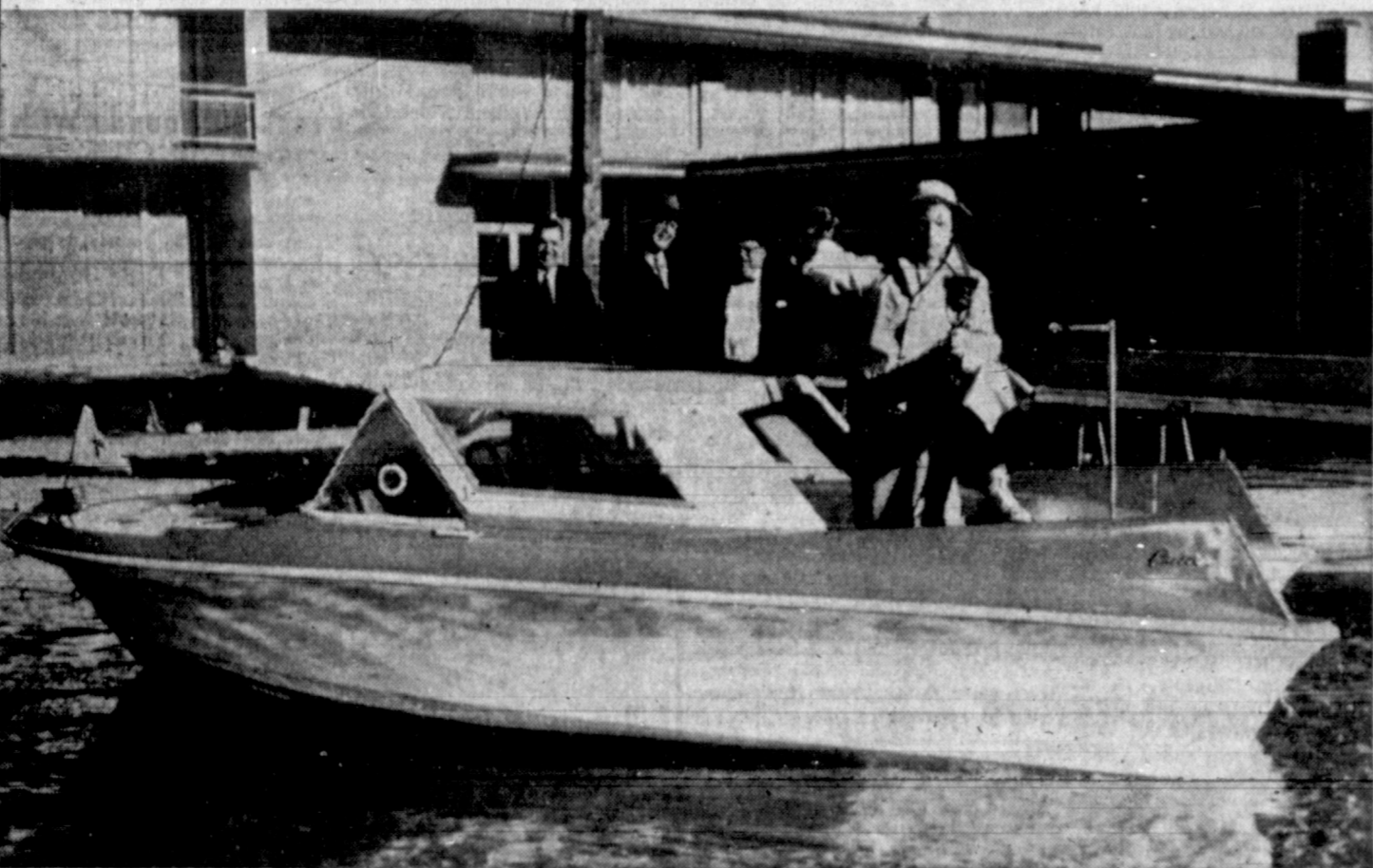

Cruising For Gifts To MOD Stunt To Raise Contributions

A lagging March of Dimes drive has given impetus this morning to the "Float-A-Thon" which was begun in the swimming pool of the Coronado Inn.

Dennis Dane, local radio station engineer and announcer will conduct morning - noon - night program from the interior of a 17-foot cabin cruiser anchored in the center of the pool.

Dane will be "captive" until \$1,000 is pledged through him to the March of Dimes campaign.

Gray County drive chairman, J. C. Roberts, said he hoped the 1959 campaign would not have to be extended, but held out little hope that sufficient monies could be collected by the end of this week.

Meals will be served to Dane aboard the boat by the Coronado Inn. The announcer will conduct spot programs during the day from a concentrated campaign, in addition to the boat stunt, will be conducted this week, including a "bucket brigade" and a coffee drive, in an effort to spur the campaign financially.

The boat on which the "Float-A-Thon" is being conducted was furnished by Ogden & Son.

Cuban President Will Reply To Eisenhower Policy Speech

HAVANA (UPI) — President Osvaldo Dorticos Torrado will reply to President Eisenhower's policy statement on Cuba at a press conference today, the Cuban "white house" announced.

The pro-government newspaper Combate reacted hostilely Tuesday to Eisenhower's promise that there will be no immediate U.S. reprisals against Cuba. Other semi-official publications were expected to comment today.

Employees of independent Havana newspapers labeled reports of the President's press-conference statement as "false" or "equivocal."

Premier Fidel Castro will have an opportunity to comment at an open-air supper tonight, marking the 102nd anniversary of Cuban patriot Jose Marti's birth. Foreign Minister Raul Roa also may have something to say on the subject when he returns tonight from a foreign tour.

(Roa declined comment on the President's statement during a 15-hour stopover in New York today on his way home, but indicated he might have a statement ready soon after his arrival in Cuba.)

Cuban and American businessmen said the attitude Castro's revolutionary regime adopts toward the Eisenhower statement may determine the course of U.S.-Cuban relations for years to come.

Newspapers here gave top play to the Eisenhower statement Tuesday, but the only one to comment was Combate, which describes itself as "a weapon of the (Castro) revolution."

Policemen Find Getaway Car Of New Jersey Mass Slayer

NORTH BRUNSWICK, N.J. (UPI) — Police attempting to track down the vicious gunman who turned a lavish country estate into an execution chamber for a surgeon's wife, two women servants and a taxi driver, today found the killer's getaway car.

The black and red taxi which the killer is believed to have used to take him to the home of Dr. Francis M. Clarke on his mission of mass murder was recovered in Elizabeth.

The getaway cab was found across the street from Kallagz Park. Patrolman Fred Robinson said, "We'd been up and down the street all night. We didn't miss him by much."

Police admitted they were unable to find a motive to the slayings but said that robbery or revenge ranked as immediate possibilities. A complete review of Clarke's personal and professional affairs was ordered. Clarke was in the operating room of a hospital at the time of the slayings.

Victims of the mass killings were Clarke's invalid wife, Edith, 60; Miss Dorothy Moore, an elderly practical nurse; Mrs. Cora

KOAE, Hawaii (UPI) — The Puna eruption on Hawaii destroyed one home Tuesday, threatened two others and cracked open the earth near Warm Springs Junction.

The home of Harry Kenol was burned in a brush fire touched off by falling hot cinders. It was the eighth home destroyed since the eruption began two weeks ago today.

Meanwhile, the lava flow advanced slowly on abandoned houses owned by William Elders and Rose Swain.

Algerian Revolt Threatens France

Officials Try To Stem Algeria-France Break

ALGIERS (UPI) — A French settlers' revolt against President Charles de Gaulle spread and strengthened itself today through all the major cities of Algeria while the increasingly friendly French army stayed its hand.

Governor General Paul Delouvier, de Gaulle's personal representative, held one meeting after another with leading political figures and with Gen. Maurice Challe, the military commander, in an effort to prevent an open break between France and Algeria.

The state-owned radio Algiers trumpeted that the chin-high cobbles and stone barricades thrown up in the streets of major Algerian cities "no longer separate — they unite. They are a connecting link between civilians, militiamen and the armed forces."

Colonels in command of paratroops surrounding the street barricades in the heart of Algiers were reported to have served no notice they will not attack the insurgents unless they are fired on first. This did not appear likely.

Paratroops kept an easy-going watch while the insurgents came and went at will and the leaders of the rebels — Joseph Ortiz and Pierre Lagallarde — boldly left their headquarters for what was believed to be a conference with Gen. Maurice Challe, the French supreme commander.

Paratroops made no attempt to interfere as the two men drove out in a small French car toward government headquarters and returned half an hour later. They made no statement on their return.

The French army also made no move to interfere while the rebels built up machinegun positions and brought in more arms, ammunition and supplies. Nor did they act Tuesday night when volunteer militia seized control of town halls in most of the Algerian suburbs. The spirit of the revolt swept unchecked from Algiers to Constantine, Orleansville, Bone, Sid Bel Abbes — headquarters of the French Foreign Legion — and to Oran and other cities, where major demonstrations were reported. Most of Algeria was paralyzed by general strikes called by the settlers.

The de Gaulle government proclaimed martial law in Algeria Sunday but neither the settlers nor the paratroops took notice of it.

'Juggling' Charged In Missile Figures

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) charged today that the administration has "juggled" its intelligence books on Soviet missile strength "so the budget books may be balanced."

Symington, a frequent critic of administration defense policies, made the statement in a speech prepared for delivery in the Senate. The senator was Air Force secretary under President Truman.

An unavowed candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, Symington said he understood his accusation would be regarded as "politically motivated."

But he said he preferred to risk to the one involved in what he called an administration "policy of misinformation."

"I charge this administration with using intelligence information in such a manner that the American people have been given an inaccurate picture of what is necessary for our national defense," Symington said.

Symington referred to the optimistic picture of America's defense potential given to congressional committees recently by Defense Secretary Thomas S. Gates Jr. Gates based his appraisal, in part, on new intelligence estimates of Russian strength.

Symington said that the administration has "proceeded to change the ground rules for evaluating the facts."

Central Intelligence Director Allen W. Dulles told a New York audience Tuesday night that there is nothing new in the method being used to prepare estimates of Soviet missile strength. Dulles said new information has made it possible to make more accurate predictions of what Russia probably is doing in the missile field.

Ike Takes Off On Political Tour Of West

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower left today for California where he will make his first major 1960 political speech to 100,000 Republicans attending a series of dinners throughout the nation.

The dinners have been billed by the GOP as the forum for a reply to what the Republicans have termed a newly-launched Democratic "sneer-and-smear" campaign.

Eisenhower, accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower and a group of California congressmen, took off from nearby Andrews Air Force Base aboard a government luxury jet airliner. Because of the out-and-out political nature of his trip to Los Angeles, the Republican National Committee is paying the bill for the flight to Los Angeles.

The Chief Executive will speak tonight from Los Angeles over closed circuit television to 80 Republican fund raising dinners in 43 states. GOP National Chairman Thurston B. Morton said 100,000 dinners would see the telecast.

Eisenhower then will go on a weekend golfing vacation at the La Quinta, Calif., home of his close friend, George E. Allen.

Busy Day Of Missile Firings

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — America's only combat-ready intercontinental ballistic missile, the Atlas, thundered aloft from both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts Tuesday night to climax the busiest day of rocket activity this year.

During the same day the Navy launched a 10-million cubic foot balloon to a height of almost 22 miles from an aircraft carrier in the Atlantic; the United States and Canada rocketed 50 pounds of instruments 500 miles up over Wallops Island, Va., and an Army Redstone missile at Alamogordo, N. M., ejected a capsule designed to carry a television camera on surveillance missions.

The Air Force called both Atlas shots, here and at Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., successes.

The 85-foot Atlas fired from Vandenberg by a Strategic Air Command missile crew landed "in the general vicinity of Wake Island."

The Atlas fired here soared 5,000 miles down the Atlantic test range to test a new nose cone. Crews searched late into the night in efforts to recover a data capsule.

The Redstone missile fired at the White Sands range in New Mexico was the first in a planned series. It was fired by U. S. troops in NATO forces just returned from Europe.

Extradition Papers Signed For Garbutt

District Attorney Bill Waters said today he has filed extradition papers for 22-year-old Stanley F. Garbutt.

Garbutt was captured in Salt Lake City, Utah, after he and a companion, 18-year-old Cecil E. Sexton, escaped from the Gray County Jail Jan. 18.

Sexton was captured Jan. 20 in Fresno, Calif.

Pampans Injured In Auto Crash

Larry Ross McWilliams, 21, and Jimmy Roger Cook, 26, both of Pampa, were injured yesterday afternoon when their car hurtled into a canyon near Clarendon.

The car, driven by McWilliams, left Highway 70 about 12 miles north of Clarendon about 4 p.m. yesterday.

Investigating Highway Patrolman Bill Cornelius said McWilliams was apparently thrown from the car when it fell.

Neither man was believed to be seriously injured.

Crashed Plane Carried Secrets

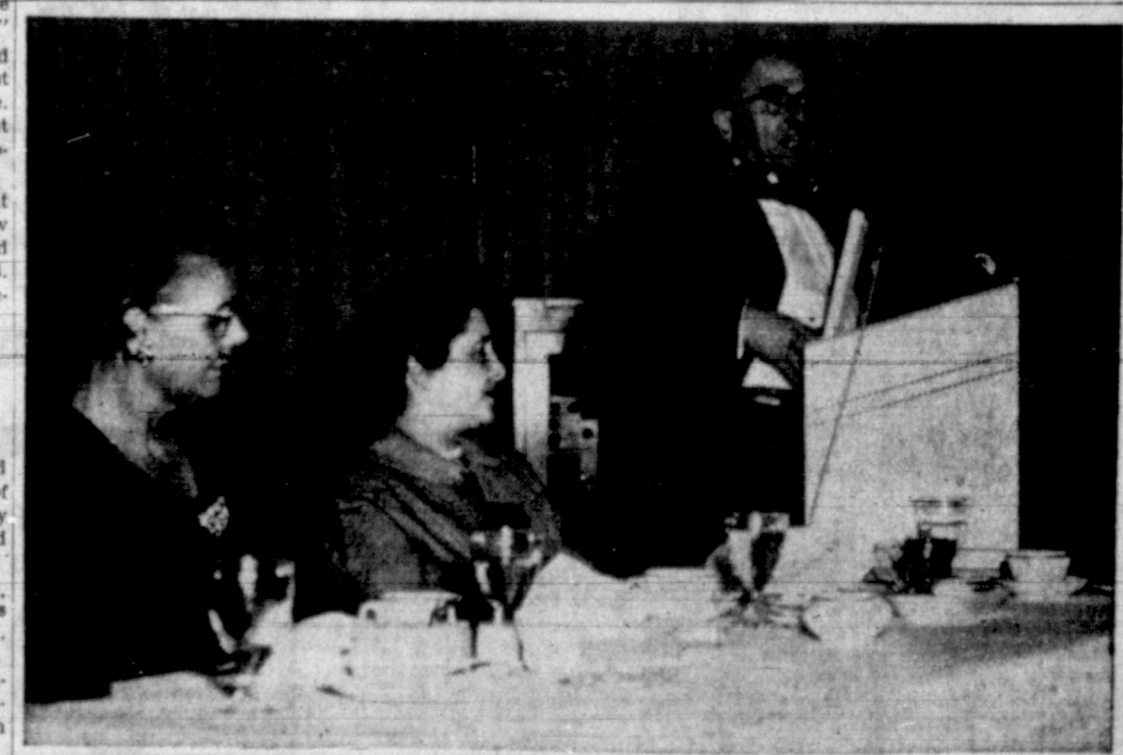
NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI) — A United States Navy plane which crashed Jan. 19 in Turkey killing all 16 men aboard was carrying all "highly confidential" documents from Washington, reports reaching Nicosia from Turkey said today.

A Royal Air Force spokesman when asked about the documents said, "We can't say anything."

The Mercator plane crashed in the Taurus Mountains on a flight from Naples to Adana, Turkey.

Today 19 members of the crack RAF mountain rescue team which scaled snowswept Mt. Karanfil to reach the plane returned to Nicosia.

Sgt. Peter Davis, looking tired with a seven-day growth of beard, said the bodies of 10 men had thus far been recovered from the wreckage and brought down to Adana.

Police Probe Burglaries

Police and sheriff's officers are investigating three burglaries today, all of them occurring last night or early this morning. The first of the break-ins was reported at 7:15 a.m. today, by Jack Ward, owner of Ward's Mini Mart in Prairie Village. Ward told police that sometime after 11 o'clock last night, someone kicked in the rear door of his building, took \$102 from the cash register, plus an undetermined quantity of cigarettes. At 8:45 this morning police received a call from the Pennant Club, 543 W. Brown. Sometime after 12:15 a.m. today, when the club closed, a burglar pried open an east window, opened a cigarette machine and took about \$12.50 in change. The thief also damaged a juke box, but did not obtain any money, took a box of cigars and about \$15 in nickels and dimes from the cash register.

At nine o'clock this morning the sheriff's department received a call from the Kilmer Drive Inn, where someone had broken a window, entered the Drive Inn and stolen three cases of beer, broken open the pin ball machine and cigarette machine. NEW YORK (UPI) — Widespread spread warnings of stock market trouble later provoked a prompt correction, according to Prentice-Hall, and sharper-than-expected price correction, according to Prentice-Hall. But all this, it notes, could have the effect of smoothing out future price fluctuations by: — Preventing a too rapid spurt to new highs — And forestalling a very sharp reaction after the too-rapid advance. However, until the technical clues supporting this comforting theory are more evident, it's advisable to continue a cautious, conservative investment policy, Prentice-Hall points out in its weekly report on business.

Two of the horses and the goats were quickly rounded up. Only Big Boy, a 10-year-old brown gelding, was missing. Tuesday afternoon, county road department workers James Wallace and Joe Zinkus happened by a 12-foot-deep, water-filled rockpit about three blocks from the Hart home. They spotted something moving in the water. It was Big Boy. The horse apparently had been treading water in the rockpit for nearly two full days.

Civil Rights

Talkathon Opens Today

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Northern Democrats today opened their House civil rights talkathon with a challenge to President Eisenhower to help them force a vote on a stalled rights bill.

The Democrats reserved 14 hours and 10 minutes for their speeches in support of a parliamentary maneuver to pry the bill from the conservative-dominated House Rules Committee. They planned to use only two or three hours today.

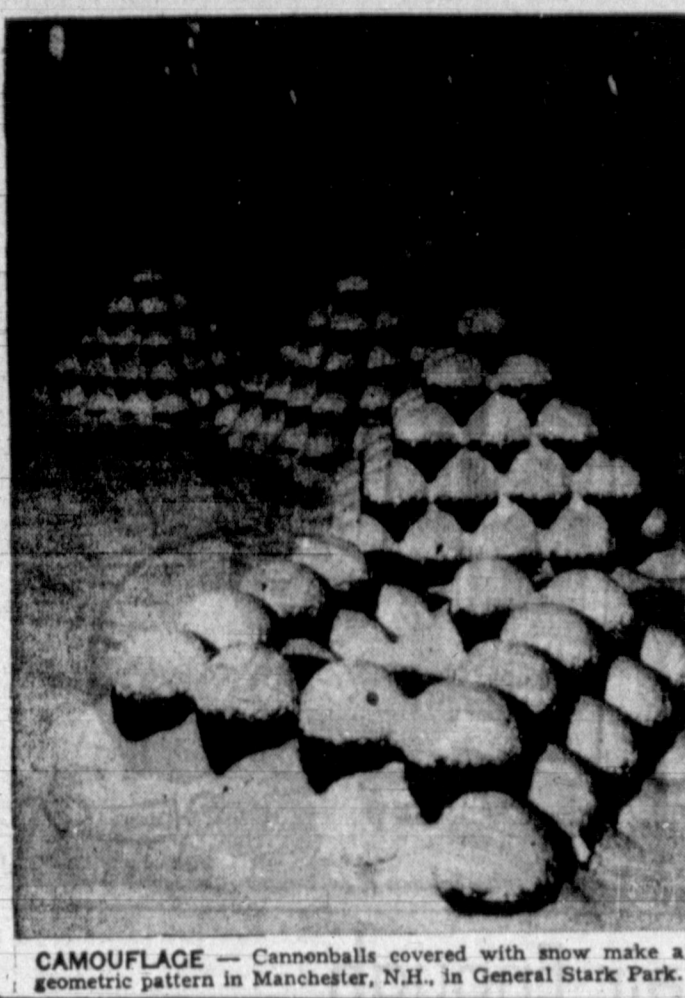
Chairman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) of the House Judiciary Committee, the lead-off speaker, urged Eisenhower to persuade Republicans to sign a petition to force the bill out of the rules group and onto the floor.

The petition requires 219 signatures. As of Tuesday night about 190 lawmakers had signed, including at least 30 Republicans.

Other congressional news: World Court: Secretary of State Christian A. Herter and Asst. Atty. Gen. Robert Kramer were the first scheduled witnesses at Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearings on proposals to repeal a restriction on U.S. participation in the World Court.

Drugs: Senate investigators hinted that Congress would be asked to approve new laws restricting advertising by drug companies. Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said hearings by his Senate anti-trust subcommittee showed "definitely that something ought to be done."

Farm: President Eisenhower probably will skip his usual farm message to Congress this year. Instead, he was expected to stand on a six-point farm program outlined in his Jan. 18 budget message.

Flu Siege

Thru Texas

AUSTIN (UPI) — The State Health Department reported Tuesday that influenza, which has already hit thousands of Texans, is steadily growing worse in the state.

J. E. Peavy, state health commissioner, said most cases appear to be Asian flu, but there have not been enough laboratory confirmations yet for definite statistics.

The incidence of influenza in the state has shown a marked increase for the fourth consecutive week, Peavy said. "The general clinical impression in individual cases is much the same as in the epidemic of two years ago—that is, comparatively mild with low mortality."

Many schools throughout the state have closed because of heavy absenteeism. Peavy said 35 counties throughout the state have reported more than 80 cases of flu, but the hardest hit appeared to be El Paso, Travis and Nueces counties.

Flu cases totalled 2,246 in El Paso in an unofficial count, and authorities said they believed many more cases had gone unreported.

San Antonio, hard hit a few weeks ago, was pulling out of the high-incidence-of-influenza cases.

No Written Memoirs

Ruling In Death

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower has had all the best intentions to jot down in a diary each night the momentous events of his career as military leader, college president and Chief Executive.

But, not many of the diary's pages are filled because, like the rest of us, Eisenhower found it easier to put off until tomorrow what could be done better today.

The President's admitted procrastination came up at his news conference Tuesday when he was asked if he was trying to keep an orderly record of the historical events of his presidency.

He said he had started a diary nearly 30 years ago "and every evening I find I have been a little bit too tired — and I was going to do it tomorrow."

Eisenhower recalled that he started the diary "in Panama in 1921, and I found that from time to time as I look back, oh, I'd find three or four notes over the period of five years and I decided that it wasn't very..."

The President got no further. He joined the laughter of the reporters.

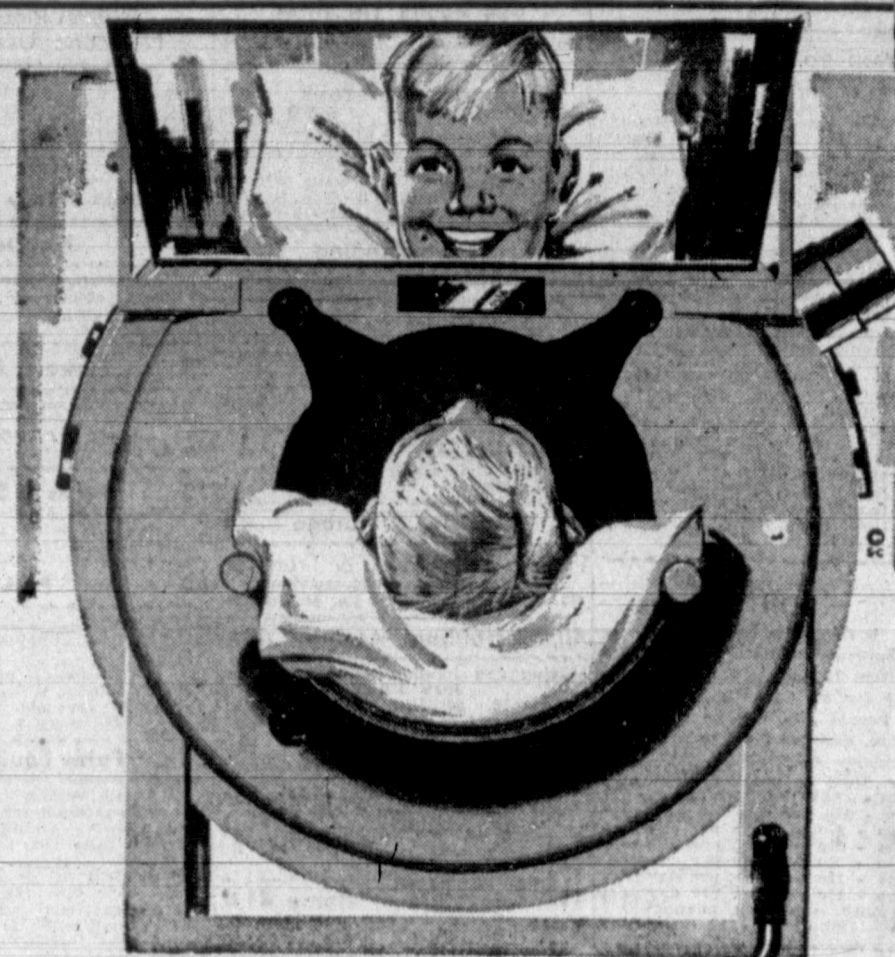
