



tested the treatment and U.S. Ambassador Walter McConaughy and United Nations Commander in-Chief Carter B. Magruder both apologized.







A Debate With Russian Economists

The American Institute for Economic Research reports an interesting debate between Mr. Philip Cortney, president of Coty, Inc., and Coty International and chairman of the American section of the International Chamber of Commerce, and members of the Russian Institute of World Economy and International Retations (a section of the Russian Academy of Sciences), in Moscow on July 31, 1959.

I thought Mr. Cortney presented the free enterprise side against the Russians in a splendid manner, so I am reproducing installments of this debate:

Mr. Cortney: "At three o'clock sharp, I duly appeared on the premises of the Institute of World Economy and International relations accompanied by Mr. S. Veshchunov of the USSR Chamber of Commerce, where Mr. Rubinstein and eight other economists were awaiting me in a room leading to another large and imposing hall which appeared to be where the Members of the Academy hold their meetings, around an enormous table. We assembled in the meeting hall of the

Before reporting the dialogue with the members of the Institute I wish to say that this was not an interview but a real confrontation of ideas.

'All the people there spoke English, so that we did not need an interpreter. Some preliminary remarks indicated to me immediately that these gentlemen were up to date on everything being published in the United States. England, France, etc. Much to my surprise, they had already read a book that had been out scarcely three weeks in the United States, 'The Failure of the New Economics' by Henry Haz-

Mr. Cortney: "The first ques-tion Mr. Rubinstein asked me was whether I had chauged my position as to the ideas I advocated or attacked in my book 'The Economic Munich'. He added that it was very interesting, but that many of the opinions I had stated therein seemed to him highly controversial (debatable).

'The Economic Munich' was primarily an attack upon Keynes' theories, which had polsoned the minds of our economists, and indirectly those of statesmen and

Rubinstein "But the book also contains views on socialism, to which I do take exception."

Cortney: "I am hardly surprised at this, but I have not changed my views either on socialism or on Keynes' fallacious theories. My book expressed chiefly my anxiety as to the dangerous trend of thinking in ecowrote against inflation, the effects of which might destroy our social order, and especially human freedom to which I attach the utmost importance. In the book, I especially stressed the vital role of sound money to free economies. The theory of full employment maintained by Keynes gave hardly any attention to effects on a country's balance of

payments. You will grant that the 1929 crash was a major crossroads in the life of all the free people. Now you know as well as I do that Keynes did not foresee the crash, and even his diagnosis of the great depression as formulated after the fact in his famous book 'General Theory of Employment' is false. And yet it Keynes who set forth remedies for economic depression which are es-

sentially inflationary expedients."

A Russian Economist: "I seem to have noticed an evolution of ideas in your country contrary to Keynes. But it appears to me that your literature on inflation has gone astray. There is talk of wage inflation' (inflation due to rise in wages) or 'credit inflation'. In my opinion there is only one real source of inflation-budget deficits financed by the banks. That is the sole real cause of inflation. The budget of my country

is always balanced. Mr. Cortney: "I wish that many of our economists in the United States and elsewhere could hear your opinion of the main causes of inflation. However, let me draw your attention to the fact that in he period from 1920 to 1929, before the crash, we had a credit inflatioin in the United States that was in large part responsible for

the severity of the crisis." Same Russian Economist: "Yet Galbraith in his book on the great crisis holds that it was due essentially to runaway speculation on the stock market.

Cortney: "Market speculation did play a large part in the seriousness and development of the crisis, but the effective cause of this speculation was abnormal exsion of credit.


