ident seeking his support for a resolution to repeal the clause. The reservation was authored years ago by Sen. Tom Connally (D-Tex.).  
The President said that elimination of it now would "contribute to the greater effectiveness" of the court.  
"One of the great purposes of this administration," Eisenhower said, "has been to advance the rule of law in the world, through actions directly by the United States government and in concert with the governments of other countries."  
He said the United Nations and U. S. defense pacts with other free world nations have provided a "powerful deterrent against international law-breaking" but this was not enough.

The President cited Hungary and Tibet as examples of how a stronger World Court could have come into action if it had held jurisdiction.  
Eisenhower also stressed in his letter the importance of devising effective means of controlling and reducing armaments. "Success in this quest will bring great security to all countries and lift the threat of devastating nuclear conflict," he said.

First South American country to electrify its roads was Chile, which did so with a section between Santiago and Valparaiso.

**Berlin Crisis Anniversary Passes Quietly**

BERLIN (UPI) — The first anniversary of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's demand for the withdrawal of Western troops from Berlin came today, with 11,000 U.S., British and French soldiers still present for duty.

West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt declared in a speech that his Communist-encircled city is not only still free but is economically stronger than ever.  
He told 1,800 German civil leaders that the Soviet effort to take over the city has failed so far.

Last Nov. 27, Khrushchev presented a six-month ultimatum to the West, demanding that West Berlin be stripped of its defenses and left as an unguarded "free city" more than 100 miles behind the Iron Curtain.

Pamper Hands During Winter

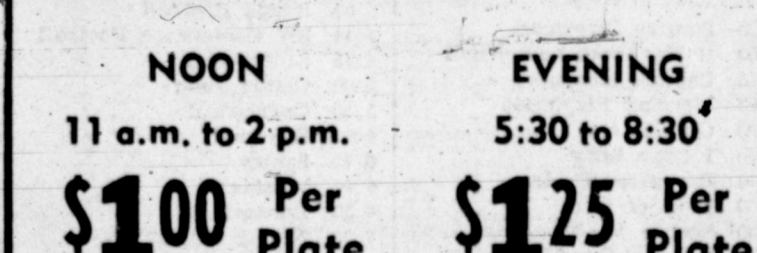

NEW YORK (UPI)—A Vermont grandmother would put Hollywood talent scouts to shame. She traveled thousands of miles over back roads in snowstorms and spring thaws to round up craftsmen for shows and state fairs.

Mrs. Reita Litz, 44, of Pittsford, Vt., was commissioned in 1937 as the director of the New York-Vermont-Champain festival crafts fairs. This meant finding craftsmen in New York and Vermont to display their wares.

Of the 800 craftsmen whom Mrs. Litz contacted personally, 174 are taking part in the annual women's international exposition which is being held here this week. Forty-eight booths display thousands of items from hand-wrought sterling and ceramics to hand-made candles and jewelry of Vermont marble and quartz.

Mrs. Litz, who has four grandchildren, worked 21 months organizing the project and traveled more than 30,000 miles. Most of her time was spent driving alone—over dirt roads in the wilderness of Vermont mountains.

"It took a lot of doing and keeping on and on and on," she said in an interview. "In one place, there was no road leading up a mountain. I had to drive to the top to find a woman in her 70's who makes dried apple dolls. I went up that mountain with my fingers crossed."

The weather alone would have daunted less hardy souls. Often the mercury went down to 28 degrees below zero. Snow storms blinded her path. But she had only one mishap. About two o'clock one morning, her car skidded on ice and went off the road. Several hours passed before she was able to get help. At other times she had to plow through deep mud and encountered deer, bob bats and porcupines.

"But the only time I got lost was — not in Vermont — but in Greenwich Village in New York City," she said.

Mrs. Litz' interest in crafts began with China painting, people thought I was rather queer because no one did it," she said.

## Recent Congress Not The Pinchpenny It Was Labeled

WASHINGTON WINDOW BY LYLE C. WILSON United Press International

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Tax Foundation, Inc., of New York comes up now with a chilling reminder that the 1959 session of Congress was a spenderbund and not the economy operation it was advertised to be.

More responsible for this than any others are the taxpayers themselves. The taxpayers also are voters. This automatically gives them powers of awesome finality over the careers of congressional statesmen. These congressional statesmen are the very ones who pass the legislation for which the taxpayers or their grandchildren—must pick up the tab.

Taxpayers should know that the foundation offers simple evidence that the story of economy in the first session of the 86th Congress was mostly malarkey. This is true despite the unchallenged fact that President Eisenhower bucked the spenders with vetoes and threats of vetoes and with considerable success.

Spending In Future  
"An important omission in most analyses of congressional budgetary (spending) action in the session just ended is their failure to reveal the very significant impact some actions will have on future federal spending."  
"For example, Budget Director Maurice H. Stans and others have pointed out recently that there is enough built-in momentum in the commitments under present laws and programs to raise total expenditures in 1961 by two or three billion dollars."  
Stans has estimated that congressional actions in the past session would increase federal spending after 1959 by almost 1 1/2 billion. He estimated that about 10 billion of this predicted increase would derive over a 40-year period.

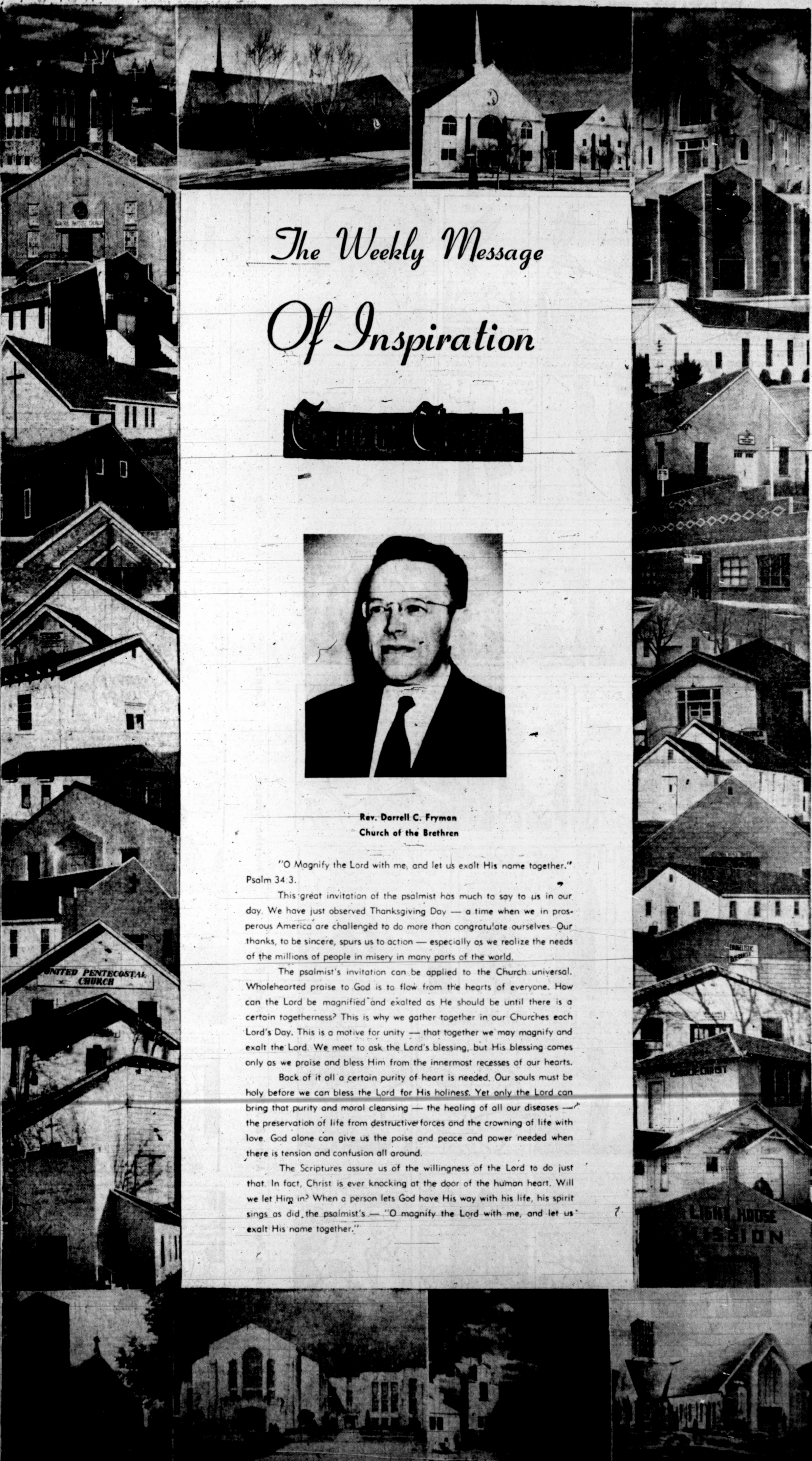
"O Magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt His name together."  
Psalm 34:3.

This great invitation of the psalmist has much to say to us in our day. We have just observed Thanksgiving Day — a time when we in prosperous America are challenged to do more than congratulate ourselves. Our thanks, to be sincere, spurs us to action — especially as we realize the needs of the millions of people in misery in many parts of the world.

The psalmist's invitation can be applied to the Church universal. Wholehearted praise to God is to flow from the hearts of everyone. How can the Lord be magnified and exalted as He should be until there is a certain togetherness? This is why we gather together in our Churches each Lord's Day. This is a motive for unity — that together we may magnify and exalt the Lord. We meet to ask the Lord's blessing, but His blessing comes only as we praise and bless Him from the innermost recesses of our hearts.

Back of it all a certain purity of heart is needed. Our souls must be holy before we can bless the Lord for His holiness. Yet only the Lord can bring that purity and moral cleansing — the healing of all our diseases — the preservation of life from destructive forces and the crowning of life with love. God alone can give us the poise and peace and power needed when there is tension and confusion all around.

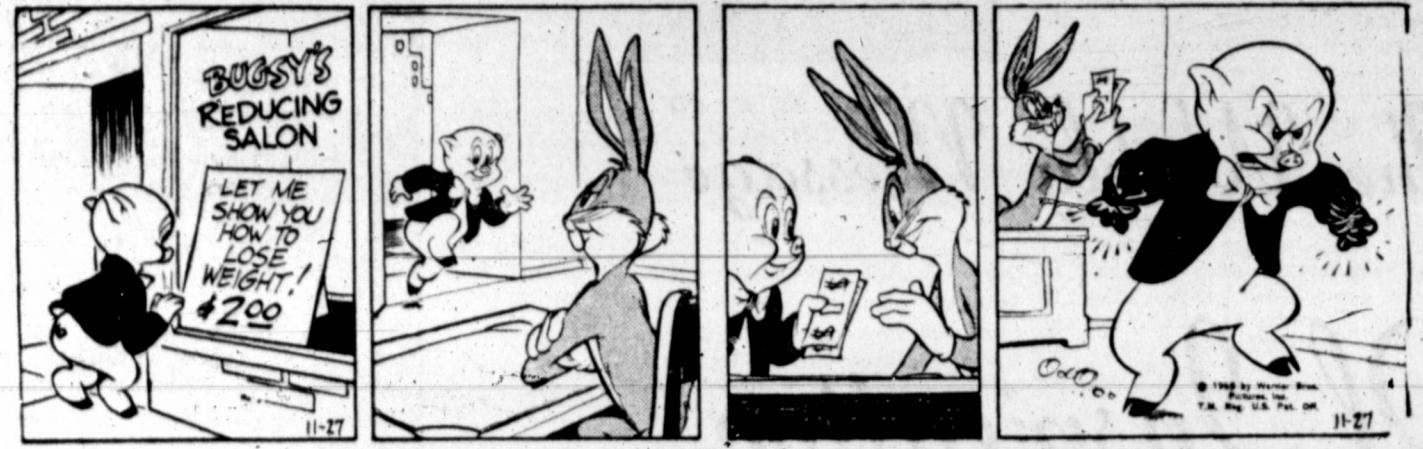

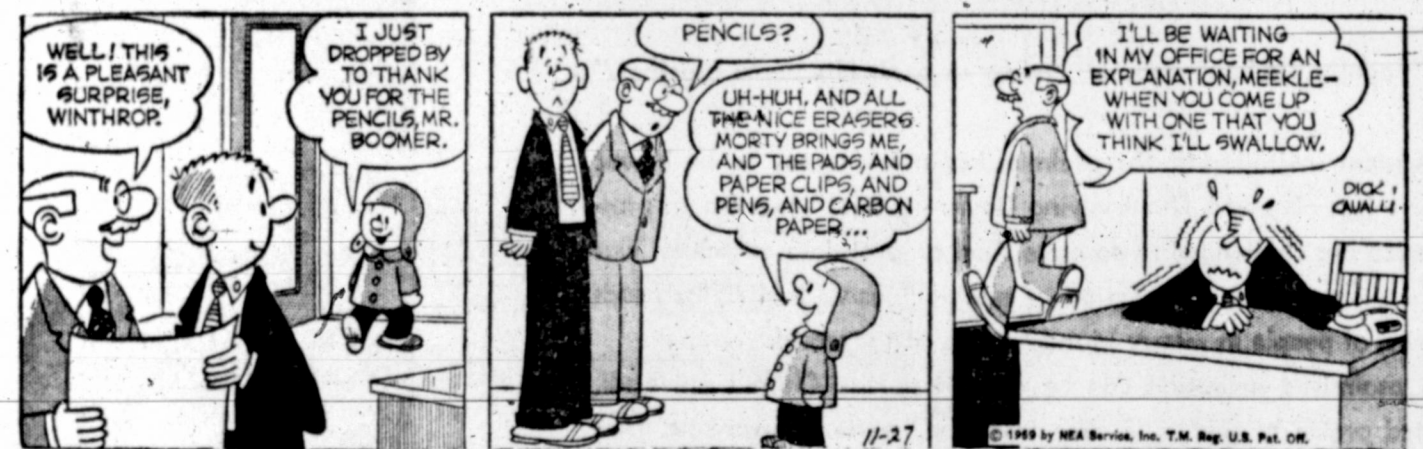

## Longhorns Clinch Cotton Bowl Bid

While some folks nursed holiday indignation, officials of the Cotton Bowl licked their chops today over the completed bidding for their New Year's Day game—top-ranked Syracuse vs. fourth-ranked Texas.

The Longhorns won the right to represent the Southwest Conference in the Dallas classic by turning back a fighting Texas A&M team, 20-17, Thursday in one of the greatest thrillers in the 66-year history of this storied series.

Texas, a 10-point favorite, picked up only one first down in the first half and left the field at intermission trailing 10-0. A pair of touchdowns by Mike Dowdle enabled the Longhorns to open a 14-0 lead early in the final quarter but the Aggies went ahead again on quarterback Charley Milstead's second touchdown pass of the game—a five-yard flip to end Jack Estes.

Then, with less than 2 1/2 minutes remaining, quarterback Bobby Lackey climaxed a 75-yard march by sneaking over from the one for the Longhorns' winning touchdown.

Syracuse, which accepted a bid to the Cotton Bowl almost two weeks ago, was represented by two scouts at Thursday's game. However, head coach Darrell Royal of the Longhorns admitted "we haven't scouted Syracuse and frankly I haven't even read much about them."

The Cotton Bowl game should be one of the best of the post-season classics, matched only by a possible meeting between second-ranked Mississippi and third-ranked Louisiana State in the Sugar Bowl. Ole Miss reportedly will accept a berth opposite LSU in New Orleans if it whips archival Mississippi State as expected Saturday.

Pennsylvania and Virginia Military also celebrated Thanksgiving Day by wrapping up conference titles. Penn won the Ivy League crown by gaining an uphill 28-13 victory over Cornell while VMI surprised Virginia Tech, 37-12, in a showdown clash for the Southern Conference championship. Cornell was leading Penn, 13-0,

Both teams drilled Thursday, the Cadets at West Point following the annual Thanksgiving home base at Annapolis. And both, as expected, put the finishing touches on their passing game.

Working in sweat-soaked, the first three Army teams ran against Navy defenses and brushed up their timing on running and passing plays. Accompanying quarterback Joe Caldwell and halfback Bob Anderson in the first team backfield were sophomore George Kirschenbauer and Al Ruzhask. 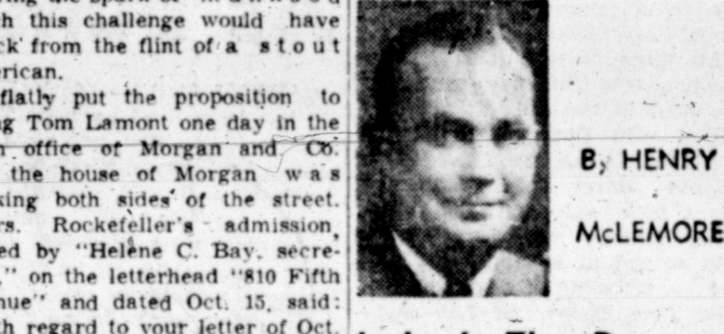

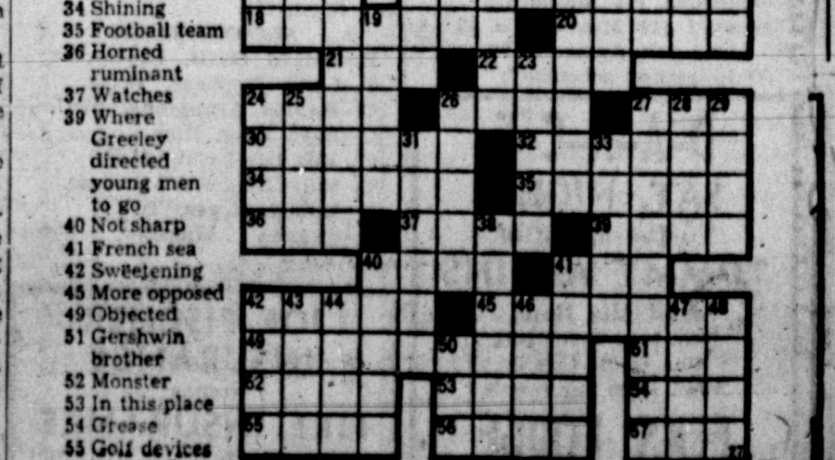
