

## St. Laurent Favorite for Canada Post

OTTAWA-(AP)-Louis Stephen St Laurent, Canadian minister for external affairs, emerged a heavy favorite today to become Canada's next prime minister, but the race is still wide open.

Most of the delegates to the National Liberal Party Convention opening this morning are uncomnitted. The convention was called to name a successor to Prime Minster W. L. MacKenzie King.

James Garfield Gardiner, minister of agriculture, is the second leading contender.

The convention's primary responsibility is to select a new party leader. King has said he wants to retire after more than 20 years in office. He has served as the elected head of a British commonwealth country longer than any other person in history. He first was elected prime minister in 1921 but his leadership has had two breaks in

Under Canada's political system, the leader of the dominant political party automatically becomes prime minister. The liberals now are the strongest party.

King plans to remain as prime minister for a few months after his successor is chosen to give him time to find his political feet. And time to find his political feet. And plant are in the first three King to continue as leader, at least until the next national election in 1950.

Prior to the war the Danube had been under international control which gave rights to both Eastern and Western powers.

Theoretically the conference is to reestablish free navigation, but practically the matter was virtually fixed in advance by the Communists. ### Experiment Fertilizer To be Used on Farms In Roberts County

The experimental use of nitrate and phosphate fertilizer will be used on Walter Ehman's farm south of Miami, the Roberts County Soil Conservation District reports.

The fertilizer will be put in the ground at the time of wheat drillng. Soil analysis of this area indicates a lack of nitrogen and phosphorous. A variation in the rate of the use of these two substances vill determine which one will help soil the most.
