# Mid-East Armor Battle Raging

Israel and Egypt are fighting "large scale armor battles" in the Sinai desert east of the Suez canal, Israel said today. On the diplomatic front, the Arab states tried to put pressure on the United States to lessen its

support for Israel.

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Amman radio announced that Jordanian forces with the support of Syrian dive bombers attacked six Israeli positions on the Golan Heights of Syria at dawn and destroyed nine Centurion tanks in a "fierce" battle that lasted until noon. While the battle was in

progress in the Sinai, there was no word of the Israeli task force which slipped across the canal into Egypt Tuesday to hit at the antiaircraft and artillery positions that have provided the umbrella for the 100.000-man Egyptian army which had advanced three or more miles beyond the waterway.

Israel has not yet announced the task force's withdrawal. Egypt said Tuesday it had destroyed three of its seven amphibious tanks and was after the others, but a later communique was silent about the task force.

News from the battlefields was skimpy. For the second straight day Israel barred newsmen from the Sinai front where analysts believe the decisive battles will be fought.

During the night, Egyptian commandos raided the region around Sharm el Sheikh, which guards the entrance to the Tiran Straits on the tip of the Sinai peninsula. An Israeli in Canyon. splokesman said 38 of them were captured and "you can assume no damage was done. Israel occupied Sharm el Sheikh during the 1967 war.

1966 A U.S. airlift continued to pour replacement equipment to Israel to match the Russian resupply of the Arab forces. UPI correspondent Joseph W. Grigg reported from Beirut that military analysts there believe that without the resupplying of both sides the war could hardly go on another 10 days.



# **Evangelist Fights To Keep Homes**

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) -Evangelist Lester Roloff, trying desperately to keep his home for girls open despite its failure to meet state requirements. said Tuesday night the state of Texas was playing God and in the process would make orphans of 80 boys and girls.

We're living in a welfare, socialistic sort of government and they're taking over." Roloff said.

He referred to state officials who would force him to shut down the Rebekah Home for Girls in Corpus Christi and the Anchor Home for Boys in Zapata. Neither of the homes meet state requirements for child care center licenses.

Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell asked Attorney General John Hill to begin contempt of court proceedings today against Roloff and his organization. Roloff Enterprises. Inc., for keeping the schools open beyond the Oct. 1 deadline set by District Judge Walter Dunham.

Attorneys for Roloff said they would file their own suit today challenging the constitutionality of the state regulations concerning children's homes

Tuesday night, during an emotional rally in Austin led by Roloff with his supporters cheering and applauding, the evangelist appealed to Gov. Dolph Briscoe and the people of Texas to keep his schools open.

A crowd of 4,000 gathered in the capital for the rally, many driving to Central Texas from the Corpus Christi area. Roloff arrived when the rally was two hours old, and stayed until it ended three hours later.

With 80 of the boys and girls he said would become homeless gathered around him, Roloff attacked the Welfare Department, the governor and the state regulations.

"Our diet, our discipline, our staff are not acceptable to the Welfare Department," Roloff said "I don't think the Welfare Department is trained to run a Christiah home.

Something ought to be done if they have to declare an emergency. I don't see how anybody could lose any votes by helping little girls. I don't see how they can expect to get any votes

President Nixon praised Kissinger "for his richly deserved selection.

Brig. Gen. John P. Flynn of the Air Force, the highest ranking American prisoner of war held by the Communists in Vietnam, said he agreed completely with the award of the prize to Kissinger. He added, "I hope Le Duc Tho attempts to get his government to live up to the stated agreement concerning the peace in Vietnam and especially that portion that deals with

strict accounting of all the missing in action and no interference with the affairs of the south :

In Paris, a spokesman for the Viet Cong said Le Duc Tho made a "great contribution" to achieving the uneasy ceasefire in Vietnam. "the agreement which has been violated very seriously by the United States and the Saigon

administration. According to Saigon command figures, 47,376 Vietnamese on both sides have

been killed since the ceasefire began Jan. 28. Some 45,944 Americans were killed during the entire war.

Bui Bao Truc, the Saigon government spokesman, said "the act of giving the Nobel prize to Le Duc Tho is similar to granting the title chastity to a prostitute or a pimp." Truc did

not mention Kissinger at all. Prof. George Wald of Harvard, who has won the Nobel Prize for science, called the award "an absolute disgrace." He said the Nixon adminstration's Vietnam policy, which Kissinger drew up, was characterized by "brutal, heartless" murders.

The New York Times in an editorial said the award was "at the very least, premature. Secretary Kissinger ... may by the end of his career amply warrant the award already won that, however, remains conjectural, a reservation that remains at least equally applicable to the Le Duc Tho

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# Home tennis court becoming "in" item

By DOROTHEA M. BROOKS NEW YORK (UPI) - First it was the backyard swimming pool. Now, it's the home tennis court - and more.

Backyard recreation is a booming business. At least \$100 million will be spent by consumers this year on leisure time equipment for their own backyards, according to Thomas T. Lenk, president of Garcia Corp., sporting goods manufacturer. That sum, he says, is a rapidly growing slice of the \$5 billion pie estimated for the entire leisure market industry in 1973.

Affluence and the growing disenchantment with heavy traffic and heavy crowds at public recreation centers have helped to bring about this reversal in the habit patterns of many American families, Lenk said.

Swimming pools still are a big thing, and there are many other sports taking on a backyard tone; even the backyard horse is becoming a commonplace in suburbia.

But the really "in" thing this year, Lenk said, is the private backyard tennis court.

The more people watch the game and play the game on municipal or club courts, the more they will yearn for their own private court, Lenk said. Swimming pools

"Exactly the same thing happened to the backyard swimming pool, which was a Hollywood status symbol in the late '30s. It became a booming national in-thing with the public within 25 years," he noted.

The status symbol pools-like Liberace's piano-shaped one - are a memory for the most part. Residential pools are utilitarian and generally conventional in shape — at least 75 per cent of them renging from 15 by 30 feat to ranging from 15 by 30 feet to 20 by 40 feet. The cost of the average middle-range pool this year is \$5,278, and small pools cost around \$4,000 although some do-it-yourselfers have cut even that tab.

A tennis court, Lenk said, takes more room than a swimming pool, but a small court can be managed on a flat section of ground about 55 by 110 feet. The playing area itself is 36 by 78, with the rest taken up by border strips. A standard championship court requires 60 by 120 feet.

or wood surfaced with a new resilient material, an all-weather product designed to drain rainwater quickly and afford a solid, no-slip surface for players. The same material is used as decking for swimming pools. Ideally, the court is fenced -10 to 12 feet

high. Lenk says a professionally installed, regulation, fenced court in most areas will start close to \$10,000. Fencing alone runs to several thousand dollars.

For a less professional set-up, using some do-it-yourself labor, figure on \$2,000 up. You might economize by leaving out the fencing until later on - collar one of the youngsters to chase balls.

For those who can't afford the space for a regulation court, Lenk said, there is platform tennis, a type of miniature tennis played outdoors on a 30 by 60 foot platform. Designed with a 12-foot fence around it, the game utilizes the fence itself for caroms and angle shots.

Other ideas Growing in popularity, too, is the home putting green giving the golf enthusiast a chance to sharpen his game for the greens and give the youngsters a little at-home instruction. In areas wherebackyard means more than an acre or two, there is room for a scaled-down course on which the kids can learn the game, and Dad while away an hour or two. It takes ingenuity and labor. You might even consider the once-popular miniature golf.

In colder climates, ice skating is becoming a backyard sport, both figure skating and ice hockey, each gaining a wide following as a result of widespread television coverage. The neighborhood pond still is the most likely spot for this sport, but the family with a swimming pool can covert it for winter skating, using bumpers to protect pool sides. and there are even backyard rinks-shallow, plastic lined circular or rectangular areas which can be filled and frozen. But it does take space - room for stable, paddock and, hopefully, a grazing area, and easy access to riding trails.

"It's extremely difficult to put a new man into a position as tough as quarterback and it's even harder to try to cram the necessary experience into him in a short time." the Aggie coach said.





**QUESTION:** If Richard Nixon, who has taken an oath to aphold the Constitution and the laws of the land, can defy, with complete immunity, an order from a federal judge, is not

every person entitled to this

same privilege? ANSWER: In the first place, President Nixon did not defy the court. He answered as any other citizen was legally obligated to do. When Judge Sirica ruled against him, he appealed. That is procedure to which every person, whether he is a citizen or an alien from the most obscure corner of the earth, is entitled under the English system of law Some observers believe that

he made a public - relations mistake when he submitted the question of presidential authority to the jurisdiction of a federal district court. Going into court, according to this view. leads people to suppose that the President will abide by the decision of the courts after appeals are exhausted.

In legal actuality, other writers point out, the President like any other citizen - can raise the question of the courts' jurisdiction at any point along the line. Hence, if the appeals go against him, he might still resist the court order on grounds that the judiciary does not have constitutional grounds for determining the question at

issue. In that event, Mr. Jones' question becomes pertinent.

We concede we don't know the answer yet. We are dealing here with a political system, and it is difficult for a rational mind to think in political terms. From a pragmatic standpoint, political aws flow out of political power. That is to say, if there is no political power to enforce a

ruling of the political court system, how can there be a law? Suppose the Supreme Court were to order the President to

jail for refusing to obey a final order? Suppose the President were to submit to the jailing? The courts would then have in custody the chief executive officer of the country. What does that do to the doctrine of the separation of the branches of government?

Looking ahead, we believe the judiciary will avoid that ridiculous situation. One method of avoidance would be for an appeal court to hold that the Pres t was correct in not

WASHINGTON - Two background factors were impellingly behind the latest round of large - scale Middle East warring:

(1) Open Russian scorn of Arab bravery and competence. This baldly insulting contempt and disparagment was broadcast by Moscow's Radio Arabic following Egyptian and Syrian complaints about the Soviet weapons they were getting.

Retorted the Kremlin spokesman, "Only cowards and imcompetents talk like that. The Arabs have more planes and tanks and missiles than Israel.

(2) Seething unrest and steadily intensifying disaffection in both Syria and Egypt. The strongman rulers of the two countries had weathered previous attempted coups and revolts, and both were highly doubtful they could survive another.

So Egupt's Anwar Sadat and Syria's Hafez Assad, both ex-generals, resorted to a time worn strategem of military dictators when in trouble at home - they went to war. It was admittedly a gamble,

but they figured they had more to gain than lose; that is, they couldn't lose any more than they did in the "six day war" in 1967 - when Egypt lost all of the Sinai peninsula, including the east bank of the Suez Canal and Sharm el-Sheikh on the Strait of Tiran; and Syria, the strategic

**Pulling No Punches** Moscow Radio Arabic's excoriation of the Egyptians and Syrians was as scathing as it was exceptional.

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The Arabs started it by indignantly protesting, via Cario and Damascus Radio, that the Kremlin was withholding modern and sophisticated weapons from them while the U.S. was showering them on Israel. All the Arabs got were "defensive" weapons, it was charged, while Israel received the latest in

"offensive" hardware. At first, Mowscow responded mildly and forbearingly. But when the Cairo and Damascus yelling became insistently rancorous, the Russians lashed back - and with obvious long held vengeance.

In one blistering broadcast, Moscow in effect characterized the Arabs as cowards when it came to facing up to the Israelis. The Russians flatly made no bones about branding the Arabs as incompetents in handling weapons and managing economic and other aid projects.

'The weapons of the Vietcong and North Vietnamese. declaimed Moscow Radio, "are no better than those supplied the Arab countries. In fact, in some instances that are not as good. Yet the Vietnamese destroyed thousands of American airplanes, many of them on the ground by guerrilla attacks. Certainly it should not be necessary to point out to true fighters that a submachinegun is a highly effective offensive weapon in the right hands."

On another occasion, Illiodor Kuley, in charge of Soviet economic aid in Egypt. caustically berated the latter's management of the huge Aswan Dam project and irrigation system

In a broadcast, Kuley, in what he wryly called "friendly advice," declared that Soviet supplied equipment was being neglected and mishandled, and that important installations were being operated in a "disastrous manner." Unless immediate corrective measures were taken, he somberly

Your Health The Great Protein Put-On By Lawrence Lamb, M.D.


Here is a moral degenerate whose confessions of misdeeds clearly show he has no respect for the individual rights of others yet he has the gall to complain that the Press is picking on him.





**By HOWARD L. WEATHERLY** Q. I collect state assistance because I'm blind and I have no other income. I understand the federal government is going to make these payments. What do I have to do to make sure my payments continue?

A. Starting in January, 1974. the federal government will make monthly supplemental security income payments to people in financial need who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled. Until then, state and local public assistance offices will continue to make payments in the usual way. Since you're getting state assistance, you don't have to apply for the federal payments. The conversion from one program to the other will be automatic.



Adequate wiring and sufficient electrical outlets are always found in the newer dwellings, but what about older homes? How can you tell if your home is not properly wired for today's needs?

Homes that were built many years ago were wired for the needs of the times. Often there

Over the years, you and other occupants of your home, have probably added make - shift outlets to handle the growing family demands as you added new electrical appliances. carpeting? lamps and other things that

-required electricity. One definite sign of electrical overload is when you notice your lights dim when you plug in your iron, electrical heater. toaster, etc. Sometimes this drain on your electrical supply will even cause your TV picture to become smaller when you are using many other appliances at

the same time. In this situation the home owner will find himself replacing fuses frequently and good insurance? he will be tempted to increase fuse capacity, sometimes even placing a copper penny behind a fuse that burns out time after time. The latter practice is very dangerous and should not be done under any circumstances. The penny cannot "blow" like a fuse does and therefore it will allow you to "pull" too much electricity from your supply

source. This allows wiring, both

in the walls and out in the rooms to become very hot, sometimes to the point of melting or burning off the insulation. Can you imagine the potential fire danger if you have a tremendously hot wire in the wall or lying across your

If you have any suspicions at all about the adequacy of your house wiring, waste no time in calling in an electrician for a complete and professional analysis of the situation. It may cost several hundred dollars to replace worn wiring or install new circuits, to bring your home up to present day needs.

But if this investment were to save you a serious fire, loss of a loved one, or other personal things of value that could never be replaced, wouldn't it be a

Additionally, while having the house wiring checked, make a survey of all electrical appliance cords. Examine them for breaks and signs of wear in the insulation. Be especially attentive to appliances which use large amounts of electricity such as portable electric heaters, irons, electrical

cooking appliances, etc.

These take a special, heavy duty type of wiring and unless you are thoroughly familiar with wiring yourself, you should take these to an electrical shop for wire replacement.

Also, search out and find any electric cords that run under carpets. If you find any, have sufficient wiring added to that particular appliance so it will not be necessary to place it under rugs to reach the outlet.

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
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In summary I would say that the importance of proper wiring in good condition cannot be emphasized to strongly. I urge every person in the community to avoid underestimating the dangers poor wiring produces in the home

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
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
