Talkathon **Opens Today**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - North ern Democrats today opened their House civil rights talkathon with a challenge to President Eisenhower to help them force a vote on a stalled rights bill.

The Democrats reserved 14 hours and 10 minutes for their speeches in support of a parliamentary maneuver to pry the bill from the conservative-dominated House Rules Committee. They planned to use only two or three hours today.

Chairman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) of the House Judiciary Committee, the lead-off speaker urged Eisenhower to persuade Republicans to sign a petition to force the bill out of the rules group and onto the floor.

The petition requires 219 signa tures. As of Tuesday night about 190 lawmakers had signed, including at least 30 Republicans. Other congressional news:

Bent on disintegrating the market economy, the ruling parties will certainly not consent to reforms that would deprive them of their most formidable weapon, inflation. Monetary reconstruction presupposes first of all total and unconditional reection of those allegedly progresive policies which in the United States are designated by the slogans New Deal and Fair Deal".


