Algerian Insurrection Ends After Eight Days

Threat To DeGaulle Over As 500 Rebels Surrender

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
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

Y. - You have, probably, to be the titular but not necessarily the de facto head of a household swarming with teen-agers fully to realize how the payola revelations have strangled the vogue for rock 'n' roll music. It doesn't particularly matter, in the end, what Chairman Harris and his Congressional bloodhounds turn up as statistical data concerning the spread of payola among disc jockeys, All you have to detect is how, so suddenly, rock 'n' roll has all but vanished from disc shows.

A long time ago some of us starchy old gaffers, driven nigh daffy by the discordant wails floating from our children's radio sets, said right out and huffily that disc jockeys just had to be paid to foist this noisome cacophony on the public. No man in his right mind, whatever the low state of his tastes, would elect to curdle his program with this blighting music. Not only were the tunes psychotic, but the lyrics were worse, being idiot collections of English syllables more often than not making no sense. There was one about short shorts, for example, which did little more than repeat that phrase over and over. And if you think American fathers are lawless, consider how few of us seized shotguns and blew those blithering radios to smithereens. Not only were the tunes lustreless and the lyrics maniacal, but the wooflers and warblers, mostly young men not yet old enough to shave, much ess vote, could not sing on key. The only one who stood out at all was the most despised one in adult terms and, looking back across the plague we had, I think we were wrong. Elvis, however swivelled was his anatomy, could at least sing. The later ones, the Fabians and that crew, simply could not sing. Couldn't and can't.

Depraved Taste It did no good to sit our young down and have heart to heart talks on the sublime beauty of good music or the joy to be had from a lovely voice. To have even suggested that rock 'n' roll addiction betrayed at least a depraved taste would have been to kindle hysteria and light rebellion. And I say now, as I did then, that all this horrifying torrent of base, stupid, ear-offending music was forced onto its young public by crass and grasping disc jockeys who did it for money. It never would have happened at all if the boys weren't

paid to foist it. Several disc jockeys, and not one of them is personally known to me, stood their grounds and refused to permit this tripe to soil their shows. One such was a William B. Williams, who covered about four to five hours a day in two sessions daily, who never his show. He would kid about it verbally, burlesque it, but he firmly refused to play any of the guff. More cheers to him for that, There were others.

Suggestive Lyrics

It seems odd to me, who isn't necessarily easy to rowel when wordage becomes slightly suggestive, that only the payola angle has been put under scrutiny and no one has objected to the frankly suggestive and sometimes almost openly obscene themes of the lyrics in some of the rock 'n' roll songs. Teen-agers often pretend to a mockery for what adults believe to be suggestive and laugh it off as harmless, but I have to say that on several occasions the teensters filling my house themselves cut off certain records as being inexcusably "dirty". Death in an airplane crash removed the worst offender, a fellow known as The Big Bopper. He sluiced one song onto the public before death got him that was genuinely obscene and this fact did not prevent radio stations and their disc jockeys from playing

Elvis, himself, has skated close to the borderline on occasion, but the suggestiveness, it always seemed to me, was more in the insinuation of tones than in actual words. This, of course, when you could not see him. When you could, in person, on film or on TV, the suggestiveness became more acute. The plain fact is, though, that off-color lyrics were a part of the whole smelly busi-



what the actual price of gold of gold established after some oscillations on the American market will be higher than \$35 per ounce, the rate of the Gold Reserve Act of 1934. It may be somewhere between \$36 and \$38, perhaps even somewhat higher. Once the mar-

ket price has attained some stability, the time has come to decree this market rate as the new legal parity of the dollar and to secure its unconditional converts ibility at this parity. "A new agency is to be established, the Conversion Agency. The United States government

lends to it a certain amount, let us say one billion dollars, in gold bullion (computed at the new parity), free of interest and never to be recalled. The Conversion Agency - has two functions only: First, to sell gold bullion at the parity price to the public against dollars without any restriction. After a short time, when the mint will have coined a sufficient quantity of new American gold coins, the Conversion Agency will be obliged to hand out

such gold pieces against paper dollars and cheques drawn upon a solvent American bank, Second. to buy, against dollar bills at the legal parity, any amount of gold offered to it. To enable the Conversion Agency to execute this second task it is to be entitled to issue dollar bills against a 100 per cent reserve in gold". It looks to me as if von Mises

had. 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
