State Postal Receipts Drop

AUSTIN—(AP)—Postal receipts in 60 Texas cities in July were slightly below June receipts, the Bureau of Business Research reported. Totaling \$3,671,447, July receipts

were a percent greater than in July, 1947, however. Palestine reported a July increase of 26 percent, the greatest monthly gain. Lubbock postal receipts stepped up 24 percent from June, followed by Brownsville, 20 percent, and Snyder, 11 percent. Bryan receipts dipped 30 percent, and Austin's 17 percent from

a month earlier. Nine of the 60 cities reported decreases in postal receipts from July, 1947, ranging from a 13 percent fall in Palestine to 3 percent in Sweetwater and Vernon. Most substantial gains over the year were made by Greenville, 38 percent; Lockhart 27 percent; and Midland, 25 percent.

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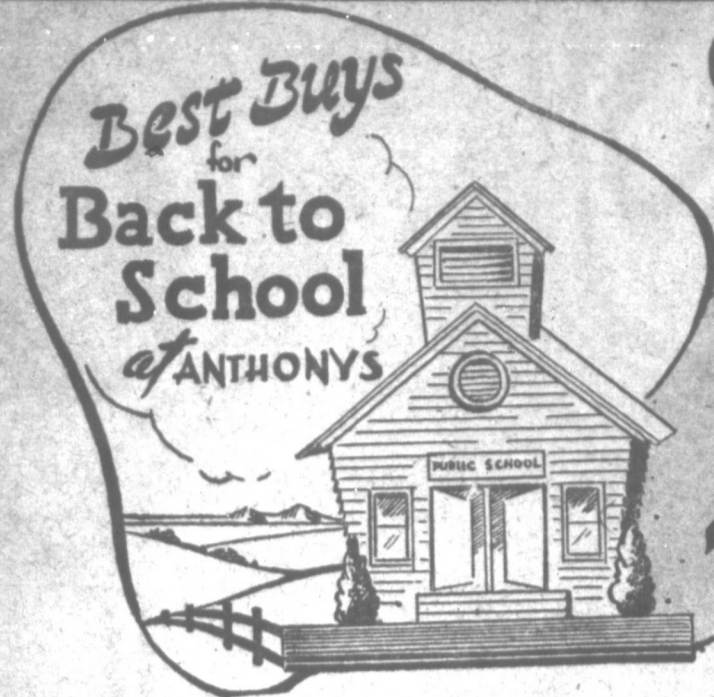
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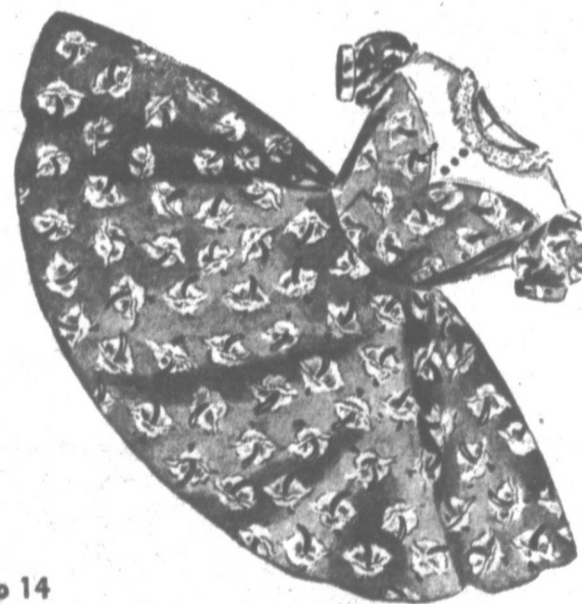

Oil Industry Loses Pioneer In Death of Harry C. Wiess

HOUSTON — (AP) — The nation's oil industry has lost another of its pioneers, Harry C. Wiess, chairman of the board of Humble Oil and Refining Company.

The 61-year-old oil executive died at 6 P.M. Thursday at his Houston home, six weeks after undergoing two major operations in a New York City hospital. As a boy Wiess saw the big Spindletop field — the so-called

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chairman of the statewide USO drive.

His philanthropic contributions were numerous.

Within the industry, Wiess was a member of the National Petroleum Council and a director of the American Petroleum Institute.

During World War II he was chairman of the Supply and Transportation Committee of District 3 of the Petroleum Administration for War and served on the Petroleum Industry War Council.

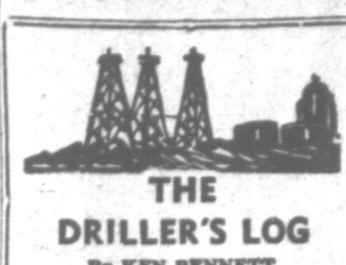
On December 15, 1944, he was given the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association's distinguished in-service award as the major oil company executive who had made the greatest contribution to the war effort that year.

A native of Beaumont, Wiess was a son of Capt. William Wiess, a pioneer Texas industrialist who himself went into the oil industry after Spindletop.

After the young Wiess graduated from Princeton in 1909, he returned to Texas and within three years became president of both the Paraffine and the Reliance Oil companies.

It was during these early days that Wiess became associated with S.W. Farish, R.L. Blaffer, Ross Stitt, and other men who organized the Humble Oil and Refining Co. in 1919 to 1923. Wiess was almost solely responsible for creation and operation of Humble's Houston Community Chest, refining activities. In the early 1930's he served as chairman of the Finnish Relief Fund in the Houston, and in 1942 he was directed the well-mapped program.

Due to the increasing interest and activity in secondary recovery (more commonly called gas injection, repressuring, or water flooding) in the Panhandle oil field, we have decided to devote today's entire column to a discussion of this topic.

Secondary Recovery Defined: Secondary recovery is additional oil and/or gas that is produced from a reservoir over and above the amount that would have been produced under primary recovery methods. Oil recovered by primary methods is only the oil that is forced into the well bore by utilization of reservoir energy. Reservoir energy in the Panhandle Field is supplied by the gas that is dissolved—or is contained—in the oil. The expansion of this gas causes the oil to move slowly through the reservoir rock to the well bore just as the gas contained in cold soda water will cause the drink to spill over when the bottle is uncapped. When the dissolved gas is exhausted, no further flow of oil to the well will result from natural causes.

Since scientists have proven that only from fifteen to twenty percent of the original oil in place in reservoirs similar to ours is recovered by primary production methods, progressive oil men have searched for years for effective and economical means of increasing the oil recovery from known reservoirs. Their efforts

increase recovery by 50 percent and prolong life of the 27,000 acre field by eight years.

The Texas Railroad Commission, the University of Texas and Texas A & M College are organizing a program which calls for 50 graduate petroleum engineers to work full time to developing new secondary recovery methods.

Stanford Oil has asked blanket permission from the U.S. Army Engineers to develop oil fields in six areas off the Texas coast.

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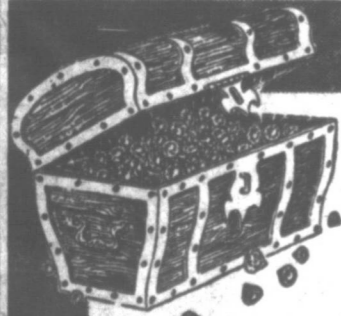

Premier Marie's Government Falls Over Price Issue

PARIS (AP)—The month-old government of Premier Andre Marie resigned early yesterday over the issue of wages and prices. The toppling of the government, the tenth postwar French cabinet, plunged France into what may be one of its gravest political crises. Marie had been in office since July 27. President Vincent Auriol hurriedly called in various political leaders. The political instability of one of the four nations participating in the Moscow talks was outlined starkly as France was left technically without a foreign minister. Former Premier Robert Schuman will, however, continue as foreign minister until a new cabinet is formed. Schuman and Finance Minister Paul Reynaud conferred with Auriol early yesterday. The cabinet resignation came after an unsuccessful two-day struggle to draft wage and price reforms. Finance Minister Reynaud earlier was given the wide powers after making some concessions to the Socialists. The two-day cabinet discussions concerned Reynaud's plan for politically dangerous increases in the prices of such products as milk, bread, rail fares and tobacco. Former Veterans Affairs Minister Andre Maroselli said the crucial point of the disagreement concerned the amount of wage increases to be allowed to compensate for price rises. Reynaud had agreed to raises of ten percent in wages. The Socialists wanted an immediate salary increase of from 15 to 18 percent. No compromise was reached. Maroselli said, although a general accord had been agreed on for freeing all wages from state control as of Jan. 1, 1949. The figure of Gen. Charles de Gaulle loomed large. He and his followers in the Rally of the French People (RPF) were expected to renew their pressure for dissolution of the legislature and new elections. Marie, a Radical Socialist, (Moderate), had a coalition cabinet

Gilreath served two years in Oklahoma for passing hot checks.

Greek Army Wins New Skirmish With Reds

ATHENS (AP)—The Greek Army won skirmishes with guerrillas in four separate areas in the north, a communique said Wednesday. Elsewhere thirteen Communists were executed, including one woman. In the Mount Kaimaktchalan area, northwest of Salonika, the Army launched a new offensive. This mountain lies astride the Greek-Yugoslav border. 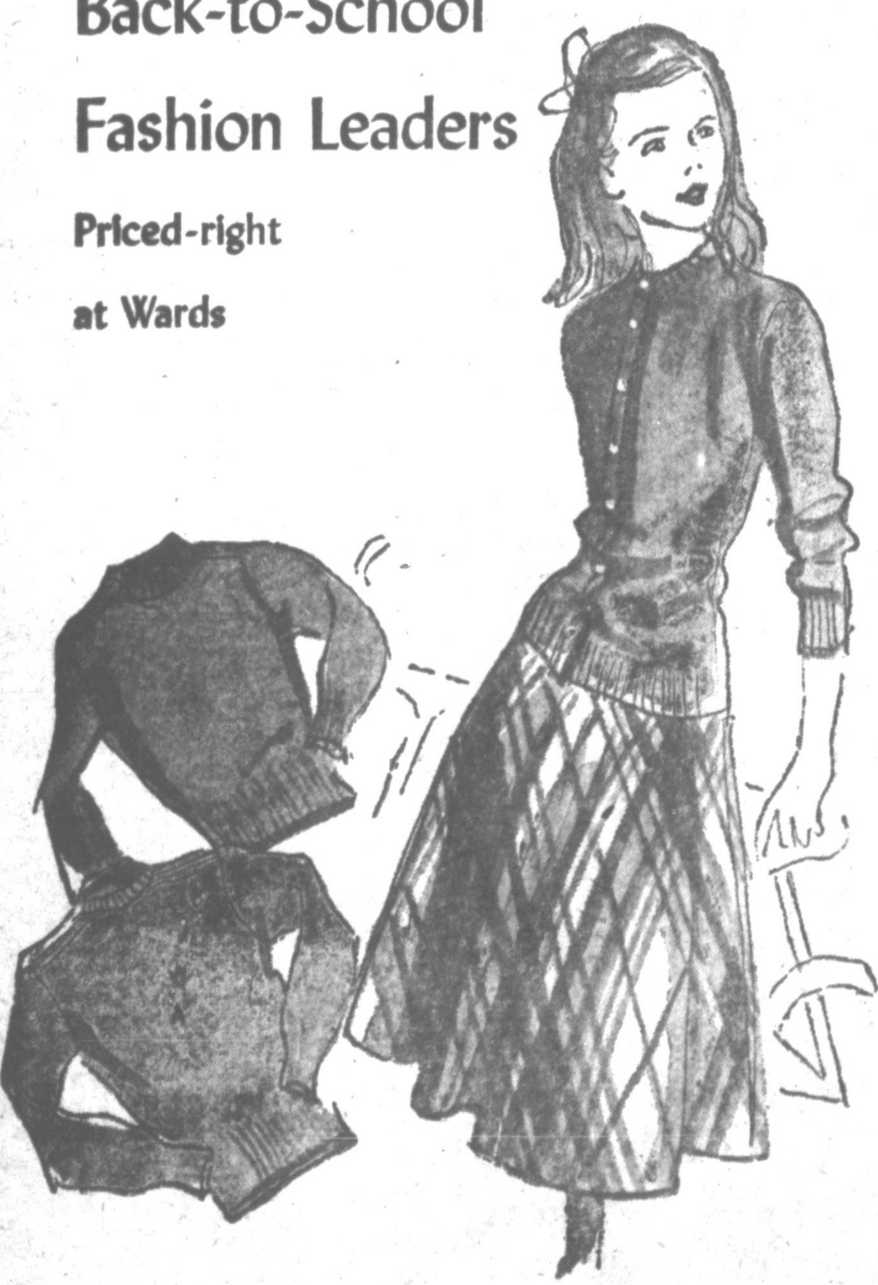

Texas All-Stars Beat Okies, 20-0

WICHITA FALLS —(AP)— All-star schoolboy griders from Texas kept a perfect state in eleventh annual Oil Bowl game here Friday night, turning back the Oklahoma All-Stars, 20-0.

Bryon Townsend of Odessa, Texas' top high school football star last season, paced the Texans' easy victory.

Townsend passed for two touchdowns and kicked two extra points. A pass interception by Danny Perkins of Brackenridge (San Antonio) accounted for Texas' other score.

Bubba Woods of Wichita Falls connected with Carl Mayes of Pampa on a 26-yard aerial in the second period. Townsend and Bob Raley, Bowie, Tex., High School, worked the ball down to the nine-yard line after a penalty had set the Texans back to the Oklahoma seventeen. Then Townsend hit Johnny Allred, Wichita Falls, with a short pass to the touchdown and booted the extra point.

Perkins grabbed a pass thrown by Jim Rinehart of Frederick, Okla., and ran it back 25 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter. Townsend again kicked the extra point.

Late in the fourth period, Townsend completed a ten-yard toss to Bill Howton for the last touchdown as the speedy Plainview boy ran the last 15 yards to the goal.

Texas gained 100 yards on the ground to 45 for Oklahoma, attempted 22 passes and connected on six for a total of 107 yards. Oklahoma tried 22 passes, completed three for 33 yards.

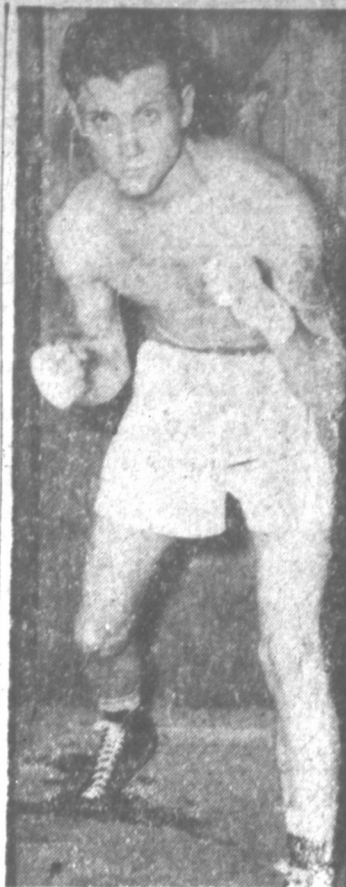

Blair Winner of 34th Victory

Fulcher Wins Over Twig in Four-Rounder

Jackie Blair, southpaw welterweight, added another to his string of 33 wins as a professional by beating Trinidad Perez, Mexico City, in a 7-night at the Sportatorium, 10-round main event Friday night.

Promoters Arvid Oording and Vic Burnett presented Pampa's first professional boxing card.

In the four-round curtainer, Roy Fulcher, local heavyweight, pounded a decision out of another Pampa boxer, Kenneth Twig.

Neither man was in condition. They were both soft and flabby and short-winded, and before the end of the second round they were both dropping their guards and walking flat-footedly into each other's punches.

In spite of the fact that Fulcher went down for eight counts in both the third and fourth rounds, he won the match with superior footwork and a looping left that kept Twig continually off balance.

Two welterweights, 148 pounds each, battled through the first of two six-round matches.

Billy Pollard of Dallas won on a split decision. Pollard was a springer on his feet, but Rogers was the better puncher, in spite of the fact that he telegraphed his punches by blinking just before he threw leather.

Referee Hubert Gray drew bores from the crowd because they thought he was slow in breaking clinches. According to rules, however, as long as a man has one hand free, to punch with it, the referee cannot break them.

In the opinion of the crowd, the second of the two six-rounders between two light heavyweights, was the best of the evening's matches.

In a match that was very nearly his all the way, Jack Wortham, 170, of Amarillo, belted a game and shifty Jimmy Boggs of Oklahoma City, who weighed in at 166.

Boggs kept ducking, bogging, and shifting from side to side, and he kept moving his head and shoulders up and down and around and around all through the match to give Wortham a very elusive target to aim at.

Nevertheless, Wortham tagged Boggs almost at will with a looping left that he kept pumping at the Oklahoman's head. Boggs' nose was reddened in the first minute and, before the end of the first round, his mouthpiece and upper lip were stained red.

Wortham kept Boggs off balance with that steadily pumping left, but the continual weaving and ducking of his opponent caused him to miss several hefty rights that would have ended the match much sooner.

Blair, who is an outstanding contender for the state featherweight crown, is a lean and stringy 128 pounds. A southpaw, and a man of very quick reflexes, his fighting style is one of constantly advancing, pumping leather at every possible target.

Blair has a terrifically solid punch with either hand, and in the very first few rounds he had Perez in trouble from blows to the midsection.

Perez is short and chunky, and took a handcap of at least two inches in reach from the lean Dallasite.

Perez, who was at such a peak of nervous tension that he could hardly sit still in his corner, was a game and willing boxer, however. He stood toe-to-toe and slugged it out with the taller Blair, but, from the beginning, it was evident that Blair was the better fighter.

Every round except two, was Blair's; the third was considered a draw, and the eighth, when Perez managed to get inside the taller man's guard, was the little Mexican's.

Homer Anderson of Pampa acted as referee for the first and third matches; Hubert Gray, who is expected to appear here soon as a welterweight, was referee for the

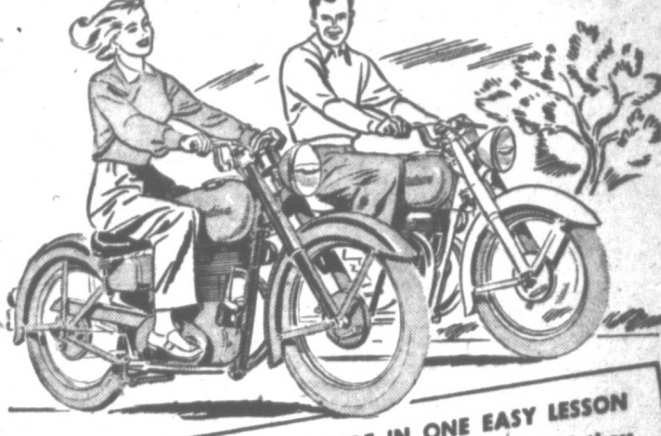

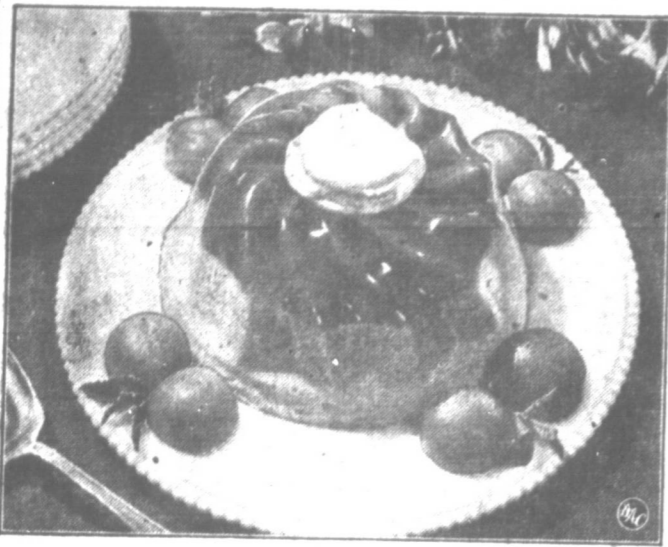

Thrifty Two-Toned Gelatine Whip Tastes and Looks Luxurious



COMPANY dinners usually rate special desserts that are extra-attractive and as delicious as the cook can make them. But festive desserts like the Apricot Two-Tone Snow in the photograph can be served at family meals and "company" meals alike with the help of unflavored gelatine to make things thrifty. There's a simple trick explained in the recipe below, to making two-toned and two-textured gelatine snows that are a treat to the tongue. Apricot nectar lends distinctive flavor to the Snow and halved apricots make a pretty garnish. Here is the recipe to follow in making an Apricot Two-Tone Snow.

Apricot Two-Tone Snow
 1 envelope unflavored gelatine
 1/2 cup cold water
 1 cup hot apricot nectar
 1 egg white
 1/2 cup cold water
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup lemon juice
 1 egg white
 1/2 cup cold water

Soften gelatine in cold apricot nectar. Add hot apricot nectar, sugar and salt and stir until dissolved. Add lemon juice. Pour 1/2 of the mixture into a large mold; chill. Chill the remaining mixture until slightly thicker than the consistency of unbeaten egg whites. Whip until light. Beat egg white until stiff; add gelatine mixture. Place the bowl in ice water; continue to beat until mixture begins to hold its shape. Pour on top of stiffened gelatine and chill until firm. Unmold and serve with whipped cream or soft custard. YIELD: 16 servings.

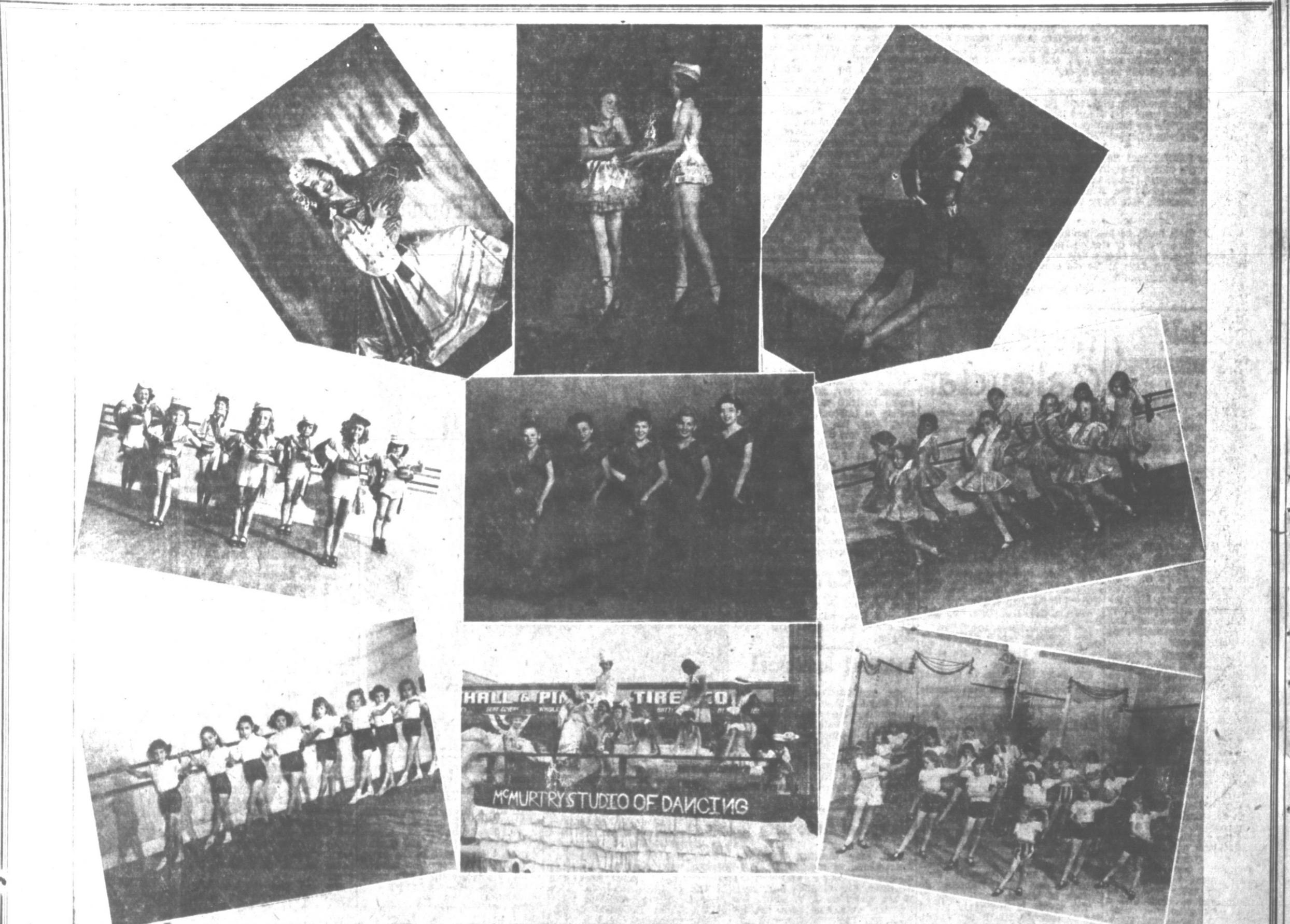

State Gets Dimes Fund to Fight Polio

NEW YORK—(AP)—Dime a \$100,000 worth of them from the March of Dimes funds, have been sent to Texas to fight the current outbreak of polio, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis reports.

The foundation already had contributed more than \$290,000 to the state during the present epidemic. All funds are used by the foundation chapters to pay medical care costs of victims of the disease.

Snoring Ruled No Nuisance

LOS ANGELES—(AP)—It's perfectly legal to snore, even if it keeps the neighbors awake.

At least this is the ruling of Deputy City Prosecutor Byron Gentry.

The weighty problem was handed him by Mr. and Mrs. Wilson E. Carr, who complained that a neighbor in their apartment house snored so loudly that it constituted a disturbance of the peace.

Gentry ruled that the snoring was not wilful or malicious and that "the unconscious perpetrator could not possibly exercise any degree of control" over his snores.

The prosecutor declared that a citizen may snore with immunity in his own home "even though he may be in possession of unusual and exceptional natural ability in that particular field."

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The State Department said it is turning over to New York police two letters which Moscow says were written by Mrs. Oksana S. Kasenkina, refugee Russian school teacher.

She is reported to have written two letters before leaving from the Soviet consulate in New York two weeks ago. The State Department asked the Soviet embassy for copies.

Michael J. McDermott, State Department press officer, told reporters their authenticity has not been confirmed. Presumably, New York police will ask Mrs. Kasenkina, now a hospital patient, whether she actually wrote them, but McDermott declined to say so.

Asked whether the communications bore out Mrs. Kasenkina's story that she did not want to return to Russia and leaped from the consulate for this reason, McDermott said he had not read them.

Stevenson, 60, rugged of face, a Kimble County rancher who likes his pipe, has had 30-odd years in politics. The energetic, dark haired, handsome Congressman Johnson is 40.

Their hot fight at Saturday's polls was a mirror of their heated runoff campaign for the Democratic nomination to succeed W. Lee (Pappy) O'Daniel as the state's junior United States senator.

The race was Johnson's second all-out bid for the Senate. O'Daniel beat down his first attempt by a margin of 1,311 votes in a 1941 election, the result of which was not known for two days, it was so close.

This time Johnson was leaving his 10th District Congressional job because of the Senate race. His speech-making campaign was vigorous from the start of the first primary.

Stevenson, who called himself "pipe-smoking, calculating Coke" did a handshaking job in that primary. He came out of it leading the ticket with 39.68 percent of the record 1,231 votes cast. Johnson had 33.75 percent. Most of the rest of the votes in the field went to the third man, George Paddy, Houston attorney.

Both Stevenson and Johnson bid strongly for the Paddy vote in the runoff. Unofficial returns showed Stevenson leading Johnson in Paddy's home box on the basis of unofficial returns Saturday.

The former governor kept up his handshaking in the second primary, but he stepped up his speechmaking, too. Both candidates hurled charges of "mudslinging."
