Man-Model Satellite Is Launched But Drops Short

Riderless Mercury Misses Mark Due to Engine Failure

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., (UPI)—A riderless test model of the man-carrying mercury satellite was launched today but dropped short of its mark because of engine failure in an Atlas missile.

The test was at least a partial success, however. A sharp-eyed crew on a Navy patrol plane spotted the 9-foot nose cone—the section that one day will house a space traveler. Two destroyers were sent to the area at full speed. Recovery of the instrument-loaded cone was expected this morning.

Trouble in the Atlas intercontinental missile shortly after the 2:19 a.m. launching caused the funnel-shaped capsule to fall several hundred miles short of the target area 2,900 miles downrange in the Atlantic.

Col. H. H. Eichell of the Air Force ballistic missile division, said the Atlas trouble was caused by failure of two outside engines to separate. This added weight reduced the planned altitude and velocity.

FBI Seeks LR Bombers



BOMBS IN LITTLE ROCK

Three bombs set off in Little Rock, Ark., within minutes of each other, wrecked the fire chief's city-owned station wagon, an office in the school board building and damaged the building in which the Mayor has his offices. Police believe the explosions were caused by dynamite. No injuries were reported. The FBI has sent a laboratory expert to Little Rock to help in the investigation of the bombings.

Astronaut With Mercury

Spotting of the Mercury nose-cone, said that several of the scientists gathered here for the experiment. One of the seven American astronauts who will make the first American trip into space during the coming months also witnessed the firing last partial satisfaction among the NASA officials.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration, in charge of the shot, said that several of the seven objectives of the flight may have been achieved. There had been no attempt to put the vehicle into orbit.

Robert R. Gilruth, NASA Project Mercury director, said "indications are that the capsule systems transmitted up to 12 minutes after launch. This indicates we should have gotten some good and valuable data."

The recovery destroyer will take the capsule's atmosphere and then to Cape Canaveral for study.

Gilruth said that had a man been in the Mercury, an automatic escape rocket probably would have ejected him when trouble developed in the Atlas. Today's model was not equipped with the device.

It was not known whether the nose cone reached sufficient height to provide facts on re-entry into the earth's atmosphere—one of the key objectives of the test.

Location Secret
No officials would say where the capsule came down. They explained this information, coupled with knowledge of what caused the Atlas to fall short, would enable the Russians to deduce much about the Atlas' capabilities as a war rocket.

A manned Mercury capsule will not be fired until project officials are sure a space voyager will be protected.

One of the nation's seven carefully selected Astronauts, Navy Lt. Cmdr. Alan B. Shepard Jr., watched the launching from the Atlas blockhouse over a TV monitor.

The capsule was the first to be launched in the project named "Big Joe."

Goal of "Big Joe" and several other projects being conducted by NASA is to put a space voyager into orbit around the earth late in 1960 or early in 1961.

Laotian Troops Capture Post

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)—The Laotian government announced today that its troops have captured a post in Samneua province.

The communique said the post was retaken from two rebel battalions who had been operating in the region of Samneua at Muong Pao, 16 miles northeast of Samneua, and at Muong Pong, 24 miles east of the provincial capital.

Small engagements were also reported fought Tuesday between government and Pathet Lao rebels in Muong Pong with two killed and one seriously wounded on the royal army side, the communique added.

Youth Is Charged With Rape Here

An 18 year-old Skellytown youth, Benjamin Alex Hassler Jr., was charged Tuesday by the District Attorney with the rape of a 16 year-old Pampa girl Sunday night. The alleged rape occurred on a country road south of Pampa late Sunday night.

No information on the case was released to the press or radio by the sheriff's office which had jurisdiction in the matter. The case was brought to light Tuesday when District Attorney Bill Waters filed charges in justice of peace court. Police Chief Jim Conner said the case was out of his hands.

District Attorney Bill Waters said Hassler is being held in county jail without bail.

The Skellytown youth was arrested shortly after midnight Sunday in Pampa by Police Sgt. D. L. Day after a complaint had been filed by the girl's parents. Hassler was held in city jail Sunday night and was arraigned Tuesday before Justice of Peace Bill Graham.

Hospital Fire

Despite Ike's Criticism
No Settlement Of Strike Is Sighted

NEW YORK (UPI)—Steel industry and union negotiators Tuesday night feuded off criticism by President Eisenhower, blaming each other for prolonging the strike into the longest in the industry's history.

Eisenhower had called on both sides to end "intransigent bargaining" and begin "intrusive, uninterrupted, good faith negotiations" to end the walk-out. The strike by 500,000 steelworkers today entered its ninth week, with no sign of a settlement.

David J. McDonald, president of the United Steelworkers of America, fired off a reply stating that the union was trying to do just what the President asked. But he said the industry negotiators "have either refused or lacked the authority to negotiate, except on the basis of complete denial of any injustice to the steelworkers."

Virginia Faces Integration

A federal district judge today considered an appeal by public schools in mountainous southwest Virginia.

Legal suits involving 12 Negroes seeking to enter two white schools in Floyd County, Va., and eight more Negroes seeking admittance to the only white school in Galax County, Va., were in the hands of Federal Judge Roby C. Thompson.

The suits marked the first desegregation push in the southwest Virginia area, where Negro population is sparse. Negro attorneys are seeking an immediate court order to force the counties to admit Negroes to white schools.

There were no incidents Tuesday when 64 Negro students quietly joined hundreds of whites in integrated classes in Front Royal, Charlottesville, Norfolk and Alexandria, Va.

Twenty-one Negroes and nearly 300 whites attended classes together at the Warren County High School at Front Royal. It was the first time since last fall that the whites had attended the school in Miami, Fla., where two Dixie County elementary schools were integrated Tuesday for Florida's first integration.

Holiday Highway Toll Shocking

The Labor Day toll of 434 persons "dead in traffic" accidents left many state officials resolved to do something to curb the highway slaughter.

Tow truck officials were stunned by a traffic count of 19 dead, the worst in state history. The Iowa highway patrol was ordered to discontinue such practices as issuing only warning tickets and delivering safety talks.

Ohio Gov. Michael V. DiSalle ordered his highway patrol boosted to its maximum strength of 760 after 29 deaths over the weekend holiday.

Missouri Gov. James T. Blair Jr. said his state, which had 16 auto deaths this Labor Day compared to six in 1958, also needed more patrolmen.

California, which led the nation with 39 deaths, vowed to continue a crackdown on traffic violators started earlier this year.

The National Safety Council expressed alarm at the toll, which was two greater than the 432 persons who died last Labor Day.

Firemen's Convention Is Held In Canadian

Eleven firemen from Pampa were in Canadian Tuesday for the 51st semi-annual convention of the Panhandle Firemen's Association. Ninety-two firemen from 18 Panhandle area cities attended the all-day meeting.

Pampa's track runner race team again took first place in the afternoon's punper contest with a time of 24.4 seconds. Dimmitt finished second with 34.5 seconds, and Wellington placed third with 36.6 seconds.

The contest involved the stringing of 100 ft. of fire hose in the fastest time.

In the water-polo event Pampa failed to place. First place went to Eumax, followed by Dalhart and Memphis.

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of four articles prepared to help publicity chairmen do their job effectively for their clubs and organizations Monday's article concerned deadlines, for daily and Sunday publications and preparing a story for print. Today: "Tell It Honestly.")

The ABC's of writing a news story is to tell... who, why, what, when, where and how. After you have written your story, check it against the five W's and the H. The editor wants all of the facts and necessary details, including full names and any identifying titles they want. You naturally will want every story you give the editor to be as accurate and impartial as though it had been prepared by a newspaper reporter.

NAMES, NAMES, NAMES... In each issue of a national news magazine, there appears over one column this comment: "Names make the news." People nearly always like to see their names in print. A person, whose name appears in the paper in a complimentary way, will buy, not one, but six copies. Experience has taught editors that names, names, names help build circulation, so it's well worth all the efforts that may be required to submit all the names of guests, members, or other people involved (up to a 45 name limit). Sometimes when the list exceeds 45, it isn't fitting to include full lists, and after you've listed this many, you will know that you have enough, but if in doubt, do it.

When it is physically possible, the woman's editor will want your club meeting news no later than three days after it is held. A happening or event that is days, old is generally no longer news, it is history... and newspapers leave the writing of history to the historians.

Much of the time, you can give the story to the editor before it happens. For example, you know well in advance that your group is going to have a banquet, or hold an election of officers or sponsor some other similar activity. Always see to it that the editor has this information well in advance of the event. Once you've given her an "advance" story, follow it with a "cover" or account of what happened at the event.

If, for some reason, the event fails to take place, it is your responsibility to notify the editor immediately. If she prints a story announcing a meeting at a certain time and place, and on that same day gets a call from a reader stating that the meeting did not take place, she is going to have some choice comments to make. Back to the subject of names. Be sure that they are always right. As publicity chairman for your group, you have a perfectly legitimate excuse for being as "nosy" as you wish to be. Determine at the beginning of the club year, all of your members full married names. The woman's editor does not like to use given first names, such as "Helen Jones". Sometimes this is the only name you know of a member. We must have the husband's name, except in the case of a widow or divorcee.

As most of you by now, the woman's editor does not have time to take a story by telephone. You may call when she is rushing to meet a deadline or in the midst of an interview. Sometimes she may be out on a story and you will not be able to reach her. She is especially rushed from Wednesday morning until Saturday noon. That is why it is requested that you bring the story into the office. Your story may be short, taking only 10 minutes. (But multiply that by as few as six calls a day (and there are often many more), that is one hour spent in conversation; then when the stories have to be typed, edited and a headline written for it, you can see that it would be time consuming. Stories left in the News Office, even in note form can be typed and edited in a third of the time, they can be taken over the phone, retyped and edited.

We do have available at the News for club reports, forms that will assist in writing up your stories. They are yours for the asking. Just a couple of more ideas, while we're on the subject of submitting new stories. Rising costs of turning out any newspaper make it imperative that all stories be told in as few words as possible. You will soon find that it's a lot more fun to see a brief item, giving all the essential information in print... than to contemplate that beautiful, long story that found its resting place in the wastebasket.

Avoid adjectives and the glowing tributes. If it takes pages to tell your story, better read it over carefully and do a little editing of your own. Don't express an opinion about the "delicious" refreshments, they are all good; and don't praise an interesting speaker, they are all good (or should be.) The highlights you give of his

speech will be tribute enough and the reader can make up her own mind if it was interesting.

And, please avoid the needle, it can be a temptation, when handling a story to the editor, to casually mention that Brother John, a well-known advertiser, thought the editor would be deeply interested in your story; or that so-and-so in the newspaper office is a good friend of yours, or that you used to "work for a newspaper." If you succumb to this temptation, you won't be adding sunshine to the editor's day. (TOMORROW: Any Questions?)

Comedy Skit To Be Presented At Horace Mann

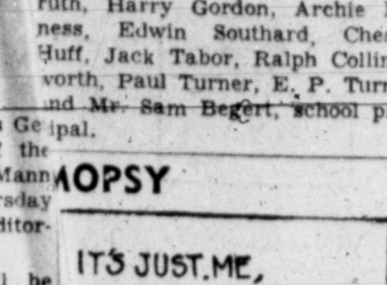
