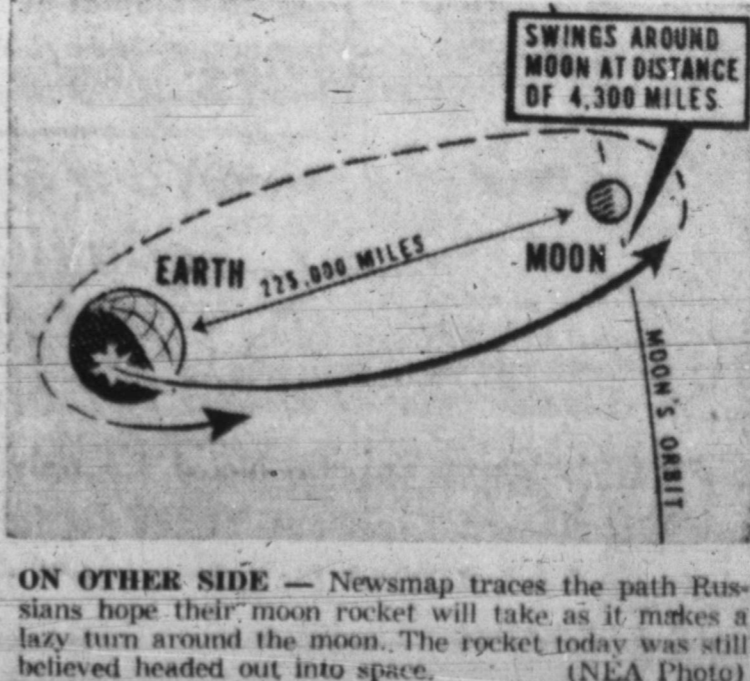

Today is Thursday Oct. 8, the 281st day of the year, with 84 more days to follow in 1959. The moon is in the first quarter. The morning star is Venus. The evening stars are Jupiter and Saturn. On this date in history: In 1871, the great Chicago fire broke out. Several hundred persons were killed, 98,000 were left homeless and damage totaled \$198,000,000. In 1890, world war aviator-hero Eddie Rickenbacker was born. In 1918, Sergeant Alvin York with the U.S. Army in France killed 26 enemy soldiers and captured 132 others. In 1940, Congress passed the Excess Profits Tax on corporation earnings. In 1953, the United States and Great Britain announced plans to withdraw their occupation forces and let Italy take over the so-called zone "A" of the disputed Trieste territory. Thought for today: English writer Norman Douglas said: "You can tell the ideals of a nation by its advertisements."

Hopes Pinned On Thor, Atlas Test Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—Three brilliant successes by two of America's most powerful ballistic missiles Tuesday gave U.S. space scientists something other than Russian Luniks to think about. From a military standpoint, an Atlas ICBM and a Thor IRBM fired from the cape and another operational Thor launched at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., met all test objectives. To space experts, the engine performances and accuracy successes meant another degree of reliability for the two missiles they are counting heavily on to break Russia's monopoly on moon exploration. Tuesday's shots were fired within a 14-hour period and were all declared "highly successful." Atlas and Thor will be integrated into rockets to explore the lunar surface and to probe deep space during coming months. The time table is still vague, but probably will be stepped up in the wake of Soviet successes. Atlases and Thors will serve as boosters to U. S. space rockets, even though neither comes close to bristling 800,000-pound thrust engines behind the Luniks. Maximum Atlas thrust power is about 350,000 pounds. Even so, the 75-foot-tall Atlas reaches a thrust-cut-off velocity near escape velocity. With de-queue staging, it can lift a sizeable payload to the vicinity of the moon. The missile's guidance system, the Defense Department said, the new Mark III nose cone scored in its programmed impact area 5,500 miles downrange.



Deadline For Soil Bank Rates

Friday will be the final day for area farmers to apply for a rate under the soil bank conservation reserve program. Evelyn J. Mason reports from the Gray County ASC office. Miss Mason, manager of the ASC office, said that anyone interested must apply by Friday to be considered for a 1960 contract. Making application for a rate will not obligate farmers to sign a contract. Final date to make an offer on the land, Miss Mason said, is Oct. 16. "If you requested a rate, you will be advised of the rate determined for your farms," she added. "You would then have until Oct. 16 to make a bid for your land. A contract cannot be offered unless your bid is less than the rate offered to you by the county committee." An important change in the soil bank program is in the method of determining the rate. Recent legislation removed the requirement that the fair rental value be established for the farm to determine the 1960 rate.

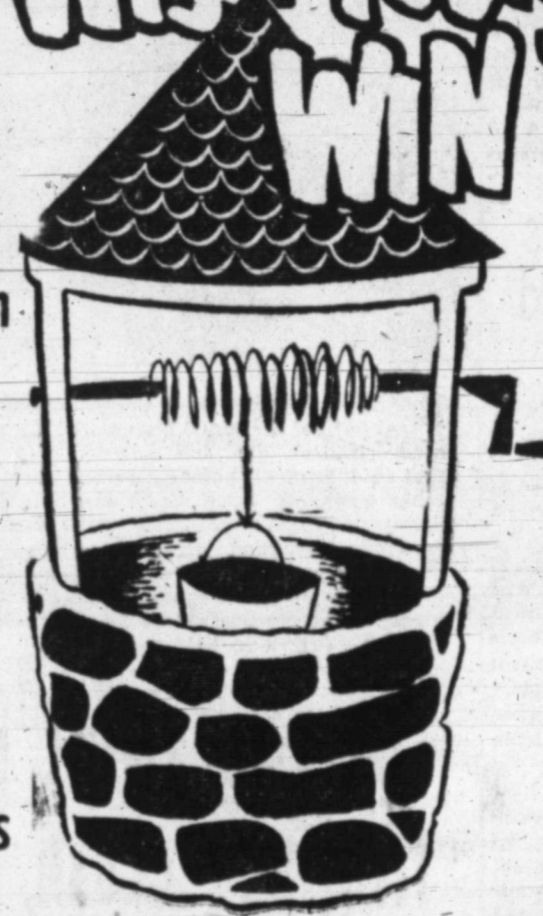

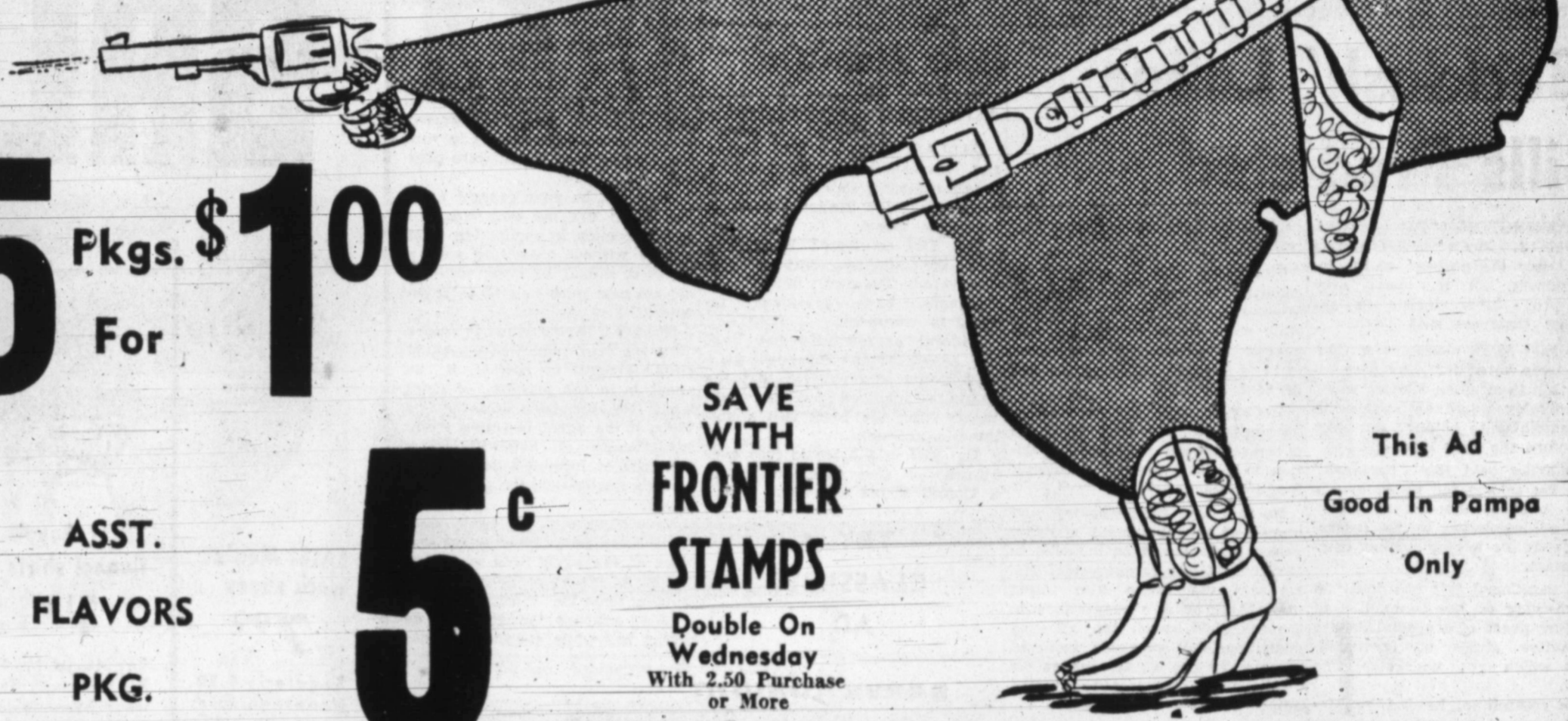

'Backlash' Labor Bills Predicted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy (D-Minn.) said today the passage of the labor reform bill this year may help pro-labor legislation get through Congress next year.

He said some members of Congress who voted for a tougher reform bill than union leaders wanted probably would be anxious to do something to balance the ledger before the 1960 elections.

McCarthy said this "backlash" from the reform bill might give a boost to such labor-backed measures as legislation to fix federal standards for unemployment compensation.

He mentioned this possibility in commenting on the completion of the first phase of a special Senate committee study of unemployment which got underway this week.

The committee, headed by McCarthy, plans to follow up the hearings here with trips to various U.S. areas which have failed to keep pace with the nation's general economic growth.

The committee will move into Pennsylvania next week for hearings Wednesday at Uniontown and Thursday at Wilkes-Barre. These communities have been hurt by the coal industry slump. On Oct. 26, the committee will visit Altoona, Pa., one of the railroad

centers hit hard by declining rail traffic.

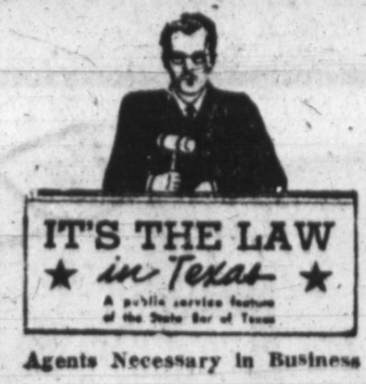
The group also is expected to conduct hearings in Michigan, Minnesota, West Virginia and possibly other states during the congressional recess. It is supposed to have a report ready by the end of next January.

McCarthy said the on-the-spot hearings possibly will generate pressure behind proposed legislation to provide federal assistance for depressed areas.

He said area redevelopment and increased unemployment compensation likely would be included in the committee's recommendations. He said the group also might make four or five suggestions in the tax field, such as allowing deductions for expenses incurred when a jobless worker moves his family to a new locality to find employment.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Agents Necessary in Business

Practically all business transactions of every kind depend upon the services of agents of one kind or another. Your insurance man is an agent and so is the man who sells you real estate, or delivers your groceries, or drives your bus. These are just a few examples and each under the law of agency is somewhat different.

But they have in common the idea that, in some way or another, they represent or act for someone else. The person or corporation for which they act is known as the principal.

Generally speaking, there are two broad classes of agents — special agents and general agents. For example, suppose you wish to sell your house and you engage a realtor or handle it for you. He is a special agent who represents you in this transaction alone.

On the other hand, if you were to be absent from the city for a long period of time and have business affairs to be cared for, you might grant a power of attorney to a close associate to act in your place as fully as if you were present.

He would be your general agent and could use his own judgment and discretion in conducting your affairs without consulting you as to what should be done with any old or new problems that might arise.

However, the principal is responsible for the conduct of his agent, either general or special, if the agent is in the process of doing what he has been hired to do. Thus, if the agent is acting within his "scope of authority", and someone is injured through the agent's negligence, the principal is liable.

Very often difficult legal questions arise as to whether the conduct of the agent was within the "scope of his authority", and thus binding upon the principal. For example, suppose the grocer's delivery boy while enroute to a cus-

tom's home, and despite the grocer's instructions to stick to business while on delivery, decided to go a mile or so out of his way to see his girl about a date that night. He drives through a stop sign and hits a pedestrian. Is the grocer responsible for this?

Though this is one of the areas of the law that can be very complex, at the same time it is one of the areas of the law where fairness, common sense, and common understanding are most important.

The facts concerning TB, as published by the National Tuberculosis Association include: Tuberculosis is a serious and chronic disease caused by a germ called the tubercle bacillus.

It frequently spreads from the unsuspecting ill to the well and is transmitted from someone who already has tuberculosis. TB most frequently is found in the lungs but can be found in any part of the body.

TB is symptomless in the early stages; known symptoms like fever, night sweats, and hemorrhages usually appear only in the later stages. It is the cause of irre-

parable destruction to lung tissue.

It is most apt to cause breakdown where there are contributing causes of poor economic or physical conditions or undue mental strain, and is usually of long duration, requiring months, frequently years, of treatment.

Tuberculosis is apt to require a completely new mode of living with relative always a potential threat and is unlike other infectious diseases in that it does not establish an immunity by one attack.

TB is one of the most costly diseases in terms of lost earning power, taxpayers' money and immeasurable heartbreak.

Showing Our Worst Side Can Be 'Good' Propoganda

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—"Let the Russians see all the American movies they want—even 'The Grapes of Wrath' and 'Tobacco Road'—it's good propoganda for our own country," says E. F. Johnston, president of the Motion Picture Association of America.

Johnston claims depicting the United States at its worst still shows how much better off we are than Iron Curtain countries.

"Here's an example," he said. "Grapes of Wrath" was shown in Yugoslavia right after the war to illustrate the horrible plight of American workers. It was intended to be purely anti-American propoganda.

"But when Tito's people saw the migrant crop workers, poor as they were, driving around in their own jalopies, they realized not even the rich in their own country had automobiles of their own."

"It was shown only twice, before being shelved."

"The same thing happened in Russia when they exhibited a pre-war newswreel showing Chicago cops clubbing strikers in a packing plant fight. After a stalker was knocked down there a audience could see he was wearing brand new shoes. They were used to being slugged by cops, but the Russians couldn't afford new shoes."

"We are inclined to take things

small luxuries that other nations consider great wealth."

Johnston said the Russian film commission asked for many pictures showing the American way of life in a bad light, but the U.S. State Department banned them from the exchange program.

"One of those was 'Blackboard Jungle,'" he explained. "But there were many good people in the story. In addition, the Russians would have been impressed by the fact that juvenile delinquents can afford wrist watches."

Johnston is disgusted with American tourists who howl about the kind of Hollywood films being shown abroad.

"Good or bad, movies are the most effective means we have of telling people about our country," he said. "We can't judge the reaction of foreigners by our own reactions."

"We've made a constant study of reactions to viewers abroad to our pictures, and we've found it

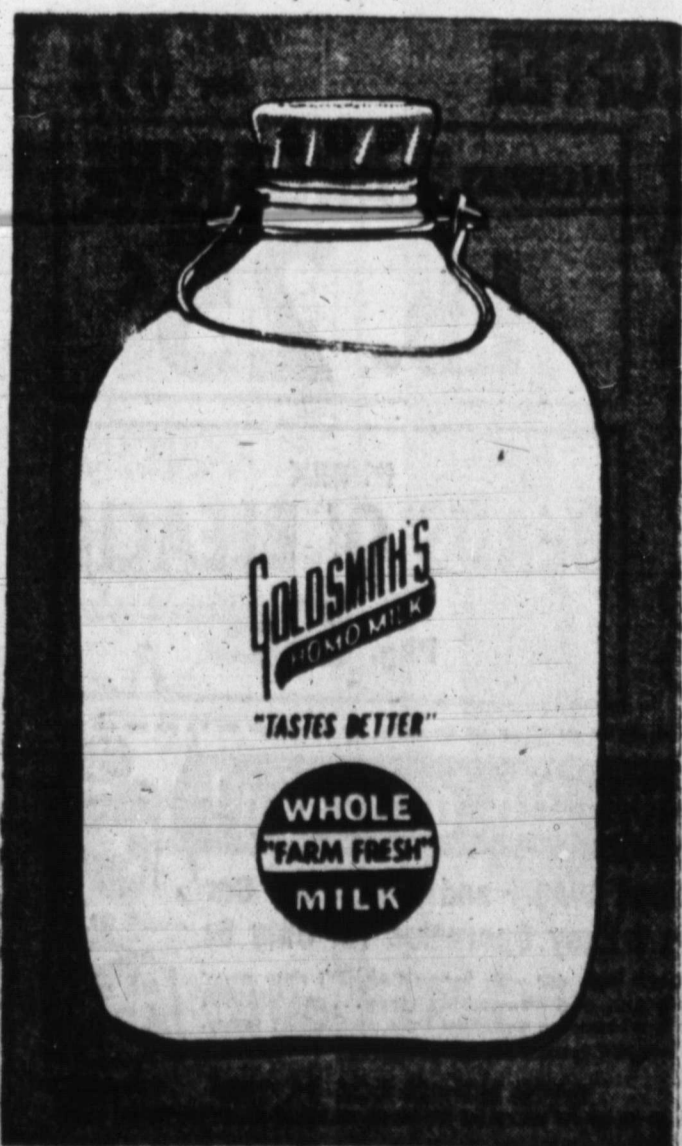

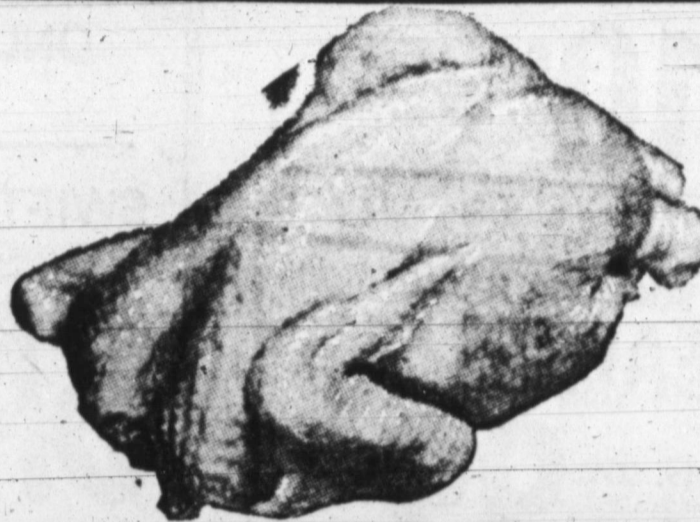

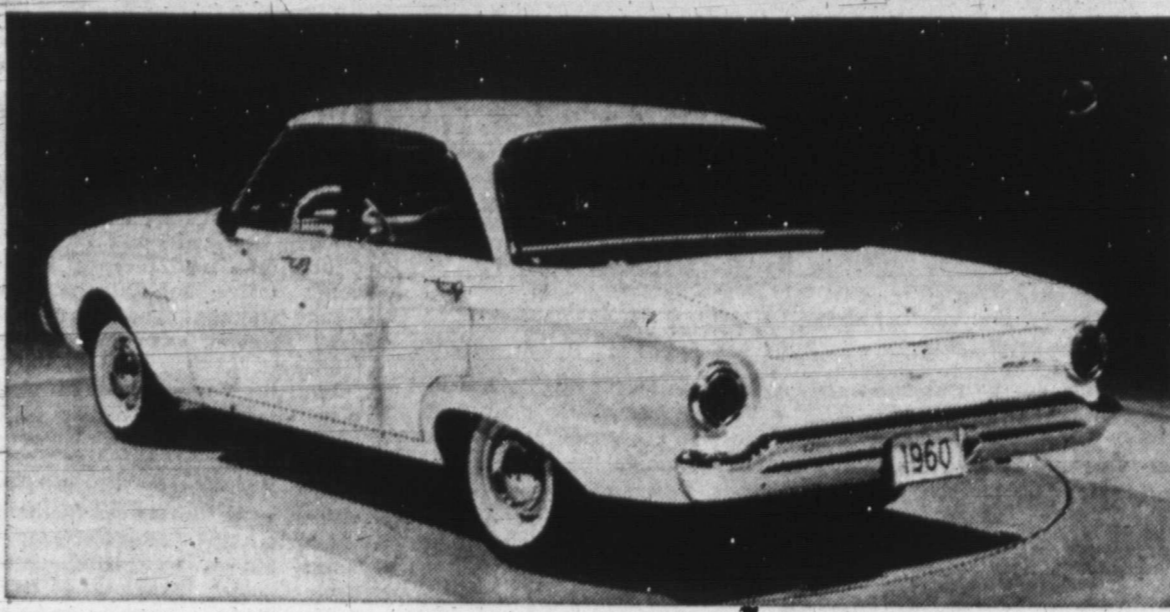

Red Chinese Treated To 'The Hard Sell'

Foreign News Commentary By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign Editor

The Chinese Reds lost little time in demonstrating they are not wholly in accord with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's current peace campaign. Khrushchev gave it the "hard sell" in Peiping.

This is not the time, he said, to "test the stability of the capitalist system by force."

At another point he told his Communist Chinese allies: "We must do everything possible to preclude war as a means for settling outstanding questions."

But scarcely were the words out of his mouth before Marshal Lin Biao, Red China's new defense minister, rose beneath a canopy of low-flying jet fighters and bombers to announce: "We will definitely liberate Taiwan and other islands."

In Lin's audience was Ho Chi Minh, whose Communist satellite Vietnamese state continued its radio blasts against the United States and the little pro-Western Indochinese state of Laos.

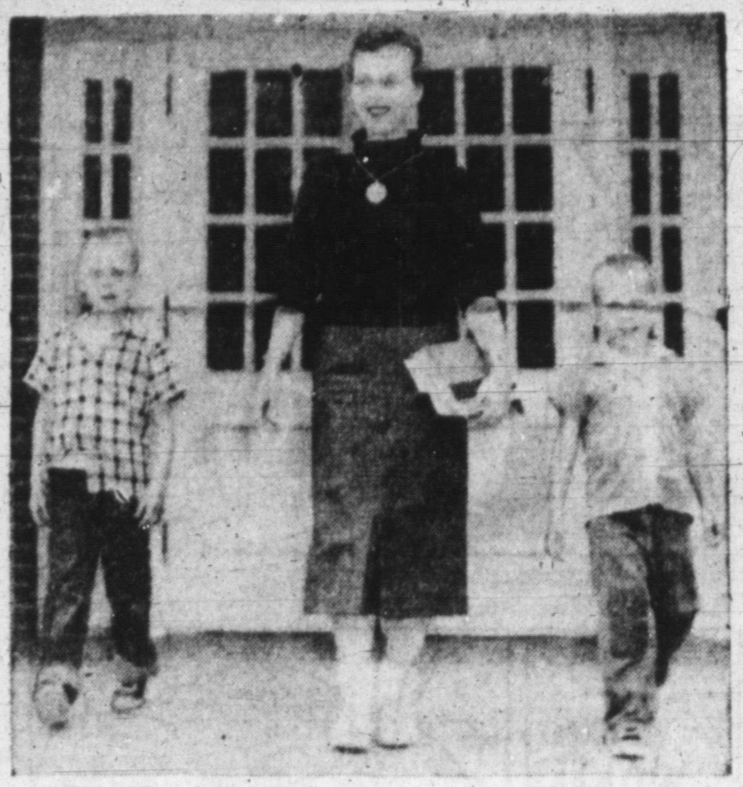
Throughout, the Chinese had no criticism but little praise for the hopeful communists which confronted the President Eisenhower-Khrushchev talks at Camp David.

On Sunday, Khrushchev left Peiping for the Soviet Siberian port of Vladivostok. There was no communique, no announced results of the long secret sessions. Just the usual Communist platitudes of friendship.

In Vladivostok, Khrushchev's silence continued a state unusual, indeed for him.

It may be considered certain that Khrushchev asked Mao not to rock the international boat at this time in his new dealings with the United States. There had been some indication that Khrushchev would ask the Chinese, as a gesture of new international goodwill to released five Americans now held in Chinese jails.

There was no sign that either had met with affirmative action. Not any of this may be taken as a weakening of the Soviet-Red Chinese axis. At the moment, each is too important to the other. Chinese reluctance to go along totally with Khrushchev's plans

Earnings, Not Dividends Liked Capital Wives

By Sophisticated Investors Tell All To 'Dear Diary'

WALL STREET CHATTER — NEW YORK (UPI) — Traditionally, investors have preferred "bird-in-the-hand" dividends to "bird-in-the-bush" earnings, but these are changing times, notes a Wall Street analyst.

As investors become more sophisticated they are putting the accent on earnings — current and future — rather than on dividends, the P-H report on business points out.

As the combined burden of federal, state and local taxes becomes heavier, more investors are realizing that earnings are the more valuable, the report says.

"When you own a stock, you get not only its current dividend return," it adds, "but also the potential . . . long-term growth in earnings due to the use of both retained earnings and depreciation reserves."

Reynolds & Co. says it still recommends Electric Storage Battery as an "attractive commitment in today's market." The firm called attention to this issue last November when it was selling at 36.

Standard & Poor's says that Westinghouse, in view of the promising growth prospects for its major product lines, retains its "long-pull" attraction at present levels in the market.

Sen. Johnson A Candidate, Rayburn Hints

BONHAM (UPI) — House Speaker Sam Rayburn has hinted strongly that Senate Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson may become a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination.

He introduced the Texas senator Wednesday to a joint meeting of Bonham civic clubs by pointing out that "Lyndon says he is not a candidate but his friends are going to have another idea about that between now and the Democratic convention."

The aging House Speaker called Johnson a man "well equipped to handle the highest office granted by the people of the United States."

Then he added, "I have been watching leaders in the Senate for many years and Lyndon Johnson is the greatest leader I have ever seen."

Johnson earlier denied that he is a candidate shortly after publication of a copyrighted story appeared in a Dallas newspaper that quoted close sources as saying he would probably make up his mind about being a candidate within two weeks.

The story quoted the sources as saying Johnson would seek the nomination if a "moderate" movement developed in the party. Johnson is considered the most conservative of several Democratic presidential possibilities.

TOO MUCH TALKING

LONDON (UPI) — Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's campaign manager, Lord Hallahan, refused to make any prediction on the outcome of today's general election.

"The only news I have got this morning is that my false teeth have hurt," he told a news conference. "They just gave way under the unusual strain."

Just a week earlier, Texas A&M's closing-minutes bid to change a 20-14 Texas Tech lead was thwarted by the Tech center.

The Aggies' Jesse McGuire, seeking his third touchdown, juggled a high pitchout as he crossed the goal line. Into the end zone rolled the ball with McGuire in hot pursuit to gain possession for a tying touchdown. But across his path lunged Holub, who batted the ball out of bounds for an automatic touchback.

The Aggies had one more chance. Charlie Milstead, the nation's No. 4 total offense man last season, took to the air. Holub knocked down one throw and on the next play barreled in to throw Milstead for a seven-yard loss.

It was just a year previously that Holub had crashed through to block Texas A&M's field goal try with two minutes left and Tech ahead 15-14.

Holub doesn't wait until the closing stages to play football, however. He was in on 21 tackles against the Aggies and 18 against Oregon State.

And, only last Saturday night, his big play (and Tech's, too) came in the third quarter when he slammed into the Tulsa safety man and jarred the ball loose for a Tech recovery that set up Tech's touchdown in the 87 victory.

Such play led Texas A&M Coach Jim Myers to term Holub "the best line-backer I've seen since Don Moomaw of UCLA and Les Richter of California."

Holub's own coach, DeWitt Weaver—a dye-in-the-wool Tennessee alumnus—says he thinks E. J. is even a bit better than Tennessee's all-time great, Bob Sutfridge.

NEW YORK CITY CONSIDERS PLANS FOR NEW BALL PARK

NEW YORK (UPI)—A proposal by the new Continental baseball league.

The other was the approval of a stadium bond issue in the Dallas area.

Voters in Dallas and Tarrant Counties, in Texas approved a special referendum by an unofficial 2-1 margin for floating a special bond issue to finance a 45,000-seat stadium at Arlington, Tex. The new park, to be located between Dallas and Fort Worth, would cost \$2,500,000.

Shea said passage of the bond issue does not automatically assure Dallas-Fort Worth a franchise, but enables the team sponsors to "get together with their financial people" to submit final plans for league approval and acceptance.

Two other cities, Atlanta and Honolulu, have made efforts to obtain continental league franchises, but their prospects appear uncertain, according to Shea.

Wynn, Podres Start in Sixth Game

CHICAGO (UPI)—Early Wynn, a righthander with a sore elbow and Johnny Podres, a left hander with an ailing back, carried the pitching hopes of the Chicago White Sox and the Los Angeles Dodgers in the sixth game of the World Series today.

Although he has had only two days rest, Wynn was called upon by Manager Al Lopez of the White Sox to keep their series hopes alive. They faced sudden death, trailing the Dodgers three

games to two in this best four out of seven game series.

Manager Walt Alton went along with Podres, the winner of the second game, confident that he would close it out and bring to the West Coast its first world's baseball championship.

"He tells me his back feels okay," Alton said, "so there isn't any reason why he shouldn't beat them again."

Wynn said his sore right elbow was "okay" and that he was "honored" by being selected to keep the White Sox in the running.

The 39-year-old star, who won 22 games during the regular season, won the first game, 11-0, leaving in the eighth inning when his elbow stiffened. He started the fourth game in Los Angeles and was knocked out in the fourth inning when the Dodgers scored four runs, set up for the most part by inept White Sox fielding.

"There's no reason to save myself, now," Wynn observed. "We

have got to win today or there isn't any tomorrow, so it doesn't matter how much rest I've had. I'm honored that the skipper picked me because both Billy Pierce and Dick Donovan are ready to go, too."

With a southpaw going against them, Lopez said he would stick to the lineup which won the fifth game in Los Angeles Tuesday, 1-0. That means Bubba Phillips will play third base with Jim McAnany in left field, Sherman Lol-

lar will be in the cleanup spot in the batting order.

Makes Lineup Change

Alton made one lineup change, putting Duke Snider, who had been out with his chronic ailing knee, in center field. That gives him six left-handed hitters, counting Podres, in his batting order.

The Sox, who again will wear the black stockings they wore in the fifth game, were glad to get back to brick-walled Comiskey Park.

"It feels good to be back in a real ball park," said Nellie Fox. "That Coliseum park is for the birds—not baseball."

Lopez said he was happy to be back home, too.

Neither Lopez nor Alton would speculate on their seventh game pitcher—if a seventh game is necessary. However, Alton was expected to go with either Don Drysdale, the third game winner, or his relief ace, Larry Sherry, if Sherry is not needed today.

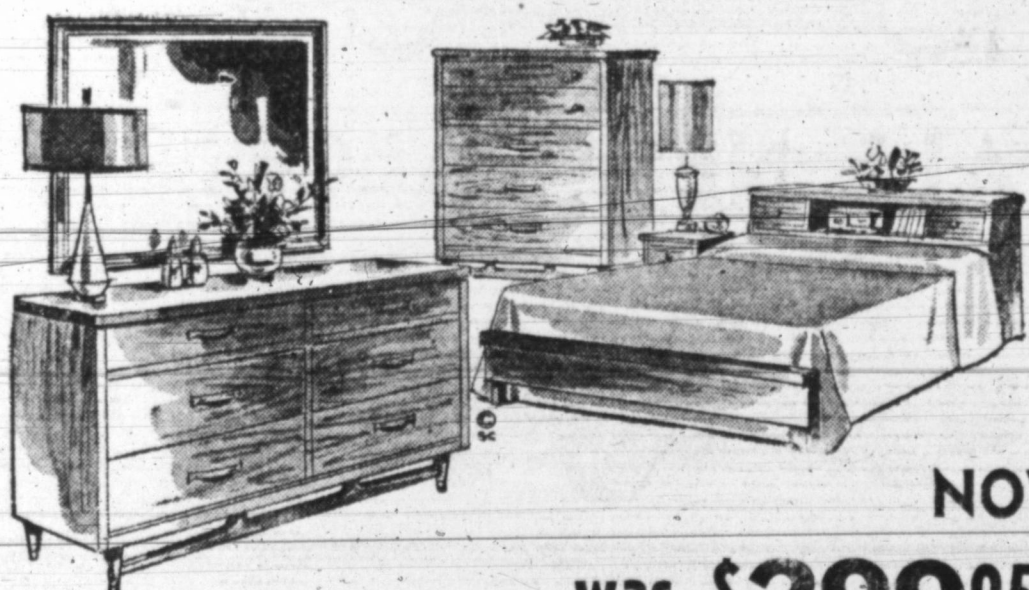

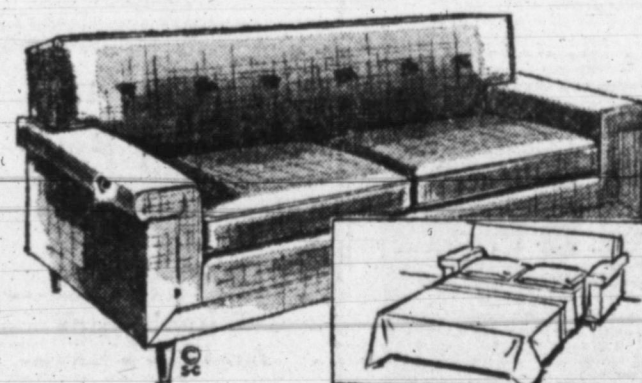
