

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

There is a very simple reason why there is a strike and why there has been no settlement, up to time of writing

The reason is that the federal government has given the labor unions a special privilege or advantage over the steel companies and their consumers. Laws have been made that make it legal but not fair and just and right and equitable and in agreement with eternal principles for the workers to do things that would be illegal and unscrupulous, unprincipled, unjust, unfair and unethical if done by the steel compan-

A Double Standard

In other words, we have established a double standard of rightness, and there is no possibility of a fair and just settlement, a fair and just bargain when we have a double standard and permit one side to threaten the other and to make it a crime for the other side to do the same thing. Of course, we do not want either side to have the right to threaten, to injure or to blackmail the other side. But when labor groups are permitted to conspire and get a monopoly by limiting apprentices, by limiting those who dare do a certain line of work and interfere with the free and natural division of labor, then there is no chance of a fair and just bargain. Then it becomes a question of surrender, of paying tribute to those who have a mon-

Undoubtedly many people believe labor unions help raise wage levels. They probably believe it as sincerely as Khrushchev believed that everybody would be better off if he directed the lives of every other person. They have been told so often that labor unions are good for the working man that they actually believe it, But they can no more raise total wages than men can lift themselves up by their boot straps. It simply wastes energy that could

It looks like that beautiful line detective story writers have used for years, "Arrest him on suspicion of murder," is a dead duck, killed by the U. S. Supreme Court. The court ruled Monday that a police officer may not arrest anyone just on "sus-

The decision is certainly going to pose a lot of problems for the police. Over the past years, many a crime has been foiled because a police officer became suspicious of a loiterer and picked him up for questioning, Many a town has been kept clean of tramps and bums because the local police insisted on hauling every one they saw to the local callaloose on "suspicion." Evidently the court ruling means that a police officer must have some kind of evidence before he can arrest a person. In the case ruled on, a man

was picked up because police suspected he had something to do with illicit alcohol. As it turned out, he was stealing radios. So now he goes free because the police did not have some sort of evidence that he was stealing radios - although the stolen :adios were found in his possession as soon as he was taken into custody

The majority opinion of the court was based on the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution which says, "The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses papers, and efagainst unreasonable fects. searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the

> The Doctor Says:

by EDWIN P. JORDAN, M.D. At one time or another, each of us runs into some disturbance of sleep. We may have trouble dropping off. Or we may fall asleep as soon as our heads touch the pillow and then waken one or more times during the night. Or we may have a few hours of deep slumber and waken, wide-eyed, hours before it's time to get up.

We usually think it's much worse than it really is. A few minutes of wakefulness seems like an hour, an hour like half the night. Go with any doctor on his hospital rounds and you're sure to run into a difference of opinion between the night reports of patient and nurse.

The chart says "Slept well. Comfortable night." The nurse claims the fers to the patient who insists that the very opposite is nearer

the truth. The patient claims the report must refer to the nurse who, if this version is correct, has apparently mastered the art of

sleepwalking. Whatever the truth and what-

ever the type of insomnia, the result is more or less the same: the sufferer gets up heavy-headed and irritable. It's as hard to get muscles and brain to function as it is to start a motor on a sub-zero morning. Some time during the day, eyelids get heavy, eyes smart and head droops. Then the proverbial 40 winks make things worse rather than better.

In this day and age, the first thought of the victim of insomnia is a prescription for sleeping medicine, now sold by the ton to peoples throughout the civilized

Let me explain why I think this should be a last thought. First as regards sleeping medicines and the act of taking sleeping medicines:

Most and perhaps all effective sleeping medicines tend to produce addiction. That is to say they create a true drug dependency as evidenced by the fact that the insomniac requires larger and larger doses to obtain the desired effect.

In some cases if deprived of the accustomed dose, he develops withdrawal symptoms such as nervousness, restlessness and even convulsions.

In addition to true drug addiction, the act of taking sleeping medicines tends to become a hab it. As night approaches, the insomniac becomes increasingly fearful of the approach of bedtime. If the sleep "crutch" is not immediately at hand, this fear may grow to panic proportions. eased and panic avoided by providing the patient with a blank dose that looks and tastes like

Sometimes this fear may be the regular medicine except that the drug is omitted.

In another column, I'll have suggestions for the conquest of sleeplessness.

On the other hand, the minority opinion of the court said that, "When an investigation proceeds to the point where an agent has reasonable grounds to believe that an offense is being committed, in his presence, he is to proceed to make such searches, seizures, and arrests as the circumstances require. It is only by such alertness that crime is discovered, interrupted, prevented, and punish-

Justice William Douglas, in defending the opinion, paraphrased an old saying in declaring that, "It is better, so the Fourth Amendment teaches, that the guilty sometimes go free than that. citizens be subjected to easy arrests." The original saying was that, "It is better that the guilty sometimes go free than even one innocent man suffer." It is hard to argue against

the saying in its original form. cent man hanged for murder. But as the saying is applied to this case, it seems to be going a bit far-quite a bit. Here was a case in which police were not forcing illegal entry, but were simply halting a man whose actions were suspicious. Had he been innocent, a simple check by police officers would have discovered the fact. After a minor inconvenience, he would have gone free. But as the majority of the supreme court has interpreted the Fourth Amendment, it seems lil ar that the road block to trap escaping criminals is a thing of the past. If you can't step a car or the suspicion that it might contain a murdarer, how are you going to stop anyone

Certainly the court fait the duty to protect the average citizen against um easonable sear h and arrest, but it seems that in this case in court has been overzealous in its desire to protect the rights of the citizen. It would have been better had the court felt it was bester to inconvenience the innocent momentarily than to permit the commission of a crime.

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
