

Powerful Rocket Shot Poised

U.S. Attempt To Boomerang Far Side Of Moon Imminent

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — America's most powerful rocket was ready Wednesday for an imminent shot at the moon — expected to be made soon — with a new guidance system and a device to get the free side's pictures of the lunar surface. The new U.S. lunar probe is 98-foot-tall, four-stage

Atlas-Able was expected to blast off as the moon moves comparatively close to earth — about 221,000 miles. The ideal moon shot period starts Thursday and ends Sunday.
The rocket, America's answer to the highly-successful — and considerably more powerful — Russian Luniks, will carry a 375-pound payload which it will try to push into orbit around the moon.
If all goes as scheduled, the trip will take about 62 hours from

the time of launch.
During the past 15 months, the U.S. has failed five times to orbit or hit the moon. But scientists appeared more confident of success this time with a unique, new "terminal" guidance system. With it, they hope to guide the fourth stage into orbit via radio waves from one of three stations on earth.
If successful, the Atlas-Able satellite will be the first to go into a true orbit around the moon itself. Lunik III, launched last

month, circled both the moon and the earth.
The most spectacular single piece of equipment in the payload is a facsimile scanning device, designed to record pictures of the "far side" surface and transmit them upon command from radio signals from earth.
Lunik III secured dramatic "far side" photographs, which were released to the world earlier this month. American scientists hope their system will produce even better pictures.

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Threats Molding A Forceful Nehru

India Erupts Over China Border Acts

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, in an aroused Parliament Tuesday, said India was ready to fight for its life if the border dispute with Communist China erupted into war.
Nehru raised his voice to emphasize the point in one of the longest speeches he has made during the simmering frontier argument with India's giant neighbor.
The tension generated by the dispute was evidenced by a noisy parliamentary session, with the opposition socialists heckling Nehru on the one hand and the Communists on the other.
Outside the building several hundred socialist supporters demonstrated loudly for a stronger stand against the Chinese Communists.
Nehru pleaded for unity. He said this would be the country's latest strength.
He said he did not think the danger argument with Peking, which has cost the lives of a number of Indian soldiers already, would lead to war.
"But if war is thrust upon us," he said, "we will fight with all our strength."
I am not boasting but our defense forces are capable of taking care of the security of our country."
Nehru stressed that India was going to settle the problem peacefully first and that he had his proposals for joint withdrawal of Indian and Chinese Communist troops in certain border areas were "fair and reasonable and honorable."
But he said no country could rate the jeopardizing of its honor, self respect or border integrity whatever the consequences.
Nehru noted that there had been some suggestions that India allow the Chinese out. He said (See NEHRU, Page 3)

Thanksgiving Treat Will Be On Tables

The Thanksgiving holiday, with cranberries back on the grocers' shelves in the nick of time, began Wednesday night in crisp, fair weather across most of the nation.

Families huddled up for cold weather trips back to their hometowns and traditional feasts of turkey with all the fixings.
Thanks to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Public Welfare, an old friend was not

barred from the Thanksgiving table.
Federal and state officials in most parts of the country had cleared adequate supplies of cranberries to fill out Americans' Thanksgiving menus. It had been touch and go for cranberry lovers for a while after Health Secretary Arthur S. Flemming announced that some cranberry crops were contaminated with a possible cancer-producing weed killer, aminotriazole.
Flemming's wife announced she was delighted the cranberry ban was over because "I happen to love cranberries." White House aides weren't talking officially.

Tainted Cranberries Sold In Kansas City

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government reported Wednesday night that more than 2,000 packages of contaminated fresh cranberries were sold this week in groceries at Kansas City, Mo.
The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) said in a Thanksgiving Eve announcement that efforts were being made to recover the berries.
The contaminated berries, tainted with the residue of a weed killer which caused cancer in laboratory rats, was shipped Oct. 7 to the DeMaria Fruit Co. in Kansas City from Wisconsin Rapids, Wis.
The shipment, consisting of 2,232 one-pound packages, went out prior to the government's Nov. 6 warning to the public that a portion of the 1959 cranberry crop had been found to be contaminated.
The FDA also announced Wednesday night that it plans to seize two other lots of Wisconsin fresh cranberries found to be coated with the weed killer.

One was shipped to Terre Haute, Ind., Nov. 2 from Wisconsin Rapids. The other was shipped from Eagle River, Wis., to Springfield, Ill. These brought to 17 the number of contaminated lots seized by the government.
The cranberry industry has been testing additional lots of cranberries in an effort to meet the holiday demand.

Watson asked persons who have not been contacted and who wish to donate to send checks or cash to the United Fund office in city hall.
There is every indication that this year's drive will succeed, Watson enthused.

\$1,121 Collected In MD Canvass

Pampa "marchers" for Muscular Dystrophy collected \$1,121.65 one night this week, surpassing last year's total donations by \$291. It was reported Wednesday by drive chairman, Raymond Dalton.
All collections were not tallied by Wednesday and approximately 165 coin canisters in Pampa business houses had not been picked up.
Persons who were not contacted this week and who wish to may leave donations at either the fire department or First National Bank.
More than 100 firemen, DeMolay members, Pampa High School Band and Key Club members and individuals took part in Monday night's solicitation.

With the "goal in sight" and \$61,501.70 in the Pampa-Letors United Fund coffers Wednesday, campaign chairman Floyd Watson urged volunteers to "clean up their work and report in." Only slightly less than \$24,000 remains to be collected before the campaign goal will be reached.
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Chiang Air Invasion Planned Soon Against Chinese Reds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek plans to parachute 3,000 specially-trained Nationalist Chinese troops into Red China in "the near future" as a touch-off of a revolt against the Communist regime, Rep. Silvio Conte (R-Mass.) said Wednesday.
Conte has just returned from a month-long tour of southeast Asia which included a 75-minute talk with Chiang on Formosa last Thursday.
"Chiang figures that 95 percent of the people in the mainland will be ready to overthrow the Communist government within in the near future," Conte told a news conference.
Chiang, according to the congressman, hopes that once he launches his "internal attack" on Red China, "the United States would give the moral, economic and logistic support necessary."
Conte said he did not press the Nationalist leader for an exact date of the contemplated move against the Peiping regime. Conte said Chiang confined his discussion of the timing to "just the near future."
Conte said Chiang told him he expected a revolt to start on the mainland because of dissatisfaction with the "Communist system, the breaking up of families, the government's control of crop production and hunger."
Conte quoted the Nationalist leader as saying the 3,000 troops from Formosa would train the mainland Chinese in the art of "revolt against the government."

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Leads Fizzle In Houston's Kill-Contract Investigation

HOUSTON (UPI) — Police Wednesday watched another lead fizzle in the killers-for-hire murder of Mrs. Joseph F. Selby.
A mysterious package her accused husband allegedly mailed after his release on bond from jail contained only clothing he was sending to a relative.
Officers hoped the package would provide some clue to the identity of the triggerman who fired two .22 caliber pistol shots into Mrs. Selby shortly before she staggered from the front room of her fashionable Alton Oaks, Houston, home into a hall where she slumped and died as her blood spilled onto her red carpet.
The detectives were disappointed.

Meanwhile Mrs. Maggie Morgan, a Negro woman who admitted she received \$1,000 from Selby to find somebody to kill his wife, was transferred from city jail to Harris county jail as attorney's attempt to free her on bond reduced from \$10,000 to \$2,500.
Mrs. Morgan told officers in her third statement the name of a man she said was the triggerman. But detectives discounted the information after an investigation.
Mrs. Morgan, her husband and her son were jailed after the shooting Nov. 18 along with Selby, a paperhanger believed to have knowledge of the murder, and a massage-parlor female operator a friend of Selby.
Officers continued Wednesday to seek the location and identity of a

57 Forest Fires Racing Across East, Mid-Texas

Fifty-seven separate forest and grass fires, many of them out of control, raged across East and North Central Texas Wednesday, burning barns, homes and thousands of acres of valuable timber.
Across the northeast Texas border, a grass fire pushed into a southside residential area in Hugo, Okla. To the east, a fire in Louisiana consumed into Panola county, Tex.
The fires consumed at least nine homes, 16 barns and out-houses and a sawmill. A fire at Maul, in northeast Texas, figured toward Red River Arsenal, but firefighters believed they could stop it short of tons of explosives.
The problem is primarily one of careless burning: burning trash, burning leaves, even washpot boiling," D. A. Anderson, head of the Texas Forestry Service's Research and Education Department, said.
"There is a high south wind. Humidity is extremely low. The countryside is dry. The smoke covers East Texas so thick that planes can't see through it to spot new fires."
Anderson could not estimate how many acres were burned, although he said it totaled "thousands" or say how many were grass fires and how many forest fires.
But he said they were most severe from Nacogdoches County north. Six homes burned in Kellogg. (See FOREST, Page 3)

White Citizens Council Accused In Dynamitings

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) — Two of five men charged with taking part in Little Rock's three Labor Day explosions testified Wednesday E. A. Lauderdale Jr., a White Citizens Council official, gave them dynamite and told them where to plant it.
The trial of the wealthy lumber dealer was recessed Wednesday night until Friday when one of his attorneys, W. B. Howard of Jonesboro, Ark., became ill. The jury of nine men and three women voted Wednesday not to convene Thursday because of the holiday.
Samuel Graydon Beavers, 49, and Jessie Raymond Perry, 24, testified for the prosecution in the trial of Lauderdale, who is charged with blowing up the office of the Little Rock School Board and a city-owned station wagon of fire chief Gan Nalley.
Wednesday night, Bryant Rucker, a salesman, testified he saw Lauderdale with his car parked near his home four miles outside Little Rock early on the night of the bombings.
Rucker said he asked Lauderdale, whom he had known 10 years, what he was doing there. He said the segregation leader replied he was gathering leaflets. Rucker said he knew there was no leaflet within 300 yards of where Lauderdale's car was parked. After he heard about the explosions, Rucker notified his boss about the Lauderdale meeting. The boss called police.
Sheriff's deputies uncovered a cache of dynamite within 150 feet of where Lauderdale was parked.
Rucker was the 18th state witness Wednesday, the third day of the trial. The state expects to finish Friday.

Payola Sleuths Find Rock 'n Roller DJ

NEW YORK (UPI) — Two detectives tracked down rock 'n' roll disc jockey Alan Freed by watching television Wednesday night and served him with a subpoena to appear before a grand jury investigating "payola" in the recording industry.
Freed, who had been accused by District Attorney Frank Hogan of failing to appear an appointment to appear voluntarily for questioning, accepted the subpoena without a word of objection.
"I have been subpoenaed," he said, "I'll be there Monday."
Asked why he would not appear for questioning without a subpoena, as rival disc jockey Martin Block had done a few hours earlier, Freed declared: "I will not volunteer for anybody. My grandmother once told me, 'Never volunteer for anything.'"
There had been some doubt whether Freed would appear at the WNEW-TV studios for his regular 5 p.m. hour-long "Big Beat" program because he had been quoted in a newspaper interview as saying that he was through with the station as of Tuesday.
But he appeared on schedule anyway, despite the fact that his contract with the TV station has been terminated as of this Saturday night. He also has been dismissed from his ABC radio job, for refusing to sign a statement that he never has accepted payola.
Freed repeated to newsmen Wednesday night his earlier assertion that he never has taken payola, which is money passed under the table by record publishers to disc jockeys in exchange for having records played on the air.

Levellville community. "There is also a lot of destruction to barns, pastures and fencing," Anderson said.

A grass fire in south Dallas county, far from the smoke-covered scorched land of East Texas, burned a house, but was brought under control.

In East Texas, there was almost more fires than fire fighters. Two radio stations — KEBE of Jacksonville and KWRD of Henderson — broadcast emergency appeals for firefighters.

"It looks like the end of the world," Reporter Pat Endsley (of KWRD) said.

"The little sky is covered with smoke. The fire is burning out of control. It is a grass fire now, but it will be a forest fire if they don't head it off."

That fire destroyed Pogue Hodge's sawmill in New Salem community, 15 miles south of Henderson.

Another fire at Jacksonville burned over more than 1,000 acres and one house and at last report was still going. The curling flames, leaping through the tops of pines, jumped road after road.

It was burning around the edge of the old Jacksonville airport. A fire truck stood between the fire and a residential area.

Volunteer fighters fought it with low sacks and tractors with sprayers. A 35-mile-an-hour wind whipped the flames along.

There was a second fire south of Jacksonville between Davila and Union Grove community, but it was not as severe as the other fire.

Wind gusts up to 54 miles an hour drove a fire across "thousands" of acres on highway 10 southwest of Tyler. The fire jumped the Dallas highway southwest of Tyler, destroyed an abandoned barracks and burned around the edges of Tyler airport.

Fire Marshal Neal Harris said it probably started from a trash fire.

Another fire in the woods five miles from Tyler on the State Park Highway burned two homes.

The smoke was so thick over the southwestern part of the Tyler airport that planes had to land crosswind. Motorists could not see and stopped their automobiles on the side of the road.

Another fire damaged the Gulf and Santa Fe Railroad bridge over Elm Creek in Ballinger.

The Department of Public Safety estimated at least 20 fires in Smith and Bowie counties.

AMARILLO — A head-on crash 10 miles north of Amarillo on State Highway 136 killed three persons and critically injured two others Wednesday at 11:50 a.m., one of them a noted Panhandle sheriff who never carried a gun.

The dead were identified as Mrs. Tommy-B. Fox, 40, and her father, William Clark, 77, both of Borger, and Mrs. Hark Wilbanks, 74, of Spearman.

Mrs. Fox' son, Jimmy Wayne, 6, underwent surgery. Doctors said Wednesday night the boy is "holding his own."

Also in critical condition is Mrs. Wilbanks' husband, a sheriff in the 1920's and 1930's in Hansford county who prided himself on never carrying a gun. He is a rancher now.

Troubles Galore For Local Man

Ed Wood, 1109 S. Sumner, tried to spend a quiet day at home Wednesday but ended up with a burned right hand and a damaged car.

His troubles began at 1:30 p.m. when a can of gasoline caught fire in Wood's truck behind his home. Wood threw the flaming can from the truck's front seat into a pile of wood but during the exploit suffered third degree burns on his right hand. The wood pile caught fire and brought firemen to the Wood home.

At about 7 p.m. Wood was driving two daughters to a choir practice and in the 100 block of W. Brown his car was rammed from behind.

but it was believed likely that "cleared" cranberries would be on the table when the President and Mrs. Eisenhower dine in Washington Thursday with their son and daughter-in-law and their four grandchildren.

With or without cranberries, a United Press International spot check had shown that Thanksgiving dinners would cost a little bit more than last year, but not much. Turkey prices were up a few pennies in most cities, ranging from 60 cents a pound in Washington to 29 cents at Miami.

The average cost of a Thanksgiving spread ran from \$6 to \$10. The threat of death on the highways appeared to be far less over Thanksgiving than during other national holidays. The National Safety Council said Thanksgiving is primarily a sober, family affair, with little compulsion for alcoholic celebrations and "one for the road" highballs.

Consequently, the Safety Council declined to make an estimate of the nation's traffic death over the 30-hour period starting at 6 p.m. Wednesday and lasting until midnight Thursday. The council merely noted that the average traffic toll for such a period at this time of year is 90—a grim enough figure in itself.

The U.S. Weather Bureau also

came through with good holiday news. It predicted "generally pleasant" Thanksgiving weather, with fair to partly cloudy skies from the Pacific coast through the great plains into the gulf coast states. Georgia, the Carolinas, Virginia, and up the east coast into New England.

The weather was cold, however, from the plains to the Atlantic seaboard, and snow and rain developed from eastern Missouri and the upper Mississippi Valley to New York state and the northern fringes of New England. A storm was already in full swing in Iowa and was expected to lay down three inches of snow.

Church services played a major part in Thanksgiving plans in all the nation's towns and cities. In the big population centers, there will also be department store parades and traditional football games.

New York will have its annual Macy's Parade, led this year by actress Shirley Temple. Detroit scheduled "another" department store parade and the annual Detroit Lions-Green Bay Packers football game. New Airport Facility Burns

WICHITA FALLS (UPI)—Fire raced through a building under construction at Wichita Falls' new \$600,000 airport Tuesday night.

Flames danced high in the night sky and were seen as far away as downtown Wichita Falls, more than five miles from the municipal facility which opened last Friday.

The control tower at Sheppard Air Force Base spotted the fire and sounded the alarm.

Firemen from Sheppard and Wichita Falls brought the blaze under control after a 20-minute fight. They said it appeared to have started in electrical wiring in a storage room being built onto the kitchen of the new terminal.

Clem MacIn, Braniff Airways agent-in-charge at the field, said damage would run into the thousands of dollars.

The new airport was built by the government so the Air Force could take over Kell Field, the old airport.

Atlanta Plan On Pupil Placement

ATLANTA (UPI)—After months of study, the Atlanta School Board has settled on a complex pupil placement plan as its answer to a federal judge's order to stop discriminating against Negro pupils.

The Atlanta plan will be submitted to Judge Frank Hooper. It must also be approved by the Georgia Legislature, where Hooper once served, before it can be put to use anywhere in Georgia.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that Florida's pupil placement law was inadequate to carry out the 1954 U. S. Supreme Court decision.

The ruling was the latest in a series of legal decisions which stemmed from a suit filed in Miami in 1958 by the head of Miami's NAACP chapter. The appellate court ruling overturned a decision by the federal district court in Miami last year.

Dade County officials said they will read the decision "with a view to asking for a rehearing or further appeal."

Hooper handed down his anti-discrimination directive last July and gave the Atlanta Board until Dec. 1 to submit a proposal for carrying it out. Recognizing that any plan would run counter to Georgia's many segregation laws, the board specified that it could be submitted subject to the Legislature's approval.

To Press For Free Elections In Hungary

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—The nations of the free world rallied Tuesday for a major diplomatic assault on Russia's Hungarian policies in hopes of preventing a new bloodbath of Hungarian patriots who rose against their Red masters in 1956.

The General Assembly meets Wednesday to approve the recommendation of its steering committee that "the 1956 Hungarian freedom revolt and its brutal suppression by Russia be put on the agenda of the 12-member world organization."

In previous sessions, the assembly had called upon Hungary and Russia to get Soviet troops out of the country and permit free elections for a new government. The resolutions have been ignored by both Moscow and Budapest.

Sir Leslie Munro of New Zealand, special U. N. representative on the Hungarian question, reported briefly last week that Russian troops are still in Hungary, and "the framework of repression remains unchanged."

Munro said there are reports that trials and executions of Hungarian freedom-fighters continued in spite of Communist assurances that they had been stopped. He warned of the "imminent possibility of further executions."

Anti-U.S. Outbreaks

HAVANA (UPI)—Anti-American vandals in suburban Jaruco broke into a church Sunday night and destroyed 20 sacks of flour sent from the United States for the relief of Cuba's poor, it was disclosed today.

At the same time, army headquarters announced the arrest of 16 persons—nine of them former soldiers or policemen—on charges of "plotting against the people." A communique said the prisoners planned a campaign of arson and anti-government agitation.

In recent weeks the government has arrested several hundred persons for questioning in a wave of anti-Castro plots reported in five of Cuba's six provinces. Most of them were said to have been released.

The outbreak in Jaruco, a road hub 25 miles east of Havana, involved about 100 youths whose attack on the church was punctuated by shouts of "in Cuba, no one needs to eat flour sent as alms!"

Before police arrived, the young vandals had dragged 20 sacks of flour out of the church, ripped them open and dumped their contents in the street. No arrests were reported.

Another 80 sacks of flour, sent to Cuba by Roman Catholic groups in the United States, escaped damage.

Repairs Delay Space Flight

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—An engine explosion and a "broken" fuselage have delayed by about three weeks a program to put the first manned aircraft 100 miles above the earth.

A North American Aviation Corp. spokesman disclosed today the X15—one of three seven-ton rocket ships built for the Air Force and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration—should be repaired and back in the fringe-of-space project by Dec. 1.

The X15 was jolted by an explosion in flight Nov. 5. Test pilot Scott Crossfield, 38, brought it down "hard" in the Mojave Desert. The fuselage was damaged in the landing.

"Possibly we've been delayed about three weeks," the spokesman admitted.

GM Output To Resume

DETROIT (UPI)—General Motors announced Tuesday car production which had been curtailed by the steel shortage since Nov. 11 will resume Dec. 7.

However, Chrysler said another 10,200 workers would be laid off this week, bringing its total idled to 23,430.

So far, GM has recalled 17,000 workers and expected to have another 36,000 back on the job by the end of this week.

GM also said assembly production would resume at plants in Detroit, Willow Run, Mich., Flint, Mich., Janesville, Wis., and Norwood, Ohio.

By Dec. 14, the big auto company said other car and truck divisions would return to five-day weeks.

A Ford spokesman said his company would operate all 17 of its assembly plants through today, closing down for Thanksgiving. Only three of the plants will work Friday.

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Cranberries On Menu—With Turkey

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Thanksgiving Day will be a "quiet day at home" for most of official Washington—with cranberries on the menu along with the turkey.

With most Washington stores now offering cranberries found free of contamination by the weed killer aminotriazole, most of the uncertainty has disappeared over whether to serve the traditional Thanksgiving item.

Mrs. Arthur S. Flemming, wife of the man who caused all the cranberry fuss, is delighted that the government-industry clearance program will permit her to serve cranberries to the husband and four children on Thursday.

"I happen to love cranberries," explained the wife of the secretary of health, education and welfare.

Also choosing a quiet family dinner at home are President and Mrs. Eisenhower; Defense Secretary and Mrs. Neil McElroy; Treasury Secretary and Mrs. Robert Anderson; Agriculture Secretary and Mrs. Ezra T. Benson; and Labor Secretary and Mrs. James P. Mitchell.

Another club is played. If West can be allowed to hold that trick South ducks; otherwise he wins that trick also since he cannot afford to give East the lead.

In either case South cashes his good diamonds, loses the heart finesse and winds up with nine tricks.

There is one slight trap in the play. If South's queen is allowed to hold the first heart trick he should play the ace the next time to assure his contract. If he goes for an overtrick the roof will fall on him.

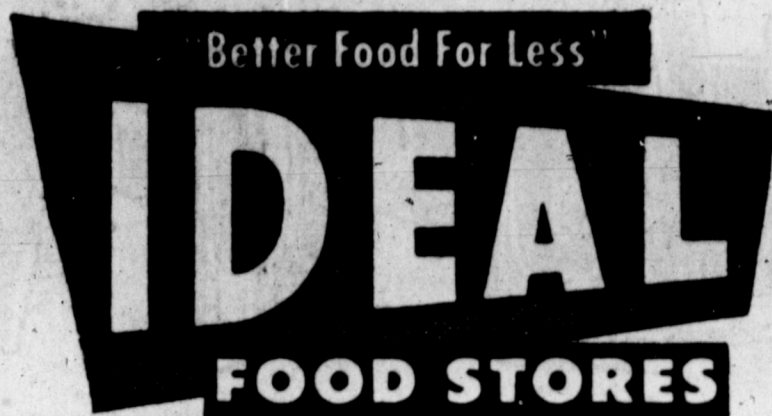

Reporter Admits Lie In Bribe Charge

NEW YORK (UPI) — A newspaper reporter who charged on a television program that a city official had offered him a bribe to stop investigating slum clearance has admitted he lied in making the charge.

Dist. Atty. Frank Hogan said Eugene Gleason of the New York World-Telegram and Sun admitted the charge was false and "made out of whole cloth."

Hogan had called Gleason and a co-worker, Fred Cook, to his office to question them on statements made on the Sunday night WNTA-TV television program, "Open End."

On the program, Cook said Gleason had told him that a high city official, whom they did not name, had offered both men \$75 to \$100 a week in 1956 if they would stop their investigation of abuses in the city's slum clearance program.

Gleason signed a six-page statement in Hogan's office Monday saying the bribe charge was "completely untrue," and he cleared Cook of any responsibility in the false charge. Hogan said that whatever Cook had said about the matter was based on Gleason's reports.

Gleason said in his statement to Hogan that he had been "excuberant and was carried away" when he made the charge.

The World-Telegram and Sun said it would have no comment until it had studied a transcript of Gleason's statement.

Both newsmen, Hogan said, told him they had not informed their superiors on the newspaper of the bribe offer.

Hogan refused to reveal the name of the city official Gleason had claimed offered the bribe.

"It was a damnable outrage, and it would be most unfair to make it public," Hogan said.

Hogan said there was no further action to be expected in the case. "The man has admitted he was a liar," Hogan said.

Tale Of Losses Sucker Bait?

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Management of the Sands Hotel wondered today when a costly winning streak by gamblers playing the newly introduced card game of baccarat would let up.

Hopeful bettors were still lined up today and three deep this week waiting to get a crack at the fast-moving game played by 12 players each making minimum bets of \$20 up to \$1,500.

The hotel introduced the blackjack like game at midnight Sunday and attracted a flock of all-night gamblers who had taken the house for \$231,000 by 5 a.m.

A steady stream of anxious players since has visited the single table, but the hotel has been able to reduce its losses to about \$195,000 according to a hotel spokesman.

"Our promotion people tell me this is great advertising," said casino director and hotel vice president Carl Cohen. "I'd like to know when our advertising campaign is going to finish."

Morgan Claim Draws Scoff
CIUDAD TRUJILLO, D.R. (UPI) — Col. John Abbes Garcia said today if anyone is plotting the assassination of ex-American Maj. William Morgan it is Cuba's Premier Fidel Castro, not Dominican ex-President Rafael L. Trujillo.

Abbes, who is chief of Dominican military intelligence, scoffed at Morgan's charge that authorities here have put a price on his head.

The major, a former resident of Toledo, Ohio, told UPI Correspondent Matthew Kenny in Havana Monday that Dominican authorities have offered \$45,000 to anyone who succeeds in killing him — and \$500,000 to anyone who can kidnap him and deliver him here alive.

"These declarations reveal the perfection Fidel Castro is achieving in his plans for political assassinations," Abbes said. "When Morgan is eliminated his own words will be used to justify his murder."

Morgan claimed credit last summer for breaking up an attempted invasion of Cuba, saying he lured the invaders into a trap by pretending to work with him.

Mortgage Millions Insured By Firm Worth Only \$150,000

NEW YORK (UPI) — An investigation was underway today of eight savings and loan associations charged with insuring 100 million dollars of their investors' funds with a one-room Tangiers firm that had only \$150,000 in assets.

The investigation, touched off by a court action by Atty. Gen. Louis Lefkowitz of the state of New York, involves wealthy financier Stewart B. Hopps, Belvedere, Calif., who formerly was connected with Lowell M. Birrell, accused international swindler.

Birrell is the insurance promoter who now is a fugitive in Rio De Janeiro from charges of having been involved in stock fraud charges.

Hopps was named Tuesday in a petition by Lefkowitz asking the right to examine the savings and loan associations, the insurance company and 46 individuals Supreme Court Justice Jacob Markowitz granted the petition and the examination is to start Jan. 13.

Lefkowitz said he was acting to protect investors and had no proof that any loss had occurred.

He charged in his petition that the savings and loan associations had insured 100 million dollars in mortgage loan assets with the International Guaranty and Insurance Co. of Tangiers, Morocco. He said, the insurance company's assets had an actual value in this country of only \$151,000 on Jan. 31, 1953. This sum, he said, included only \$33,000 in cash, with the rest in second mortgages and building contracts.

The petition also said J. Howard McGrath, former U.S. attorney general, was serving as a trustee of funds for International Guaranty. McGrath denied this in a letter to Lefkowitz's office.

The petition said "the grand design for the Tangier company's operations was masterfully planned" by Hopps. It further charged the allegedly fraudulent mortgage insurance had "jeopardized millions of dollars of the savings of New Yorkers." The companies advertised in New York promising interest rates of up to 5 per cent on insured mortgage security.

The savings and loan companies named are — Commercial Savings & Loan Assn., Baltimore, which now is under indictment on charges of mail fraud; City Savings Assn., First Guaranty Savings Assn., and Chicago Guaranty Savings Assn., all of Chicago; Idaho Savings & Loan Assn., Boise; Utah Savings & Loan Assn., Provo; Prudential Savings & Loan Assn., Buxley, Idaho; and Security Savings Inst., Seattle.

Ike To Visit Buffer State, Afghanistan

When President Eisenhower visits Kabul, capital of Afghanistan, on his 11-nation tour next month, the magnificence of its mountain setting may remind him of Colorado Springs, Colo.

But Kabul's magnificence ends with its view of the snow-capped Hindu Kush mountains. It is a muddy, dark-brown city with only a few modern shops. Russian buses and cars dominate its streets, which also were paved by the Russians. Green lawns and attractive flower-beds are hidden behind walled compounds.

Afghanistan is one of five nations the President will visit which have common boundaries with the Iron Curtain.

"Of them all, Afghanistan is the closest to becoming a Russian satellite."

The reasons are many. One is the country's geographical location which makes it a buffer between Russia and India and Pakistan, and a natural for Soviet infiltration. At the same time, Afghan-Pakistan relations have been strained over Afghanistan's demand for a free path to the state which would include some of Pakistan's northwest territory.

But as is often the case, the real reason for Afghanistan's present close relations with Russia is economic.

Afghanistan has received economic aid both from Russia and the United States, but by far the greatest amount has come from Russia which has granted the country a 1088 non-dollar loan and flooded it with Russian experts of all categories.

In contrast, U.S. aid, while steady, has amounted to a comparatively small five million to seven million dollars per year.

Russian and Afghan barges ply the Oxus River, bringing in Russian machinery, petroleum, sugar, fabrics and other goods in exchange for Afghan wool, cotton, oil seeds and dry fruits.

Russian experts assist in Afghan oil explorations. Russian engineers build power and irrigation projects, and drive a tunnel through the Hindu Kush mountains, bringing closer Afghanistan's southern and northern provinces by nearly 150 miles. Other Russian aid builds airports, cement factories and metal works.

While small by contrast, U.S. aid also has been substantial, including dam and airport construction and assisting in Afghanistan's substantial educational program.

In years past, Afghan trade flowed southward through the Khyber Pass to Pakistan. Today, the bulk of it is moving northward into Russia.

Afghan leadership is in the hands of Prime Minister Sardar Daud, a bald, tough man who is driving hard to improve his country. But his critics have declared him naive, so far as the Russians are concerned, and even have suggested he would not object too strenuously to a Communist takeover.

Ideal Weather For Thanksgiving

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Weather Bureau forecasts 'ideal' weather for most of the nation on Thanksgiving Day.

It predicts sunny and mild weather from Oregon and California eastward through the middle and southern Mississippi Valley and Gulf states.

The Atlantic Seaboard will have cool crisp weather with partly cloudy skies.

It will be cold across the northern tier of states, with light snow and snow flurries from western Montana to the northern-most fringes of New England.

Occasional light rain is predicted for the state of Washington.

Above normal temperatures are predicted for the central and southwest parts of the country. Below normal is forecast for the middle and south Atlantic states.

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Only One Thanksgiving Since FDR

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Among things to say thanks for on Thursday, besides cranberry jelly without aminotriazole, is that we've got it all straight now when to celebrate Thanksgiving.

Well, we've got it straight for this year, anyway.

Practically any school boy can tell you that Thanksgiving Day is the last Thursday in November. So give that boy a zero, and get on with the story.

Thanksgiving in one form or another dates back to the pilgrims. It was George Washington who proclaimed the first national day of Thanksgiving, on Nov. 26, 1789.

But — who knows? — maybe the turkeys, all smothered that year. Anyway, the celebration failed to take hold.

Washington didn't try again for six years, when he picked a day in March. Our forebears thereafter were thankful only irregularly and on such diverse days as Feb. 19, the second Thursday in April, Aug. 6, and the first Thursday in December.

In 1863, President Lincoln proclaimed "the last Thursday in November" as a day of Thanksgiving for assorted boons including recent advances by the Union armies against the Confederates.

That particular point possibly didn't go over too well in some sections. Nevertheless, this time the observation caught on. By 1898, everybody North and South knew that Thanksgiving was always the last Thursday in November.

But 1939 was a year when not everybody could think of as many reasons to celebrate as in some earlier times. For one thing, retail sales had been off. President

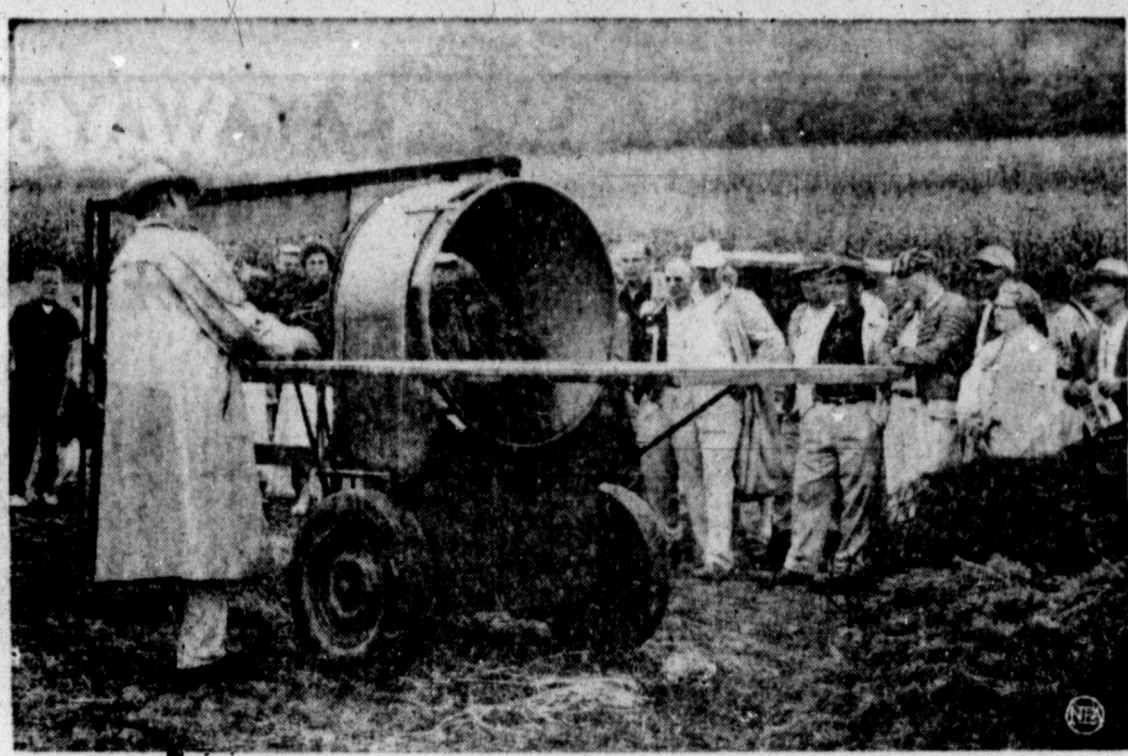
Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving Day up by a week, to give Christmas shoppers longer to give their money.

Nov. 23, the day he picked, was the fourth Thursday all right, but it wasn't the last. There were five Thursdays in November that year.

From the uproar that followed, you would have thought Roosevelt had refiggered Christmas. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale as a matter of fact warned that this might be next.

Railroads and bus lines enjoyed two holiday jams. One airline served turkey dinners aloft each Thursday in the month.

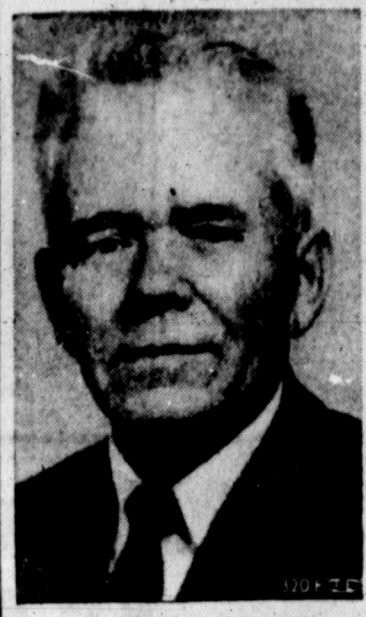
Roosevelt, undismayed, tried it again in 1940. This time he proclaimed Nov. 21, the month's third Thursday, as turkey day. In 1941 he proclaimed one more ear-

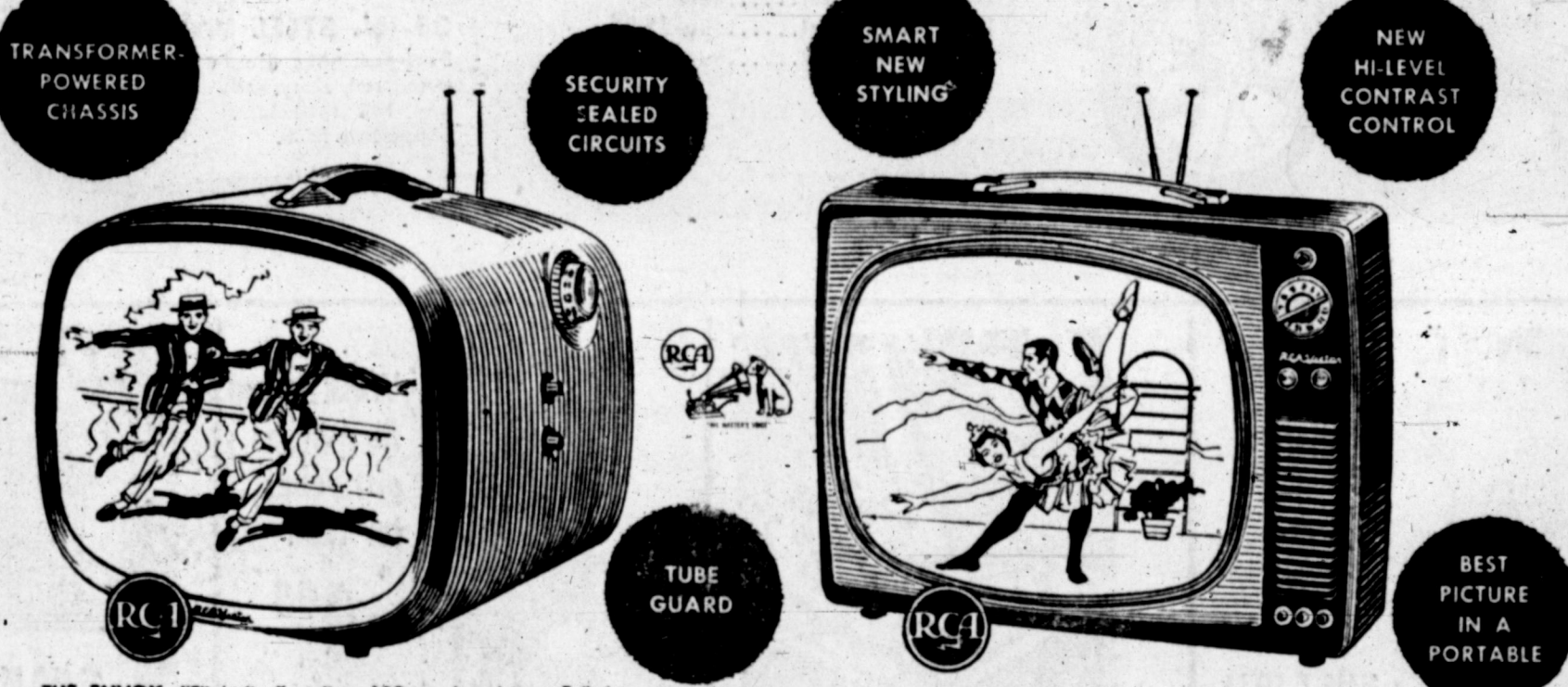

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republicans today studied the late Sen. Robert A. Taft's last political testament for clues to what might happen if Vice President Richard M. Nixon and New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller engage in an all-out fight for the 1960 GOP presidential nomination.

In a detailed memo written in 1952 and made public by friends Tuesday, Taft explained how Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower beat him in a fierce convention battle for the Republican nomination that year.

Want To Resume Security Talks

LONDON (UPI) — The Western Allies plan to ask Russia to resume negotiations on an East-West scheme to prevent surprise attacks, diplomatic sources said Tuesday.

Agreement on such a warning system — with built in international controls — could go far toward preparing for broad disarmament arrangements and a further easing of the cold war.

A final decision by the United States and Britain was expected to be announced shortly. It would determine whether such negotiations should be held in a new conference or form part of the current Geneva talks on ending nuclear explosion tests.

The Geneva talks currently are bogged down on the technical aspects of how to detect underground nuclear blasts. Eastern and Western scientists are expected to join the session Wednesday to discuss technical details.

The Western Allies met with the Soviets in Geneva last fall to discuss technical means of guarding against surprise attacks involving both nuclear and conventional weapons. But the conference cold up in failure in December, 1958, after months of futile talk.

Hoffa Threat Re Politicos Not Idle Talk

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There is a shocking muscle behind Jimmy Hoffa's threat to knock off in next year's election the members of Congress who voted for labor reform.

The muscle adds up to a little more than \$250,000 a month. That is what Hoffa's teamsters will put up each month on the basis of a 15-cents-a-head deduction from their dues. Hoffa will have a political war chest to goggle the eyes of fund raisers for mere political parties.

Neither the Republicans nor the Democrats have a money tree such as that. The Taft-Hartley Act of 1947 laid a heavy hand on Big Labor's political spending. John L. Lewis miners in 1936 donated \$500,000 into Franklin D. Roosevelt's second term campaign. The CIO Political Action Committee in 1944 accumulated about that much from various union treasuries for political purposes.

The Taft-Hartley Act amended the Corrupt Practices Act to restrict union spending just as political spending by national banks and corporations is restricted. Taft-Hartley forbade unions to make contributions to candidates or to spend money in connection with primaries and elections for the selection of federal officials.

This prohibition of political expenditures — not of political contributions — was invalidated by the Supreme Court. Big Labor may spend but it may not contribute. That did it, so far as any real restriction on labor's political spending was concerned. Big Labor went into the field of political education in a big way — educating the voters for some candidates and against others.

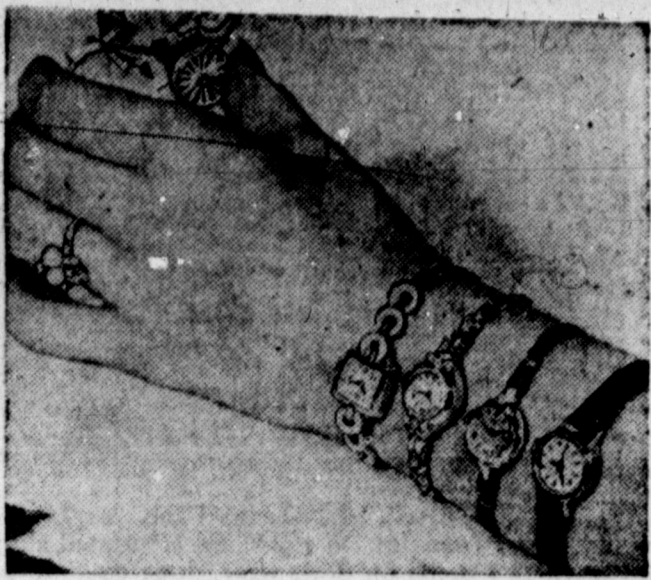

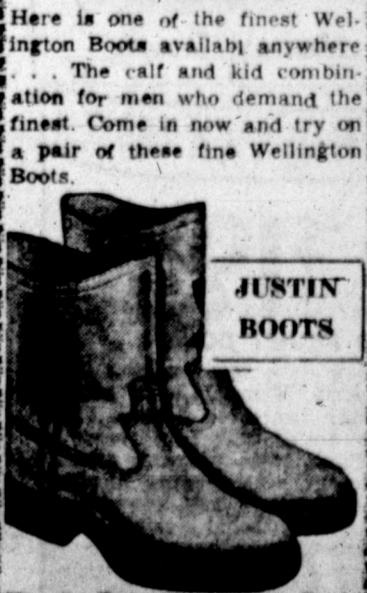

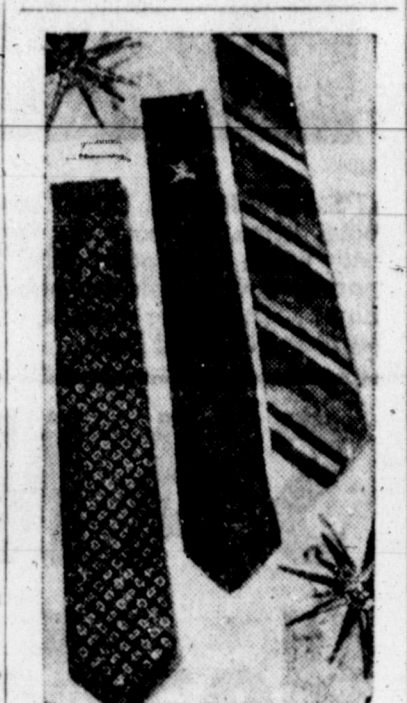

Traditional Foods Help Spark Modern Day Christmas Feasts

Good food and Christmas are traditional "go-togethers" - but have you ever wondered where the eggnog, plum pudding, turkey and fruit cake came from?

Eggnog is an American concoction. Too rich for daily consumption (twelve egg yolks, two quarts of cream and a pound of sugar to each fifth of rum), eggnog soon became the main refreshment of the southern holiday open house.

Rum, in the early days of eggnog, was an essential ingredient of this drink. Today, eggnog is enjoyed by many without it. "Frummenty," the early name of

plum pudding was eaten in pre-Roman England. It was made of steamed wheat boiled in milk, raisins, sugar and spice. Later called plum porridge, it became plum pudding in 1670.

Turkey is native to the New World. It was introduced to Europe by returning Spanish settlers and first appeared on the menu of an English Christmas banquet in 1524.

The early Romans originated the fruit cake. Almonds, added to the rich spices, symbolized the pains and pleasures of life.

of eggnog. In England, where the drink originated, wassail was usually prepared in a large wooden bowl. The base of the drink, cider, along with seasonings was placed in the bowl and it was set on the hearth.

Apples were tied above and as they roasted, the drippings fell into the bowl. The name "wassail" comes from the middle English "wass hail," meaning, "be thou well!"

Meredith First Draft Choice

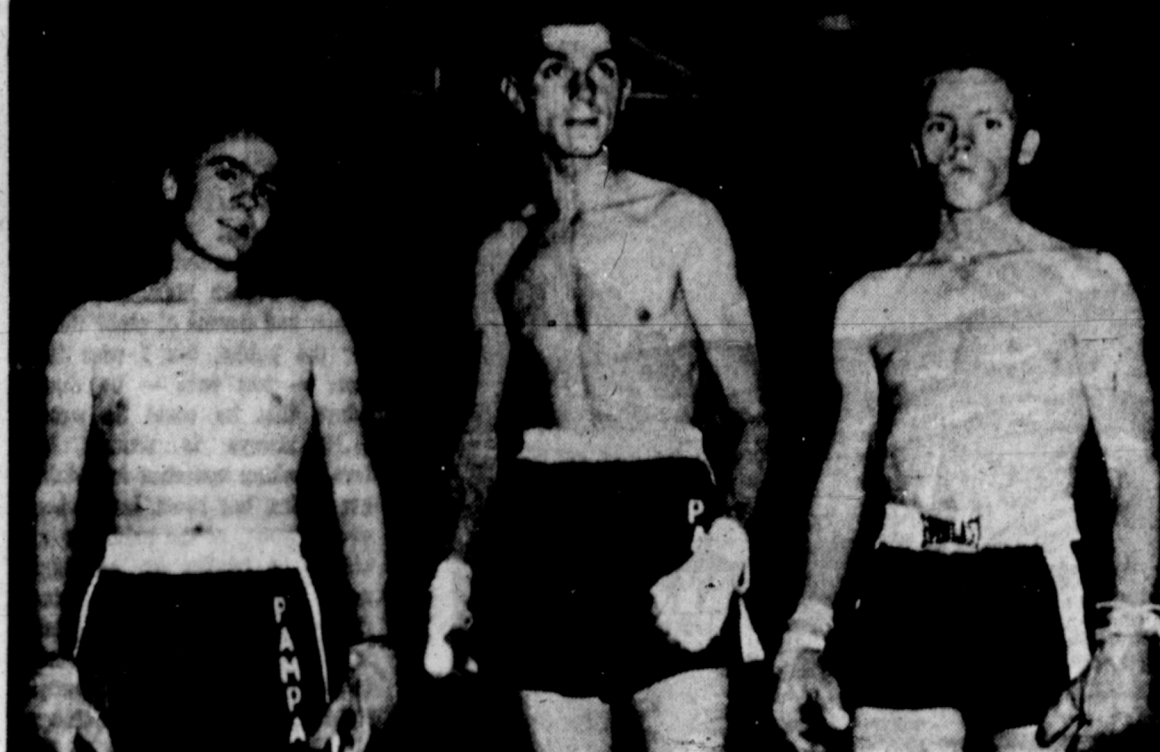

Levelland and Mount Pleasant, two of Class AAA's Top 10-rated teams, ruled the favorites today for the opening battles of that division's state schoolboy football playoffs.

The two Class AAA bi-district battles furnish half the Thanksgiving Day prep playoff program that leads into the big week end schedule of 32 games in the four divisions playing to state championships.

Levelland, rated No. 3, plays Andrews at Andrews in a battle of two twice-beaten outfits, while Mount Pleasant, rated No. 9, takes on Carrollton in neutral commerce.

Also on this afternoon's menu is a Class AA regional game pitting powerful Denver City, the state's highest scoring outfit, against Olton at Littlefield. Thursday night, Stinnett tackles Idalou in a Class A regional contest at Canyon.

Bulk of the week end action, however, will come Friday night when there are nine games in Classes AAAA and AAA and an even dozen in AA and A.

All three defending champions—Wichita Falls in AAAA, Breckenridge in AAA and Stamford in AA—were heavy favorites to expect another step toward the expected finals.

Wichita Falls and Breckenridge, which will wait until Saturday afternoon for their action, are rated three-touchdown margins over their bi-district rivals. Amarillo High invades Wichita Falls and Lamesa is at Breckenridge.

Stamford was nearly a four-touchdown choice over undefeated-untied Clisco for their Friday night encounter at neutral Abilene.

McNeely Disagrees With Results of Coaches' Poll

"They ranked us too high," Harvesters Coach Clifton McNeely declared, commenting on the results of the District 3-4A coaches' poll which has the Harvesters ranked second in the district.

"I don't see how they could possibly rate us that high," said McNeely, "when we have only one starter back from last year's team. Plainview had a good team, and has four returning starters. Palo Duro, another good team, has three men returning."

McNeely said that he thinks the vote was based more on the Harvesters' past record than on their material this year.

"I believe Borger, Palo Duro, and Plainview should rank as equal favorites," McNeely said.

Tex Hanna's Borger squad was ranked as the favorite in the pre-season coaches poll. The Bulldogs received 47 points in the voting compared to Pampa's 45. Plainview, with 35, was ranked third, and Palo Duro was picked fourth with 32.

Rounding out the voting were Tascosa with 23, Lubbock with 18, Amarillo with 16 and Monterey with 8.

A first place vote counted eight points, a second place vote seven, and so on down the line. The Coaches did not vote on their own team. Coaches taking part in the poll were McNeely; Hanna; Bob Clindaniel, Plainview; Tom Gilley, Palo Duro; Tex Parker, Tascosa; Max O'Banion, Lubbock; T. G. Hull, Amarillo and Gerald Rogers of Monterey, the only new coach in the district.

Craig Winborn is the only returning starter for the Harvesters, who won 31 straight last year to take the state championship. Winborn is a 6-3 center.

Total attendance at National League baseball games slipped 1.6 per cent during 1959 but still hit the third highest figure in its history—8,994,200 fans, the league reported today.

That total was 170,396 less than the 1958 total of 10,144,598, which was the second highest total in history. The all-time league record of 10,388,470 admissions was set in the post war entertainment boom year of 1947.

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Operation Deer Hide Scheduled

AUSTIN — Operation "deer hide" will be in effect again this year, it has been announced by the director of information of the Game and Fish Commission.

Hunters are asked to save their deer hides for use of hospital patients. Formerly they were sent only to tubercular hospitals, but this year they will be made available for patients in mental hospitals and special schools.

Wherever possible the hides should be sent to L. M. Rathbone, Austin taxidermist, who will handle them out to the tanneries. Hunters should rub salt on the green hides before sending them in. If the hides cannot be delivered direct to the taxidermist they should be left with the nearest frozen food locker plant. These locker plants will route them to Austin over motor freight lines which have agreed to handle them when they are marked "charity."

On hides west of the Pecos, they should be routed to the Russell Williams Frozen Food Locker on N. Grand Street, Odessa. From there they will be picked up by Omar Dreiling of San Angelo and routed into Austin.

From Austin they will go to tanneries, and then be sent to the hospitals for use of patients in handicraft.

The entire operation is on a cost-free basis, under direction of the Board of Hospitals and Special Schools.

Attendance Good in NL

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI) — Total attendance at National League baseball games slipped 1.6 per cent during 1959 but still hit the third highest figure in its history—8,994,200 fans, the league reported today.

That total was 170,396 less than the 1958 total of 10,144,598, which was the second highest total in history. The all-time league record of 10,388,470 admissions was set in the post war entertainment boom year of 1947.

What then is this source according to the French Declaration? Paragraph III tells us. The nation is essentially the source of all sovereignty; nor can any individual, or any body of men, be entitled to any authority which is not derived from it. The French and American Revolutions are, in short, based on contrary principles.

ROGERS URGES USE OF DRAFT LAW TO AVERT STEEL STRIKE RENEWAL

WASHINGTON — The military draft law may be invoked to block resumption of the steel strike, if no agreement is reached by the January 26 expiration of the Taft-Hartley injunction. Use of this law for that purpose is being recommended to President Eisenhower by Attorney General William Rogers. The Justice Department chief is proposing that, in the event of an unbroken deadlock between management and labor, Congress be asked to amend the Universal Military Training & Service Act to empower the President to seize plants regardless of whether they have government contracts. Now under the draft law, the President can take over plants doing government work. Rogers would extend this authority to include all plants whose production is deemed "necessary for the security and welfare of the U.S."

The Doctor Says:

Rheumatic fever causes more long-time crippling illness in children than any other disease, according to the Orange County Heart Association. It particularly attacks children of school age. It may affect many parts of the body, but the heart, and sometimes the damage to the heart may be lasting. Although rheumatic fever is a serious disease, it can be prevented. But, unlike many childhood diseases, it is a "repeater" and with each recurrent attack there is a new chance that the heart will be injured. Early detection of sore throat and prompt medical attention to prevent streptococcal infection are the best precautions against rheumatic fever, therefore, the Orange County Heart Association has prepared some suggestions to parents on when to call the doctor, and what to tell him about a child's sore throat. If a child gets a sore throat and has any of the following signs or symptoms, call the physician right away: 1. Sore throat; advice physician whether it came on suddenly. 2. Does the youngster complain that his throat hurts most when he swallows? 3. Does it hurt him under the angle of his jaw when you press gently with your fingers? Are the glands in his neck swollen? 4. Does he have a fever? How much? (Usually a strep infection brings on a fever between 101 and 104 degrees.) 5. Does the child complain of headaches? 6. Is he nauseated? Has he vomited? 7. Has he been in contact with

Sound Barrier Assaulted By Ethel Merman

NEW YORK (UPI)—Ethel Merman, a healthy woman with a healthy voice, assaulted the sound barrier 22 times Tuesday night.

That was the number of songs she unleashed during the hour-long Ford Startime special on NBC-TV. The hour was so shapeless and ear-shattering — except

for a next-to-closing cavalcade of tunes Miss Merman made famous — that even the four ballads in the batch of 22 were blasted off like Jupiter rockets.

The cavalcade segment saw Miss Merman stroll across a large stage that was tastefully and simply decorated and, in color, exceptionally attractive.

Apart from this stylish display, Miss Merman's show-stopper style was apparent only in her "Blow, Gabriel, Blow" number, when she stood before a small jazz band and belted out her pre-recorded song.

There were many drawbacks to the hour but the complete reliance on pre-recorded numbers was the biggest. Since I'm certain Miss Merman's Broadway stage appearances are not pre-recorded, I can't understand why she couldn't favor us TV free-loaders with at least one spontaneous "live" song. The recordings also provided another unfortunate distraction — an other-world echo chamber effect.

Miss Merman's three male guests, Tom Preston, Fess Parker and Tab Hunter, also were pre-recorded, making the abuse complete.

Another shortcoming was a series of three dreary sketches that were supposed to set up some songs in amusing ways. All three fell flat. One even contained a

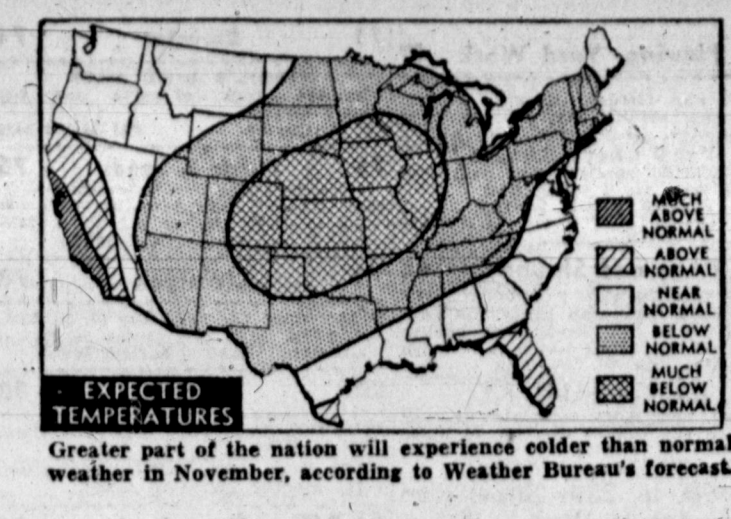
line of dubious taste. It came when Miss Merman was portraying an American in London.

The frantic sound level was another handicap. How this show needed a soft, low-key change of pace. I also missed the lack of pertinency in the numbers. The songs were familiar but some nailing-down of time, place and career-impact might have added more warmth to Miss Merman's performance.

A final note: The show opened with the song called "Everything's Coming Up Roses." This is a 1959 song. I wonder how TV specials ever managed to open without it?

The Channel Swim: CBS-TV's Lu Pont Show of the Month may take a month off next year. A variety of factors — higher production costs and a scarcity of suitable properties are some that have been mentioned — may force the series to skip a show in May.
