



Four hundred families fled. Alwas limited to a radius of three miles, the sickening fumes spread

over the whole city. Hundreds of persons reported headaches and nausea. The danger of a widespread explosion ingered for nearly 31/2 hours-3:40 a.m. c.s.t. until 7 a.m. by which time the bulk of the gas had been diluted by the atmos

# **Hopes Pinned** On Thor, Atlas **Test Success**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) -Three brilliant successes by two of America's most powerful ballistic missiles Tuesday gave U.S. space scientists something other than Russian Luniks to think

From a military standpoint, an fired from the cape and another operational Thor launched at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., met all test objectives.

To space experts, the engine performances and accuracy successes meant another degree of reliability for the two missiles they are counting heavily on to break Russia's monopoly on moon

Tuesday's shots were fired within a 14-hour period and were all declared "highly successful."

Atlas and Thor will be integrated into rockets to explore the lunar surface and to probe deep space during coming months. The time table is still vague, but probably will be stepped up in the wake of Soviet successes.

Atlases and Thors will serve as boosters to U. S. space rockets, even though neither comes close to brutish 800,000-pound - thrust engines behind the Luniks. Maximum Atlas thrust power is about





Agents Necessary in Business

Practically all business transacis an agent and so is the man who sells you real estate, or delivers your groceries, or drives your bus. These are just a few examples and each under the law of agency is somewhat different.

But they have in common the idea that, in some way or another, they represent or act for someone else. The person or corporation for which they act is known as the principal.

Generally speaking, there are wo broad classes of agents - special agents and general agents. For example, suppose you wish to sell your house and you engage a realtor or handle it for you. He is a special agent who represents you in this transaction alone.

On the other hand, if you were to be absent from the city for a long period of time and have business affairs to be cared for, you might grant a power of attorney to a close associate to act in your and accountants investigated a place as fully as if you were pres-

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### **BETTER JOBS**

Since this column thinks there is nothing more important than the means used to get the youth of the land to understand God's or nature's laws, I want to quote from Russell Kirk's review of the book "The Freudian Ethic, an Analysis of the Subversion of American Character" as published in the "National Review". The review was so interesting that I have ordered a copy of the book. This is the way Kirk puts it:

"Mr. Richard LaPiere, professor of sociology at Stanford and editor of the McGraw-Hill series in sociology and anthropology, has just published an important and courageous book: 'The Freudian Ethic, an Analysis of the Subverof American Character' (Duell, Sloan & Pearce, \$5.00). The Portestant ethic (a term borrowed from Max Weber), Dr. La-Piere writes, is being supplanted by the Freudian ethic - that is, a coddling of the human person in the delusion that man is have piest when he is almost back in the womb. "This study contains the keen-

est demolition of Freudian psychology that I have seen anywhere, particularly the two chapters from Freudian theory and practice in education: 'The Progressive School' and 'The Adjustment Motif.' Going straight to the heart of the matter, Mr. La Piere finds in a vague and vulgarized Freudian notion of man the principla cause of the failure of modern American education.

"Publicly - supported schools in the United States, he points out, were established in the belief that they 'would, in a generation or two, be the cure for every recognized social ill; and that the schools would, moreover, in the course of time, cost the taxpayer nothing, since the educated boys would grow up to be reasonable and honest men and the need for public support of jails, prisons, poor farms, and homes for the aged indigent would thus be eliminated.' This naive hope, derived from the Protestant ethic, died hard. As the public schools failed to fulfill these Utopian hopes, education was made compulsory, and extended to girls. We established the state teachers' colleges -and so riveted upon ourselves the present shackles of Teachers' College, Columbia. 'The end result' of these and other related developments has been the creation of a fairly closed system of teacher recruitment training and accrediting that is impervious to correcfrom without and generates

"The Department has also received information indicating that many of the group of Armenian Americans who repatriated to the Soviet Union are now dissatisfied with living conditions there and wish to return to the U.S.

"We have made efforts through our Embassy in Moscow to have our Consular Officers interview claimants to American citizenship who are residing in the Soviet Union. In the main these efforts have so far been unsuccessful. "The Vice President during his

recent trip to the Soviet Union brought to the attention of Mr. Khrushchev the question of claimants to American citizenship and relatives of American citizens who desire to reunited with their family in the U.S. This subject was also discussed during Mr. Khrushchev's visit here. We are hopeful that the Soviet Government will take favorable action to clear up this matter.

"I can assure you that the Embassy at Moscow will assist in every feasible way claimants to American citizenship, including those Americans of Armenian background who wish to return to

the U.S." The group of American nation als who wannt to return to the U.S. from Russia includes approximately 100 children ranging in ages from 12 to 21, who were born here and are still U.S. citi-

Peb Bellocq's cheesa fondue, described yesterday, was the true cottage fondue, the peasant fondue of Swiss families who find it nourishing and delicious but not a vast, exotte treat. It is a must. And now, at last, has come the recipe for a meat fondue from Paul Burger of the Swiss Pavilion restaurant, which is copyrighted, but M. Burger says I may use it so long as I give him due credit. M. Beilocq says: "What credit? Fondue Bourguignonne is well known in France as well as Switzerland as a delightful, easy dish of piquancy and charm. I imagine some old French and Swiss mothers who have made it for years would be amused at such a copyright." Let M. Burger and M. Bellocq meet at dawn with the weapons of their choice. Set a table for four persons (or

2 or 6 or 108, as you wish), with linen mats and sectional plates. Put a spirit lamp in the center of the table and on it, in the frame, a small cast-iron enameled pot already filled about 1-3 full with a previously heated and joined combination of 2-3 peanut oil and 1-3 butter. During the entire procedure this mix must remain hot enough to cook beef. Now, for each guest, cut into

one-inch cubes 10 ounces of trimmed prime filet of beef and put the cubes in the center of each plate. Each guest-must also have a regulation dinner fork and a two-tined long fork with an insulated handle. Freshly ground pepper and salt to tase may be added to the meat when it ready to eat Roesti-hardbrowned potatoes pancake style in the Swiss manner- goes well with this as does creamed spinach. A
