

Pair Fashion Key, Break County Jail

Both Under Sentences to Prison

Escapes were still at large after fleeing the fourth-floor cell in the county courthouse late between 8:45 p.m. Sunday and 1:15 p.m. Monday. They are Stanley F. Garbutt, 22, and E. Sexton, 18.

Sheriff Rufe Jordan said the men used a key from a spoon handle to unlock the cell door, slid an elevator shaft, forced the elevator door on the second floor and made good their escape.

Jordan said the pair is believed to have stolen a car belonging to Whititt, 831 S. Wells, which they drove to Borger where they believed to have stolen another car.

As Ranger Bill Henslee said, they are also believed to have stolen a safe in Borger, obtaining \$100.

Jordan commented, "Where they got the key from is anybody's guess, but we're checking the west and Oklahoma." He said both were rearrested in Oklahoma, but at Lawton and Sexton at McAlester.

Jordan said: "In my four and a half years as deputy and nine as sheriff, this is the first time I ever had a prisoner."

Through "shakedown" of the jail just a few days ago to turn up the key that was used, although another fashioned the same way was discovered. Jordan said, however, this is not unusual, since almost every search finds something of this nature.

Garbutt has been in jail since last August and Sexton since November. Sexton will be remembered as burglar caught in the act of robbing the Harvester Bowl, but he was later released on bond.

Sexton later made his way to Groom and took a bus to California. He was flown back to Pampa by Deputy Buck Haggard and Claude Timmons.

Jordan said 10 other prisoners in the jail did not attempt to escape.

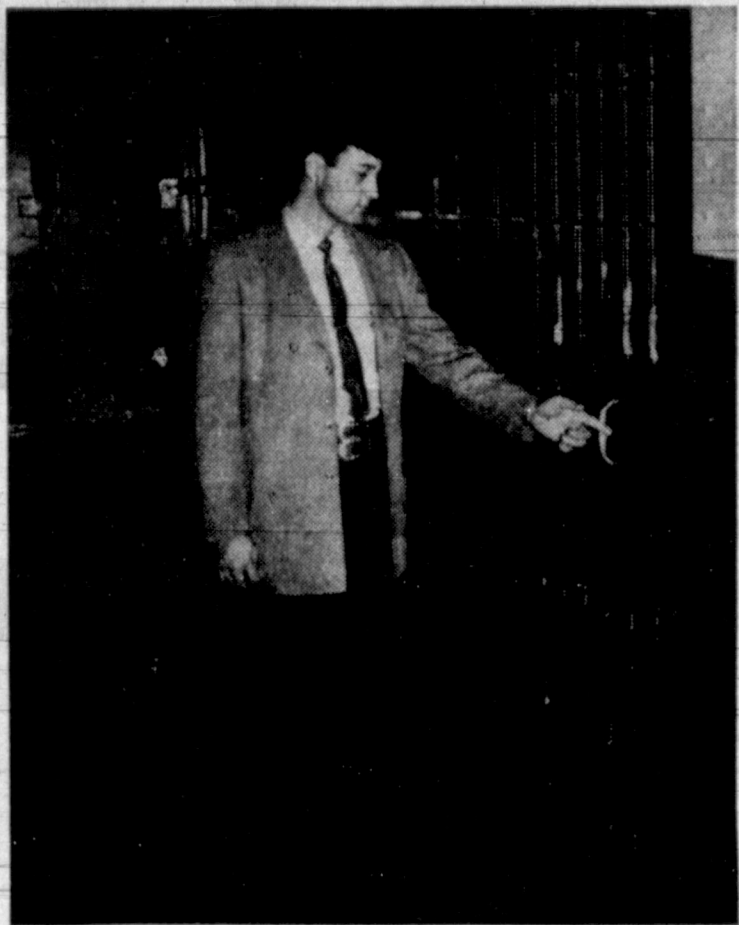
It is usual in such cases, the sheriff probably will file a charge of wrongful flight against the two.

Jordan said the men "had to escape between 13 minutes to nine 10 minutes to 10; because that the hour I was out of the house."

Both men were sentenced Dec. 11 in 31st District Court. Sexton given a seven-year sentence, Garbutt, a three-time loser, sentenced to six years in the penitentiary.

Jordan said the feeding schedule was meals a day at 9:30 a.m., 4:30 p.m. He could not say if their loss was not discovered at 9:30 a.m. feeding yesterday.

Atty. Bill Waters said when the pair are caught they will be charged with jail break, which can range from two to 10 years to their sentence.

Ministers Hit City Limits Extension

City commissioners today accepted the resignation of corporation court judge J. B. (Buff) Maguire and appointed Robert D. McPherson to replace him.

Maguire's resignation becomes effective Jan. 15. McPherson will assume office Jan. 15.

Commissioners also heard a protest from the Pampa Ministerial Alliance to the admission of the Coronado Inn into the city limits. The group gave as their reason the issuance of a liquor license to the hotel.

Mayor Ed Myatt explained that the Inn has not asked for admission to the city at this time, but told them their protest will be considered at the proper time.

Commissioners also heard the third reading of zoning Ordinance 234, paid monthly bills amounting to \$20,743.40 and approved the application of M. Roberts to operate a cab company.

A public hearing was held prior to approval of Roberts' application. Following the hearing, Commissioner James Crawford, Jr., moved that the city issue permits for 13 cabs in the city limits. Nine of the taxis will be operated by the Yellow Cab Co. and four will be operated by City Cab Co., which Roberts owns.

The other enlisted man, Sgt. Harry K. Saunders, of Kansas City, Mo., was not punished.

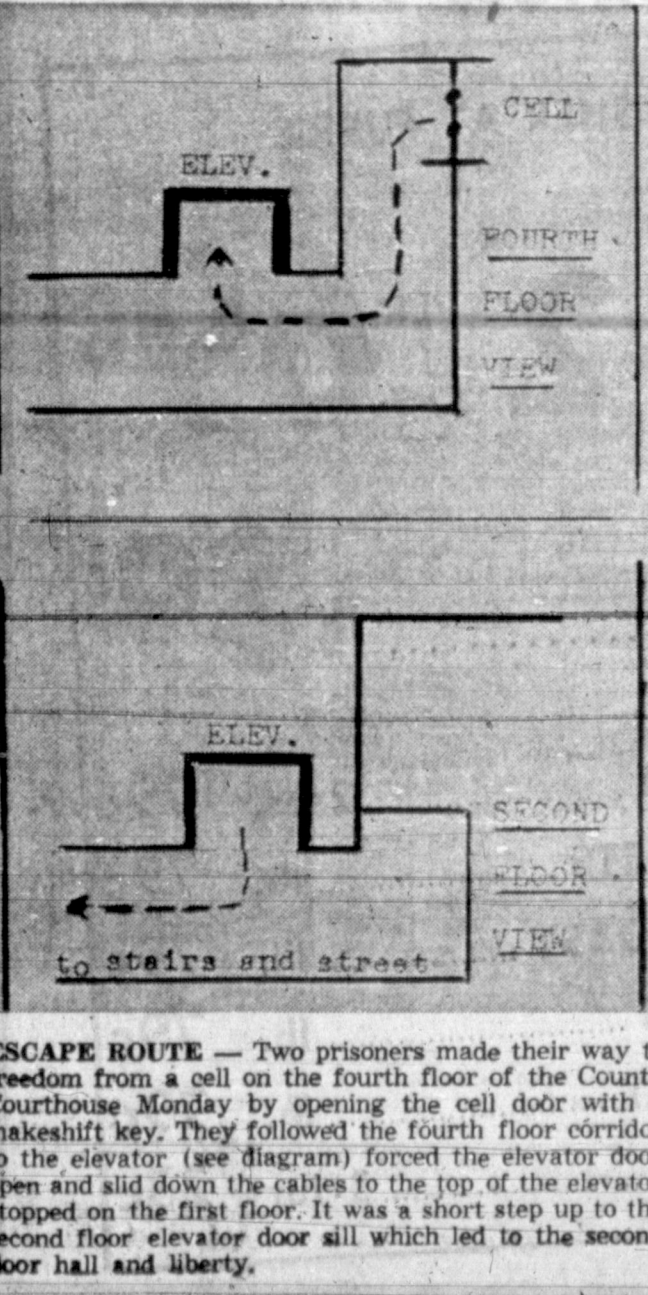
The action came after the Republic of Korea lodged a formal protest with the United States government demanding that "proper measures" be taken against the three and that steps be taken to prevent any recurrence.

Ghost Of Dixon-Yates Issue Arises

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — The ghost of one of the loudest, longest and most misunderstood political issues of President Eisenhower's first term is back again in his final year in office.

The issue is public versus private electrical power. It was a burning political argument during most of Eisenhower's first term under the name of "Dixon-Yates."

The old Dixon-Yates arguments of 1953 and 1954 were thrust back into the news last month when

the Memphis City Commission approved a rate increase averaging 19 per cent for the city-owned power plant. The increase now is before the courts, and at least one plea has been made for Congress to re-examine the operation methods of all public power agencies.

Memphis was the battleground for the Dixon-Yates argument which embroiled the Eisenhower administration in a running controversy with congressional Democrats. Many accused the President of trying to strangle the Tennessee Valley Authority, the na-

tion's foremost public power domain created in the first year of Franklin Roosevelt's administration.

The Dixon-Yates argument started like this:

In 1952, the TVA with President Truman's endorsement, asked Congress for 100 million dollars to build a new steam plant at Paducah, Tenn., north of Memphis to meet a power shortage. Congress turned it down, and President Eisenhower later killed a second request.

In 1954, at Eisenhower's suggestion, the Atomic Energy Com-

mission started negotiations with Edgar H. Dixon, president of Middle South Utilities, Inc., and Eugene A. Yates, board chairman of the Southern Company, to build a \$107,250,000 steam plant at West Memphis, Ark.

Under that plan, the Dixon-Yates combine would supply 600,000 kilowatts to TVA at Memphis to "replace" power TVA was sending to the Atomic Energy Commission plant at Paducah, Ky.

TVA advocates charged the Atomic Energy Commission was "frogging" a move to strangle TVA growth and give private

power a foothold in the area.

The controversy raged through a Senate filibuster, into the congressional elections and into several congressional investigations.

The city of Memphis, long accustomed to low-cost TVA power, finally killed the entire deal by building its own steam plant to supply Memphis with power at TVA rates and then withdrew from TVA.

Now the Memphis rates have been raised and it has brought the old battle back into the headlines.

U.S. Insists Cuba Pay For Property Grabs

New Strain On Relations; Protest Note Is Rejected

HAVANA (UPI) — The Cuban government Monday night rejected a U.S. protest against seizure of North American holdings in Cuba and said a formal protest failed to deal with "a basic situation" of Cuba's new agrarian reform laws.

A statement by Acting Foreign Minister Marcelo Fernandez Font made it clear Cuba later would formally reject a State Department note handed over Monday by U.S. Ambassador Phillip W. Bonsal. However, Fernandez promised to study the note further.

In dealing with a similar American protest last June a spokesman first criticized the Washington note and the revolutionary government later rejected it officially, Monday's was the fourth U.S. protest in a year.

U.S. insistence on cash payment for Americans whose property in Cuba is seized by the Fidel Castro government put a new strain on the already cool U.S.-Cuban relations, and Fernandez statement made it clear Cuba would continue expropriating property.

The text of the note was not made public immediately, but the embassy said it concerned the "denial of basic rights of ownership to U. S. citizens in Cuba" rights provided under both Cuban law and generally accepted international law.

A statement issued by Fernandez Monday night indicated that the U. S. protest was concerned with arbitrary seizure of property rather than expropriations authorized by Castro's land reform program.

The Cuban official said the note concerned "a number of supposed facts which are described as 'violations' of the agrarian reform law." He said the government will decide "in due time" what (See CUBA, Page 3)

Candidacy Of Morse Said A Red Herring

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse's decision to enter presidential primaries was viewed today as a possible holding action to build up support for Adlai E. Stevenson.

Morse announced Monday he would enter the District of Columbia primary on May 3 and run as a "favorite son" in the Oregon primary on May 20.

A. L. Wheeler, D.C., campaign manager for the Oregon senator, said today if Morse finds he can't win at the July Democratic convention, his backers here want him to throw his support behind Stevenson.

Wheeler, chairman of the D.C. Democratic Central Committee, said one of the main reasons why Democrats were backing Morse was "his untiring support of Adlai Stevenson in 1952 and 1956 and his continued favorable comments about Stevenson."

Stevenson has said that he is not a candidate this year but he has not ruled out a move to draft him for a third try for the White House.

A United Press International survey showed Monday that a campaign to draft Stevenson has reached the official organization stage in at least five states—Wisconsin, Missouri, Ohio, California and Texas.

In the D.C. and Oregon contests, Morse will clash directly with Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.). The only other announced Democratic aspirant, Sen. John F. Kennedy (Mass.) has not said whether he would run in these two primaries. But Morse said he understood Kennedy would run in Oregon.

Morse said he had tried unsuccessfully to keep his name off the Oregon ballot, but that his supporters have more than the 1,000 signatures necessary to enter him without his consent.

Wilson, who votes in Dallas county, has served two terms as attorney general.

He will announce his 1960 political resolutions over a 22-station radio hookup starting at 7 p. m.

House Speaker Waggoner Carr has already announced that he will make the race for attorney general.

DeGaulle Faced With Monumental Decision

PARIS (UPI) — President Charles de Gaulle will decide today whether to fire Finance Minister Antoine Pinay and run the risk of precipitating a grave economic and political crisis, informed sources reported.

Pinay is the architect of French economic recovery and the stock market already has reacted sharply to reports he is on his way out. Prices dropped as much as 5 per cent Monday; they began the decline Thursday when Pinay broke with government economic policies.

Pinay is engaged in a bitter struggle with Premier Michel Debre over what Pinay called Debre's attempts to "Sovietize" French industry. Debre is aligned with Justice Minister Edmond Michelet who has called for more socialization of French industry.

De Gaulle was expected to announce his decision at a cabinet meeting Wednesday. All indications were Pinay would be out.

There was widespread speculation that should a major crisis develop De Gaulle would fall back on a provision of the new constitution giving him the right to declare a state of emergency which would give him dictatorial powers.

It was the worst political crisis in France since De Gaulle came to power a year ago and it had major implications involving NATO, the summit conference, future French military policies and continued French economic recovery.

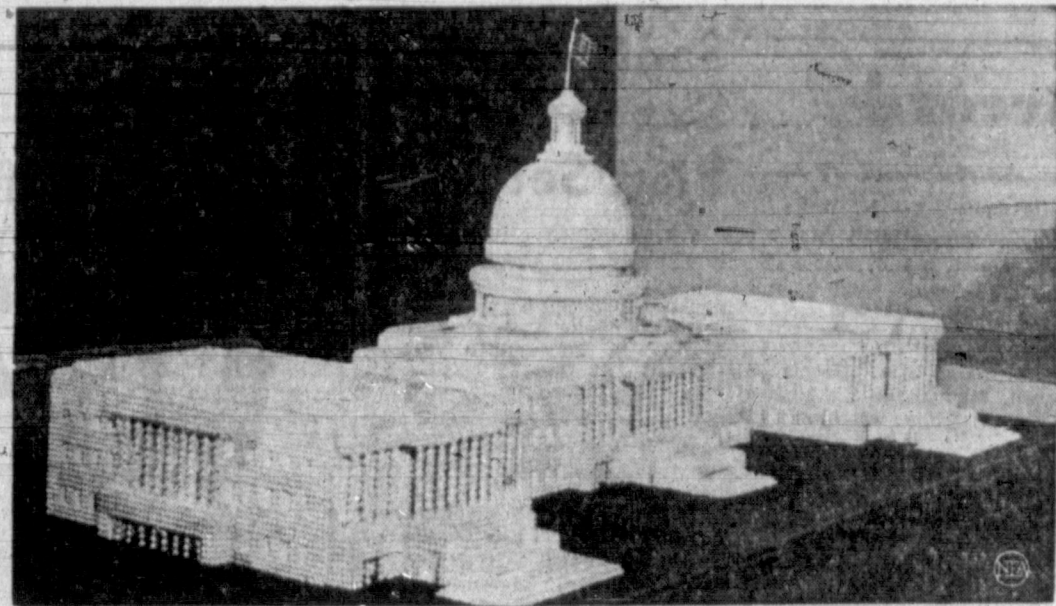
Texas Chief Jumps Track At Stafford

STAFFORD, Tex. (UPI)—Workmen labored today to repair more than 400 feet of track, ripped up last night when the Santa Fe passenger train derailed after hitting a truck loaded with steel.

One of the approximately 50 engines on the Chicago-to-St. Louis train was killed although suffered minor injuries. The men in the trailer-truck managed to leap from the vehicle as the train approached.

prosecution chemist was scheduled to testify today that he was from three to six feet in height. Barbara Jean Finch when the fatal shot entered her back.

William C. Crompt, the chemist, testified that estimates on the evidence of gunpowder fragments and in the back of the white dress worn by the victim last night she was killed outside her \$65,000 Finch home in West Los Angeles.

Finch's attorney, Grant Cooper, offered to concede previously that a gun held by Finch killed the tennis-playing wife.

Cooper scored some ground today with admission from an ophthalmologist that the items in the so-called "murder kit" discovered on the murder scene could far more reasonably be used for innocent purposes.

Among them was a kitchen knife (for carving meat or bread), a clothesline (for hanging hampers on Finch's porch), second and syringes (normal parts of a doctor's equipment) and a flashlight (not unusual for anyone).

The incriminating part was that the flashlight case with such items just outside the double garage where the state charges Mrs. Barbara Finch was attacked outside her red convertible.

Finch's mistress has an explanation.

Miss Tregoff has said the doctor called her to bring up the flashlight the night of Mrs. Finch's killing and that she thought the whole case instead.

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Khrushchev Formalities Win Approval

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev probably never heard of Emily Post. But she would be proud of the way he handled an international etiquette problem by sending gifts on two holidays.

Christmas is just another cold day in December to the avowedly atheistic Russians. Nevertheless, Khrushchev sent President Eisenhower a plane full of Christmas gifts on Dec. 19.

The Soviet boss also sent Christmas presents to the four Eisenhower grandchildren.

Then Monday Khrushchev sent Eisenhower two more large gift packages containing New Year's presents. New Year's Day is the holiday here—which Russians exchange gifts.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said one of the New Year's boxes held caviar. He said he did not know what was in the other package.

The latest Khrushchev presents were delivered by Soviet Ambassador Mikhail H. Menshikov during a 20-minute White House conference. He also relayed an oral message from the Soviet premier.

Menshikov would not reveal to newsmen the text of Khrushchev's message. He said only, "I brought a goodwill message from Chairman Khrushchev to the President and also conveyed Mr. Khrushchev's New Year greetings to the President and all his family."

Khrushchev's Christmas gift to Eisenhower last month was a plane load of 130 assorted trees, plants and shrubs.

When the plants are released from quarantine, they will be sent to Eisenhower's Gettysburg, Pa., farm.

It is not known what, if any, Christmas or New Year's gifts Eisenhower sent Khrushchev.

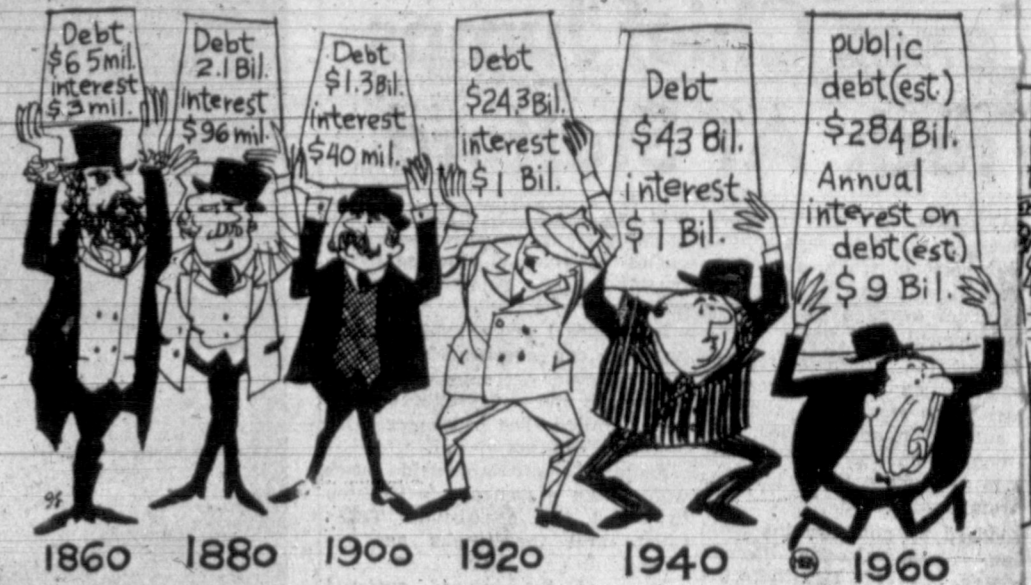
Santa Fe Expansion Plan Set

A \$100 million capital expenditure program in 1960 for modernization and improvement was announced today by Ernest S. Marsh, president of the Santa Fe Railway System, in an annual year-end statement.

The program is larger by some \$18 million than for any prior year. It compares with expenditures of approximately \$60 million in 1959.

"The 1960 program divides about equally between new equipment and improvement to roadway and other facilities," Marsh said. "It includes 227 miles of new and heavier rail of the continuous welded type; 60 new 2400-horsepower freight diesel-electric locomotive units; sizeable expenditures in connection with Arizona line change projects; 50 new baggage cars; about 2500 new freight cars, part of which are already in production schedules; construction of a new modern freight house at Kansas City, Mo.; consolidation of freight yard facilities at Brownwood, Texas; installation of micro-wave communications at various points; further installations of centralized traffic control and traffic reversal signaling and other projects."

The Santa Fe President said, "This program is designed to meet continuing growth of population and industry by providing modern facilities to perform an adequate and efficient service and to produce the most economical operation in order to help keep abreast of constantly rising costs of doing business."



A HUNDRED YEARS IN THE HOLE—The nation's public debt of \$65 million a century ago seems almost infinitesimal compared with today's. A decade later, as a result of the Civil War, it was over the \$2 billion mark. Sketch above shows the debt history in 20-year intervals. After the Civil War high, it declined, on the average, until the depression and the beginning of World War II. Today, the government is spending as much for interest alone as the entire national budget in 1940. The debt is currently running at \$29.1 billion, but hopes are that it will wind up around \$28.4 billion at the end of the fiscal year.

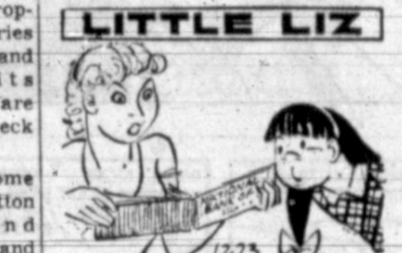

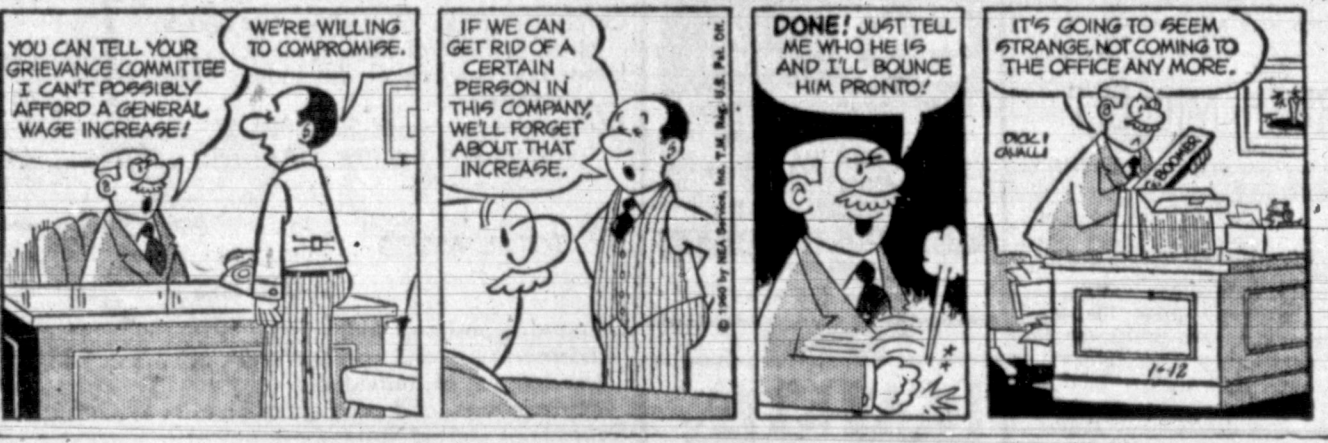

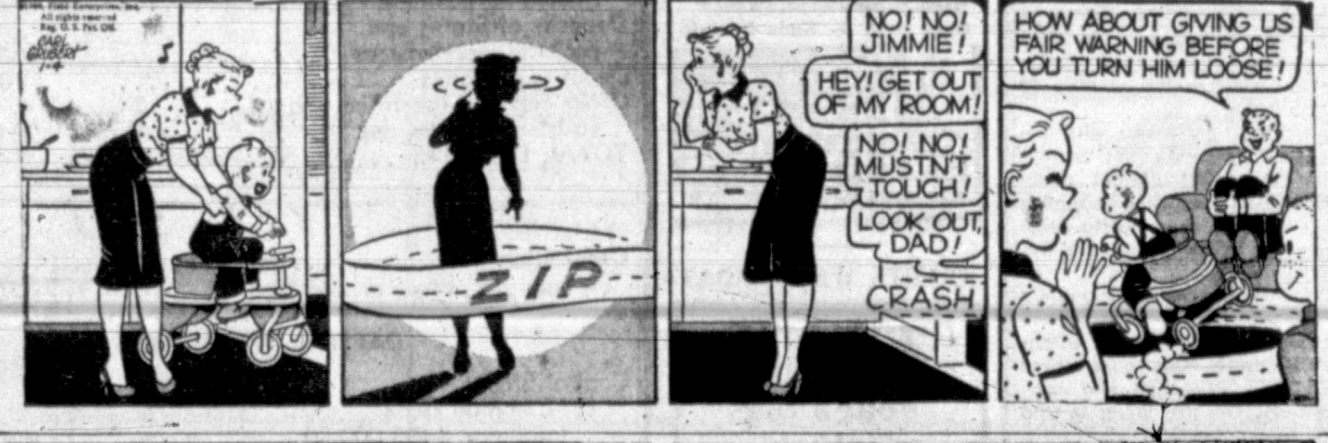

TWINING RETIRING BY JUNE FOR HEALTH, AFTER HE BACKS DEFENSE BUDGET

General Lyman Lemnitzer, Army Chief of Staff, is his most likely successor.

President Eisenhower has been told by Twining of his intention to quit the one-time Air Chief of Staff.

Blocking that is a bipartisan group headed by Representative Howard Smith (D., Va.) and including Representatives William Colmer (D., Miss.), Homer Thornberry (D., Tex.), Leo Allen (R., Ill.), Clarence Brown (R., O.), Carroll Reece (R., Tenn.), and Hammer Budge (R., Idaho).

Favoring the bill are Democratic Representatives Richard Bolling, Mo., Ray Madden, Ind., Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr., Mass., and James Delaney, N.Y.

Two Republican votes are needed to force the bill out of this Committee. Last session, Halleck, who supports the legislation, repeatedly tried to win over several GOP committeemen, but got nowhere.

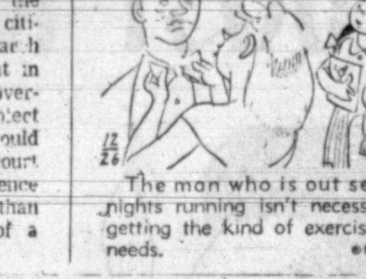
