



Water flooding is accomplished in much the same manner as gas injection with water being used as an energizing or driving agent. There is at this time no active large-scale water flood in the Panhandle; however, there are several experimental projects in operation. Due to the scarcity of water in the area, it is anticipated that several years will pass before a practical means of water flooding is perfected.

How The Panhandle Can Aid Secondary Recovery: Strange as it may seem, a majority of citizens, royalty owners, and even oil producers are unaware, poorly informed or skeptical of the ad-vantages of secondary recovery. Such endeavors—especially in the larger projects—are simple in theory but complex in formation and operation. At this time efforts are being made to form the Watkins Area Repressuring Proj-ect which will cover 11,500 productive acres with 1,049 oil wells that are located mostly in Hutchinson County. Before actual gas injection can be started it will be necessary for all of the oil pro ducers and royalty owners in the area to execute agreements signifying their willingness to cooper ate in the project. Citizens, mer chants, royalty owners, and ol producers can expedite the start ing of this important project by seeking information on the ven-ture from the interested oil pro-ducers in order that such infor-mation can be passed on to others. Although the benefits of secondary recovery have been proven by previous projects in Pennayivania, Oklahoma, and other states, it is believed that the weight of pub-lie opinion is needed to convince the oil industry that secon²
