Snow, Colder Weather To Hit Panhandle Tonight

The Weather Bureau at Amar-Illo today predicted the winter season's first snowfall in the upper Panhandle today and tonight, with 2-4 inches expected in Dalhart.

Snow was expected to fall as far south as Amarillo

sas. Oklahoma and eastern Color ado and New Mexico.




anyone in need, even if it be your arch enemy.



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


