Algerian Insurrection Ends After Eight Days

Threat To DeGaulle Over As 500 Rebels Surrender

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI) — The French settlers' revolt against President Charles de Gaulle collapsed today. The insurgents barricaded positions in Algiers without a fight. Last to surrender against the overwhelming odds was Pierre LaGailarde, a red bearded 29 year old former paratrooper. The end to the eight day insurrection against De Gaulle came at noon 6 a.m. e.s.t. LaGailarde marched out of the barricaded zone in the heart of Algiers followed by 500 members of his armed forces. Moments later, the barricades thrown up last week began coming down and army troops moved into the areas. News of the surrender spread like wildfire through the streets of Algiers. Thousands of civilians gathered in the streets to shout for the insurgents and chant "Algerie Francais" (Algeria is French) the insurgents war cry. Two army helicopters hovered over the barricaded zone while groups of stragglers dragged out stocks and equipment and loaded them into army trucks. LaGailarde led his men out from the barricades behind a French tricolor. They boarded trucks and army officials said they had been taken to the 1st Foreign Legion Regiment's base at Zeralda, 18 miles west of Algiers. Troops who entered the Algiers bank headquarters of insurgent soldiers reported that they had gone into hiding. Red beretted paratroopers moved forward to the main barricade. (See ALGERIAN, Page 3)

Down Pacific Corridor

Russians Fire 2nd Rocket

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union announced today it fired its second super-rocket in the Pacific Sunday to complete its present series of rocket tests in that area ahead of schedule. The Tass announcement did not give the precise point of the rocket's impact, but said the next to last stage with a dummy nose cone had "reached the intended region in the Pacific Ocean" at 7:58 p.m. Moscow time. It added that this shot successfully ended the presently announced test series designed to develop a more powerful multi-stage rocket for launching earth satellites and to prepare for flights to other planets. "In this connection," the announcement said, "Tass is authorized to state that the area defined by the coordinates given in the Tass statement of Jan. 8, 1960, is being freed for sailings and flights as from Feb. 1—that is, ahead of schedule." Defense Chief Faces Critic In Questioning

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Thomas S. Gates Jr. faced questioning today on reports that intelligence experts have modified estimates on which he based an appraisal of U.S. military needs. Gates and Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, were scheduled to testify before the Senate Military Appropriations subcommittee. One of Gates' sharpest critics, Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.), may sit in on the hearing. The reports of revised intelligence estimates began to circulate last Friday after Central Intelligence Director Allen W. Dulles briefed the combined Senate Space Committee and Preparedness subcommittee. Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D-Wash.) said that the briefing disclosed a "substantial" change in the estimates which Gates had been using to paint a "rosy" picture of U.S. defenses. From other sources it was learned that the modified estimates in part at least, upgraded the accuracy of Russian missiles. The revisions were said to have been based on new information. In a filmed TV interview with Sen. Prescott Bush (R-Conn.) made public Sunday, Gates said Russia's advantage in missiles would be greatest about 1962 "at which the numbers will close."

Hoiles Group Publisher To TDNA Board

LUFKIN (UPI) — Charles H. Draper of the Houston Post was elected president of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association today at the opening session of its annual meeting. He succeeds Phil North of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram. One hundred and eighty-five publishers and editors of the largest total in history, are attending the meeting. They elected James Chambers of the Dallas Times Herald as vice president and Allan Englemann of the Edinburg Review as secretary. Charles E. Devall of the Kilgore News-Herald and Ralph Jullard of the Valley Morning Star of Harlingen were elected to the executive committee. MacArthur Improved

NEW YORK (UPI) — Gen. Douglas MacArthur, hospitalized with a urinary ailment, was reported improved but still in serious condition today. He will be in the hospital for at least two weeks. MacArthur, who was 80 last week, was reported feeling stronger Sunday. He entered Lenox Hill Hospital Friday complaining of not feeling well. His condition was diagnosed as a blocked urinary tract. "Considerable time will be required to complete a full evaluation of the general condition," Dr. George W. Slaughter, a urologist who is treating MacArthur said.

Congress Takes Up Civil Rights Issues This Week

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress began the new week where it left off Friday — with civil rights issues in the forefront. The House Rules Committee scheduled its first meeting of the current session today. Rep. Ray Madden (D-Ind.) said he would move to clear the civil rights bill to the House floor. But Democratic backers held little hope the southern-led committee would uncoil the long bottled-up measure. Rules Chairman Howard W. Smith (D-Va.) called the meeting after supporters of the bill had mustered 194 of the 219 signatures needed on a discharge petition that would force the measure out of his committee. In the Senate, southern Democrats piled up a list of speakers to debate against a proposal to outlaw poll taxes, still in effect in five southern states. Action on the bill was expected about Wednesday.

28 Dead, 14 Missing In Japanese Mine Blast

YUBARI, Japan (UPI) — Rescue workers braving fire and the threat of gas explosions today brought one of 43 miners trapped in a caved-in coal mine to the surface alive. They found 28 bodies. The bodies were entombed more than two miles from the mine entrance, leaving 14 of the trapped miners unaccounted for. Mine officials said the bodies were found 12 to 150 feet inside the mine. Some appeared to have been killed outright by the early morning explosion which triggered the cave-in, while others appeared to have burned to death or suffocated. The survivor was found "much closer to the entrance of the mine," the officials said. Rescue work was hampered by a raging fire which broke out underground soon after the explosion. Foul air also threatened the lives of the trapped men, and air was pumped into the shaft in hopes of saving lives. Press reports said there was "no hope" for the rescue of the miners, but this report was not confirmed immediately by officials of the Hokkaido Tanko Kisen Co., operator of the mine. The pit ripped by the blast is the biggest coal mine on Japan's southern island of Hokkaido, and one of the largest in the country. Reports from the scene said 65 of the miners originally were trapped by the explosion, but 22 had managed to work their way to safety. HTK officials said seven rescue teams were at work in the mine, trying to break through to miners who were still underground. Officials said it was "lucky" the accident occurred at a time when a reduced Sunday-night shift was at work. "If such an accident occurred on a weekday, more than 1,000 miners probably would have been in the mine and the tragedy would have been much worse," one official said. It was the second potentially-tragic mine accident reported in less than two weeks. On Jan. 21, 440 miners were trapped underground by a cave-in in a coal mine at Coalbrook, South Africa. Their fate is not yet certain. In 1958, 180 miners were killed in a similar accident at Yubari, Japan.

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) — Israeli and Syrian armed forces fought a raging night long battle that lasted until dawn today in the demilitarized zone south of the Sea of Galilee. There were casualties on both sides. Several hours later fighting planes from the two nations clashed in a brief dog fight over Metulla on the Israel Lebanon border. The Israeli spokesman called the operation "the direct result of acts of provocation and aggression by Syrians during the last few days in the southern demilitarized zone." He termed the operation a "clean-up" of military positions that "interfered with normal life in the region." An Israeli military spokesman said in Tiberias that three Israelis were killed in the battle for the Arab village of Tawafik. Seven more soldiers were wounded in the attack, launched against Syria after an Israeli border patrolman was killed and two more wounded in a border clash Sunday. A spokesman in Damascus said two Arabs were killed and four wounded in the fighting at Tawafik. News of the aerial dog fight came from an army spokesman in Tel Aviv. He charged that four Russian-built MIG jet fighters from Syria tried to penetrate Israeli air space and were chased off by two Israeli jets. The battle at Tawafik was the most serious in a feasting series of Israeli-Syrian border clashes that began last Wednesday. Israeli Chief of Staff Haim Laskov rushed to a cabinet meeting in Jerusalem to give a detailed report on the crisis. Reports conflicted. The United Arab Republic spokesman in (See CLASH, Page 3)

Lost, But Not Mute

BIG SPUR, Calif. (UPI) — The pounding suit got a lecture on chemistry and the steep rocky cliffs were told about minerals. Then the redwoods swayed to a cadence counted in three languages. Dr. Louis Pauling, captured by the rugged wildness of the California coastal mountains rising sharply from the sea, gave back to nature some of man's knowledge which is supposed to make him free. Pauling was struck, and he wanted to keep awake. The 58-year-old Nobel Prize winning chemist had started out Saturday morning on a walk. He followed a deer trail through the deep ravines and along the steep cliffs above the ocean. On one incline, the trail "just gave out" and he was unable either to go up or down or back. He wasn't rescued until Sunday morning. "To keep awake I gave a little lecture to the surf on the nature of chemical bonds," he said. "I recited the periodic table of the elements. And when I thought I had run out of material, I ran over Mohs scale of hardening minerals and counted in some languages I know — French, German and Italian." The search for the noted scientist was started Saturday night when his wife, Eva Helen, notified authorities "that he left home on foot about 10 a.m. and failed to return for supper."

Creation Of U.S. Missile Czar Likely

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A new move for creation of a missile "czar" appeared likely today in the wake of statements by two military leaders on the short and long term dangers to the United States. The short-term danger, according to Air Force Gen. Thomas S. Power, is that in two years Russia may have enough intercontinental missiles to launch a massive nuclear attack on this country. The long-term hazard, retiring Army Maj. Gen. John E. Medaris said, is that at the present rate of progress Russia may completely dominate space within 10 years. Medaris, whose retirement from the Army became effective Sunday, said in a broadcast interview with Missiles and Rockets magazine that all missile and space activities should be placed under a joint military command. Chairman Overton Brooks (D-La.) of the House Space Committee disagreed with Medaris, but said "We've got to have more leadership, but something's got to be done about this hickering and back-biting that is still going on."

Rail Union Set To Take Strike Tally

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers prepared today to take a strike vote while two other railroad unions resumed negotiations with the nation's rail industry. The engineers' union said it would ask its 40,000 members this week if they want to strike if no agreement is reached. Even if the workers approve a strike, any walkout would be delayed at least 60 days while a presidential fact-finding board studies the dispute and makes recommendations. Negotiators for the BLE and Firemen and Enginemen broke off talks with industry bargainers last week. Talks continued with two other operating unions — the switchmen and conductors. The switchmen's union said it "only a matter of time before we break off, too, unless something comes up that we can send to our membership for ratification."

Candidate Filing Deadline Today

Two persons filed for county offices today, bringing the number of candidates to 35. Latest to file are M. L. Turner of Pampa, who will oppose incumbent Earl Lewis for constable in Precinct 2, and Harris King, 55-year-old McLean farmer and a rancher, who filed for county commissioner in Precinct 4. Democratic Executive Secretary Bob Baker reminded potential candidates that midnight tonight is the deadline for filing for a political office.

Finch Gets Chance This Week To Tell His Story

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The surgeon with the sincere eyes tells this week his story of how Mrs. Barbara Jean Finch was shot to death. Dr. R. Bernard Finch is expected to take the witness stand sometime late Tuesday or Wednesday morning to give for the first time his version of his wife's slaying. "We have heard a lot of stories in this trial," Finch told this correspondent. "But when you get down to it I am the only eye-witness to what happened. And I am not guilty of what they say I am." What they say is that Finch, 42, and Carole Tregoff, 23, after a two-year illicit love affair, killed the doctor's brunette wife because she had tied up all his money estimated at \$750,000. The trial resumes today after a postponement since last Tuesday due to the illness of a witness. Had Carole remained silent she might not be on trial as a co-defendant. Not a single witness so far has been placed. Finch's red-haired mistress at the scene of the July 15 slaying outside the cliff-top home in West Covina, Calif. Prosecutor Fred N. Whichello expects to wind up the state's case at noon Tuesday. Whichello has said he will seek the gas chamber both for Finch and Miss Tregoff.

Railroaders Begin Setting Up Strike Vote Apparatus

CHICAGO (UPI)—The 40,000-member Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers (BLE) began setting up its strike vote apparatus Saturday, a move which could herald the nation's first major rail strike in 10 years.

No matter what the vote's outcome, though, a strike could not legally be called for at least two months. If it did come, however, it ultimately could involve 71,000 railroad workers in 21 unions.

The BLE's strike vote, planned to start "sometime" next week, was accepted from Cleveland Friday night by union chief Guy L. Brown. The BLE earlier had broken off federally mediated talks with management.

A second powerful rail union, the 60,000-member Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, also stopped negotiations, they planned no strike vote until first receiving a National (rail) to the BLE's request for a "last step" mediation procedure.

The procedure would provide for federal mediators to offer arbitration in the dispute. Both sides then would have the option of accepting or rejecting the offer. Presumably, the first side to reject would lose somewhat of a propaganda advantage to the offer.

In addition to the BLE and

BLFE, two other major rail unions of on-train employees, the switchmen's and conductors' brotherhoods, were involved in talks. Both the switchmen and conductors planned continued negotiations under federal mediation following a weekend recess.
