Harvester Bowl Burglar Caught

An 18-year-old who led Pampa police on a high-speed chase Friday morning into Donley County, was captured Sunday morning in Coalinga, Calif. Sheriff Rufe Jordan said today Cecil Sexton was apprehended at about 10:30 a.m. (12:30 a.m. Pampa time) by a Coalinga police lieutenant who had been alerted by Gray County lawmen. Deputy Sheriff Buck Haggard and Pilot Claude Timmons left Perry Lefors Airfield this morning to pick up Sexton and return him for arraignment on a charge of burglary. At night and theft. Haggard and Sexton are scheduled to return here Tuesday noon. Sheriff Jordan said the youth has already signed a written confession to the burglary Friday morning of the Harvester Bowl. It is believed the youth hitchhiked to Amarillo Friday morning and took a plane from Amarillo to Coalinga. Coalinga is located about 175 miles southeast of San Francisco. The Californian was the object of an intense air-land man hunt Friday in a desolate canyon about two miles from Groom. Sexton, driving a 1959 Chevrolet, outran a Pampa police car in an early morning chase that began at the Harvester Bowl. Sexton was surprised while burglarizing a number of vending machines and was in the process of opening the bowling establishment's safe. Sheriff Jordan said that Sexton will be arraigned "the moment we get him back." The car driven by Sexton was reported stolen at San Francisco Sept. 14.

Will Attempt To Further Peace Aims

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower told congressional leaders today he would try to further the American aim of a more peaceful world during his 11 nation goodwill tour but he does not intend to do any negotiating. House and Senate leaders from both parties gave the President their best wishes for success of his 22,370-mile trip to Europe, Asia and Africa which begins Thursday.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson told reporters after leaving the special breakfast conference at the White House. "He will take with him our understanding, our prayers and our hopes for a successful journey." "We hope that the peoples he contacts will realize as we do that as far as peace is concerned, the American people stand as one, united," the Texan added.

Another Democratic leader, House Speaker Sam Rayburn said, "It is a strenuous piece of business, but I think we all think it is a good thing — it is not amiss." Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois said the chief executive reviewed his plans and aims in some detail, including the outline of "three or four major talks in India."

He said the Democrats present, including Chairman J. William Fulbright of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, unanimously expressed approval of the trip as the President gave each breakfast guest full opportunity to express his views.

Fulbright told reporters, "We all said we were glad he was going and we all wished him good luck and Godspeed." Fulbright said he told the President he felt this was a propitious time to bring about a solution of the difficulties between India and Pakistan and Eisenhower said he was hopeful that he could make some contribution to a solution.

Russian Troops To Stay, Says Kadar In U.S. Blast

VIENNA, Austria (UPI) — Hungarian Communist Party Leader Imre Kadar accused the United States today of inciting a slander campaign against Hungary in United Nations.

Kadar addressed the opening of the seventh Hungarian Communist congress in Budapest before an audience of Red leaders that included Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

There was widespread speculation outside Hungary that Khrushchev might use the party meeting to announce the withdrawal of Russian troops who crushed an anti-Communist uprising there in 1956.

Kadar said, however, that the Russian troops would stay. "The Soviet troops will remain in Hungary as long as the international situation demands their presence against the Socialist countries can be heard, therefore we must be prepared."

"The United States has incited a slanderous campaign against Hungary," he said. "We strongly protest against the holding of a debate on the so-called Hungarian question in the United Nations."

The party first stressed that the country's foreign policy is "based on friendship with the Soviet Union."

"Our relations with the United States are most satisfactory," Kadar said. "The American diplomatic neglect of undertaking any measures to improve this situation during the past two years, certainly is according to our government's orders."

Khrushchev makes a major address to the congress Tuesday and Western political observers believe he may take advantage of the United Nations debate on Hungary to announce a troop withdrawal in line with his new peace offensive.

Khrushchev flew into Budapest from Moscow with none of the fanfare which surrounded his trips to Washington and Communist China to attend the Hungarian Communist Party's first congress since the anti-Communist uprising in 1956. The fireworks could come in what the Communists called his "very important" speech Tuesday.

Diplomats in Moscow said Khrushchev was attending the congress obviously to stress his support for the regime of Imre Kadar in the face of the parallel United Nations debate on Hungary. Moscow dispatches said he also would protest U.N. intervention in Hungary as a gross interference in Communist internal affairs.

Tributes To Sir Winston On Reaching 85 Years Of Age

LONDON (UPI) — Tributes poured in from the four corners of the earth today to honor Britain's grand old man, Sir Winston Churchill, on his 85th birthday. The principal observance planned for the occasion was a party for about 20 relatives and close friends at the wartime prime minister's town house. Churchill also was expected to listen to the annual radio broadcast tonight listing the achievements of his long career.

Longview Jail-Breaker Shot, Recaptured By Police Officers

DALLAS (UPI) — J. A. Avery Jr., 29-year-old Fort Worth convict who once told a Longview jailer he had "nothing to lose," remained in "fair" condition today after he was riddled by shotguns and pistols in a running battle with officers Sunday.

Hospital attendants said that Avery, who had been sought since he escaped from the Longview jail Nov. 18, probably will survive although he was hit seven times in the head and his arm was "punctured" by pellets. However, physicians said none of the pellets in his head penetrated his skull.

A few minutes after Avery was captured, officers broke into a nearby apartment where Lowell Scott Logsdon, 25, of Odessa, Avery's companion in crime, was holed up.

Logsdon, wearing only his shorts, was caught completely by surprise and he surrendered without a fight.

Avery and Logsdon, both of whom were being held in the Longview jail on burglary charges, escaped Nov. 18 when they pulled a gun on jailer A. F. Hamm. Avery threatened to kill Hamm and told him, "I have nothing to lose."

Balloonists Soar 13 Miles, Back Safely

BLAINE, Kan. (UPI) — A veteran Navy balloonist was injured slightly Sunday in the rough landing of a balloon that had carried two men 13 miles high for a closer look at Venus, but he was expected to be on his feet again today.

Commander Malcolm Ross suffered shock when the gondola ripped loose from the big plastic balloon, struck a fence on a country road and toppled over. His companion, Dr. Charles B. Moore, was unhurt, but both men were hospitalized overnight for fatigue.

Ross and the Cambridge, Mass., scientist had spent 27 hours aloft in a gondola packed with scientific and photographic equipment in an effort to determine whether the planet Venus has water vapor in its atmosphere. If it does, then the possibility arises that the planet has vegetable and perhaps some sort of "animal" life.

Moore said the flight was "very successful" except for the rough landing. "Our carbon dioxide rose about 30,000 feet, but other than that everything went well," he said.

Ross said the temperature aloft dropped as low as 80 below zero. "It was cold as hell," he said.

Chinese Accuse U.S. Of Kidnaping

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru said today the Chinese Communist ambassador in New Delhi had complained officially that the U. S. consulate in Bombay had kidnaped a Chinese National. However, in a speech to Parliament Nehru refused to comment on the Bombay incident except to say that both the American and Chinese Communist versions of the incident were contradictory and "appear to be some kind of fiction."

He said he had informed both embassies not to let the persons involved to leave the country.

Red China's official protest today followed Peiping radio charges that American consular officials in Bombay had kidnaped a Chinese official. Both were direct contradictions of American protests the Reds held an American Marine sergeant prisoner for six hours Thursday.

A statement by the Chinese Communist foreign office broadcast by Peiping radio said American accounts of the incident "reversed right and wrong." It said the Americans had "lied" and accused the United States of previous kidnap incidents.

Crimes Of Violence Increase

WASHINGTON (UPI) — FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover reported today that vicious crimes such as murder, rape, stabbings and violent assault are on the increase throughout the nation.

Hoover declared that these terrific crimes have risen 7 per cent in the first nine months of this year even though the overall crime statistics dipped 1 per cent for the same period of 1958.

Using figures reported by cities of more than 25,000 population, the FBI chief stressed that murder showed an increase of 4 per cent through September forcible rape, 5 per cent, and aggravated assault, 7 per cent.

Only a decrease in "crimes against property such as larcenies, burglaries and auto thefts offset the increase in crimes against persons," Hoover said. He termed the over-all 1 per cent general decrease "almost insignificant."

Of non-violent crimes, Hoover said reports for the first nine months of the year showed a 7 per cent decrease in robberies, 2 per cent in burglaries, 1 per cent in auto theft, and 1 per cent in larcenies over \$50.

But Hoover said: "Violent assaults against the person continue their upward climb." A breakdown of crime statistics for 134 cities of more than 100,000 population showed New York and Chicago led the list of murder cities.

New York reported 303 cases of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, Chicago, 247 Philadelphia, 91; Los Angeles and Houston, 89 each; Detroit, 84.

Los Angeles had the highest number of rape cases — 745. New York reported 581; Philadelphia, 483; Chicago, 441; and Detroit, 198.

Seven Killed In S. Texas Crash

PETTUS, Tex. (UPI) — A smashing two-car head-on collision just south of Pettus in South Texas late Sunday night killed seven persons, including six members of a San Antonio family.

The Department of Public Safety said the driver of the second automobile was alone. She was identified as Odessa Deval Mc Dow, 32, of Corpus Christi.

The six victims riding in the first automobile were identified as Larry Victor Chatham, 44, the driver; his wife, Irene, 34; and their four children, Larry, Jr., 16; Elizabeth Ann Chatham, 6; Kathy Chatham, 4; and nine-month-old Patricia Chatham.

Fire, Blasts Hit Temple In Night Disaster

TEMPLE (UPI) — A roaring fire, punctuated by four explosions, destroyed a drug store and damaged four other business buildings in downtown Temple Sunday night.

All of the city's available equipment and firemen answered the alarm. No one was injured. About 100 speculators who crowded into an alley behind the drug store had to flee to safety when the series of explosions rocked the building.

Firemen battled the flames more than three hours before bringing it under control. City Fire Marshal J. C. Singleton said the cause of the fire was not immediately determined. It started in the Harris Drug Store at 7:55 p.m., less than an hour after its owner, Charles Harris, had closed for the night.

Smoke and water caused heavy damage to the Dough Shop, a pastry shop, the Community Finance and Loan Co., the Holiday Lounge and the Jake Carter Sales Co., a wholesale warehousing firm.

Harris said his store and stock were partially covered by insurance.

Panamanian Troops Praised For Stopping Anti-U.S. Riots

PANAMA CITY (UPI) — U. S. authorities praised Panamanian troops today for the quick action which curbed Saturday night's anti-American rioting by unruly teenagers waving Fidel Castro placards.

Thirteen U. S. soldiers and a score of Panamanians were injured in the outbreak, none of them seriously. The only Americans hospitalized were Pvt. James E. Mitchell, of East Prairie, Mo., who accidentally jabbed himself with his own bayonet, and PFC Ralph B. Gillan, of Ft. Worth, Tex., whose forehead was cut by a rock.

Bandits Net \$150 In Groom

A pair of bandits robbed a Groom service station of approximately \$150 in cash early Sunday morning and made good their escape after locking the attendant in a restroom.

Luther Williamson, who works the night shift at Al's Texaco Station on Hwy. 66 in Groom, said two men pulled into the station at 4:05 a.m., came into the office and asked for "cigarette change."

When Williamson opened the cash drawer, he said the older of the two men pointed a revolver at him, then emptied the contents of the cash register.

The pair didn't threaten Williamson, but he said the younger of the two "wanted to take me with them."

Before fleeing, Williamson was locked in a restroom. He said he believed the couple headed east.

The two men were not masked and Williamson described one as about 35 years old, 5 feet 8 inches tall, weight about 150; the other man was believed to be about 18 or 20, weight about 165, and more than 6 feet tall. They were driving a late model auto, Williamson said.

Carson County sheriffs, Grady Stapp and Kenneth Black, are investigating the robbery.

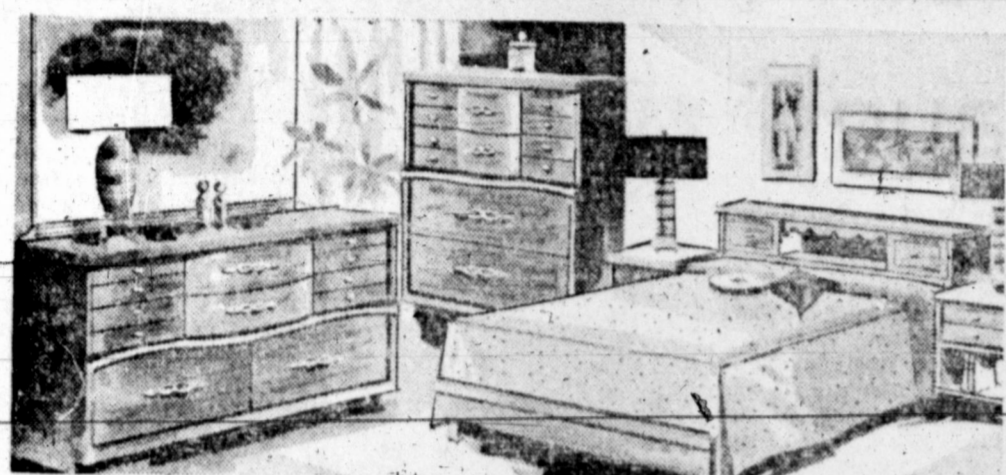

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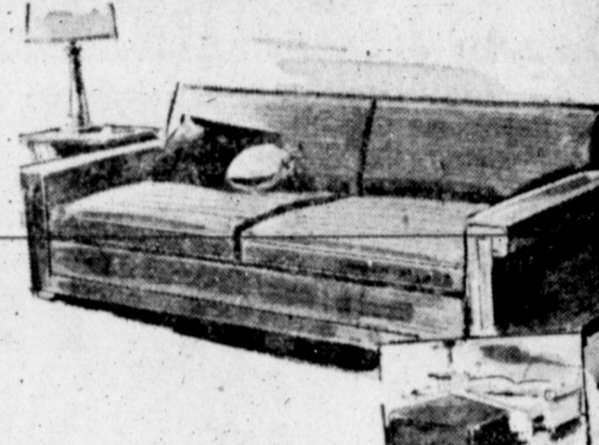

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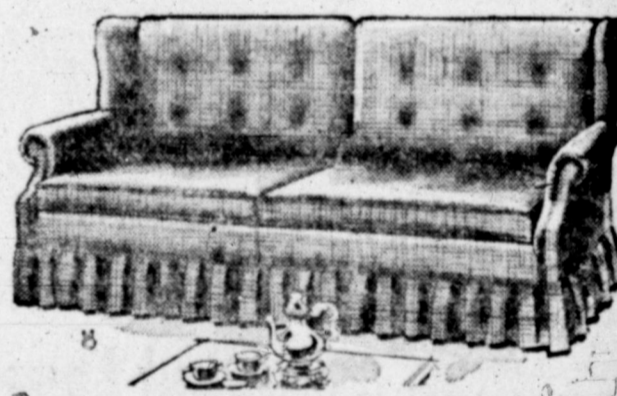

Mike Urged To Ready More Moon Rockets

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower was urged to issue immediate orders to prepare at least three or four more Atlas-Able rockets for launching toward the moon early next year.

The proposal was advanced by Andrew G. Haley Jr., general counsel for the American Rocket Society. He said the alternative would be a year's delay in any new U. S. moon shot which would be "fatal to America's prestige."

Haley's statement came as a high official described as "naive" and "real stupid" America's previous efforts to compete with Russia in lunar exploration.

This official, who asked that his name not be used, said the 1,500-mile Thor and Jupiter missiles used in the first five U. S. moon shots did not have sufficient power for the project.

Consequently, he said, most of their guidance equipment had to be removed to reduce weight, despite the fact that they were used for a mission requiring the highest accuracy.

The official also described as "real stupid" the fact that only one rocket was ordered for the unsuccessful Thanksgiving Day launching featuring the 5,000-mile Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile.

"If the Lunar job is worth doing, as I believe it is," he said, "the Thanksgiving day firing should have been part of a comprehensive program involving at least five or six rockets."

Haley agreed with the criticism. He said Russia plans space projects on a multi-rocket basis and usually has an alternate rocket standing by at the time of the firing.

Unless Eisenhower orders a new moon shot program with overriding priorities, a year or more will pass before America makes another attempt to send a rocket to the moon because all the Atlas rockets to be produced in that period are earmarked for other projects.

Haley said this would be "fatal to America's prestige." It is vital that we make another attempt or that we make another attempt within three months.

Although missiles could be diverted from other projects to meet Haley's timetable, this could affect tests scheduled in "Project Mercury," to put a man in orbit in 1961, or "Project Atlas," to develop an early-warning military satellite.

Spokesmen for the National Aeronautics & Space Administration (NASA) and the Air Force said an order for additional lunar shots would require a careful examination to determine what could be sacrificed or postponed.

Doughboy's Feet Turn To Clay

FORT DEVENS, Mass. (UPI) — The infantry isn't what it used to be. Two soldiers trying to set a new world record for walking Saturday surrendered instead to the wind-whipped rain.

They covered 72 miles of their hunched derby in 23 hours in a downpour that caused weathermen to issue flash flood warnings after they quit.

L. Wayne B. Nicoll, 27, of Bow Mills, N.H., and Sgt. Harry Goldsmith, 30, of Bridgeport, Ohio, clambered into an ambulance at Milford, N.H., with pulled muscles and sore feet.

"I'll try it again," said Nicoll, New England heel and toe champ who was using the hike as a warm-up for his coming attempt to make the U.S. Olympic team.

The wind was clocked at 25 miles an hour when they surrendered, leaving Royal Air Corpsman Mike Desmond, 20, of England still "official" champ in the latest craze.

Desmond last week had hiked 110 miles from Norwich to London, England. His title was disputed by Dr. Barbara Moore, 56, of London who had claimed a 110-mile march in 27 hours and 30 minutes. Nicoll didn't recognize her title on the ground that she ran some and "that's not cricket."

The Americans had set out from Groton, Mass., Friday, using the standard Army tactics — march 50 minutes and take a 10-minute break.

Algerian Rebels Increase Fighting

ALGIERS (UPI) — Algerian rebels were reported Saturday to have stepped up the pace of fighting against the French in an apparent prelude to the imminent United Nations debate on Algeria.

French army sources said that 233 Algerian rebels had been killed or captured in the past 48 hours in a sharp increase of military activity.

The sources said 47 rebels were killed in a single battle waged along the border with Tunisia, which provides sanctuary for the nationalists in their five-year-old struggle for independence from France.

Observers here said the suddenly increased rebel activity was connected with the forthcoming debate on Algeria in the political committee of the U.N. General Assembly. They said it was designed to add emphasis to a rebel U.N. drive to push through a resolution backing Algerian independence.

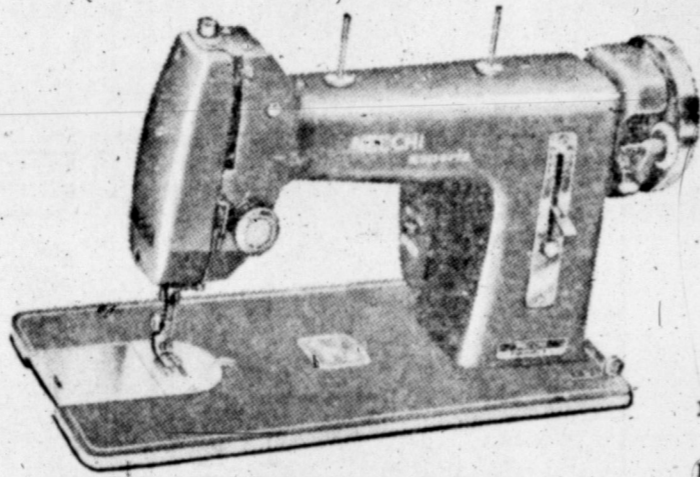

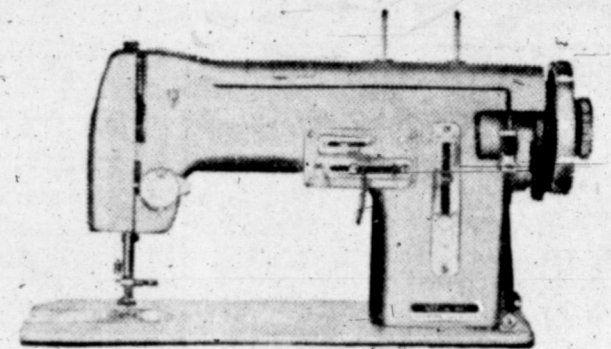

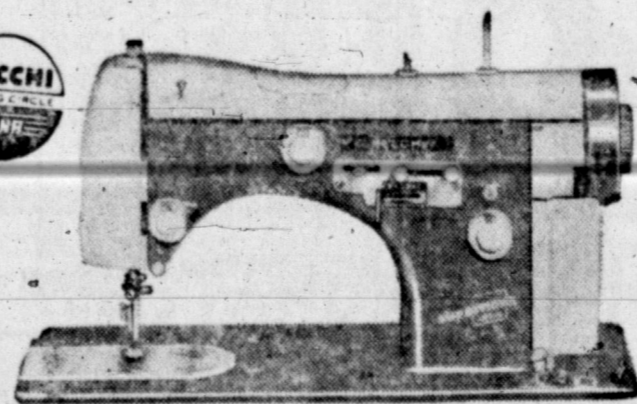

(Continued from Page 1) produced at Fairless — at 6:40 a.m. the following day. The plant has been operating at 90 to 95 per cent of its 2,400,000 ton-a-year capacity since Nov. 20, Johannsen said.

This was in sharp contrast to predictions from many industry sources that it would take a month or more to get back to pre-strike levels of output. The industry now is running at about 45 per cent of capacity.

Our employees gave us an orderly shutdown when the strike began and an honest-to-goodness start-up when it was halted," he noted.

Johannsen, however, refused to specify what changes he wants to make to improve efficiency at the huge Fairless plant that now are barred under the controversial 2-B clause in the Steelworkers' contract.

The clause permits management to change the size of crews and other work rules if it introduces new machinery. But it prohibits revision of established practices unless the company can show the conditions which gave rise to those practices have changed.

Russell Thompson, president of the 5,000-member Steelworkers' local at the plant, is convinced that union members would lose hard-won gains if 2-B was dropped.

Thompson, 47, is classified as a rigger, or an expert in moving machinery and other loads within the plant. Thompson said he might be required to do painters' and pipelayers' work in addition to his specialty, rigging, if the clauses were eliminated.

"Our deep fear is that abolition of 2-B would give management a weapon and when they saw the power they had — watch out!" Thompson said.

Both Johannsen and Thompson agreed that Fairless did not have as big a problem as other steel plants since it's a baby in the industry — seven years old.

Because of this, there are fewer long-established work practices and the company solved many crew-size problems by setting up a broad incentive program when it opened this plant. Johannsen said 92 per cent of the production and maintenance force is on piecework rates.

The union claims, however, that 2-B will become more important as time goes by. It recently won a grievance at the plant which the steelworkers claim has established the principle that the clause applies to practices arising after 1947 when 2-B was inserted into the contract.

Kennedy Says '60 Election Important

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (UPI)—Sen. John Kennedy (D-Mass.) said Sunday that the 1960 presidential election might become more important to the nation than the 1952 victory of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

"In 1952, the security of the country depended on the election of a Democratic president," he said. "In 1960, the election of a Democratic president involves the cause of freedom around the world."

Kennedy told a Democratic Party reception here the Soviet Union may outstrip the United States within the next decade if a Republican administration is returned to the White House next year.

"In the next 10 years, unless we bring some sense into our farm policies, the Soviet Union may outproduce us in food and find some better way of distributing it to a hungry world," Kennedy said. "By 1975 the Soviet Union may outproduce us in hydro-electric power."

"Every time the Soviets are first, whether they are first in education, hydro-electric power, space, or food, it augments the totalitarian system and works to our discredit."

At a news conference Sunday, Kennedy said he thought the 80-day back to work provision of the Taft-Hartley law was a "one-sided tool" which broke the steel strike at a crucial time for management.

Kennedy said he thought the industry was reluctant to bargain because it felt an injunction would be issued.

The other 35 New York Giants soon may join Charley Conerly in riding around in new automobiles. The \$25,000 heavy of gifts Conerly received Sunday at Yankee Stadium included two brand new autos. The Steelers, with Bobby Layne throwing four touchdowns, whipped the Philadelphia Eagles at Pittsburgh, 31-0.

The Browns and Eagles started the day only a game behind the Giants but virtually lost all hope by losing Coach Paul Brown, whose Browns invade New York next Sunday, told what the Forty-niners had done to his team's Eastern chances in two words: "That's it."

The Baltimore Colts remained tied with San Francisco for the Western lead by downing the Los Angeles Rams, 35-21, at home behind the passing of John Unitas. The Chicago Bear kept their Western hopes alive, retaining a game behind the two leaders by thumping the Chicago Cardinals, 31-7, in Sunday's other game. Each of the 12 clubs has two more regular season games.

New York is in a powerful position. It entertains the Browns before ending its regular campaign against the crippled Redskins at Washington. The Eagles play at Washington next Sunday and then entertain the Browns. Baltimore, the league titleholder, must perform like a champion and snap a jinx to retain the Western title. The Colts play next Saturday at San Francisco and the following Saturday at Los Angeles. Baltimore has won only one of 14 games in those cities.

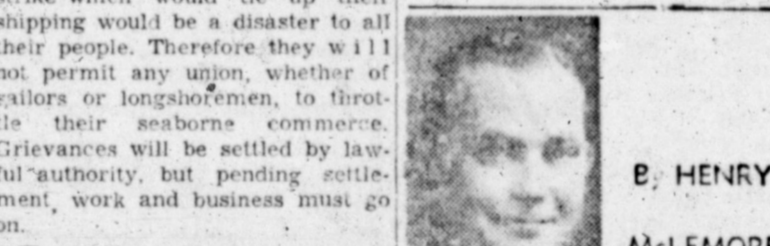


Fair Enough



The big steel and automobile companies are owned by individual American investors, most of them workers. Under our laws and our bigotry against big aggregations of little investors, these people are forbidden to band together as their employees are banded in the United Steel Workers and United Auto Workers unions. The steel and auto workers can strike the entire steel and auto industries. But the small investors who own the companies are forbidden to strike back. The lockout by a company, or a whole industry as a result of a strike, is unthinkable. The investor cannot strike first, beating the unions to the punch when economic and political circumstances favor a lockout. They must always wait until the unions have had the benefit of initiative and propaganda. The small investors appear in the role of gigantic masses of capital and power. The politicians, including presidents, all know that the share-owners are as needy and deserving and altogether valuable to the country as the union members are. Yet, as "capital" they seem ugly.

At this point, the simple but somehow almost unthinkable method of the Scandinavians in dealing with belligerent, brutal unions is worth quiet study. The Scandinavians all have reached very practical conclusions which are only beginning to dawn dimly on the intelligence of Americans. The four Scandinavian nations have solidly decided that any strike which would tie up their shipping would be a disaster to all their people. Therefore they will not permit any union, whether of sailors or longshoremen, to threaten their seaborne commerce. Grievances will be settled by lawful authority, but pending settlement, work and business must go on.

Traditions Weld A Family Together

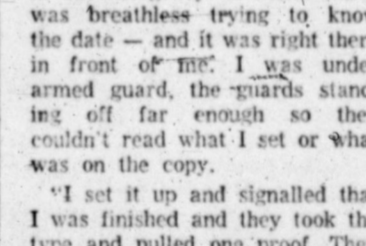

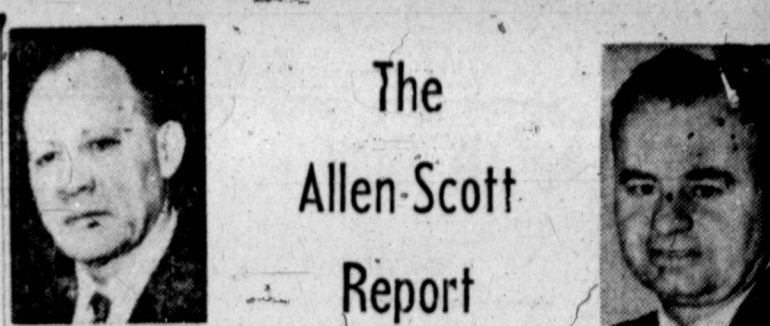

There was a dinner the other night given by my New York newspaper to employees who had been with the paper 25 years or more. Two fellows had just qualified and they were the guests of honor. STATION PERMANENT UN TROUBLESHOOTERS IN MAJOR DANGER SPOTS — HERTER WASHINGTON—Secretary Christian Herter is proposing that United Nations trouble-shooters be stationed permanently at major danger areas in the world. Under their far-reaching plan, as the Secretary of State is discussing it with UN leaders, Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold would send UN representatives to Berlin; the India - Chinese border, South Vietnam, Korea, Formosa, and other potential explosion spots.

In his backstage discussions, Herter is explaining the trouble-shooters would not be imposed on any nation. Instead, they would be assigned only on a voluntary basis and at the request of one or other countries involved in a dispute. Secretary General Hammarskjold not only favors Herter's plan, but would expand it to include new and undeveloped nations in Africa and Asia.

As an illustration, Hammarskjold has suggested that a UN representative be stationed in Somalia in East Africa, which is slated to become independent of Italy next year. While there is no crisis in Somalia, the Secretary General stresses that a "UN presence there would permit keeping a close watch on outside attempts to overthrow the new government by economic and propaganda subversion, and enable prompt measures to be taken to block this."

The United Nations now has a "diplomatic presence" in Laos, Jordan, Lebanon and Palestine, and "police forces" in South Korea and the Gaza Strip, and Gulf of Aqaba. LAOS PRECEDENT — Basis of Herter's plan is the precedent established in Laos where Sakara Severi Tuomola, a UN undersecretary, has been named UN representative at the request of the small Communist-ruled nation.

In a letter Hammarskjold has sent UN members, Tuomola has been assigned to keeping him fully informed, as follows: "The task of this representative is to report to me on such further developments and conditions as might be of importance in the light of the obligations of the Secretary-General. The legal basis for a decision to leave a personal representative in Laos, apart from the consent of the government of Laos, is the general responsibilities of the Secretary-General regarding peace and security, combined with my administrative authority under the UN charter."

Foremost among those with whom Herter has so far discussed his momentous plan are Britain, France, Canada and Italy. Later, after further details have been formulated, he will take it up with Russia. RECORD DEPTHS — The U.S. now has nuclear submarines that can operate at depths greater than 400 feet. Admiral Hyman Rickover has revealed this to congressional leaders.
