sioners from Milam, Falls, Robertson and Bell. The four counties are plagued with rabid foxes and "The situation is acute and calls,

for emergency control measures," Dr. Rich said. "These counties are running a grave risk of having a dog rabies epidemic, which of course almost always is followed by human exposure to rabies.'

The county commissioners plan to hold public meetings in each their respective counties to plan emergency control measures. "This will put the matter into
