





I've never forgotten the little informal speech the dean of the medical school made when he welcomed our class. "Some of you boys," he said "are going to develop the symptoms of every disease you hear about or read about except maybe the morning sickness of pregnancy. I think I ought to warn you it'll do you no good and maybe slow you up enough so you'll get vourselves flunked out." Maybe the good dean's advice applies also to some readers of this and other medical columns. Maybe some of you are so busy finding out about your ailments you haven't time or energy to enjoy your good health.

Every writer of a medical column wants desparately to help each reader to a better understanding of the wonders of the human body. He tries to suggest measures that will help to preserve the health of your body. He tries to indicate the early signs of trouble that will lead you to consult your own doctor when treatment holds greatest promise.

The purpose of the medical writer may be defeated by those readers who picked up every symptom they read and who live in constant fear of the diseases that are described.

Now fear can be a very useful emotion if it leads to direct action. You have to use fear to teach children not to play with matches. cross streets without looking in all directions or pull the dog's tail. But you carefully avoid making them so panicky that they run away every time you light a fire on the tireplace, take them marketing or bring a pet pup in the

In the same way, we medical writers try to give you a useful amount of anxiety. If we give you - or you give yourself - a panic reaction, the

whole purpose of our efforts is de-We want you to be on the lookout for the early signs of cancer or heart trouble but we don't want to give you a "cancerophobia" or a

We want to keep you informed but we don't want to make you so neurotic you haven't time or energy to do your housework or go out and look for a job

And we certainly don't want to make you so fearful you drive your family half out of their minds with all your warnings, precautions and predictions of calamity. Somewhere you have to draw the line between constructive anxicty and destructive fear.


