

"LONDON (UPI) - Radio Mosgow got so mad at Harry S. Truman Monday night it called him a bark beetle

A political commentary heard here said the former U.S. President fathered the cold war, that he goes into a frenzy at the thought of a nuclear weapons testing ban, that he is out of step with history and is hysterical.





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# **Counter-Revolutionaries Say Anti-Castro Violence Looms**

HAVANA (NEA) - The first nti-Castro bombs are set to explode about the end of November, according to the present Cuban underground timetable here (subject to usual change without notice).

Counter . revolutionaries assert in clandestine interviews that they have enough guns and more than army at bay. They aren't ready to go all-out vet. The reasons, in the words of sev-

eral anti-Castro leaders: 1. "The economic conditions in





STORM STALKERS-Scientists have come up with another weapon-in their growing attack on the secrets of weather. Severe storms and squalls anywhere in the U.S. can be detected and tracked by means of a system that tunes into radio signals generated by lightning strokes called "sferies" (from "atmospherics"). Map above shows where a Sferies Locating System, sponsored by the Air Force, has gone into operation. Signals from an outlying point are relayed to a central station where an electronic plotter pinpoints the slorm. One possibility is the early detection and identifying of tornadoes.
