Agnew Delivers 'Farewell' Talk

Spiro T. Agnew has said goodnight to the Americans who

He faded from the American political scene in a sad televised speech to the nation Monday night in which he protested his innocence of criminal wrongdoing, said he was driven from the nation's second highest office by the testimony of frightened men trying to save themselves and admitted nothing except the possibility he had violated a 'new post-Watergate morality."

The former vice president gave no accounting in his 22minute address for cash contributions he has acknowledged receiving from Maryland contractors in 1967 and acknowledged spending "for nonpolitical purposes.

Nor did he address the specifics of the U.S. government's charges in U.S. District Court last Wednesday that he had received cash payments totalling at least \$87,500 from those contractors, beginning while he was governor of Maryland and continuing long after he became vice president. He Attacks Media

He confined himself, instead, to an attack on the news media for publishing leaked stories about the government's case against him, an assault on pleabargaining and an expression of continued loyalty to President

The speech was without precedent in American political history. It was deliveredunemotionally and calmly-just five days after Agnew stood before a federal judge in Baltimore, pleaded no contest to a 1967 tax evasion charge, resigned the office he held for five years and accepted a judge's verdict of three years'

probation and a \$10,000 fine. While I am fully aware that the plea of nolo contendere was the equivalent of a plea of guilty for the purpose of that negotiated proceeding in Baltimore, it does not represent a confession of any guilt whatever for any other purpose." he

He said he had decided not to fight the government's charges because "the American people deserve to have a vice president who commands their unimpaired confidence and implicit trust. For more than two months now, you have not had such a vice president.

Agonizing Period Cited

"If I had remained in office. and fought to vindicate myself through the courts and the Congress, it would have meant subjecting the country to a further agonizing period of months without an unclouded successor for the presidency.

Agnew said his claim days before his resignation that he would not resign even if indicted was a "tormented verbal

The latest price hikes, which also apply to diesel fuel and home heating oil, range up to 11/2 cents a gallon, but most dealers will get less than a penny a gallon increase

(A check of several service stations in Pampa this morning revealed the price hikes allowed to gasoline retailers by the Cost of Living Council Monday have not gone into effect as yet.

(Those talked to either said hey had not heard about the increase or they had heard of it but were awaiting word from their wholesale suppliers as to actly what increase they could make.)

After allowing the increases the CLC clamped a two-week price freeze on the three petroleum products and set a new price control formula beginning Nov. 1. The new formula will allow automatic increases to flow from refiner to service station in jumps of a penny a gallon.

Both Leaders Announce Conditions To End War

By United Press International Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir announced today, without giving details, that Israeli troops are operating west of the Suez canal behind the massive Egyptian force poised across the waterway. President Anwar Sadat threatened to retailiate with missiles if Israel strikes the Egyptian heartland.

Israeli Troops Operating

Behind Egyptian Forces

In speeches within hours of each other, the Egyptian and Israeli leaders laid down their first conditions for an end to the fighting in the Middle East war which began with the surprise Egyptian and Syrian attacks on

Sadat told the Egyptian Parliament in Cairo in an "open letter" to President Nixon that there could be an immediate cease-fire and reopening of the Suez canal if Israel would withdraw from the Arab territory it occcupied during the six-day war in 1967.

Mrs. Meir said Israel has received no cease-fire proposal but would not accept an end to the fighting unless it provides for a complete exchange of prisoners:

"Eygpt and Syria have not been hit hard enough to want a cease-fire." she told a special meeting of the Israeli Knesset (Parliament) in Jerusalem.

The rival speeches came amid ground, air and sea action on both the northern front between Israel and Syria and the southern front between

Russia was supplying the Arab states and a U.S. airlift was bringing urgent replacement arms for Israel, which has lost large numbers of tanks and up to a quarter of her first line aircraft in the ll days of fighting

The situation already threatened the detente between the superpowers. Ironically, the fighting went on as Secretary of State Henry A: Kissinger shared the Nobel Peace Prize with Le Duc Tho of North Vietnam for their negotiations in arranging a cease-fire half a

When the Nobel announcement came. Kissinger was meeting with Nixon in the White House about the Middle East

The decisive battle appeared Egyptian territory occupied by Israel in 1967. Egypt has been able to push up to 100,000 troops and large numbers of tanks across the Suez canal and from five to eight miles east of the

Meir's claim that Israeli forces were operating on the westtern bank behind the waterway so

Mrs. Meir again blamed the Soviet Union for planning and supplying the equipment for the the unneeded moisture out into

Arab attack. She charged that the aim of the Arabs was "the occupation and destruction of the state...their true intentions (being) the extermination" of Israel It was a charge Sadat denied

in advance. His rasping baritone interrupted by bursts of applause. Sadat announced Egypt's terms for a ceasefire in his hour-long speech, in which he castigated American aid to Israel. Calling his speech "an open

letter" to President Nixon. Sadat said the United States was aiding the "aggressor" by shipping arms to Israel. He said that Egypt favored the detente between the two super powers.

But this cannot take place as long as there is aggression in the Middle East -the most strategic region of the world.

'We are prepared to agree to a cease-fire at this moment and to reopen the Suez canal, if the Israelis withdraw from all occupied territory." Sadat said. referring to the lands which Israeli occupied in the Sinai and the Golan Heights of Syria during the six-day war of 1967. Initial preparating for clearing the 102-mile waterway, closed by sunken ships since the 1967 war, have already begun, Sadat

We do not seek the extermination of Israel, as they (the Israelis) claim." Sadat said, but warned against deep penetration into Egypt attacks on Cairo -by Israeli forces during the current

the lines into both countries. The 11th day of the 1973 Middle East War saw Syrian and Iraqi troops counterattacking against an Israeli spearhead bogged down 22 miles from the Syrian capital of Damascus. In the south, Egyptian tanks tried again to break through the Israeli containment line in the Sinai peninsula on the

eastern bank of the Suez canal. Israeli headquarters said its men, with massive air support. were "warding off" the Arab pushes on both fronts in what military analysts saw as the prelude to even bigger battles that may determine the out-





UPI Capitol Reporter AUSTIN (UPI)-For the sixth time in eight years. Texas legislators are asking voters to raise their salaries.

This time, the lawmakers say, they've earned the pay increase by restoring public confidence in government and passing the strongest ethics law in the state's history.

The pay increase. Amendment No. 1 on the Nov. 6 ballot, would raise the annual salary for members of the House and Senate from \$4,800 to \$15,000, and raise the expense allowance granted each member during legislative sessions from \$12 to \$18 a day.

The amendment would also have other far-reaching effects.

It would abolish the current system of having the legislature meet every two years, and set up annual sessions to permit lawmakers to meet 180 days in odd-numbered years and 69days in even numbered years. **Would Set Limits**

The annual sessions would also abandon the current system of drafting state budgets

Kathy's query illustrates the widespread belief of children that adults NEVER are afraid! So relieve their inner tensions by a "Fear Party." for it will often change their entire future life. It will also avoid your facing that "generation gap"

typical of many timid toddlers. "Daddy," she asked, "are

you afraid of the dark, too?" And that was the heading of a very attractive full page advertisement by Metropolitan Life Insurance Co., many months ago.

It so beautifully illustrates my emphasis on "Fear Parties" for kiddies, that I clipped it out of the magazine.

For youngsters often are afflicted with all sorts of inner tensions and turmoil

They hesitate to confess such fears, lest they be regarded as 'chicken" or "sissies."

Yet their repression of such phobias makes them neurotic and leads to many behavior problems when they enter school

Parents are usually regarded as giants and giantesses in physical size, for Kathy's daddyis twice her height and 6 times her weight

If you adults wish to regain this toddler outlook on the world, just try to imagine that you are now surrounded by men who are all 12 feet tall and weighing 1,000 pounds.

And the women adults, as mothers, teachers, sales clerks and waitresses, would be over 11 feet tall and-weighing 750 pounds.

That's the giant adult world in which little Kathy is living. Moreover, we adult giants

seem omniscient to kiddies, forwe know when Kathy has been into mischief during our absence, though she can't figure out how, for she thinks "You didn't see me do it."

In numerous addresses before State Teachers Conventions, I have thus urged teachers to devote an hour to a "Fear Party," wherein they casually mention one of their own terrors when they were a child.

One 4th grade teacher started such a "confessional" by telling how she was terrified of snakes when she was 9 years old

And how her brothers made her life miserable thereafter by scaring her with snakes.

Individual opponents, however, contend that taxes and the cost of government are already too high, and that legislative salaries should not be increased. Annual sessions also would contribute to escalating state spending, opponents say.

There has been speculation that recent publicity about a house feud over purchase of an \$850,000 voting machine, and concerning a newsletter sent out by Hobby might damage chances of the amendments passage



Congress Taking Look At Commodities Market

WASHINGTON (LIPI) - Re cord high food prices this year have drawn the attention of Congress to the commodities markets, where speculators make and lose fortunes on obscure items such as No. 2 shell corn and frozen porkbel-

To many Americans, these markets may seem mundane in their products and exotic in their workings, but the prices of bread, meat and clothing are partly influenced by them.

The only public regulation of the \$268 billion annual commodities trading comes from the Commodity Exchange Authority (CEA), a tiny federal agency with 17 regulatory professionals and a budget that matches the annual federal outlay for construction at the National Zoo.

The House Agriculture Committee said it would open hearings Tuesday on the possibility of strengthening the CEA to protect the public interest

With the cost of food rising because of increasing world demand, devalued dollars and inflation, the committee said it would also look for evidence of artificial stimulation of prices on the commodities exchanges.

The House small business subcommittee of Rep. Neal Smith, D-lowa, completed hearings two weeks ago, after which Smith said he believed that the CEA did not know what was

market Prices on commodities exchanges doubled this summer for soybeans, corn and durum wheat. The price of cotton soared from 27 cents a pound in 1972 to 99 cents last month, the highest level since the Civil

happening in the commodities

Under present law, the exchanges regulate trading and make periodic summary reports to the CEA. But traders found to manipulate prices are treated lightly if they are exchange members, according to Agriculture Department of-

These officials also complained that dual reports are filed by exchanges in cases of alleged manipulation. A report for exchange members is detailed, they said, but the public summary is so vague that one Agriculture Department examiner said he could not tell "whether the weather or a trade'' was under

TV In Review

By Rick Du Brow HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - It's not often that a single television program brings a new look to the home medium, but there was such a broadcast during the weekend on NBC-TV: "Burt Reynolds at Leavenworth Peni-

Ever since most live video entertainment shows went thataway, network television has had a notoriously neat, precise, ultra-organized and often pantywaist quality. But the 90-minute Reynolds entrythe first of an occasional series of late-night specials featuring the star-had an amiably roughneck tone that somehow managed to get through the home screen with its raw, real. unmanicured substance intact.

The achievement was surprising because the essential format was so simple: Wellknown performers entertaining the inmates, and prisoners with musical talent showing their

When a video program has enough life-force of its own to avoid the finishing touches of the Madison Avenue or Hollywood mentalities, it can radiate a natural energy that is highly attractive, and an individualism that stems from relief in itself and in the project it is undertaking. There was little doubt that "Burt Reynolds at Leavenworth Penitentiary* had a strong life-force that seemed drawn from the involvement of the show business performers and the inmates with each other on a human, person-to-person basis.

Until the weekend debut of his series. Reynolds had two basic images as a performer: In movies, he came across as a controlled, contained but nonetheless natural and earthily appealing leading man. On video (aside from his routine action series, "Hawk" and 'Dan August," both of which he could have sleepwalked through), he registered as something of a glib, wisecracking fellow. It was sometimes difficult to think of Reynolds the movie star and Reynolds the television guest as one and the

same performer. But in his weekend Leavenworth program, Reynolds genuinely broke new ground for himself as well as for television. For while he showed some of the familiar glibness in his opening monologue and at other times throughout the broadcast. he was, above all, a man caught up emotionally in the spirit of his program—and the rapport with the inmates-and, unlike many home screen show it. The show wasn't especially neat or precise, and neither was Reynolds, but both were real and you. Getting through the home

screen to viewers on a real basis is probably the toughest thing for a television performer to do. Jack Paar managed to do it, as a late-night host, in a weekly talk-and-variety series and in his marvelous personal documentaries. Reynolds could not be more different from Paar, and yet in his Leavenworth broadcast he displayed, in his own way, some of the same qualities - cut the nonsense, the heck with the way things are supposed to be done, let's break out of the standard television package concept and do things our own way, no matter what happens.

Many people make a habit of

tems that could never be replaced should be stored in fire resistant cabinets or lock boxes. In short, throw out the unnecessary junk, while packaging and arranging those things you must save in proper containers.

And, be sure your attic vents are clear of leaves and debris, with fine screening protecting them from entry of foreign

THE GARAGE: This can also be the source of fire. Keep it neat and orderly. Do not use it for storage of things you are going to throw away someday," especially newspapers, rags, old clothing. etc. And, above all, see to it that no greasy rags are left in waste cans or piles. (We'll cover this

THE CRAWL SPACE: If you have no basement, you no doubt have a crawl space under the house. Frequently, depending on how tight your foundation and ventilation openings, leaves and other trash will accumulate here. Go under the house and

storing old newspapers, and clean out all unnecessary material.

YOUR BASEMENT: This is probably the most difficult area of all to keep free of fire hazard. As with the attic, neat, orderly and proper packaging are the

keys to successful storage without danger. Flammables. in small quantities are best stored here due to the lower temperatures year 'round. But, they should be kept under lock and key to prevent misuse by curious youngsters.

THE EAVES, GUTTERING AND DOWNSPOUTS: Eaves always have ventilation openings. These should be kept clear of dried leaves and debris. The same holds true for guttering and downspouts. If a neighbor's house should burn. few things make it easier to endanger your home than gutters full of leaves and tree







When the continent-wide charity game of the American Contract Bridge League takes place on Dec. 14, at least a hundred thousand people will play the same hands. When they finish they will be given an expert analysis which will attempt to cover many of the possible results.

Today's hand was played in the spring charity game. The analysts point out that most South players would arrive at four spades after very simple bidding. They also point out that four spades can be beaten. Jack of hearts lead to East's

ace. Eight of hearts return as a suit preference signal to ask for a diamond lead next. Ruff by West; diamond return to the ace and a second heart ruff.

The analysts also point out that nothing can hurt a fourheart contract, but don't see how to get there. We agree with that. In fact, we doubt if anyone actually did

play this hand in hearts. Furthermore we doubt if even a corporal's guard of players found that killing defense. Even if the jack of hearts is opened and East clatters up with the ace, South will drop his queen. East is not likely to lead a heart back.



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


The top rusher in the league's history was Chris Gilbert of Texas, who carried for 3,231





WASHINGTON (NEA) - The Egyptian - Syrian Yom Kippur assault upon Israeli - occupied territory probably reflects the two nations' judgment that, without an improved Arab military position, there is no hope of negotiating with Israel on a basis acceptable to the

They want a return to boundaries fixed before the 1967 Six Day War, and the Israelis have said firmly that they will never agree to withdraw from all the land gained in their sweeping victory that year.

The long-static condition in the Mideast conflict zone has tended to undermine Egyptian President Sadat's credibility as a leader pressing for return to old boundaries. He and other Arab leaders also have been disillusioned that no great power efforts at settlement have even begun to produce the kind of results the Arabs desire.

No diplomatic experts here at the State Department, or anywhere else, seem entirely clear as to Egyptian - Syrian motives. But it is thought that, at the very least, they want to shake up the situation in order to compel negotiations which would follow the course they seek. An established Arab military presence in the Israeli occupied zones may be seen in Cairo and Damascus as a key

The difficulty with this thesis. if it is the one governing Egyptian - Syrian action, is that failure to hold the bridgeheads gained by surprise religious holiday attack may only harden Israeli attitude toward prospective negotiations.

In a policy declaration written months ago. Israeli Prime Minister Golda Meir restated clearly her country's basic stance with regard to the occupied Sinai desert, a 120 mile - wide stretch which before the 1967 war was sovereign Egyptian soil.

Israel has long been willing to yield some - but not all - of this territory in negotiations, but she insists upon retaining a buffer zone to keep potential Arab attackers well away from the old Israeli boundary. according to Mrs. Meir.

With an election coming up Oct. 30. Mrs. Meir's hard - line right wing opposition has been pushing against any concessions. The new war puts the campaign on ice for the moment, but it may also move Mrs. Meir's Labor party closer to this hard view, on the ground that the Arabs once more have demonstrated their untrustworthiness by breaking the 1967 cease - fire agreement and breaching the lines then

accepted by both sides. With the United Nations General Assembly heavily weighted in the Arabs' favor and the U.N. Security Council hindered by the Chinese -Russian veto threat from any action which would not be favorable to the Arabs, Egypt and Syria might welcome a U.N. call for a quick cease - fire in this fourth Mideast war.

This presumes, however, an Arab capacity to hold at least some of their newly - won bridgeheads across the Suez Canal and in the old Syrian Goran Heights which allow Arab artillery to dominate and

harass nearby Israeli farms. It presumes also that the U.N. might reinterpret, to the Arabs' advantage, a 1967 resolution which they read as calling for full Israeli withdrawal from occupied zones and which Israel reads as assuring Tel Aviv that it may keep lands necessary to preserve its defensible boundaries.

Arab success in the current venture is obviously vital to such hopes. If the attackers are thrown back, the present lines may be hardened for years to

CRIME RATE.

There was an overall reduction of crime in the United States during the first six months of 1973, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has reported. The cut amounted to one per cent, the FBI said, but the figure can be deceiving, it was pointed out. Violent crime was actually up four per cent. and that includes murder. which showed a nine per cent boost. The overall decline was registered because of a two per cent cut in crime against property. As usual, there were more offenses in that category than in any other-

of Pancreatitis By Lawrence Lamb. M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - In just four days we recently ost a dear member of our family to an illness diagonosed as pancreatitis. I need to know what causes this sudden disease, its symptoms, proper treatment and whether or not it is usually

DEAR READER - At the outset let me say that there is a difference between acute sudden pancreatitis and chronic pancreatitis. The outlook in the chronic form is somewhat different - although it can become poor if underlying problems are not corrected, such as a gall stone blocking the duct from the pancreas or failure to correct an underlying alcohol problem.

Acute pancreatitis is sudden inflammation of the pancreas, the organ lying underneath and behind the stomach at the upper left part of the abdomen. The picture varies a great deal. In general there is obstruction of the drainage of normally produced pancreatic juice into the small intestine. These juices tend to break out of the normal drainage ducts within the gland and chemically inflame or even digest the pancreatic tissue. This in turn leads to more damage and the process can accelerate rapidly.

The pancreatic juice contains powerful enzymes used to digest both proteins and fat. They are capable of causing severe inflammation of the pancreatic tissues. If swelling of the tissues is all that occurs, the patient may do fairly well and recover.

The usual picture is one of shock and it can be very severe. Some of the proteins that are released into the bloodstream tend to dilate the small arteries throughout the body and blood pressure

Treatment is directed toward relieving the shock when that is the main feature. Sometimes there is an associated diabetic complication if the islets of tissues within the pancreas that produce insulin are also severely damaged.

There is usually abdominal pain, and it can be in the pit of the stomach and radiate to the back. Other patients may not have such severe pain. The pain can resemble many other conditions that can occur in the abdomen, including a ruptured peptic ulcer. If the damage and inflam-

mation of the pancreas is severe and if it is associated with bleeding into the pancreas, which can and does occur, then only about half of the patients survive the acute attack under the best management. Surgery is usually not at-

tempted during the acute attack unless it is obvious that medical treatment is not going to prevent the patient's demise. It can be harmful. It is a very serious medical problem and the outlook isn't too encouraging.

There are many causes of it. Underlying gall bladder disease resulting in a stone in the bile duct may block the pancreatic duct and is a common cause. Alcohol is another frequent cause and there may not be any cause that can be identified.



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
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
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
