Nikita Receives Warm Hello, Hot Argument

'Mr. K Irked By Deputy Mayor'

EDITOR'S NOTE: NIKITA Khrushchev chatted with UPI Moscow Bureau Manager Henry Shapiro for 10 minutes on the train coming from Los Angeles to San Francisco Sunday. Khrushchev already knew Shapiro well in Moscow. This is Shapiro's account of their conversation.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—I was sitting at a table of the club car when Premier Khrushchev came through the train. He was escorted by Henry Cabot Lodge and accompanied by his interpreter Viktor Sukhodrev and several security officers.

Khrushchev knows me from Moscow and he headed over to my table. His tired face broke into a broad smile and he stretched out his hand and addressed me in Russian.

"I am glad to see a familiar face," he said. "There are several Moscow correspondents here."

I stood up and we chatted in Russian.

I asked him how he was bearing up.

"Not badly," he said, "although the diet and the mode of living is quite different than what I am accustomed to."

Having witnessed the frosty reception Khrushchev had been given in Los Angeles, I asked his reaction.

The smile vanished and Khrushchev told of riding in a car with "the deputy mayor of Los Angeles." Khrushchev said he was a swarthy man and the Soviet leader asked him if he was Armenian.

"The deputy mayor replied, 'No, I am a Russian-born Jew and I was born in Rostov.'"

"I said to him: 'You could not have lived in Rostov if you were Jewish because before the revolution Jews were not allowed to live in that coastal area.'"

Khrushchev said the man then told him that his father was a manufacturer whom the Czar permitted to reside in Rostov on the Don River.

'Frisco Union Men Sound Off

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Soviet Nikita Khrushchev got into an uproarious and hot exchange with American union leaders late Sunday night after receiving in San Francisco the warmest public reception of his tour.

Union chiefs were still arguing today exactly what Khrushchev said in the commotion, but there was general agreement that he did insist that workers in Russia have the right to strike.

Khrushchev blasted Walter Reuther, United Auto Workers president, as a "capitalist stooge" when Reuther asked him why he pretended only Communists wanted to help the working man.

The dinner and argument lasted for three hours and 15 minutes and ended shortly before midnight. Khrushchev, went up for a five-minute look at the lights of the city from the top of the Mark and then retired to his "royal suite" on the 18th floor of the hotel.

The AFL-CIO was holding its national convention here but President George Meany pointedly stayed away from meeting Khrushchev. James B. Carey of the Electric Workers Union along with Reuther was a prime mover in arranging the dinner.

Reuther Held Briefing

Reuther held a "briefing" for 300 newsmen after the session and gave his version of what had happened.

Reuther said he asked Khrushchev: "I would like to know what a Soviet worker can do — can he strike? Can he withhold labor's power?"

Khrushchev was said to have replied: "Yes, he has the right to strike and there have been strikes since the revolution. But there have been no recent strikes because the worker knows the government is on his side."

Reuther said he pressed the point further and got the argument that "labor and government are of one mind."

The Communist leader became very upset, Reuther said, when union leaders asked him to explain the mass exodus from North Korea, Poland, Hungary and other nations where Reds had taken over the government.

Told To Think It Over

Khrushchev told his questioners to think it over and answer for themselves.

"You drink some beer and you will find the answers," he said.

At this point, Reuther said, "matters got out of hand."

Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and Yuri Zhukov, minister for cultural and foreign exchanges were among the Russians present. Other union leaders were Joseph Curran, National Maritime Union; Karl F. Feller, United Brewery Workers; O. A. Knight, Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers; Paul Phillips, United Paper Makers; and Steve Tecton, Workers.

Reuther's brother, Victor Reuther and George P. Weaver, Carey's administrative assistant.

Khrushchev had been in good spirits on his arrival and during the daylong train trip Sunday from Los Angeles in which he laughed off the idea he was thinking of going home in anger after his clash with Mayor Norris Paulson.

"Why should I go home," he said. "But I don't intend to say forever."

White House Warns Against Discourtesies

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The White House said today that President Eisenhower's desire for constructive talks with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is not being helped by "any personal discourtesies" shown the Russian leader on his cross-country tour.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty reminded newsmen that "the President's basic purpose and desire is to have Chairman Khrushchev see our country prior to the discussions of mutual interest that he will have with him at Camp David this weekend."

"The President is looking forward to these discussions and as he has said before, hopes that they can be constructive."

"This purpose of constructive meetings at Camp David is not served by any personal discourtesy extended to the chairman during his visit throughout our country."

Hagerty made the comment when asked whether Eisenhower felt any need for a new statement calling upon the American people to be courteous to the Soviet Premier.

He was asked whether such a statement was felt necessary in view of Khrushchev's blow-up over remarks made to him Saturday night by Los Angeles Mayor Norris Paulson and by some other incidents which have arisen since Khrushchev began his coast to coast swing.

Paulson touched off a tirade by Khrushchev by questioning him about his famous remark that "we will bury you."

Hagerty also was asked whether the President, who returned to his desk this morning after a four-day rest at his Gettysburg farm, was making special preparation for his forthcoming meeting with Khrushchev.

"He has for six and a half years," Hagerty tartly replied.

Eisenhower and Khrushchev will hold their crucial face-to-face conference next week end at the President's secluded Camp David, Md., retreat, 60 miles north of Washington.

The Chief Executive whizzed past the Catalina Mountain area Sunday night in a motorcade which brought him back to the White House at 8:30 p.m. e.d.t. after driving the 80 miles from his farm in an hour and 45 minutes.

'CAN CAN' LEAVES TOP RED BLUSHING

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Nikita Khrushchev blushed when Shirley MacLaine led a leggy chorus in a spirited performance of the "Can Can" for the Soviet leader and his wife.

The pudgy Communist boss appeared indignant after the performance when attempts were made to photograph him in proximity with the scantily-clad dancers and other Hollywood glamor girls, among them Marilyn Monroe.

"People look better from the front than from the back," he said and added that he thought "Can Can" was "tastelass" and would not be shown in Russia.

The "Can Can" performance was one of the big events during Khrushchev's visit to the studios of Twentieth Century Fox in Hollywood. The girls, led by Miss MacLaine, skipped out onto the studio floor with skirts fluttering just as the visiting-couple finished lunch.

Khrushchev and his wife, Nina, appeared embarrassed by the performance.

Although Khrushchev had little actual contact with the stars, he did meet briefly with costar Frank Sinatra, Maurice Chevalier and Miss MacLaine.

When Sinatra asked the Soviet leader how a cabaret set compared with cabarets in Russia, Khrushchev replied that he knew nothing of cabarets in any country and could make no comparison.

The Soviet premier proved Sunday there is nothing wrong with him that a good night's sleep and some popular American enthusiasm can't fix.

As his car rolled into the courtyard of the Mark Hopkins Hotel on Nob Hill after a trip from Los Angeles — he made several stops to greet crowds on the way — he looked tired.

But when he got a hearty welcome from a crowd of 10,000 the Khrushchev spirits jumped right up again.

Wilson Wondering Whether Daniel Will Vacate 'Chair'

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has his eye on the governorship — but every time he takes a look it appears that Gov. Price Daniel may want to sit there for another two years.

Daniel's repeated hints of a possible third term have left Wilson on the sidelines waiting for the decision. At Wilson's back are a pack of formidable potential opponents for his job as attorney general.

In McAllen Saturday, the State Democratic Executive Committee praised Daniel as "one of the greatest governors of all time," and urged him to seek a third term.

Daniel told the SDEC there was too much at stake to close the door now on a third term, but reminded the committee that he has until Feb. 1, the new filing deadline, to make up his mind.

Former highway commissioner Marshall Formby of Plainview is also certain to be a candidate. It is no secret that Formby has been cruising the highways he helped build, lining up support for the race.

Walter Hall, Dickinson, banker, has been mentioned as a liberal candidate for governor.

Should Daniel decide to run again, Wilson faces a challenge by an array of potential candidates.

Mentioned as prospects for the attorney general's race are Travis county Dist. Atty. Dan Wright, Dallas county Dist. Atty. Henry Wade, Speaker Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, Tom Moore of Waco and Tom Reavley of Austin. Moore forced Wilson into a runoff during the 1956 campaign.

After Senate Seats

On the state-wide level, there appears to be little hope that Texas liberals can crash the scene, but the liberals seem certain to win a fair share of house seats and possibly unseat one or two Senate stalwarts in the 87th Legislature.

Liberal House members being mentioned for Senate races include Rep. J. C. Zbrank of Dallas against Sen. Nevelle Colson of Navasota, Rep. Don Kennard of Fort Worth against Sen. Doyle Willis of Fort Worth, Rep. Malcolm McGregor of El Paso against Sen. Frank Owen of El Paso, Rep. Alvin Jamison of Denton against Sen. Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford, and Rep. Jim Bates of Edinburg against Sen. Hubert Hildson of Brownsville.

Conservative Rep. R. L. Strickland of San Antonio has already announced against liberal Sen. Henry Gonzalez of San Antonio.

Squalls Lash Florida Coast

MIAMI (UPI)—Squalls lashed most of the Florida peninsula today and more bad weather was in store as a tropical disturbance approached rapidly from the Caribbean.

At least three vessels were lost or in trouble in rough waters of the Gulf of Mexico along the Florida West Coast, and a 100-foot motor vessel was aground in the Atlantic off Andros Island in the Bahamas.

Small craft warnings were displayed along the East Coast and keys and southward from Cedar Key on the West Coast. Northeast and east winds 20 to 30 miles per hour accompanied very heavy rains.

Almost five inches fell on Miami Beach in 24 hours.

The Weather Bureau said the bad weather over the weekend and this morning was caused by a high pressure area which moved over Florida from the eastern United States.

Normally, the bureau said, Florida could expect some improvement in weather as the high pressure area weakened. But the tropical disturbance, known as an easterly wave, was expected to reach the southern tip of Florida Tuesday morning.

The disturbance this morning was in a line about 150 miles long extending from the central Bahamas to the extreme eastern end of Cuba.

It was attended by showers and thunderstorms and winds to near 35 miles per hour. The Weather Bureau said the wave and associated weather would move westward about 15 miles per hour, reaching the southeast Florida coast, the Florida Straits and western Cuba Tuesday morning.

The area was being watched closely for any intensification.

The motor vessel George C. Bell, with five or six persons aboard, radioed the Coast Guard it was aground and breaking up off Andros Island. At 10:30 a.m., the Coast Guard said small boats in the area were taking off the crew and that the master, Mark Stevens of Fort Lauderdale, would remain aboard.

In the Gulf, an intensive search was under way off the Tampa Bay area for three small boats. One was a 14-foot outboard rented to two unidentified fishermen Saturday at 2 p.m. Another was the 54-foot fishing vessel, Echo, which reported it was disabled and taking on water south of Egmont Key. The third was a 25-foot cabin cruiser which left Fort Myers Beach Sunday at 8:30 a.m. and was supposed to return by sunset.

Reds Ask UN For 'Debate'

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Russia today asked the General Assembly for a full debate on Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's outline for "general and complete disarmament."

Khrushchev, in the major speech of his U. S. tour, last Friday proposed to the assembly that all the world's armies, navies and air forces be abolished within four years, leaving forces only to maintain internal security.

The Communist conquest of Tibet probably will be discussed at length, even though no nation has been willing so far to sponsor the Dalai Lama's appeal for "immediate intervention...to stop the wanton and ruthless murder of my people."

India has proposed admission of Red China to the United Nations at most assembly sessions since 1950. In each case, the assembly has voted to take no action in the matter.

A canvass of the corridors, meanwhile, indicated dwindling interest in another pending matter — the 27-year-old disarmament plan that Premier Nikita Khrushchev drafted off for consideration by the assembly.

The Russian delegation circulated with Khrushchev's speech a bulky declaration of the Soviet government on general and complete disarmament. This document, according to an explanatory memorandum filed by Gromyko, constitutes the backbone of Russia's argument for the Khrushchev

Eight Perish In Fiery Collision

PETERSBURG, Va. (UPI)—Eight persons, seven of them crowded into one car, were killed early today in a head-on collision of two trucks and a car near here.

State police said a large tractor-trailer truck collided head-on with a car which was trying to pass a pickup truck on U.S. 469 five miles west of here shortly after midnight, scattering bodies along 100 feet of the highway.

Two persons were injured. One of the injured, a Negro, identified only as Baker, was found about six hours later buried into a bean patch about 90 feet from the scene of the rash.

Martin I. Hand, 31, of Amelia, Va., driver of the tractor-trailer, was killed and Jesse Moody, 50, of Petersburg, driver of the pickup truck, was hospitalized in critical condition.

Police said the tractor-trailer, after crashing into the car, jackknifed and broke in two. The pickup truck rammed into it and tipped atop the crumpled car in which seven Negroes died.

State Trooper M. L. Duke identified the dead in the car as Ronald Eugene Jones, 20; Donald Ray Couch, 19; Midget Castle, Charlie

"So I said, 'Let's go to my house and get some cold lemonade.' And Joanie said, 'Who wants to go to your dumb house? You haven't got any air conditioning.'"

"Then she took the other kids off with her and nobody said a word on. And I don't see why I can't have air conditioning if Joanie Simpson does, I . . ."

You know you can't make her see why she can't have air conditioning. You think of the installments due on your automobile, of the threadbare patch in the hall carpet and of new overcoats to be bought next fall.

You know there's no hope of making the child of your heart see that these needs are more important than air conditioning because air conditioning is most important to her.

So, saddened not only by her hurt but by the difference of years between you, you wipe her face with a wet dish towel, murmuring, "There, darling, it was Joanie Simpson who was sick."

Later when your husband comes home and proposes catching the early show at the drive-in movie, you say, "I couldn't stand it tonight, Jim." But the child for whom you are still suffering jumps with joy and shouts, "Oh, Daddy, let's! Oh, come on, Mommy! Can I have a shrimp salad sandwich when the man comes around?"

At first we just find these speedy recoveries astonishing. Then, as time passes, we begin to resent them a little. We wonder why we lost last night's sleep because that party invitation or phone call didn't come—and the victims of these hurts comes bounding downstairs for breakfast as fresh as daisies.

Well, they're not the shallow young monsters they seem to be. Nor are we the fools we think we are.

Our young victims have expressed the anxieties aroused by the hurts to us—and we have just kept ours stewing inside us.

If we'd had someone to listen and wipe our eyes with a wet dish towel, we too could jump with joy at the prospect of an early movie at the drive-in.

But it takes a long time to learn that the hurt child in ourselves needs comfort as well as the child we've comforted.

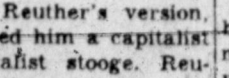

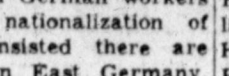

Childress, the area's winningest district record squad with three

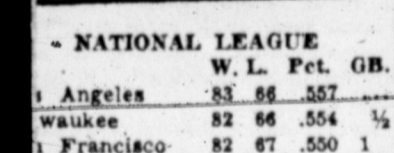

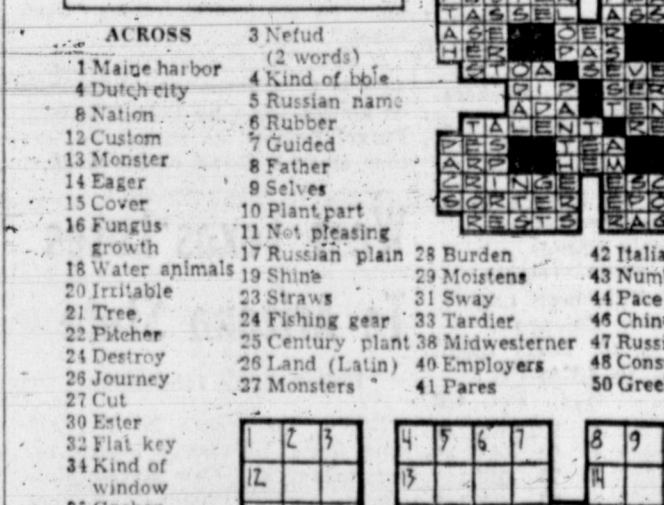

Reporters May Get Exemption On News Sources

BRYAN, Tex. (UPI)—The Legislative Council of Texas has approved a proposed law to exempt reporters from having to reveal their news sources to any state official or body.

David Haines, general manager of radio station KORA, Bryan, wrote State Rep. D. H. Cole of Bryan and suggested such a bill. Several other states have such a law.

Cole turned Haines' suggestion over to C. R. Granbury, executive director of the legislative council, who disclosed the text of the suggested bill.

It provides that no person who works in the news departments of newspapers, press associations, radio or television stations "shall be required to disclose the source of any information procured or obtained by such persons in the course of his employment in any legal proceeding, trial or investigation before any grand jury, petit jury, or any officer thereof, before the presiding officer of any tribunal, or his agent or agents, or before the legislature or any committee thereof, any commission, department, division or bureau of the state, or before any county or municipal body, officer or committee thereof."

A section of the bill would make it emergency legislation, that is, if it is passed and signed by the governor, it will become effective the moment the governor signs it.

The emergency clause of the proposed bill reads in part: "The fact that the unrestricted gathering and dissemination of news is essential to the democratic way of life and that the holding of news services investigative would result in more news and broader coverage of news stories, create an emergency, and an imperative broad necessity."
