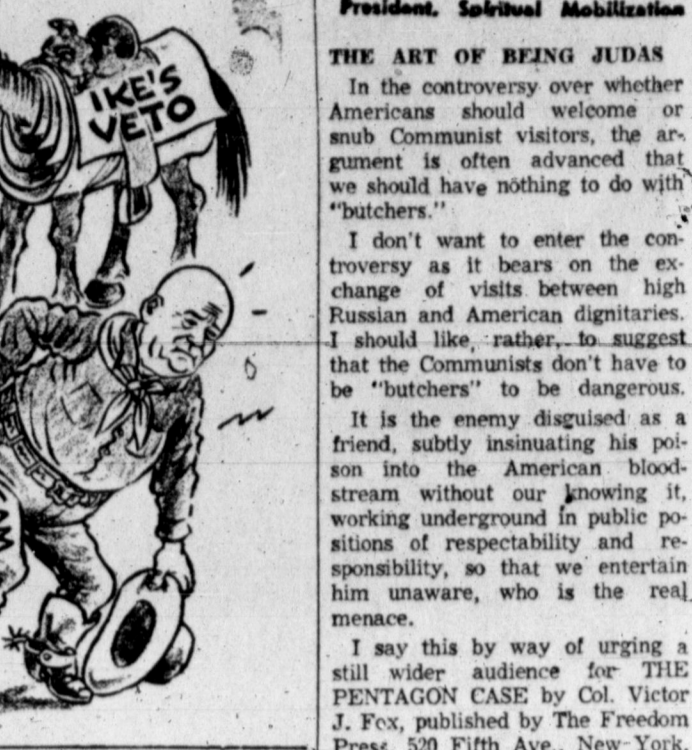
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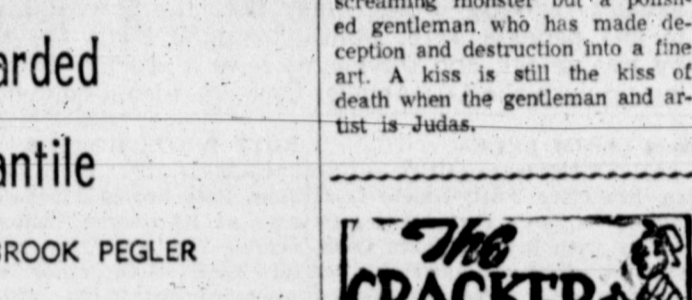
