





BIG CHOMPER-The largest earth-moving machine ever built in America, the Kolbe Wheel Excavator, is shown in operation in southern Ohio. Owned by Bucyrus-Erie Co., it's being used to strip mine coal, but can do other gargantuan earth-moving jobs. The monster is 46 feet wide. 150 feet high and weighs 2,100 tons. It gets its name from a 27-foot-wide wheel, extreme left, driving 21/2-cubic-yard digging buckets. Excavated material is carried by a belt to be dumped, right, 420 feet away.
