Mrs. Kasenkina told reporters the Soviet consulate here from the White Russian refugee farm at Valley Cottage, N. Y.:
"I knew that since they did not permit me to leave the consulate. I would not be able to

escape in Russia either. "Therefore I jumped out of the window to escape
