"It's a record for Bailey County," Barrett said, adding that the figure includes both mail ballots and in-person early voters.
The total means that just under 19 percent of the county's 3,869 voters already have cast ballots, with Election Day coming up Nov. 7. Interest in the presidential race presumably is high, with native son George W. Bush in the

The only local race with opposition is for Precinct 1 commissioner, where incumbent Democrat Floyd "Butch" Vandiver is being opposed by Republican Jack Dunham.
Unopposed are incumbent Democrats

## Weevil battle continues after harvest

The cotton-growing season is winding down, and producers in non-eradicated areas should notice a decline in treatments for boll weevils.
But they also may notice that some harvested fields are still being treated.
These treatments reflect a difference in philosophy between control and eradication, said texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation program director Charles Allen.
"Pests can cause little injury to the harvestable crop at this point in the season," Allen said.
"But during this time of year, control efforts intensify in boll-weevil eradication programs," he added. "The main difference is that the objective of a grower is to control boll-weevil populations to prevent economic damage to the crop, while that of the eradication program is to eliminate the pest.'
The boll weevil's primary focus during the latter part of the season is feeding to gain latter part of the season is feeding to gain
enough fat to survive the winter, Allen said.
Because of this, weevils may be present in defoliated or harvested fields that still have green bolls or immature squares, which are weevils' prime food sources.

In Texas, foundation personnel continue to trap fields until all hostable material - plant parts that a weevil can feed on - has been eliminated from those fields, Allen said.
If trap catches on those fields meet or exceed established triggers, then the fields are treated to eliminate weevils before they can overwin er. Fewer overwintering weevils mean fewe emerging weevils to worry about in the spring he said.
When the next season begins with lower populations, less spraying will be needed, saving the growers money and speeding the course of eradication, he added
Growers can help reduce the number of treatments in their area by practicing good cultural controls, a key element in the eradication process, Allen said.
Such practices include harvesting fields as soon as possible after defoliation and shredding or plowing stalks after harvest to eliminate host material
Some growers prefer to leave stalks in fields as ground cover, but they should be careful to check for regrowth as long as the weather remains warm and take steps to keep the fields free of host material.

Shrubs can be multiplied by digging up suckers

Anyone who has a mature suckering shrub and wants more has a goldmine on their hands.
Probably the shrubs most Commonly divided by suckers in our area are lilacs, simply because we have so many lilacs and their suckers are so numerous.
Suckers, by the way, are the shoots that spring up from the roots near the base of certain plants.
Qnce these suckers have a season's growth, they usually have enough root to survive on their own, so you can spade them up and put them where ou like.
With a prolific sucker producer such as a lilac, it's easy to produce a whole hedge or small windbreak very quickly from one or two parent plants. Another shrub that is a prolific producer of suckers is kerria, and it can be treated the same way as lilacs in this re-

and sweet box (Sarcococca) also produce usable suckers. This type of division works best when the plant is dormant; the two best times for us are fall, when the ground is still fairly warm, or early spring, when the ground is about to start warming up.
While most shrubs sucker from the roots, it is worth noting right from the beginning that a few - such as shrub roses - produce usable suckers from the main stem, between the roots and ground level.
(Suckers from hybrid tea or any other hybrid roses should simply be cut off and discarded, since they probably would not

## match the parent plant.)

 Once the sucker is dug up, cut the "umbilical cord" (the main root that came from the parent plant) as closely to the fibrous roots of the new plant as is practical.If there is considerable top growth, it may be advisable to trim off some that, too, but you'll need to leave at least a few buds to start new growth. If you aren't comfortable deciding how much to trim, it's almost always all right to leave the whole thing.
I have read books that advise cutting back the tops of the suckers to 12 to 18 inches. Because of the digging involved, I prefer to deal with the suckers before they get more than 18 inches tall. With lilacs other than the old-fashioned Persian kind, you may be dealing with taller suckers simply because they get tall in one season.
It's a good idea to work some compost or rotted manure into the soil where you set these "baby" plants, and you will
