More than 150 division chairmen, team captains and workers got off to a rousing start at 8:15 a.m. today following a breakfast at 7 and speeches by campaign officials in the Robert E. Lee Junlor High School cafeteria.

The morning's principal address was delivered by Melvin T. Munn, drive publicity chairman, who called this year's Pampa-Lefors United Fund goal "practical."

There are two kinds of discontent in this world - the discontent that works and the discontent that wrings its hands. The first gets what it wants and the second loses what it wants.

"For two short weeks, Pampa and Lefors must be discontented until the needs of our neighbors, our children and our own families have been met"! Munn declared.

Munn described the "united method", as the best possible means of approaching the public. He said one campaign is "efficient, less costly and more likely to suc-Workers were charged with suc-

cess. The speaker pointed out that what is accomplished in the next 14 days will determine "how much you care 'about people.'

In concluding, Munn warned: "If we fall short - may the thought never occur - let us at least be honest. Let there be no celebration October 27th, but, rather, a quiet reporting of our failure to finish the work, then back to our safe, sane, insulated little worlds to await the fading of man's mem-
